Lost, stolen, or damaged Ventra cards require new paperwork and a \$10 replacement fee. Please see Mr. Valant and/or Mrs. Verdin.








English Department

• Creative Expression:



From the Desk of Mr. Arrington



According to research, only 3% of the U.S. population will take time to set goals or create a plan for their future. That 3% will earn more than all of the other 97% combined. One of the exciting things about the Education and Career Tech (ECT) class is that, in addition to learning about amazing technology and software, Outlook juniors and seniors set goals and create a plan concerning their future. After setting goals, students begin researching careers, colleges and the trades. The data is compiled in MS Excel, using tables as they learn various spreadsheet functions. Next students create a research essay based upon their research as they

learn MS Word and Google Docs

word processing features. Students also create a personal resume. Lastly, students present their college and career choice research to the class using MS PowerPoint and Google slides features, including required images, videos and tables. Students are already off to a great start for the new school year. Advanced Computers Apps (ACA) students are already ahead of the pack, as some will begin testing for the Microsoft Office Specialist certification (MOS) soon after the Labor Day holiday. Last year, 87% of students taking the ACA class passed at least one MOS certification. This school year's goal is to increase that number to 100%. Let's go!



Science Department

From the Desk of Ms. Anderson

Students in the Integrated Science – Science in Cinema class are in the middle of the Biology Unit, which focuses on the human body. Students are tasked with creating life-size body posters and detailing how a specific drug and disease affected ten body systems. The drugs and illnesses assigned were those that are (unfortunately) prevalent in the community.

After studying witness statements as evidence, and determining the validity of those statements, students in the Forensic Science Semester 1 course are studying what is evidence and how it is processed. This month students examined fingerprint evidence. Students learned how to make fingerprints using traditional ink and inkless methods. They also learned how to transfer fingerprints from one surface to another.

IG students will look at how various drugs and illnesses affect each system of the body. The illnesses and drugs covered are those that well know among students' ethnic groups and include OTC and illegal drugs.

Forensic students will continue to focus on different types of evidence with a study of footwear prints (including castings) up next!

- **Election Strategies:** Investigate the campaign strategies used by Trump and Harris, including their approaches to debates, media engagement, and voter outreach.


Political Spectrum and Ideologies:

US History

As we began semester, we are discussing how US was torn apart due to the Civil War.

Learning objectives for studying the Civil War might include:
Analyze the political, economic, and social factors that led to the Civil War, including issues of slavery, states' rights, and sectionalism.

Recognize the roles and contributions of major figures such as Abraham Lincoln, Jefferson Davis, Ulysses S. Grant, and Robert E. Lee, as well as the perspectives of various groups like the Union and Confederate soldiers, abolitionists, and civilians.

Evaluate the significance of major battles (e.g., Gettysburg, Antietam) and military strategies used by both the Union and the Confederacy.

Understand how the Civil War affected American society, including changes in the roles of women, the impact on African Americans, and the economic consequences for the South.

Investigate the goals, successes, and failures of the Reconstruction period, including the amendments

to the Constitution and the challenges faced in rebuilding the nation.

Discuss the long-term effects of the Civil War on American politics, race relations, and national identity.

In order for students to make those connections to historical content,

- we watched the film "Glory." This movie tells the story of how runaway slaves joined the Northern Army and their courage helped turned the tide in favor of the North.

Glory objectives

Objectives/Student Outcomes:

Students will identify how the struggle to make an end to slavery a goal of the Civil War. They will expand their knowledge of the participation of black soldiers in the Civil War as well as the commitment of white abolitionists to the cause of ending slavery. Research and writing assignments in pursuit of these topics can be of great benefit in the study of the conflict that cost more American lives than any other.

Assessments following "Glory."

Here are the following assignments, please select one:

- 1. You are a soldier in the 54th Regiment, please write a one-page letter home to a loved one. In the letter, you will describe your experiences of fighting in the war.
- 2. You are a movie critic who just viewed the release of "Glory." Write a movie review about the historical accuracy of the film.

- 3. You are a journalist assigned to cover the 54th Regiment. Write a news story giving an account of what life was like for the African American soldiers.
- 4. In a personal essay, write an account describing how the Civil War caused America to confront its racial prejudices and begin to look at African Americans as citizens and not slaves. Discuss how this idea of equality made America honor its declaration that "All Men Are Created Equal."

In Intro to Art, students are utilizing the Elements of Art; Line, Shape, Value, and Form to create an artwork of a bouquet of tulips using oil pastels. In Visual Design students are creating a cakes art piece inspired by the artist Wayne Thiebaud, who is well known for his dessert's artworks. As we move into the new school year, I want to take a moment to highlight an important topic that affects us all: **National Suicide Prevention Month**. September is a time to raise awareness about suicide, connect individuals to mental health resources, and offer support to those who may be struggling. Suicide is a challenging and sensitive subject, but discussing it openly is a crucial step toward prevention. The more we talk about it, the better we can understand the warning signs and help each other.

Recognizing the Warning Signs

Here are some warning signs to watch for in students or loved ones:

- Talking about feeling hopeless or having no reason to live
- Withdrawing from friends, family, and activities they once enjoyed
- Unexplained anger, irritability, or mood swings
- Changes in sleep patterns, either sleeping too little or too much
- Increased use of drugs or alcohol
- Expressing thoughts of being a burden to others

These signs don't necessarily mean someone is thinking about suicide, but they are indicators that they may need help and support. Don't hesitate to reach out to them, encourage them to talk to someone they trust, or offer to connect them with a professional.

How You Can Help

- **Be Present:** Sometimes just being there and listening can make all the difference.
- Reach Out: Encourage students, friends, or colleagues to speak to a trusted adult if they're struggling.
- Connect to Resources: Familiarize yourself with local and national resources like the 988 Suicide & Crisis Lifeline.

For Students: How to Start the Conversation

Talking about mental health and suicide can feel overwhelming, but it doesn't have to be. Here are a few simple ways to start the conversation:

- "I've noticed you haven't seemed like yourself lately. Do you want to talk?"
- "I care about you and just want to make sure you're okay."
- "You don't have to go through this alone. I'm here for you."

Remember, small actions can have a big impact.

Final Thoughts

National Suicide Prevention Month is an opportunity for all of us to be reminded of the importance of mental health. Let's use this month to educate ourselves, have open conversations, and continue building a supportive school environment where everyone feels safe, valued, and heard.

As always, my door is open to any student, family member, or staff member who needs support, resources, or just someone to talk to. We are all in this together.
