Families miss out on big aid opportunities by failing to apply at fafsa.ed.gov.

Key financial aid forms are now available to high school students and their families, and experts urge people to fill them out – even if they do not think they will qualify. The government encourages high school seniors to fill it out as soon as possible to obtain aid.

Each year the Department of Education awards about \$120 billion in grants, loans, and other funds to help millions of students afford education costs. It is the largest provider of student financial aid in the country.




Math Department

English Department


From the Desk of Mrs. Goodman


We are also practicing professional writing, such as emails. Students need more exposure and practice with this form of communication

From the Desk of Ms. Anderson


Biology students will conclude their study of cells this week and begin a new journey into genetics. Students will study inheritance laws and examine how they are exhibited.

Cards for Care Program – Students make cards to give to a local nursing home. Cards are made for a variety of occasions – Birthday, Encouragement, Thinking of You, etc.



Social Studies Department


From the Desk of Mr. Martin

Welcome to the Visual Arts Classroom, Session 2. In Visual Design S1` students created concert poster designs using Google Drawing. Students incorporated various graphic design concepts that are important in visual design. Students also learned about space, symmetry, and balance through Japanese Notan Design. In Intro to Art S2 students learned about value through shading geometric shapes and applying Color Theory. Students also learned about radial symmetrical design by creating a mandala design as well as learn about the Element of Art, Space by creating a 2 Point Perspective Word Design. In Visual Design S2, students are learning how to create a design

collection by creating a shoe and jersey collection. Students also learned about how to use graphic design concepts by creating a cereal box design by hand and then by using Google Drawing. I look forward to challenging my students as they learn to create art that is both relevant and personal.

During the month of November, there are several important events that take time to remember. Events that have occurred as well as those that will shape our future. Election day this year is held on November 8^{th,} and it will surely shape the future of our country at the local, state, and federal levels. Due to the importance, it is imperative that every one that is registered gets out and votes. You always want to make sure that your voice is heard, and that your vote is counted.

We will also be celebrating Veterans Day this month on the 11th. Veterans Day honors our veterans of the armed forces and those killed in the country's wars. The observance originated in 1919 on the first anniversary of the 1918 armistice that ended WWI and was known as Armistice Day. It was commemorated in 1921 with the burial of an unknown soldier from

World War I at Arlington National Cemetery in Arlington, Virginia. November 11 became an official national holiday in the United States in 1938. In 1954 the name was changed to Veterans Day to honor those who had served in all U.S. wars. Ceremonies are held each year at the Tomb of the Unknowns, and floral tributes are placed on the graves of service men and women and at memorials throughout the country.

The last holiday we will be celebrating this month is
Thanksgiving. Thanksgiving Day is an annual national holiday in the United States and Canada celebrating the harvest and other blessings of the past year. Americans generally believe that their Thanksgiving is modeled on a
1621 harvest feast shared by the English colonists (Pilgrims)
of Plymouth and the Wampanoag

people. The American holiday is particularly rich in legend and symbolism, and the traditional fare of the Thanksgiving meal typically includes turkey, bread stuffing, potatoes, cranberries, and pumpkin pie.

Thanksgiving Day did not become an official holiday until Northerners dominated the federal government. While sectional tensions prevailed in the mid-19th century, the editor of the popular magazine *Godey's Lady's Book*, Sarah Josepha Hale, campaigned for a national Thanksgiving Day to promote unity. She finally won the support of President Abraham Lincoln. On October 3, 1863, during the Civil War, Lincoln proclaimed a National Day of Thanksgiving to be celebrated on Thursday, November 26.
