# Math Department

#### From the Desk of Mrs. Garza

Who said math isn't fun? Students in my class are having fun making sense of problems and preserving in solving them. Students are working in small groups and talking about math. They are learning from their mistakes. They find that many of their mistakes come from them not attending to precision. Making sense of problems and attending to precision are 2 of the 8 Standards of Mathematical Practice. Those two standards are extremely important skills in the workforce. Students are also developing their selfawareness and self-management skills to achieve school and life goals. Developing those skills is one of the 3 goals of Social Emotional Learning. Students are reaching out to help others achieve their goals. I notice this while I hear a student struggling with a math problem and another student offers to help. Another way the students have fun in class and reach Social Emotional Learning goals is by using socialawareness and interpersonal skills to establish and maintain positive relationships. We have Fun Friday's when students have finished their classwork for the week, and students still are learning by trying out new games. An example is students have enjoyed playing Uno Flip which was unfamiliar to them, but they gave it a chance, learned how to play, and learned rules are very important in math, while playing games, and in life.



#### From the Desk of Mr. Bailey

The second quarter of statistics has begun here in November. We have completed our lessons on terminology. The students will begin to explore the concept of a normal distribution. We have begun working on the measure of central tendency. During the next several weeks we will explore z-scores of the normal distribution. We will understand how percentiles and areas under the normal curve relate to total populations. We will then move on to frequency tables and graphs.

Students used dice rolls to determine how the chip fell down the board and were able to evolve their theory on where the disk is most likely to land.



# English Department


#### From the Desk of Mrs. Goodman

The students are working on comic strip projects, as well as character profiles of the main characters in the play.


We've learned about mass hysteria and how it affects everyone involved. We made connections to our own personal lives and how mass hysteria has shown itself to us.





# Business Department

Introduction to Business students began the 2<sup>nd</sup> Session learning about business technology and careers. Students were introduced to computerized business systems and programming including HTML (Hypertext Markup Language) and Pyton coding. Student also discussed how emerging technology such as QR codes and AI (Artificial Intelligence) will affect the way they learn and do business in the future.

Advanced Computer Apps students are actively working to become Microsoft Office Specialist (MOS). Students receive certifications in MS Word, Excel, PowerPoint, and Access. Currently students have obtained a total of 26 MOS certifications. Each student must complete a resume' before the completion of this course. Congratulations to Yamilet Carachure for being the first student to pass the MOS Exam in MS Word, PowerPoint and Excel this school year.





#### From the Desk of Ms. Digiacomo




Accounting Session 2: The students are excited to start a new semester! The first item on

the curriculum for second semester is preparing a worksheet. In accounting, worksheets are used as a planning tool for accountants. Worksheets are helpful in the preparation of financial statements

and in preparing adjusting entries at the end of the fiscal period. After completing the worksheets, the students will prepare financial statements, an income statement, and a balance sheet. On the income statement, the component percentages will be calculated and on the balance sheet, they will be able to provide current capital. Introduction to Business: The students have identified different types of businesses: manufacturing,

extracting, service, and merchandising, and what types of employees are needed for each type of business. They are currently working on a franchise business project. The project requires the students to differentiate between start-up costs and royalty fees. They are also required to give a presentation about 3 different franchises in this county.














# Science Department

As we near the halfway point for 2nd Session the Civics classes are preparing to take the Constitution Test and fulfill another one of their graduation requirements. We have also been analyzing the differences between Republican and Democrat ideology. The students took an online Political Personality Quiz. The students could then analyze and identify what beliefs were responsible for where they were placed on the political


spectrum. As we move closer to May and graduation, please remember that passing the Constitution Test is a graduation requirement. If you have any concerns about fulfilling this

# Visual Arts Department

Welcome to the Visual Arts at Outlook Academy. Sir Ken Robinson, Ph.D. stated, "Creativity is not the opposite of discipline and control. On the contrary, creativity in any field may involve deep factual knowledge and high levels of practical skill. Cultivating creativity is one of the most interesting challenges for any teacher. It involves understanding the real dynamics of creative work."

Creativity is an essential component in creating art. Sometimes there is fear and hesitation when learning about new art mediums and techniques but once students.

understand the how and the why and with a little bit of practice, that fear subsides, and their creativity emerges.

One of the art projects we have been working on is a paper relief sculpture through a paper folding art project. Students learned how to measure out paper by cutting them down to 3"x3" squares which were then used to create three different paper folds. These folds were then arranged in a radial symmetrical design. Radial means circular and symmetrical means the same all around.

Currently, students are using the art medium of oil pastels. First students practiced blending colors and how to properly apply the oil pastels to



paper. Now students are working on a large-scale art piece by drawing out various-sized feathers, overlapping them, having some come off the paper, and finally using color theory to color in and blend the oil pastels.

It is always a positive learning experience when students are willing to step out of their comfort zone and show their creativity.




### Program Director
