Message from our Program Administrator

From all of us at Outlook Academy, we wish everyone a very merry, safe, and peaceful holiday season!

It is with a great deal of sadness that this month, OA is dealing with the death of one of our students. This tragic event has affected the entire school; our students and staff mourn together. We are shocked and saddened by this tragic event and although we are not new to this occurrence, each time we lose a student to gun violence, the hole in our hearts gets a little bit bigger. We are dedicating this month's newsletter to all the students we have lost over the years to violence and are asking that we all remember the families and loved ones of these former students.

In the last four years, we as a nation have seen too many youths killed by firearm violence. Just in the past four years, adolescent deaths by gun violence have doubled. The largest increases in gun assault deaths across racial and ethnic groups were among Black and Hispanic Youth (an increase of 80% since the start of the pandemic). If anyone thinks that gun violence is someone else's problem or a political issue, they need to come work with us and feel the frustration and pain of our day-by-day.

Seniors (attending public high schools in Illinois) must complete the FAFSA to graduate! That is right! It is now a graduation requirement.

FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) APPLY SOONER RATHER THAN LATER!!

Families miss out on big aid opportunities by failing to apply at fafsa.ed.gov.

Key financial aid forms are now available to high school students and their families, and experts urge people to fill them out – even if they do not think they will qualify. The government encourages high school seniors to fill it out as soon as possible to obtain aid.

Each year the Department of Education awards about \$120 billion in grants, loans, and other funds to help millions of students afford education costs. It is the largest provider of student financial aid in the country.





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### Math Department


#### From the Desk of Mrs. Garza

Mrs. Garza's Term 2 Math II and Math III classes have been working on solving systems of linear equations using a variety of methods and simplifying expressions using laws of exponents and properties. We use a blended learning approach where students are given entire units to work on at their own pace, but with a daily percentage completion goal to assist with keeping them on track. During class time students are working either independently, in groups, or getting assistance from Mrs. Garza. The Financial Algebra class has been working through the cost of transportation. The students have been exploring buying a new or used car. The class discussed different types of insurance for vehicles. Students have also explored the cost of leasing a car or renting a car for short periods of time.

The statistics class discussions have been centered around the normal curve. The class has discussed the use of z-scores to compare data that is not on the same scale. For example, the students studied the differences between male and female athletes' jumping ability and compared players from the Bulls with players from the Sky.




#### From the Desk of Mr. Davidson

Outlook Reading Resource has screened over 130 Outlook students for reading level and common issues which delay reading.

Many students are already receiving support on vocabulary found on A.C.T. and S.A.T. tests. All classes will soon be invited to join the <u>Varsity Vocabulary Pizza</u> <u>Playoffs</u>, a competition that will encourage students to challenge their teacher's vocabulary skills to win weekly contests and receive free pizza lunches at the same time they improve their own vocabulary skills.

While screening our students, we also asked them about post-graduation plans and are now collecting information on South Suburban College programs which offer certifications in the areas of interest of our students. S.S.C. offers over 75 certificates in many diverse areas of work.



#### From the Desk of Mr. Folsom

In Mr. Folsom's class, we are working on SEL strategies, like being empathetic. We have done several different exercises in class to practice what it means to be empathetic vs. sympathetic.


We have completed reading The Crucible and are currently working on final projects.


### Science Department


#### From the Desk of Ms. Anderson

Students will learn the structure and function of DNA, and how those coded instructions make us.



Welcome to the Visual Arts
Classroom. We have been busy
learning about how the Elements
of Art are used in art. In Charles
Demuth's "5," students created a
grid and applied color theory and
line patterns in their artworks. To
celebrate the start of the fall
season, students created a warm
and cool color leaf art project
using geometric and organic
shapes. Celebrating the graffiti

artist Keith Haring, students created artworks inspired by his famous artistic style. Using the symmetrical radial design, students created a paper relief sculpture demonstrating how an artist can create radial symmetry in art and how it is created in nature. Grid enlargement is a technique that artists use to create large-scale artworks. Students learned how to use this

technique through a grid enlargement of their favorite candy bar. To celebrate the culture and heritage of Mexico, students learned about the Day of the Dead ((Día de Muertos) which is celebrated on November 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup>. Students created their Sugar skulls utilizing the symmetrical design.
