






## Math Department

The second quarter of statistics has begun as we move into April. We have completed our lessons on terminology. The students will begin to explore the concept of a normal distribution. We have begun working on the measure of central tendency.

During the next several weeks we will explore z-scores of the normal distribution. We will understand how percentiles and areas under the normal curve relate to total populations. We will then move on to frequency tables and graphs.

Students used dice rolls to determine how the chip fell down the board and were able to evolve their theory of where the disk is most likely to land.








## English Department

## Business Department

#### From the Desk of Ms. Digiacomo

The students just finished how transactions affect the Accounting Equation. They can differentiate between assets, liabilities, and owner's equity. They can determine if they analyzed the transactions correctly by proving the accounting equation is in balance after completing the assignment. They completed a project titled "Cell Check" which includes a business simulation in which they have to analyze transactions, determine the net worth of the business, and be able to classify various accounts into Assets, Liabilities, and Equity.

Next, the students will be able to analyze transactions using t-accounts. T-accounts are very useful to help students identify how to analyze transactions into debit and credit parts. They use the whiteboard desks in our classroom to assist them with this.

#### **Accounting Semester 2:**

The students just completed learning about worksheets. Worksheets in accounting are a precursor to complete financial statements. It is considered an accounting tool. They just completed a project titled

"Burke's Bike Shop" which included determining how to adjust assets, update expenses, and determine net income for the business. It also included the students determining how to complete the four sections of the worksheet.

Now, they can prepare financial statements. Financial statements are a way for outsiders to determine if a business is making money or losing money. The financial statements they will be preparing are the income statement and balance sheet.

#### From the Desk of Mr. Arrington

Intro to Business students will begin researching how companies incorporate cutting-edge technology including e-commerce and artificial intelligence (AI). Additionally, students will learn about company growth, development, and quality assurance.

Congratulations to Arikaton "Ricky" Robinson who is on track to be the first Outlook student to earn a MOS certification in MS Access after earning certifications in MS Word, PowerPoint, and Excel. Advanced Computer Apps students have accumulated 64 Microsoft Office Specialist (MOS) Certifications so far this school year.

Students are encouraged to attend CP for needed assistance.




## Science Department

Students in the Integrated Science – Science in Cinema class are in the middle of the Earth Science Unit. In addition to studying various types of Natural Disasters (see pictures), students will also be looking at life in a zero-gravity atmosphere. Students will end the unit modifying the designs of everyday inventions so that they will function in space.

Students in the Forensic Science Semester 2 course have just completed units in Digital and Medical Forensics. In Digital Forensics, students took an in-depth look at their personal devices for security risks and vulnerabilities. In medical Forensics, students played the role of diagnosticians to determine illnesses and courses of treatment.




The overarching goal of Diversity Month is to encourage understanding, respect, and acceptance of all individuals regardless of their backgrounds or identities, ultimately promoting a more equitable and inclusive society. It's often observed in various contexts, including workplaces, educational institutions, and communities, to recognize and appreciate differences in race, ethnicity, gender, sexual orientation, religion, disability, and other aspects of identity.

#### From the Desk of Mr. Martin

In our 4th Term, we opened with a lengthy discussion regarding Reconstruction. I asked the students this question "Why did Reconstruction fail to secure equality for African Americans?"

From that question, we discussed how the 13th Amendment abolished slavery, and the federal troops were stationed in the South to guarantee the protection of the newly freed slaves.



We watched the film "Freedom Road," which told the story of how newly freed slaves worked side by side with whites to purchase land. They developed new friendships and showed how the races could work together in peace and harmony. The students had study questions to answer during the film.

The students, along with myself, discussed the court case "Plessy vs. Ferguson" and the impact it had on society as the premise of separate but equal became the basis for American society. Some of the students articulated how the American democracy was threatened because the federal government refused to take a strong stand on equality. We discovered that many of the politicians in Washington were Southerners who were former Confederates that wanted to keep African Americans as second-class citizens.

Therefore, students concluded that Reconstruction ended because the federal government moved away from racial equality because we withdrew troops and began to concentrate on the Industrial Revolution and the Labor Movement.

# Welcome to Visual Arts

#### From the Desk of Mrs. Martinez

Welcome to Term 4 in the Visual Arts Classroom. We have been busy creating wonderful artwork while learning about the Elements of Art. We started off the term with a mini lesson on diversity and inclusion. While this may not relate directly to the arts, it is important to understand its value in the world we live in. What is diversity and inclusion and what does it mean for each student? Students completed an activity where they could express what diversity and inclusion meant to them.

Our next mini lesson was a refresher on understanding and practicing the Elements of Art. For those students that completed Intro to Art Semester 1 and Visual Design Semester 1, this mini lesson was a terrific way to reinforce what they learned in the Semester 1 classes and apply them to Semester 2 classes.

Our first big art project was creating a Tessellation artwork inspired by the artist M.C. Escher who is most famous for not only his incredible Tessellation artworks but also optical illusion artworks. The artist's official website, mcescher (2024) states, "He is most famous for his so-called impossible constructions,

such as Ascending and Descending, Relativity as well as his Transformation Prints, such as Metamorphosis" (main page, first paragraph). For this art project, students created their own Tessellation design template, then created a repeat pattern, and then applied color theory and shading to their artwork.

Our next project involved recreating a cartoon character (Intro to Art S2) or a branded chip bag (Visual Design S2). Using the grid enlargement method, students learned to break down objects into shapes and lines and connect them from one grid box to the next as they enlarged their example cartoon character or chip bag design. Once the enlargement was completed, students used acrylic paint to complete their grid enlargement.

The last art project the students completed before spring break was building and creating their kites. Our students were allowed to meet with a storm chaser where he talked about the anatomy and science of a storm and tornado. To reinforce the lesson on weather, students built and created their flying kites. Through this lesson, students learned a little about engineering, product development, and design.

The students have learned so much thus far and it has been enjoyable to get students to learn how the visual arts and visual design bring creativity into the world.

- 7. Have you informed your family and friends about the graduation time and date?
- 8. Most importantly, Do you have a plan in place for what you will do after High School? Whether it is attending college, entering the workforce, Military, or pursuing other opportunities you need a plan.
