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








Math Department

From the Desk of Mrs. Garza

Welcome to a New School Year! Students in Mrs. Garza's classes are reviewing Algebraic concepts and focusing on the Standards for Mathematical Practice. The emphasis is currently on making sense of problems and preserving in solving them and attending to precision. While most students here at Outlook Academy have disliked math for most of their school career, in Mrs. Garza's class those students begin to see they can learn math and be good at it. Students are given immediate feedback on each problem they attempt and encouraged to find their mistakes and learn from them. When students discover their mistakes are not linked to their mathematic ability, but rather from carelessness, their confidence in their mathematical ability increases which leads to success in this class. During E-Learning, students took a math diagnostic assessment at IXL.com and then were encouraged to practice skills IXL recommends for them. IXL is a program that meets students at their current level. With practice, students will increase their math skills over time.

We started the year of with the discussion of is it possible for a person to 'smell' the distinct color of playing cards? Can a person get 12 out of 12, right? The closest student got only 10. So, when a lady in England can do it, not with playing cards, but with Parkinsons disease, we should take notice. 

Introduction to Business students began the 1st Session learning about important economic business indicators such as a nation's GDP and the monthly CPI report as they investigate various economic systems. They are using current events to track the current rate of inflation and its effect on consumer pricing and business growth. Students then learned how companies raise capital by issuing stocks and bonds for capital projects. Their first project was to begin making virtual stock market investments in businesses that showed signs of growth. Currently, all business students are in the "green."

From the Desk of Ms. Digiacomo

The students in the accounting classes are excited to be learning about starting a business! They have learned the advantages and disadvantages of starting a sole proprietorship. Some advantages are ease of formation, total control by the owner and profits that are not shared. On the other hand, some disadvantages are limited resources, unlimited liability, limited expertise, and limited life. We have discussed these concepts in all the classes. The first semester accounting classes are starting to analyze transactions including revenue, expenses, and withdrawals. The students are catching on rather quickly! The students are also becoming familiar with the accounting equation, and it helps them when they are analyzing. We are currently using the expanded accounting equation to analyze transactions. They will soon be able to analyze transactions with debits and credits by using T-Accounts. The second semester class can complete an accounting worksheet which will enable them to prepare financial statements. They have become familiar with trial balances for all accounts for the business and have been able to determine if the trial balance is accurate. After the trial balance, the students must adjust supplies inventory and prepaid insurance. The final part of the worksheet is to separate the accounts into the financial statements. The income statement includes all revenue and expense accounts. The balance sheet displays assets, liabilities, and owner's equity.

Science Department

Forensic Science students will spend the first semester of the course learning about different types of evidence and how they are processed. So far, they have examined Witness Statement Evidence and Ink and Document Evidence. Speaking of Witness Statements, did you know that according to The Innocence Project, almost 70% of wrongful convictions are contributed to inaccurate / false witness statements?

Integrated Science – Science in Cinema students are currently in their first unit – Biology. In this unit. After watching both Osmosis Jones and Contagion, students have begun to look at the systems of the body and how they work together. This is only the first layer into their Human Body investigation. Look for next month's update.

Social Studies Department

From the Desk of Mr. O'Leary

Welcome to Outlook Academy for the 2023/2024 school year. The first semester is up and running, I hope all is going well. My name is Mr. O'Leary, and I am a social studies teacher here at Outlook. I am currently teaching Civics and Economics. Both classes are required for graduation as well as the Constitution Test you will take in Civics. Please feel free to stop in room 3363 if you have any needs or concerns regarding my classes, the Constitution test, or anything at all.

In Civics, the students began our semester long journey to analyze each state and identify any advantages or negatives to living in that state. To compare the states, the students created a list of what data they wanted to collect and compare. We then created a google form to allow us to collect and track the data. Some of the data they wanted to collect includes, Red/Blue State, Abortion Laws, Cost of Living, Minimum Wage, Marijuana Laws, Unemployment Rate, Prek-12 educational system, total population, and minority populations (African American and Hispanic/Latino). As of August 30th, we have analyzed 12 states. At the start of each class, we do a 1 state (bell ringer).

The students and I took a Personality Trait Quiz in class. The quiz identified their Political Personality Type. The students then had to identify the most important characteristics of the Personality Trait that they felt showed a realistic trait of theirs and then briefly present it. Many of the students had the same result on the Quiz.

We will begin preparing for the Constitution on Monday, 09/04/23. All students must pass the Constitution Test for graduation. If you have not taken Civics yet, you will take the Constitution when you are in my Civics class. If you have already taken and passed Civics, check with Mrs. Martin to guarantee you have passed it. It is possible to pass Civics but fail the Constitution or to pass the Constitution and fail Civics. If you have any questions, come, and see me in room 3363.







From the Desk of Mr. Martin

In US History we got off to a great start. We went over the expectations for the semester and discussed the impact of US History. Students were told that events of the past affect current events. We start each class with a Trivia Question (Sports, TV, Movies, Historical events) Students receive 5 extra credit points for correct answers. The first unit we covered was the Civil War/Reconstruction.

- -Students will be able to identify the causes of the Civil War.
- -Students will identify how the conflicts between the North and South economies played a role in the War.
- Study the major battles that were fought.
- We discussed why Reconstruction failed to create a society where all races enjoyed prosperity and equality.

We watched the film "Glory" and students were asked to pick an assignment to complete.

- Write a journal entry detailing an account of the war experience from a soldier's point of voice.
- Write a movie review of the film.
- Write a letter home to a loved one describing your experience of fighting.

Visual Arts Department

Welcome to the Visual Arts and the start of the 2023-24 school year at Outlook Academy. Albert Einstein stated, "Imagination is more important than knowledge. Knowledge is limited. Imagination encircles the world." Creativity and imagination truly enrich the soul, mind, and spirit of an individual. It challenges one to think outside the box and have the courage to try new things. This school year brings new ideas to make art that nurtures creativity and imagination.

The fundamental basics of the visual arts are to analyze and interpret the Elements of Art and Principles of Design. This term, students will focus primarily on the Elements of Art. They will utilize various art mediums and techniques that focus on interpreting the Elements of Art.

Visual Design focuses more on art being used for commercial art while Intro to Visual Arts is a fine arts course that focuses on creating personal and unique artworks based on one's creativity. Both Visual Design and Intro to Visual Arts utilize the Elements of Art in different ways.

In Visual Design, students created "different style fonts" utilizing the alphabet. Students learned that different styles of typography are used in visual design to communicate to viewers a specific appeal and message. In Intro to Visual Arts, students created a "visual alphabet" by drawing an object that starts with each letter of the alphabet. This activity engaged students to use their creativity and imagination as they drew different objects for each letter of the alphabet.

Another art project that the Intro to Visual Arts class completed with an Optical Illusion Hand. Using the Elements of Art; Line, Value, Color - students used a drawing of the hand to create an optical illusion of the hand coming off the paper.

Currently, in both Visual Design and Intro to Visual Arts, students are practicing how to use the art medium watercolor and the correct techniques for applying watercolor to watercolor paper. Through this activity, students are learning how to mix, layer, and blend watercolor onto watercolor paper. This activity demonstrates how to utilize the Elements of Art, Value, Line, and Color.

It has been wonderful to see students engaged in these assignments while producing amazing and unique works of art! I look forward to sharing more of the student's artwork in the coming months!

September is National Suicide Prevention Month. Also known as Suicide Awareness Month, the month shines a spotlight on a topic not often talked about. Everyone is affected by suicide, not just the victim. Suicide impacts family and friends long after the loss of a loved one. On average, one person commits suicide every 16.2 minutes. Two-thirds of the people who suffer commit suicide depression. One way to help prevent suicide is to increase access to


treatment for depression. However, identifying depression can be difficult. Not all people who suffer from depression show signs. The first step in identifying someone who is suffering from depression and contemplating suicide is to see how serious the issue is. Talking to the person involved and asking about their thoughts will decrease the trigger of suicidal action. Suggesting a counselor or treatment for depression might also help. Often, people who are depressed need a

caring friend. A common fallacy is that people who talk about suicide never act on it. If a friend or loved one is talking about suicide, it is time to get help for that person. Learning about suicide prevention during the month of September is a great way to educate yourself and others.
