FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) APPLY SOONER RATHER THAN LATER!!

Families miss out on big aid opportunities by failing to **apply at fafsa.ed.gov.**

Key financial aid forms are now available to high school students and their families, and experts urge people to fill them out – even if they don't think they will qualify. The government encourages high school seniors to fill it out as soon as possible to obtain aid.

Each year the Department of Education awards about \$120 billion in grants, loans, and other funds to help millions of students afford education costs. It is the largest provider of student financial aid in the country.

We are studying the 1960's.


The objective is for students to identify the political events and cultural changes that altered the decade and caused a huge amount of turmoil.

World Film Studies


We are watching "The Karate Kid". Students will identify how one student was taught life lessons through Karate.

From the Desk of Mrs. Goodman, English/Speech




Welcome to the Visual Arts Classroom ^{at} Outlook Academy




Welcome to the Visual Arts Classroom at Outlook Academy. The students have been diligently working on their 3-D Letter Sculpture for several weeks now and the results of their hard work are showing some creative and talented results. While the art project may have appeared quite daunting to achieve, the students outdid themselves and learned that with hard work and dedication, the end results are something to be proud of. The art project was chunked into mini lessons and students learned many different concepts such as how to accurately use a ruler and measurements, engineering, and math by creating components to build their sculpture and adding structural elements to add to the strength of their sculpture. Finally, students painted their sculpture with white acrylic to use as a canvas to create their artwork. For the final step, students personalized their 3-D sculpture by drawing and painting symbolic objects and words that represented their personality.
