
In other news...

FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) APPLY SOONER RATHER THAN LATER!!

Families miss out on big aid opportunities by failing to apply at fafsa.ed.gov.

Key financial aid forms are now available to high school students and their families, and experts urge people to fill them out – even if they don't think they will qualify. The government encourages high school seniors to fill it out as soon as possible to obtain aid.

Each year the Department of Education awards about \$120 billion in grants, loans, and other funds to help millions of students afford education costs. It is the largest provider of student financial aid in the country.


Teacher Messages

Algebra Financial Tip of the Month: FILE YOUR TAXES FOR FREE (if you qualify).

Besides W2s, be sure to gather information for monies you have received such as any stimulus checks, child/dependent care credits, and unemployment benefits. Filing early is recommended to avoid stress and minimize the possibility of having your tax return rejected due to identity theft.

Be on high alert for scammers posing as financial institutions or "IRS Online" who send documents via email. When the consumer opens the email or attachment, malware can spread, which is especially harmful for businesses. The IRS WILL NOT send unsolicited emails, but if you do receive one and accidentally open it, forward the scam email to phishing@irs.gov.

Also, watch out for tax refund scams. Fraudsters have the capability to deposit tax returns to the wrong person, and then demand the money be returned by the victim. If you think you are a victim of this particular scam, it is important to act quickly.

Here are some tips you can use if you become a victim:

- If you receive an unexpected refund via direct deposit, immediately call your financial institution to have the funds returned to the IRS and flag your account for fraud. You also need to call the IRS to let them know why you are refunding the return
- If you receive a paper check refund that is not yours, write VOID on the back
 of the check, add a note that says, "Return of erroneous refund check
 because [brief explanation why]," and submit the check to the appropriate
 IRS location
- The IRS will never call you directly, so do not give personal information to anyone claiming they are an agent
- Always be safe than sorry, do not trust anyone but legit tax companies and/or accountants to handle your taxes if you are not comfortable doing them yourself



We are quickly approaching the halfway mark for the 3rd quarter. Finish strong and remember to stay in contact with your teachers whenever you need assistance.








From the Desk of Mr. Martin Social Studies

World Film Studies


We are still watching films that deal Civil Rights.




From the Desk of Mrs. Goodman, English/Speech




Welcome to the Visual Arts Classroom at Outlook Academy

Pebruary is Heart Health Awareness

Heart disease is the leading cause of death in the United States.



Why do heart attacks happen?

There are various risk factors that may have contributed to your heart attack, spanning everything from lifestyle to medical conditions and demographics.

Some risk factors can't be changed, such as age, gender, and genetics. Others can be managed such as:

- Lifestyle (diet, exercise, smoking, alcohol)
- Medical conditions (high cholesterol, diabetes, high blood pressure, obesity)

If you have had already a heart attack, you are at a higher risk of having another one. Therefore, it is so important to understand how making some changes can help reduce this risk.

What is a heart attack?

A heart attack happens when your heart muscle cannot get the oxygen and nutrients it needs to function properly.

It is important to know that every heart attack can be different. However, most heart attacks start slowly, with mild pain or discomfort of the chest. There may also be discomfort in the arms, back, neck, jaw, or stomach. Other symptoms include shortness of breath, nausea, lightheadedness, or breaking out in a cold sweat.

This is how it feels when one or more of the arteries that carry blood to your heart are becoming narrowed or blocked.

If the heart is starved of oxygen and nutrients, the muscle can be damaged or die—that is why it is important to call 911 right away whenever symptoms appear.



Lowering Cholesterol

How to take care of your heart"

- 1. Eat Healthy Foods: Choose foods low in sodium and saturated fat.
- 2. Aim for a Healthy Weight: Maintain physical activity for 2 hours each week.
- 3. Quit Smoking: Quitting is the best decision you can make.
- 4. Reduce Stress: Alleviate as many stress factors as possible.
- 5. Improve Sleep: Our body needs at least 7 to 8 hours of sleep every day.






Carter Woodson, the twentieth-century historian, created Black History Month. He believed Black Americans were not adequately represented in the study of American history. Carter Woodson also hoped for the day when Americans would accept Black history as a part of American history. President Gerald Ford declared Black History Month (formerly Negro History Week) in 1976. The Black History Month 2022 theme, "Black Health and Wellness," explores "the legacy of not only Black scholars and medical practitioners in Western medicine, but also other ways of knowing (e.g., birth workers, doulas, midwives, naturopaths, herbalists, etc.) throughout the African Diaspora. The 2022 theme considers activities, rituals and initiatives that Black communities have done to be well."
