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Each generation faces the challenge of preparing the next generation for success. Our students today are faced with challenges and opportunities most of us never imagined when we were their age. They live in a world of global competition, of exponentially expanding knowledge, and of an economy strained by the deepest and longest recession since the Great Depression. They must learn to become lifelong learners, and they must have the tools necessary to compete with others around the world. As adults, we can choose whether to lament the job losses, to fear the changes necessary to thrive in the modern world, to wait on someone to come to our aid, or to stretch ourselves to create opportunities for our students that just a few short years ago seemed impossible.

Over the past four years, Thornton Township High School District 205 has worked diligently to transform our education program to provide learning opportunities in the "information age." The infrastructure to support digital technology has been put in place. By the end of this year, using grant dollars more classrooms will have Smart Boards, which essentially replace chalkboards with large interactive computer screens complete with Internet access. The District is also moving toward a dual technology environment that includes Apple Mac computers and iPADS. In this new educational environment, computers will be the tools of daily work, just as they are in college and in the vast majority of today's jobs. As the nation moves toward the implementation of Common Core Standards, the Board of Education is working with the superintendent to provide our faculty with professional development and access to outside consultants to ensure the District transitions to the new curriculum model with fidelity. This includes the superintendent's new focus on performance management and contract with Pearson for School Improvement.

Over the last few years the Thornton Township High School District 205 Board of Education took a bold and unprecedented action by approving the creation and development of a Student Board of Education Program. The Student Board of Education Program was initiated during the 2006-2007 school year. At that time, students were selected by the principal via staff recommendation. Over the course of the next two years, and under the leadership of Board President, Mr. Ray Banks, the Student Board's role expanded and structure became more formalized. During the September 2007 meeting of the Board of Education the Student Board was officially charted and a District coordinator was assigned.

Since its inception, over 31 students have served on the Student Board of Education representing all three schools. Students serving on the Student Board have a 100% graduation rate, attend college and are awarded scholarships that on average cover more the 60% of the cost to attend. Members of the Student Board also participate in high level policy and strategic planning decision affecting District 205.

This year the Student Board will be led by Board President Paola Nunez, Vice President Luke Arrington, Secretary China Anderson and Treasurer Sanaa Vhora. The Student Board was elected during the spring semes-

ter of the 2011-2012 school. Students will serve one year terms.



Operations and Accomplishments

The Student Board meets once each month on the second Tuesday. However, most work of the Student Board is accomplished via committees. The Board currently has six standing committees that include:

Nanoscience

Thornton Township High School remains on the cutting edge of preparing our students for their post-secondary transition, whether they are going on to college, or entering into the workforce. Under the direction of our Small Learning Communities Coordinators, Brian Wright and Calvin Stark, we are currently providing career opportunities such as our Pre-Pharmacy program, Culinary Arts, Media Technician, Engineering, Entrepreneurship, and Northwestern University Medical Program. While this does not complete the list of opportunities we offer, I am pleased to inform you that our coordinators have been working tirelessly to bring Nanoscience and technology into Wildcat Country. What is Nanoscience? It is the new science that is, and will continue to revolutionize our world through much greater forms of technology, and we plan to have it here at Thornton Township High School in the very near future. We have developed multiple partnerships with this initiative, including but not limited to, Notre Dame University, Chicago State University, and South Suburban Community College. Dr. Valerie Goss, a professor at Chicago State University, visited Wildcat Country and spent some time with our students by instructing a "hands on" demonstration on the use and measurement of nanoscience, and it was truly amazing to see our students grasp the concept. They were motivated and asked great probing questions throughout the demonstration. I can hardly wait until it is perma-

Our NAVISTAR Diesel Engine program is producing awesome results, as it completed its first 3rd year cycle. This program has yielded a 98% graduation rate, and has provided 15 internships and permanently placed 9 graduates into jobs! The remaining students transitioned into college, technical school, and the military. This program is surrounded with a great staff, led by Earl Powell, Fred McGee, and Elyn Marcano. Through a strong partnership with Navistar representatives, these Wildcat Staff members fully prepared our students for jobs during a time of recession, and continue on a path that will increase efficiency in our students' preparedness, as

School Improvement Model

SIM or the School Improvement Model is a system of school improvement designed to build the school's capacity to create its future. The model is designed to assist schools to:

- Prepare students to be College and Career Ready—SIM is focused on helping schools prepare all students for college and careers, taking its lead from the definition of college and career readiness that is articulated in the Common Core State Standards (CCSS) and the standards for college and career readiness established by specific states, including Illinois.
- Help students achieve the Common Core Stare Standards— Consistent with the focus on college and career readiness, SIM is designed to help schools meet the demands of the CCSS. SIM has been crafted from the ground up to support CCSS implementation. It features schoolwide instructional focus on the critical aspects of college and career readiness. In addition, content area concentrations in English Language Arts (ELA) and Mathematics provide scaffolding to help teachers align their instruction to the CCSS assessments. Teachers also work with their own curriculum and instructional alignment that is required for students to perform at high levels on the new assessments.
- Provide High-Quality Instruction for All Students—SIM focuses on high-quality instruction for all students by placing a primary emphasis on building the quality of the core instructional program. When the quality of "first" instruction is maximized, fewer students will likely require supplemental support through Tier 2 and Tier 3 interventions as more students learning needs are met within the regular classroom. In this way, Tier 2 and Tier 3 interventions can be reserved for students whose needs cannot be met within the regular classroom and targeted specifically to these students needs.
- Reach Every Student, Every Subject, Every Day—Comprehensive
 and sustainable school improvement requires more than a
 focus on English Language Arts and Mathematics. SIM is
 designed to achieve schoolwide, high-quality instruction for all
 students in our schools.

Actions that District 205 is taking to support the implementation of the school improvement model:

I. Standards Aligned Curriculum, Instruction & Assessment

- o Working with administrators, Area Instructional Leaders (AILs), and coaches to identify strengths and needs in existing plans and practices and to jointly set long- and short-term objectives
- Will work with Core Course Coordinators to develop regular team meetings based on each team's needs that focus on standards-based instruction, including unpacking standards, creating performance tasks, and designing instruction to match
- Providing professional development and coaching on implementation of instructional approaches around the standards, including academic language and college and career readiness learner competencies (as defined by Common Core)

2. High Performance Leadership, Management & Organization

- o Working with the school leadership to build on the work of the Building Leadership Teams (BLTs). Each school has scheduled with us one meeting per month focusing on professional learning about best practices in gathering and analyzing data and one meeting per month examining data related to implementation.
- Working with all leaders (including AlLs, coaches, CCCs, among others) to identify strengths and needs, create action plans, and monitor progress
- o Helping the Leadership team/BLT work as a representative body that does the following:
- · Establish and maintain the vision of improvement for the school
- Drive and manage the implementation process
- Provide the organization needed to support SIM implementation
- Monitor the progress and quality of implementation, and redirect the work of school improvement as needed to maintain progress towards improved student achievement
- Develop and nurture collaboration by using a systems approach to change that actively engages the entire school in shared responsibility and shared learning



3. Data Driven Culture

- o Pearson is working with the schools on building a data-driven culture through the leadership team
- o There are data-driven culture meetings—professional learning about best practices in gathering and analyzing data—with the Leadership Teams scheduled once per month. These include:
- Building on the team's understanding of the role and value of a data-driven approach to progress monitoring and instructional problem solving
- Adding to the Leadership Team's current practices in order to increase capacity to oversee, monitor, evaluate, and support school improvement initiatives
- Improving the Leadership Team's ability to use data from multiple sources to identify and think critically about implementation
 - There are implementation meetings scheduled once per month to examine strengths and needs in implementation of school improvement efforts, and to create action steps for the following month
 - We will schedule quarterly Progress Monitoring meetings to examine school improvement efforts over the course of the previous quarter and to lay the course for the upcoming quarter

4. High Achievement & Engagement

- Will help each school develop an Engagement team that focuses on helping improve students' sense of belonging to the school, their connections to teachers and other adults, their friendships with peers, their sense that they are known both as learners and as people, and their belief in their ability to succeed academically.
- The team includes members are the staff who provide student services: the dean(s), counselor(s), social worker(s), psychologist(s), and the community outreach coordinator
- The team will meet monthly to analyze strengths and needs and create action plans.
- Pearson will provide two professional development sessions across the year
- Pearson also has a Graduation Risk Insight tool that aggregates the most relevant and predictive data points from your school's

student information system to identify the students mostly likely to drop out.

5. Sustainability for Continuous Improvement

- o Working with administrators, AlLs, and coaches to create true professional learning communities. The focus is on the core course teams. All parties are working together to identify long- and short-term objectives, examine practices, and create regular cycles of action. All of this is occurring in stable settings that everyone can depend upon.
- o Working with the school leadership to build on the work of the BLTs. Each school will have one meeting per month focusing on professional learning about data and one meeting per month examining data related to implementation.
- Pearson employees work with Core Course Coordinators individually and in groups to help them reflect on the work of their teams and prepare for future meetings.
- Leadership team meetings will include the voices of the teachers themselves, helping them to own the process of improvement.
- Pearson employees will continue to work with administrators, AlLs, and coaches on supporting and monitoring implementation.
- o The work of the leadership teams, course teams, coaching, and professional development will all be aligned.
- o All of this work combines to create systems that can last well beyond the partnership with Pearson.

6. Parent and Community Engagement

- o Had first meeting with Parent Coordinators
- o Will meet again with them next Tuesday to plan for unveiling of Parent and Community Engagement training for all three high schools and representatives from feeder schools
- o Will conduct five days of training in parent and community engagement. This will include practical techniques, networking, and action planning.

The District 205 capital improvement plan is a multi-faceted program designed to upgrade facilities and provide a safe and supportive learning environment that will sustain academic programs for current and future needs. The program has been in operation for last three and half years and encompasses all District schools. This is one of our many outreach tools in communicating with the community and potential vendors to assist us in improving our District facilities.

COLLEGE AND CAREER PATHWAYS

College and Career Readiness is an essential goal to be accomplished in order to secure a successful future for each and every one of the students of District 205. It is important that plans are goal-oriented, and made early in their education to make the transition from middle school to high school, and high school to college and/ or career a smooth one. There are several events, activities and programs, which have been initiated in our district that focus on readiness through College and Career Pathways.

Some students need more guidance while on the path to being academically prepared for college and careers. Freshman students will be participating in college tours early this year to motivate them to achieve academic goals and focus on their grades, which are considered by colleges in the admission process. It is never too early for them to think about college and careers in their future instead of waiting until their junior year.

All District 205 students are exposed to colleges through the many school visits from college representatives throughout the nation. Students are able to ask questions and get additional information one on one with the college reps. College tours are also planned for sophomores, juniors and seniors so that the exposure is reinforced throughout their time in high school. Parents are encouraged to also visit the College and Career Center in each of our schools. There is an abundance of information that can be researched electronically or in actual catalogs in the CC Center. Also, be sure to check out the Counseling De-

partment website in each school for other College and Career planning resources.

This is the last year for our Smaller Learning Communities and House structure. Research and development are underway to prepare our students for post-secondary education through College and Career Pathways. Through College and Career Pathways, students will be more focused on courses in which they are interested. They will be given the opportunity to explore more career options which will better prepare them make choices about college and careers after high school.

In an effort to expand the opportunities for our students, District 205 has been involved in many partnerships with institutions and businesses. Partnerships have been formed with South Suburban College, the Illinois Restaurant Association and Navistar, just to name a few. In addition, this year District 205 has strengthened our partnership with Chicago State University. Through this partnership our students are involved with the Pharmacy Technician program. Additional programs are being developed for our students through this valuable collaboration.

Also, through such partnerships, District 205 will continue to offer students opportunities to receive dual credit in college while taking classes in high school. Courses like Introduction to Engineering, Child Care Lab Experience and Media Production through South Suburban College will allow students to begin at a higher level in classes in the same subject area when they attend college.

Most people think the summer is tak-




ing time off from school. Nothing is further from the truth in District 205. Summer Camps will be the perfect opportunity for students to continue to plan for college and careers, and have fun doing it. Plans are currently being developed for 7th and 8th graders, and 9th and 10th graders to spend 5 days and 4 nights on the campus of Chicago State University. Supervised lessons and project-based activities with the focus on Science, Math, Engineering and Technology (STEM) and Communication, Media Arts and Theater (CMAT) will engage students while exposing them to college and careers. District 205 has a complete staff committed to College and Career Readiness for all of the students. Each teacher provides college-based standards instruction in all classes. In addition, administrators, and the College and Career Readiness team which include the Director of College and Career Pathways, Career and Technical Education Area Instructional Leader, Smaller Learning Community Coordinator and Facilitators, Career and Technical Coordinator, College and Career Counselors, and Work Based Coordinators have dedicated ourselves to preparing our students to be competitive in this global society. Together, with our external partnerships and our partnerships with our parents and community, District 205 students will be successful in their future.

Your Schools and Finance

The entire world is in the midst of a level of economic crisis and instability that many of us have never experienced. This crisis has put an increasing financial strain on all school districts in the State of Illinois. A decrease in student enrollment within Thornton Township High School District 205 is putting an added strain on the District's current and future financial condition. The District has done an exemplary job in putting itself in the best possible financial condition in order to be prepared for the great financial challenges that are expected to impact the District over the next several years.

The following graph reflects total revenues and total expenses (excluding major capital projects) of Thornton Township High School District 205 since 2005:






During this time period, the District has been able to increase fund balances (excluding capital project reserve fund) by adopting balanced budgets that have resulted in total revenues received since 2005 exceeding total expenses paid since 2005 in excess of \$28 million.

ISSUES FACING THE DISTRICT

Financial Crisis in the State of Illinois

With 33% of the District's total revenues coming from State sources, the District is vulnerable to the economic plight of the State. The State is in the midst of a major financial crisis, which has resulted in it having the lowest credit rating of any state in the country. State funding to school districts in Illinois has dropped in each of the past three years and delays in State payments have been in excess of 200 days at times. The District has permanently lost \$4.9 million in GSA revenues due to cuts. Additionally, the State owed the District in excess of \$3.4 million in past due grant revenues on June 30, 2012. The State has indicated that funding to schools will continue to decrease in FY 2014. Actions being discussed include further reductions in GSA and the elimination of the regular transportation grant, which generates approximately \$2.5 million annually to the District.

Possible Shifting of Pension Obligations from the State to the District

In order to strengthen the financial condition of the State of Illinois, there is a strong movement to shift pension obligations to school districts. Experts believe that legislation will be passed as early as January 2013. While some believe that this shift will be phased in over several years, it is uncertain what the ultimate financial impact will be to school districts throughout the State. Based on a blend of various estimates, the annual impact to the District may be in the \$1.5 million - \$2.5 million range.

Significant Decrease in Funding Due to Declining Enrollment

The average daily student attendance in the District has declined by 1,300 students over the past few years. For each student the District loses, it will lose approximately \$6,000 in revenues. In other words, the loss of 1,300 students would ultimately translate into the loss of about \$7.8 million in State revenues annually. It is important to note that the State of Illinois uses a threeyear average of student attendance in order to determine funding levels. As a consequence, much of the decline in revenues will occur of the next few years.



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
