Thrive With Us: School District 197 Launches Teacher Scholarship Program

We're thrilled to partner with Metropolitan State University to introduce a new initiative in School District 197—the Thrive With Us Scholarship Program. This initiative, similar to "Grow Your Own" programs, aims to recruit and prepare local community members for teaching roles within the district and help increase teacher diversity to reflect the students that the district serves.

"We believe that having a diverse and thriving educator workforce benefits all students and our community," shared Tye Michaels, Director of Human Resources. "We're excited about the program's first cohort and the dedication these Warriors have already shown our district."

The Thrive With Us program is open to Two Rivers High School seniors and district employees interested in obtaining a teaching license. Recipients receive full scholarships for their education at Metropolitan State University, mentorship from experienced teachers, and regular classroom observations. After graduation, recipients return to School District 197 to teach for at least three years.

We're proud to introduce the inaugural cohort of Thrive With Us scholarship recipients: Caleb Tate, Cayla Friemann, Dominique Harness, and Keyla Betanzos. You may know them, as they have already been working in schools across our district as paraprofessionals!

For Keyla Betanzos, this opportunity is extra special because she grew up in School District 197 schools. "My siblings and I grew up in this district, so we got to meet amazing and inspirational educators through the years," Keyla shared. "I'd love to give back to my community and be that inspirational educator to other students and families."

Get to Know Our Student School Board Representatives

Tell us about your family!

What do you do for a career?

I am a physical therapist at a clinic. I work with patients who are experiencing orthopedic issues such as shoulder or back pain. I also specialize in working with patients with breast cancer and patients with Parkinson's Disease.

The 2024 inductees into the Warrior Hall of Fame are:



After graduating from Henry Sibley in 1955, Gene served as a quartermaster in the U.S. Navy. Gene became a beloved history teacher at Frances M. Grass Junior High in West St. Paul and earned his Juris Doctorate from William Mitchell College of Law in 1968. Appointed a Minnesota First District Court Judge in 1983, he served with distinction until his retirement in 2003. Gene also served as Mayor of Inver Grove Heights and on the Dakota County Board of Commissioners. He passed away in 2012, leaving a lasting legacy.



Laura Ashley Grattan Henry Sibley Class of 1999

A standout multi-sport athlete, Laura Ashley earned All-State and All-Conference honors in soccer, led her team to state championships, and excelled in basketball and track. Academically, she graduated as valedictorian with a 4.0 GPA and was a National Merit Commended Student. After high school, she graduated from Dartmouth, played on the varsity soccer team, and earned an MBA from Harvard Business School. Now a partner at Hg Capital, Laura remains active in community service and lives in the Boston area with her husband and three sons.



Erin Pash Henry Sibley Class of 2005

As the CEO and founder of Ellie Mental Health Services, Erin has transformed mental health care with a mission to make it accessible for everyone. Play for All: Somerset's New Inclusive Playground

Somerset Elementary School is a school community that believes in the power of inclusive education and has worked to build a Somerset family that welcomes and includes all students. But when it came time for recess, their options for inclusion dwindled.

"Our aim at Somerset is to ensure that all students feel like they belong," said Somerset Principal Libby Huettl. "We've created ways to do that inside, but when we go outside for recess, many students with physical and cognitive disabilities have not been able to access our playground."

They Knew They Needed to Make a Change

With the support and determination of Somerset parent Anne St. Martin, their journey to a fully accessible and inclusive playground began. Last spring, Somerset students chose their favorite design, and the community rallied together to start fundraising. In less than three months, the project was fully funded—a remarkable testament to our community's generosity, the state legislature's support, and the kindness of an anonymous donor, fondly referred to as their "Fairy Godmother," who contributed \$200,000.

Play for All

Our community continued to support the project through a community build at the end of July, where volunteers braved the heat and the rain to ensure this playground would be ready for Somerset students before the start of the school year, while the old playground was donated to a school in Central America.

The new Somerset playground, completed in August, includes multiple ramps, a large variety of sensory panels, various heights of slides, musical instruments, an inground wheelchair-accessible merry-go-round, and rubberized flooring for wheelchair access around the entire structure. This is a playground where play is accessible to all, which makes Somerset Elementary the fifth school in Minnesota to feature a fully accessible playground.

"It's wonderful that our community said yes to these kids," said Somerset parent Anne St. Martin. "There are many

things kids with disabilities can't participate in, so finding ways to involve them in the community is crucial. Being able to join in recess and experience the social-emotional benefits of playing with friends is so important. The community stepped up big time, and we're so grateful.

The Somerset community celebrated the grand opening of their new playground with a ribbon-cutting event on September 28. Leo St. Martin, a Somerset student who uses a wheelchair, had the honor of cutting the ribbon before Somerset students eagerly explored the new playground.

Celebrating Culture and Connection With Our American Indian Education Coordinator

Meet Nell Barri, American Indian Education Coordinator for School District 197. Nell is a member of the Red Cliff Band of Lake Superior Ojibwe and has been making an impact on our school community since she joined our team last year. We're thrilled to share more about Nell and her important work in our district.

Hands-On Learning in the Classroom

Ensuring there is Indigenous representation throughout the school district is vital to Nell's role of supporting our Native American students. During her monthly visits to elementary schools, she shares Minnesota's Indigenous heritage and history and enhances classroom lessons with cultural insights. Nell often discusses topics like wild rice harvesting, bringing hands-on items like knocking sticks, a mini birchbark canoe, and wild rice for students to explore.

One of her favorite activities is reading *The Jingle Dancer* by Cynthia Leitich Smith, followed by introducing a real jingle dress for students to touch and admire—a highlight that sparks excitement and curiosity in the classroom.

Fostering Community and Culture

Outside the classroom, Nell organizes monthly community engagement events that cover topics like learning and playing cultural games, having drum and dance, and traditional storytelling. Nell also participates in our schools' cultural events, contributing and performing at many of them. Additionally, Nell facilitates the monthly meetings of the district's American Indian Parent Advisory Committee (AIPAC). This committee provides vital input to ensure the district offers culturally relevant and equitable educational opportunities for its Native American students.

Supporting Secondary Students

Based at Two Rivers High School, Nell works individually with Native American students in grades 9-12, building meaningful connections in her office where students can check in, do homework, or engage in cultural projects. She also organizes culturally relevant federal student loan nights and college tours. This year, Nell launched the Native American Student Group, encouraging students to take charge of the group's direction and impact. She hopes to start a similar group at the middle school level in the future.

School District 197 Educational Equity Coordinator Kevin Sheridan shares, "I am so grateful for the passion Nell brings as our district's first American Indian Education Coordinator. Every day, she makes a difference advocating for our Native students and families while being an invaluable resource for our staff."
