

steppingstones to improvement. Here is to a future where every setback spark curiosity, every obstacle fuels determination, and every error inspires a steadfast commitment to learn and grow.


### From the Desk of Mr. Bailey

### Science Department

Integrated Science Sem.2 students are studying forensic Psychology in this unit. This unit teaches students about the criminal justice system, as well as give them insight into the criminal mind. This lays the foundation for their final project, which is a psychological study of a chosen serial killer.

Forensic Science Semester 2 students have completed their study of evidence and psychology and are now analyzing actual case evidence. First up is the Casey Anthony case. Casey Anthony was charged with the murder of her 2-year-old daughter, Caylee, and was acquitted. However, she was charged and convicted of lying to law enforcement during the investigation. This case led to new legislation, called Caylee's Law. This law makes it a crime not to report a missing child.

#### Try This:

As a part of the Forensic Psychology Unit, students were asked to try their hand at Criminal Profiling. Use the information about the crime scene, to develop a profile for the killer. Good Luck! (If you would like to check your answer, email your answers to janderson@ttdistrict205.net

According to police reports, 10 black women ranging in age from 20-25, were found murdered in their homes with one bullet to the middle forehead. The women did not know each other, and the only commonality between them was that they had gone through, or were going through, a nasty divorce and/or custody situation. There were no signs of forced entry at any of the crime scenes. At each crime scene, a toy train car was left next to each of the victims.

My point to them is that we should listen to all genres and not be quick to dismiss any form of music because it's a part of expression and the arts.

One activity that was worked on was 1950's Facts and Figures. We got a chance to look at the cost of living, fashion, TV shows and movies.

We found how television became a popular form of entertainment during this.

The objectives were:

- The birth of Rock and Roll. We watched a video clip of "American Bandstand."


