Downloading and using the FortifyFL App and/or the SaferWatch with Alyssa's Alert App on your phone or mobile device.

When reporting a tip please provide as much information as possible, including the location, date, and time. The more information that is provided, the better District staff can respond to concerns. These are the non-negotiable bus behavior guidelines:

LEVEL ONE VIOLATIONS

Eating/Drinking on bus. Failure to sit as assigned by bus driver.

LEVEL TWO VIOLATIONS

Disrupting, distracting, disobeying the bus operator. Failure to utilize required safety equipment on the bus. Getting out of seat while bus is in motion. Loud talking, inappropriate remarks or spitting out of the bus window at students, pedestrians, motorists.

LEVEL THREE VIOLATIONS

Placing head, arms and legs outside of window. Opening emergency door while the bus is in motion. Opening or exiting emergency door when the bus is stopped unless directed by the bus operator. Threats against the bus operator, attendant or passengers on the bus. Profanity directed at the bus operator or bus attendant. Fighting on the bus. Throwing objects out of the bus window or at the bus. Vandalism of seats or other bus equipment. Boarding or attempting to board (also attempting to leave) a bus other than the student's assigned route or stop

I understand that riding the bus is a privilege. The consequences for not following the Bus Contract can result in a written reprimand and/or referral, which may result in being suspended from the bus for the remainder of the school year.

You will be notified by telephone and/or in writing when your child(ren) receive(s) a referral. If you have any questions or concerns please call administration and ask for Mrs. Mason.

Below are the actions taken by BCPS Transportation for Levels 1-3 Infractions/Consequences.

LEVEL ONE CONSEQUENCES

- First Offense** Verbal or Written reprimand from the school principal or designee.
- Second Offense** Parent Conference
- Third Offense** Three day bus suspension from school bus transportation

REPEATED OFFENSES: Repeated Level One unacceptable behaviors will be considered willful disobedience and/or open defiance of authority, resulting in suspension from the bus for the remainder of the school year and/or suspension and/or possible expulsion from school.

LEVEL TWO CONSEQUENCES

- First Offense** Verbal or Written reprimand from the school principal or designee.
- Second Offense** One to ten day bus suspension from school bus transportation.
- Third Offense** Bus expulsion from school bus transportation for the remainder of the school year

REPEATED OFFENSES: Repeated Level One unacceptable behaviors will be considered willful disobedience and/or open defiance of authority, resulting in suspension from the bus for the remainder of the school year and/or suspension and/or possible expulsion from school.

LEVEL THREE CONSEQUENCES

- First Offense** One to ten day bus suspension from school bus transportation.
- Second Offense** Ten day school bus suspension from school bus transportation and/or school.
- Third Offense** Bus expulsion from school bus transportation for the remainder of the school year.

REPEATED OFFENSES: Repeated Level One unacceptable behaviors will be considered willful disobedience and/or open defiance of authority, resulting in suspension from the bus for the remainder of the school year and/or suspension and/or possible expulsion from school.

PARENT REMINDERS:

- Parents, please read the [Parent Student Handbook](#) and review with your child . Remember that cell phones are not allowed to be out, on, or in use during the school day. This includes smartphones and watches. We have been working hard to set our students up for success. Please review schoolwide expectations with your student.

ZONES OF REGULATION

This year Nova Eisenhower teachers will be implementing the Zones of Regulation curriculum to help their students gain skills in the area of self-regulation. Self-regulation can go by many names, such as self-control, self-management, and impulse control. It is defined as the best state of alertness of both the body and emotions for the specific situation. For example, when a student plays on the playground or in a competitive game, it is beneficial to have a higher state of alertness. However, that same state could be a challenge in the library. The lessons and learning activities are designed to help the students recognize when they are in the different Zones. The four Zones are categorized by color and there is no “bad” zone. All of the zones are expected at different times and circumstances.

The Blue Zone is used to describe low states of alertness such as sad, sick, or tired.



The Green Zone is an alert, calm state. When in the Green Zone, you are ready to learn, happy, calm, and focused.



The Yellow Zone is a heightened state of alertness and elevated emotions; however, one has some control when they are in the Yellow Zone. In the Yellow Zone, one may be feeling excited, frustrated, anxious/worried, silly, annoyed, overwhelmed, or scared.



The Red Zone is extremely heightened states of alertness and intense emotions. Examples include mad, yelling, angry, aggressive, terrified, or out of control.



The goal is for students to identify their feelings and levels of alertness, recognize emotions in others/read facial expressions, identify effective regulation tools and when and how to use tools, problem solve with positive solutions, and understand how their behaviors influence other's thoughts and feelings (perspective taking).
