How did you become involved with District 205 and The Board of Education?

What makes the mission and vision of District 205 relevant to the students it serves?

Success has been long standing in this district. I want to continue build and enhance our success stories - to see every student graduate, increase parental involvement, build stronger relationships, and become the sustainable, sturdy bridge that connects schools and communities.

Wildcat International Bacclaureate (IB) Programme Catches Fire!

The Wildcat IB Programme under the direction of coordinator and Wildcat Alumni Brad Ablin has blazed the Chicagoland

area with our first testing results. Students undergo an extremely rigorous curriculum that includes 300 hours of Creativity, Activity, and Service hours. In addition, the students are required to complete a 4000 word essay to be graded by designated IB Programme officials. The courses were Language and Literature, History of the Americas, Psychology, Physics, Math Studies, Theory of Knowledge, and either French or Spanish. Our Wildcat Students stunned the south Chicago Suburbs by 8 students earning the IB Diploma, which is 38% of all diploma students! Thornton had 2 other students that missed the mark by only 1 point. However, through the hard work of our students, 68% of all IB students earned college credit and 76% of all IB Diploma students earned college credit! Moreover, 6 of our Wildcat IB Juniors took the Advance Placement (AP) exam for Psychology, and 5 of them scored high enough to earn college credit! Great Job Wildcats!

College & Career Counselor Report

There were a total of 376 Thornton High School Seniors who received a diploma on May 21, 2017 for completing all of the requirements for graduation as set by the Thornton Township District Board of Education and the State of Illinois. We are especially proud that our seniors were offered \$9,243,424.00 in Scholarships and including Financial Aid a grand total of \$19,068,204.00 was offered to further their education. Wildcats also had 11 Illnois State Scholars, 9 Ingalls Scholarship winners and 3 Fuch's Lubricants Frank Klienman Scholars.

Now for the Post-High School Plans, of the 376 Wildcat Graduates in the Class of 2017, 100% of them completed a post high school plan in the College & Career Center. Their post-secondary plans are as follows:

- 144, or 38% will attend a four-year university
- 203, or 53% will attend a two-year college including South Suburban College
- 7 or 2% will enlist in a branch of the Armed Forces
- 19 or 5% will enter the workforce
- 4 or 1% will enter a trade school

We are very proud that 100% our Wildcat Class of 2017 graduates had an educational plan for their future and we are confident that they will continue to make TTHS and District 205 proud of them in their future endeavors.

Thornton Wildcats cut ribbon for new stadium; school districts given credit By Patricia Muhammad



Over the Labor Day weekend, Thornton High School Wildcats Football team and local school board districts 147 and 205 had much to celebrate, including a ribbon-cutting ceremony and a colossal win against Kenwood Academy, defeating Kenwood with a 54-6 victory.

"The ribbon-cutting ceremony is symbolic. The real substance is the work and the leadership of the school board to provide the best for our community. Our

Area weather was perfect for the Sept. 2nd ribboncutting event and football game. The Thornton High School Administration, band, school district presidents, coaches, and others gathered on the new track to celebrate the opening of the bright, shiny stadium. The silver bleachers filled with Wildcat fans sat on the home team, wearing purple and white paraphernalia and a few Kenwood Academy fans sat on the opposing side. Attendees waited patiently in the 74 degrees weather, waiting for the second game of the year to begin.

According to Principal Ratliff, the rebuilding efforts for the stadium started well over a year ago, back in May 2016. Ratliff also stated that the stadium also serves as a beacon of hope for more rebuilding efforts in and around the Harvey community. Born and raised in Harvey, Mr. Ratliff said, "Harvey is a beautiful place. I grew up in Harvey. If there were any change to Harvey, people did it. People built up Harvey; people changed it, and people are going to bring it back. Rebuilding the stadium is the network and apparatus to bring it back."

Charwana Morgan, a life-long Harvey resident and Parent Coordinator for Thornton High School, stated that the new stadium will draw parents' support and involvement in school activities. "I believe that the new stadium beautifies the community. It will cause more parents to come out and support their children; because as we know, parental involvement makes a difference in every child's success."

Local school board presidents showed up to witness the ribbon-cutting ceremony. Several of them were formal teachers. Bonnie Raterre, School Board President, District 147; Maggie Hudson-Walker, School Board President, District 147 (includes West Harvey and Dixmoor); Nina Graham, School Board President, District 205, all expressed feelings of elation because of their association with school districts 147 and 205.

"I was a teacher in School District 147 for 33 years," said Mrs. Graham, who was one of the former teachers. "Some of the kids who went to Rosa Park School are in Thornton Township. They're here. I get so emotional with what is happening to our kids, and this newly renovated facility is just awesome. 'Children First.' Let's keep children first. That is our motto. I am so proud and so happy to see what is happening here today," Mrs. Graham stated.

Principal Ratliff expressed school pride as he spoke highly of Thornton Township High School. He said, "I am proud to know that as a principal of Thornton High School, our school represents the diamond or the jewel of Harvey, Illinois, and the surrounding communities. So, whenever somebody passes by Thornton Township High School, they see a slice of heaven. They see beautification that's here. Thornton Township High School in Harvey, Illinois is still alive," Mr. Ratliff said.

According to Wikipedia, Thornton High School built in 1898 is the home of several NFL players including Barry Gardner, (Linebacker for the Philadelphia Eagles); Napolean Harris (Linebacker for the Minnesota Vikings); and Antwaan Randle El (Wide Receiver for the Pittsburgh Steelers and Washington Red Skins); among other players.

Thornton IB Information:

The International Baccalaureate Program (IB) is a high school program that is a highly respected college prep curriculum. IB is open to Juniors and Seniors only. The selection of students to be a part of the IB Program begins in February of the Junior year. The IB program encourages students to think broadly, beyond the boundaries of their communities, and to see themselves as members of a global society. It allows students to receive a well-rounded world view, while also giving them a rigorous educational experience that allows them to earn college credit while still in high school. IB is now in its 3rd year of educating students at Thornton. This past May our first group of graduating IB students took IB exams for college credit with tremendous success! 8 students received the prestigious IB Diploma awarded to students for outstanding academic achievement across the program. In addition, 19 students earned college credit for their scores on the IB exams. Students received college credit on 68 total exams, totaling over 200 college credit hours for these students. These students also earned millions of dollars in scholarship money. In addition to the rigorous academic program, students are required to write an intensive 4000 word research essay and complete hours in Creativity, Activity, and Community Service. This works to mold the students into well-rounded individuals. Thornton Township High School's Daycare Program Keeps Teens in School

Director Angie James is very proud of the superb job ICC does with the children—and teens parents—in its care. Clearly teacher Cynthia Wilson adds the magic touch to professional care—the infants were alert and peaceful.

Tucked away on the campus of Thornton Township High School is the ICC—Infant Care Center. Inside are laughing, happy toddlers and content babies being cared for by patient, skilled childcare workers. For each child in the daycare, a teenager is able to stay in school.

ICC is a licensed professional daycare center. All childcare workers are staff, registered with the Illinois Gateways Professional Development System. They have training from Department of Children and Family Services (DCFS) with yearly updates, and DCFS comes out for yearly inspections. All staff are CPR certified. Each room has a teacher and an aide; two aides for the infant room. The center is outfitted with a fully equipped nursery, classrooms, playroom, kitchen, library, and offices. Each classroom has a schedule, with structured activities and nap times. The center is in the process of adding a lending library of books and hands-on activity toys for families to check out, and is currently accepting book donations. The center is housed in a former athletic facility, which is solid, but snug; there are plans to move into a more spacious facility in a couple of years.

The facility hours are coordinated to school hours, opening at 6:30 am and closing at 3 pm. A bus goes to the teens' homes, picks up the parents and children, and brings them to the ICC facility, where it waits for the parents to settle their children into their rooms. Sometimes ICC has breakfast waiting for the parents. The bus then takes the parents to their respective schools. During the day, the babies get 2 snacks a day as well as lunch. There are indoor and outdoor play areas, so the kids get exercise, rain or shine. In nice weather, little ones get a stroller ride outdoors. At the end of the day, the bus collects the parents from school, brings them back to ICC for their babies, and takes them home. The bus is already outfitted with infant and child car seats so the parents don't have to bring them. In addition to the daily routine, agencies such as Family Enrichment organize activities and field trips for the mothers and babies, and on a recent family field trip, the grandparents came as well. The center encourages the involvement of both parents, and grandparents as well.


Recruitment for the program includes information tables at the high schools during orientation to promote ICC. There's an ICC open house so students can take a tour of the facility. During the school year, campus nurses and counselors will refer students to ICC. During the summer, ICC staff go to doctor's offices, WIC offices, and into the neighborhoods, posting fliers about the program and encouraging professionals to refer teen parents. Staff even strike up conversations with pregnant teens they meet and tell them about the program. Most students are referred while still pregnant, though the center accepts toddlers up to three years old. There's an application process and the teens are invited to come visit the facility. When the baby is six weeks old, it can enter the program.



Founded in 1985, the program has been in existence for 32 years. A true pioneer, ICC was the first center of it's kind in the state of Illinois. The center's population of babies goes up and down as older babies leave and new infants come in, but on the whole, the number of babies has remained fairly constant through the years. Though it's a daycare center, it's very much about the parents as well. As the center has identified needs, it has added services. The program helps the teen parents to keep up with baby health care and immunizations. At times, when Thornton HS high school has offered childcare classes, students have been able to come into the center to help with the children, for credit. There is an annual reading competition for parents and grandparents to read to their babies, with awards presented at a Family Reading Night in November. The center comes up with family events throughout the year, and there's a special effort made to involve fathers and grandfathers. As graduation nears, ICC helps the teens transition into post-school life with career and college workshops.

ICC serves teen parents not only from Thornton HS, but also Thornwood HS, Thornridge HS, Outlook Academy, AFL in Riverdale, Country Club Hills Tech and Trade, and South Suburban College. The center accepts children between the ages 6 weeks to 3 years old. Director Angie James, previously a classroom teacher, came to ICC nearly two years ago. She has found it very rewarding; for every child in ICC, a student has the opportunity to graduate rather than drop out. James shares that of four recent graduates, two are in college, while two others have started working. She wants teens to know that just because they've become parents, doesn't mean their education has to come to an end. ICC is here to help! For more information, call 708-225-4036 or email James. 
District 205 Community, greetings from Wildcat Country!

Discipline at TWHS:
Restorative Practice Update



Under the disciplinary guidance of Assistant Principal Holmes with interventions implemented by a talented dean team consisting of; Mrs. Griggs, Mr, Gonzalez, Mrs. Hay and Ms. Jones, Thornwood High School continues to expand the use of Restorative Practices. As a result, we continue to experience a reduction in Out of School Suspensions, and have totally eradicated the use of In School Suspensions. It is important to mention that the majority of our teachers have bought in to this paradigm shift and themselves are implementing more restorative practices within the classroom itself. With an overall 72% reduction in Out of School suspensions from 2013-2017, we are confident in forecasting another 50% reduction in Out of School Suspensions for this 2017-2018 school year. Through the implementation of a Reset Room, which is a one period consequence for non-egregious rule infractions that focuses on de-escalation, reflection, re-teaching, rehearsing, and repairing relationships, we have been able to totally eradicate the use of the punitive In School Suspension model, and have combined elements of the personal, academic, and therapeutic Reset models. Our Peace circle trained staff consisting of Ms. Rucker and Mr. Sanders, have really worked hard with our students to help redirect their behavior, accept accountability, and work to repair relationships.



Thus far, the data shows that the Reset Room, our restorative practice that has replaced In School Suspensions, has yielded overwhelmingly positive results. As of 9/29/17, the supervisors have held over 120 interventions. The supervisors have also moderated a few peace circles, helping to resolve issues among students that may have led to threats or even violence. Had the reset interventions been In School Suspensions as past precedent would dictate, assigned students would've missed out on approximately 720 hours of classroom instructional time, in periods outside of classes where the initial rule infraction occurred.





We will continue to monitor and provide updates of this data. Restorative interventions like the Reset Room, Loss of Privilege, Creating Positive Relationships (CPR) and Assistant Principal Holmes' home visits have helped us to create a climate conducive for teaching, learning, goal setting and celebrating school spirit. As we work to continue shifting the paradigm we look forward to the continued open lines of communication and support from our parents and the community at large. We appreciate the opportunity to make a difference and understand that only **Together We Will....SUCCEED!**


AVID Color Run for College - The Race to Turn Dreams into Realty
