



We look forward to our continued participation in these events.





Mission Statement



Restorative Justice Training

SBOE Members were trained in Restorative Justice practices. This training was facilitated by Dr. Shaniqua Jones. SBOE members learned about the alternate practices of discipline.

- The SBOE Executive Board planned the annual Student Board Leadership Retreat.
- The purpose of this retreat was to work on team building and to build personal relationships.
- Members were also trained on parliamentary procedures and the way the SBOE functions.

College and Career Panel

- The Student Board of Education partnered with the <u>Sou</u>thland Juvenile Justice Council and successfully hosted the Three E's of Success College and Career panel on December 4, 2021.
- Students were able to get their questions answered from panelists who are currently enrolled in college, in the workforce, attended trade school, or looking to pursue entrepreneurship.
- We had a total of 152 attendees, including both students and parents.





College and Career Panel

• Eight colleges were present, and students were able to speak with representatives from those colleges at the end of the panel.







John Bradley Awards Committee

- The Dr. John Bradley Awards Committee is in the process of planning a banquet that will celebrate Dr. John Bradley and award those who have made an impact in the community.
- The following award categories have been finalized: Good Health Place Award, Living Black History Award, Dr. John Bradley Community Service

Buildingand Grounds Committee ard.

- The Buildings and Grounds committee successfully launched its student maintenance request forms, a form similar to the existing maintenance request forms but for the student body.
- The committee has worked alongside administration to finalize the process of the procedure for students to submit their maintenance requests. The process includes email notification and regular verification of submitted responses.

Southland Juvenile Justice Youth Advisory Council (SJJYC)

- The Southland Juvenile Justice Youth Committee successfully had all the Student Board of Education members trained by Dr. Shaniqua Jones in restorative justice.
- They are planning to find more solutions for the truancy issues within our district. We have realized the best way to improve our district such as grades, discipline, and mental health is to start with truancy. The goal is to ensure that each student has an alternate option outside of disciplinary action.

Cultural Events Committee

- The Cultural Events Committee distributed a survey to the members to see what activities they would like to partake in.
- The committee is in the process of planning an activity for the members using the results.

Superintendent's Special Committee

- The Superintendent's Special Committee has implemented the Pyramid of Success in District 205. Posters and flyers of the incentive system have been posted and distributed within the district, and parents and students have been notified through email and social media.
- For Quarter 1, 83 students placed in Exemplary, 583 students placed in Honorary, and 498 students placed in Satisfactory.

Election and Graduation Committee

- The Election Committee is in the process of preparing for the upcoming election.
- The Graduation Committee has provided college resources to the seniors to help with the college admissions process, partnered with Curriculum to provide the seniors with guidance for the SAT, and now seniors are on track to receiving admission letters and financial aid awards.

Public Relations Committee

- The Public Relations Committee has been building the brand of the Student Board of Education through Instagram and Twitter.
- They have collaborated with the Curriculum and Instruction to promote College and Career Panel within the three schools.

Cafeteria Committee

- The Cafeteria Committee has been relaying complaints from the students to the Superintendent and Sodexo.
- The committee has completed one inspection, and will be conducting more inspections in the second semester.
- A meeting will be held with Sodexo after winter break.

Curriculum and Instruction Committee

- The Curriculum and Instruction Committee hosted a SAT Workshop for senior SBOE members to provide them with guidance and instruction prior to the October SAT.
- The committee sat in on all district committee meetings hosted by Mr. Brett Fickes to offer a connection between the district's curricular needs and the Student Board of Education.
- They have planned and hosted the Three E's of Success College and Career Panel on December 4th, 2021 at Thornton Township High School. This event's initiative was to drive students to explore the different opportunities following the graduation of high school whether that is to enlist in the military, enroll in a four-year or two-year institution or trade school, or become employed with a livable wage of income.


Illinois Farm Bureau and the Illinois Press Foundation announced the awarding of grants to 18 high school journalism efforts throughout the state. The awards are part of the Illinois High School Media Mini-Grants Program offered by the Illinois Press Foundation and financially sponsored this year by Illinois Farm Bureau. This year IPF Director, Mr. Jeff Rogers came to present the \$1500 check and speak with the student journalists.

Thornridge Journalism sponsors, Mrs. Lisa Joseph and Ms. Erika Zachery, have earned this prestigious grant three times: 2018, 2019, and 2021 for a grand total of \$4500.

The earned monies are used to purchase new computer equipment, media storage solutions, and digital camera equipment. These new tools are for the students use to continue creating the award-winning Bagpipe publication. The IPF and IFB have provided more than \$22,000 total in grants being distributed to the schools in the fall of 2021 to pay for laptops, cameras, podcasting stations, and more. The Illinois Press Foundation Board of Directors' Education Committee selected the grant recipients from a large field of applicants.



2021 Maximum Tax Increase by Law: 1.4%

School Districts in Tax-Capped Counties Limited by Rate of Inflation


History of CPI's Used for Tax Cap Calculations



The 1.4% percentage represents District-wide maximum increase and average increase to taxpayers. Individual tax bills may increase above or below this figure based on changes to the equalized assessed values to their property. District can exceed 1.4% increase only with new property growth.

Property Tax Relief Grant

- The State of Illinois implemented a \$50 million Statewide Property Tax Relief Grant Program for this 2021 tax year.
- ■If Thornton Township High School District 205 applies for the grant, it will receive a perpetual increase in its Evidenced-Based funding level of \$3,125,000. In turn, it must abate (reduce) its tax levy by \$3,197,000 in each of the next two years.
- It is recommended that the District apply for the grant prior to the January 2022 deadline.
- ■The grant would provide tax relief to the community in each of the next two year's tax extensions.
- ■If approved, this board, will have given back to the taxpayers of Thornton Township, more than \$13 million in property tax relief the past 4 tax years.

Estimated Impact to District — Including PTRG

Versus Prior Year

- It is estimated that the tax extension for non-bond and interest funds will increase \$1,478,000.
- It is estimated that the tax extension for the bond fund will be flat.
- Therefore, the total increase in real estate tax revenues is estimated to be approximately \$1,478,000 to the District.

Estimated Impact to Taxpayers – Including PTRG

Assuming \$100,000 Market Value Home

- The increase due to non-bond and interest levy is approximately \$22 versus the previous tax year.
- The bond and interest levy is projected to be flat.
- Therefore, the total annual increase is estimated to be approximately \$22 versus the previous tax year.
