Board of Education Updates

The Blair Community Schools Board of Education (BOE) held its monthly meeting on Monday, October 14, 2024, at 7:00 PM at the Blair Community Schools Central Office. The meeting covered several important topics affecting the school community.

A request from the Bear Cubs Volleyball Skill Development group to use gymnasium space on Sundays was denied by the BOE. The board felt this would open up Sundays to other group requests, and they felt it was important to continue the practice of reserving Sundays as family time in our community.

Two parents expressed concerns regarding bullying incidents and student safety within the district. At Blair Community Schools, we prioritize creating a safe and supportive environment where every student feels valued and protected, actively addressing concerns about bullying to ensure a positive and inclusive experience for all. Administration will be following up on these concerns and reviewing current practices around reporting and follow up.

The Core Knowledge Language Arts (CKLA) curriculum was brought up in public comment, with some parents raising concerns about story topics within the curriculum. In response to these concerns, the board explained that CKLA is a research-based program grounded in the science of reading, designed to engage learners of all types with a wide variety of stories and genres. They acknowledged that all educational materials have the potential to be controversial but emphasized the need for professional judgment from teachers to determine what is appropriate for students. The CKLA curriculum was not approved at this time. The reading task force has been asked to review EL Education and Bookworms curriculum and will present their findings at the November BOE meeting.

The board approved plans for increased security measures, including the installation of security film on windows and updates to elementary school door locks. They also approved replacing the gym doors at the high school.

As always, the BOE encourages open communication between the school and the community as they work together to address these and other important issues.

We also recognize the importance of hearing from you, our parents and guardians. Therefore, we will be holding a parent meeting in the near future to discuss these issues in more detail and listen to your valuable suggestions. Please know that we are committed to fostering a safe and supportive environment for all of our students, and I will provide an update on our progress in the November newsletter.

Thank you for your ongoing support and partnership in ensuring that our schools remain a positive and inclusive space for every child.

Books for Ownership Program

Blair Community Schools has been selected to receive a grant from <u>Books for Ownership</u>, a program from Reading Is Fundamental's (RIF) in collaboration with the Dollar General Literacy Foundation! This program is designed to empower children by allowing them to choose and keep new, ageappropriate books. Books for Ownership is built on a simple yet powerful idea: when children are given the freedom to choose their own books and have access to them, they become more engaged and enthusiastic readers.

Backed by resources for families, educators, and volunteers, the program ensures that the focus on reading extends beyond the classroom. Research shows that giving children the opportunity to select and own books leads to positive reading behaviors, such as increased motivation, frequency, and engagement. These habits contribute to better reading and writing skills, language development, and overall academic success. Studies have consistently shown that students with more books at home tend to perform better on reading assessments.

Through the Books for Ownership program, each K-5 student at Arbor Park and Deerfield Elementary schools will receive:

- Three new books to take home and keep (ordered through RIF's online bookstore, powered by Scholastic). A designated person at each school will receive login details to manage the ordering and distribution by March 2025.
- Bookplate stickers to personalize their new books, and bookmarks to encourage continued reading.

In total, this grant is providing over \$3200 of supplies for the elementary students of Blair Community Schools. Thank you to Reading is Fundamental and Dollar General Literacy Foundation for your support of our students!



Capitol Visits

This month, Blair Community Schools fourth grade students and the high school Business and Personal Law classes got to visit the Nebraska State Capitol! In 4th grade, students focus on Nebraska History, and the recent trip gave students a fantastic opportunity to experience it firsthand. They explored key landmarks, deepened their understanding of the state's history and government, and saw their learning come to life in meaningful ways.

One highlight was their visit to the Supreme Court room, where they had the chance to sit in this beautiful and historic space. It was a valuable and enriching experience for all!

In Business and Personal Law, students recently finished discussing constitutional rights and learning about the court system in the United States. To culminate these units, they were able to visit the capitol and listen in on some oral arguments in the Nebraska Supreme Court.

Students then entered the courtroom and were able to ask questions of the seven Nebraska Supreme Court Justices. They talked about their journey to becoming justices and the process they go through after hearing oral arguments before rendering their decision. The students got to see how the curriculum applies to the real world.









Blair Water Treatment Plant

On September 25th and 26th, Blair High School students in the Avenue Scholar Program had a unique opportunity to visit the Blair Water Treatment Plant and get an up-close look at the construction work happening on-site. During the visit, students not only observed the construction in progress but also learned about the various phases of such a large-scale project, from initial design to implementation. The tour highlighted the collaboration between different professionals, including engineers, project managers, and skilled tradespeople, showing students the diverse range of careers that contribute to a successful project.

A big thank you to Eriksen Construction for generously hosting the students and providing an inside look at what goes into a project of this magnitude. The experience opened the students' eyes to potential career opportunities in construction, engineering, and other related fields, giving them a clearer understanding of the skills and education needed for these paths. Visits like these are invaluable in helping students explore their future career interests and make more informed decisions about their next steps.
