

Thornton Tennis Courts

- Work was stopped on the tennis courts at Thornton when the soil was found to be inadequate.
- CMM Group has agreed to honor their proposed pricing on the project if it is completed in the spring of 2010.
- CMM proposed three pricing options to prepare the ground and they were reviewed by the Finance Committee.
- The Finance Committee is recommending that CMM complete the work by removing all asphalt from the area, removing the wet clay and replacing it with 12 inches of stone for a foundation and then lay the asphalt on top of this.
- The additional cost for this option will be \$48,237 over the price of the contract (\$216,000).

District 205 Math Program

Rationale

- 4 years of math required for graduation
 - Required sequence includes Algebra, Geometry, Algebra II
- Algebra is the standard for grade 9
 - Many states beginning to require Algebra in grade 8
 - Delaying Algebra to grade 10 has significant impact on students' future opportunities
- ACT Recommended Core includes:
 - Algebra I
 - Geometry
 - Algebra II
 - Additional higher level math

College and Career Readiness

- College Algebra Benchmark ACT score is 22
- College and Career Readiness require students to meet the same expectations
 - Graduates entering the workforce require the same reading and math skills as first-year college students in order to obtain jobs that:
 - Offer salaries above the poverty line
 - Can sustain a family of four
 - Offer prospects for career advancement

40% of ACT is "Algebra"


 The Algebra portion of ACT includes topics from Algebra I and Algebra II (some appear in both courses)


Impact of Courses Taken on ACT Achievement

•Students who take the recommended core score an average of 2.5 points higher than those who only complete Algebra II

EXPLORE Exam

- Supported and funded by Illinois State Board of Education
- Common Core Standards movement for K-12 students will likely align more closely to EXPLORE, PLAN and ACT than current ISAT exam
- Need access to student-specific data from the EXPLORE exam

Year-Long Algebra I

- Proposed by math teachers
- Stressed the importance of students completing coursework beyond Algebra II
- Students would be ready for Geometry sophomore year
- U.S. Department of Education research (Adelman 1989)


Highest Math Studied in H.S.	% of H.S. Grads who completed Degrees
Calculus	79.8%
Trigonometry	62.2%
Algebra II	39.5%

Double Dose Algebra I and Geometry

- Double Dose Algebra on the current bell schedule proposed in the District Improvement Plan by math teachers
- Double Dose Geometry proposed to begin in 2009-2010
- Double Dose provides almost 2,700 more minutes of instructional time than Year-Long Algebra on the block schedule
 - Block: 85 minutes x 178 days= 15,130 minutes
 - Double Dose: 100 minutes x 178 days= 17,800 minutes

What is NOT the answer?

- Placing students in courses that the data predict will not prepare them to meet standards and be college or career ready
- Failing students and starting them over to repeat entire semesters
 - There is little or no evidence that repeated failure makes students more responsible (Guskey)
 - Threat of failure is more likely to motivate high achieving students than low achieving students (Canady)
 - Historically the success rate in repeat courses has been has been low

What can be done?

- Continue to refine Double Dose based on outcomes and results
 - Connect needed skills to the outcomes for Algebra
- Clearly identify the right benchmarks to be taught and make sure students know the learning expectations at the beginning of the course
- Connect the content to ...
 - students' learning styles
 - real-world applications
 - technology

- Shift focus from failure to "A, B, C or Not Yet"
- A consistent and timely re-do policy that expects students to re-do work until it meets standards
- Structure extra help to address standards and benchmarks, not only to provide homework help
- Professional development in teaching rigorous courses for all students

Presentation of Tentative Tax Levy (Policy Section 2.34)

TENTATIVE TAX LEVY EXPLANATION

• What is a levy?

A levy is simply the amount of money a school district certifies to be raised from the property tax. In the case of the levy, we ask for funds and funds will be given, but no more than what we requested and are entitled to by law. The tax levy for the current tax year represents taxes that are payable the next calendar year and given to the district over a period of months. We are currently receiving taxes for the levy that was filed in December 2008.

Tentative Tax Levy (cont.)

• Why is a tentative levy being adopted?

The estimated levy amount determines what the legal requirements are for subsequent actions under the Truth in Taxation Act.

Why is the tentative levy being adopted now?

- \$ The Truth in Taxation Act affects all units of local government. Under this Act, "At least 20 days prior to the adoption of its aggregate levy, the local board of education shall estimate the dollar amount of the aggregate levy for the current year."
- \$ In Cook County if the estimated levy is greater than 105% of the previous year's extension, the school district must publish a notice in a local newspaper stating the increased amount and schedule and conduct a public hearing on the increase before the levy can be adopted and filed. The final Certificate of Tax Levy must be filed with the County Clerk on or before the last Tuesday in December.

Economic Update

- The economy does impact District 205
- The impact has been partially delayed because property taxes are collected one year in arrears. This means that the taxes paid in 2009 were assessed and were for the 2008 year.
- Additionally the State of Illinois used federal stimulus dollars to ensure funding for their 2009-2010 commitments.

State Funding

- On November 16, 2009 District 205 met with State Superintendent of Schools Dr. Christopher Koch to discuss State funding.
- 2010-2011 will see a decrease in State funding.
- Dr. Koch advised District 205 to be conservative in budgeting the 2010-2011 year because currently Illinois is facing a 9 billion dollar deficit, and at least 1 billion is in education.
- State funding represents approximately 30% of District 205 revenues; a 20% reduction in funding would mean a cut of approximately 6 million dollars from the 2010-2011 budget.

Local Funding

- Local funding represents approximately 60% of District 205 revenues.
- Property taxes make up over 90% of the local revenues.
 The 2009 taxes (collected in 2010) are limited to an increase of 0.1% from the 2008 taxes.
- Because of the increase in the assessed valuation of property in the district, the tax rate will slightly decrease from the 2008 rate.
- Because of home foreclosures and businesses going under it is likely that less taxes will be collected in 2010 than in 2009, which will result in District 205 receiving less in taxes in 2010 than in 2009.


Local Funding Example

- The businesses listed below have been negatively impacted by the economy, and that impact will also be felt by District 205.
 - Allison Haggerty Buick, Pontiac, GMC \$14,662.38
 - Gibson Chevrolet \$376,435.24
 - Saturn of South Holland \$63,229.83
 - South Holland Dodge \$98,047.05
- The elementary and high schools are the biggest recipient of property taxes, and will feel the biggest impact of a decrease in property tax collections.
