



- Board of Education Approved:
  - Installation of an electric heating and air conditioning system (\$13,838,920)
  - Peak shaving generator (\$2,139,733) for Thornton Township High School
  - Total approved \$15,978,653

# Peak Shaving Generator Capacity Recap

- Planned capacity allows for heating and air conditioning system to function without electricity.
- To increase capacity to allow instruction to continue without electricity will require an additional \$1,500,000
- The power outage at Thornton on XXX would not have effected students if a peak shaving generator with instructional capacity existed.



- Water Source Heat Pump System

## System Comparison

#### **Electric**

- Pros
  - Lower up front costs
  - Heating & cooling from same unit
  - More efficient than a forced air system
  - Good individual room temperature control

#### **Water Assisted**

- Pros
  - Heating & cooling from same unit
  - More energy efficient than an electric system and forced air system
  - Will utilize existing outdoor openings
  - Good individual room temperature control

## System Comparison

#### **Electric**

- Cons
  - Electric system, and electric rates are usually higher than gas
  - Higher energy costs
  - Life expectancy of 12 15 years
  - New power must be run to every classroom
  - Units require larger wall openings than standard units
  - Units are larger than existing classroom units

#### **Water Assisted**

- Cons
  - Higher up front costs
  - Life expectancy of 28 30 years
  - New power must be run to every classroom

## Funds Available for Capital Improvement

- \$1,078,205 IDEA (Individuals with Disabilities Education Act) ARRA (American Recovery and Reinvestment Act) funding that has been allocated to capital projects (Thornton Windows, Thornton Auditorium, and Cafeterias).
- \$677,000 Life safety work on HVAC system not necessary with system being replaced.
- \$885,000 Approved Thornton District 205 has responded to six Freedom of Information Act requests since the last board meeting. A response was mailed/emailed within five business days.

## Thornton HVAC System


- The Board of Education has previously approved \$15,978,653 for an electric HVAC system and peak shaving generator.
- A water assisted system is projected to provide a long term savings to the district of \$6,442,050, and will allow the proposed peak shaving generator to provide enough power for classroom instruction.
- The additional cost for a water assisted system is projected to be \$2,505,000.



## School Energy Efficiency Project Grant

- The Thornton window replacement project qualifies for as an energy efficiency program, and District 205 will be submitting an application for the grant.
- If awarded the District can receive up to \$250,000 in funding assistance on the project.
- Grant applications are submitted by building to maximize the amount the district is eligible to receive.
