On November 5, Marysville EV School District voters will vote on a 5.5 mill emergency levy. Here are the financial facts to know about the issue:


WHY IS THE SCHOOL DISTRICT ASKING THE COMMUNITY FOR MORE MONEY?



Expenditures exceeding Revenue Revenue is projected to increase only 1% while expenditures are projected to increase by 5%



Depleting Cash Reserve Decreasing annually an average of \$9 million





- increased student needs
- operating expenses
- inflationary costs

Our financial issues are due to low revenue, not high spending.

- no new operating levies in 16 years
- revenue per pupil: \$4,944 below state average
