

Over the last five years the Thornton Township High School District 205 Board of Education has taken a bold and unprecedented action by approving the creation and development of a Student Board of Education Program. The Student Board of Education Program was initiated during the 2006-2007 school year. Over the course of the last four years and with the support and confidence of the District 205 Board of Education, Superintendent and administration, the program has successfully accomplished its role as a district-wide student advisory group and prepared student leaders for post high school opportunities.

Since its inception, over 31 students have served on the Student Board of Education representing all three schools. Students serving on the Student Board have a 100% graduation rate, attend college and are awarded scholarships that on average cover more the 60% of the cost to attend. Members of the Student Board also participate in high level policy and strategic planning decision affecting District 205. The 2010-2011 Student Board Goals included:

- Improving the District's current lunch offerings
- Working with students and student organizations to provide recommendation for the District's \$51 million Capital Improvement Program
- Continue to develop and expand the Jefferson Awards Program
- Continue to enhance the District 205 SAVE Program

2011-2012 GOALS

The Student Board of Education recently held its summer Board retreat at the Illinois Teen Institute at Western Illinois University, in Macomb, Illinois. While at the Illinois Teen Institute the Student Board created the following goals for the 2011-2012 school year.

- Work with Arbor Management to diversify breakfast and lunch menu items and improve service and food quality.
- Continue to build and expand the Jefferson Awards Program in District 205.
- · Work with Schaumburg High School to continue the Student Exchange Program with a Law and Social Justice Spring Break Immersion Experience.
- Continue to strengthen the SAVE Program across the District.
- Plan and implement the second annual District 205 Board of Education Student Commendation Awards Ceremony.

- Provided input that resulted in the successful completion of new cafeterias and Thornton Auditorium
- Facilitated Gold Service Leadership Award from the Jefferson Award Community Service Initiative
- Awarded over half million dollars in scholarships


Education to lead our organization during our time of transition.

HISTORY

Four years ago the Thornton Township High School District 205 Academic Enrichment Foundation created the Star Award for Teaching Excellence. The Star Award for Teaching Excellence recognizes outstanding teachers who embody District 205's commitment to excellence.

All full-time tenured faculty members are eligible for the award. The award honors teachers who inspire, stimulate, challenge, and motivate their students; teachers who develop in students the ability to think critically and creatively about the world; teachers who instill in their students a lifelong love of learning; and teachers who inspire, mentor; and develop new teachers entering the field.



THE SELECTION PROCESS

Each year the Foundation selects one teacher at each building to receive the Star Award. The Star Award for Teaching Excellence recipients are nominated by their professional peers in each building. The nine professionals that have been selected as Star teachers over the last three years have touched the lives of thousands of students who have attended District 205 schools. 

TRANSFORMATION

We are transforming Thornton Township High School District 205 into a Gateway District to prepare students for a global society. Illinois, along with 44 states in our union, have adopted a set of Common Core Standards in math and English/Language Arts. The standards are officially called the New Illinois Learning Standards Incorporating the Common Core. These standards will apply to all students - kindergarten through I2th grade. Having a common set of standards will help the grade schools and high schools throughout our nation to have an alignment of curriculum and assessments.

The assessments that students will take in correspondence with these standards are called the PARCC (Partnership for Assessment of Readiness for College & Careers) assessments. The first set of PARCC assessments will be taken by students during the spring of 2014. At the high school level, all 9th-11th grade students will have to take this assessment. The Common Core standards and PARCC assessments will require much more of our stu-





PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

We have literacy coaches in each building who are providing professional development to our teachers on a different Common Core Standard each month. The teachers are taking these skills and strategies back into the classroom for implementation. The teachers attend a follow up session to analyze the student work as an outcome of the incorporation of these skills and strategies. Some of the standards that are being taught focus on include reading and writing for argument, schema building and vocabulary, and reading primary documents for information.

The Common Core Standards also focus on eight mathematical practices. Our math coaches, who are in each building, provide professional development on a different mathematical practice each month. Some of these mathematical practices include making sense of problems and persevering in solving them, reasoning abstractly and quantitatively, attending to precision, and constructing viable arguments and critique the reasoning of others. A large component of the work in math focuses

on fostering critical thinking in our students. As a result, we are seeing more "math talk" and facilitated math discussions in our class-

PARENT INVOLVEMENT

As a parent, you can assist in helping to prepare your student(s) for the Common Core Standards by encouraging your student(s) to read more informational text for understanding. These are nonfiction materials that pertain to information such as cell phone agreements or insurance policies. The Common Core Standards are requiring that by 12th grade, reading done in school should consist of 70% informational text and only 30% literature. Additionally, you can encourage your student(s) to think more critically by asking them to compare and contrast or evaluate options in their everyday decision making. We can work together to ensure that all of our students are college and career ready.

MAKING CONNECTIONS

Additionally, we are working on expanding our external partnerships with colleges, universities, and local businesses. If we are truly preparing our students for a global society, they must have real world experiences and connections. We are currently assessing all of our career pathway offerings along with meeting with various institutions in order to determine the best fits for external partnerships. There have been meetings regarding the Certified Nursing Assistant Program, a Law Program, and an extension of our Pre-Pharmacy Program in conjunction with the colleges and universities just to name a few. We are also looking at other programming opportunities for our students in the area of STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Science). There is a lot of movement in our nation towards the area of STEM research, funding, and programs in order to get more students prepared for careers in math and science. District 205 will play its part in reaching this goal.

This leadership team, along with our Freshmen Academy teachers and staff, has been extremely active in building the bridge from high school to college for our freshmen students. We wanted to expose our freshmen students to life on the college campus. Our intent is to give them a sneak peek of their life just 4 years from now if they work hard and stay

focused during their time at Thornton Township High School. Since the start of this school year, our freshmen had the opportunity to attend a boat cruise luncheon for potential Gates Scholars, participate in college fairs, and visit college campuses. I must say that these activities have proven extremely effective, as more students are meeting with their counselors and discussing career pathways as they prepare to select their choice of upper house to attend during their sophomore through senior years. Our counselors conduct classroom visits to speak with students, constantly reminding them about their grades, choosing career pathways, and reflecting on their experiences.

We also conduct monthly motivational assemblies for our freshmen, where we provide our students with an array of speakers. Speakers range from upper class students who are very successful in their career pathways and now experiencing the excitement of selecting colleges to attend, to those students who started their freshmen year struggling, but are now succeeding and looking forward to attending college. We also invite Wildcat graduate who are working professionals to share their journeys of success and triumph.

The results of these initiatives are staggering, as there has been a significant decrease in major discipline infractions regarding our freshmen students, as well as an increase in their attendance rates. Our entire staff consistently comments that there is something special about this freshmen class, as they seem very focused, and they immediately embraced the concepts of Wildcat Pride, and accepted the challenge to be successful through their high school years. I am very proud of this group, as I am with all of my students, and very thankful for my administrative team and staff for pushing them towards excellence.

The 2011-2012 school year is well on its way! We had a very exciting beginning to this new year. It was great to see the faces of everyone when they saw the new cafeteria and some of the other changes in the building. Anytime there is something new, there is always the feeling of starting

fresh. Our students, faculty and staff began this year with a fresh, new attitude and feeling that something good is about to happen. That feeling is always full of hope and promise. Last year's theme was, "Solving the Puzzle of Excellence and Success: One Piece at a Time." Thornwood is working to complete the puzzle of Excellence,

Respect and Pride by expecting and challenging students to be on time for class. Attendance Challenge is an initiative created to reach the following goals in order to reduce tardies: Incrementally reduce tardies over the school year; monitor progress through technology; Increase student's self-efficacy; work with parents to reinforce positive behaviors and routines; and reward students who get to class on time. Students are rewarded with a coin, which can be redeemed for items. This program, which was devised and monitored by teacher, Mike Kincaid, has been very successful, reducing our tardies by nearly half of that they were last year.



This year the Thornwood Boys Cross Country track team led by Head Track Coach, Brian Evans, made their mark in the Southwest Suburban Conference by becoming the 2011-12 Conference Champions. They also placed 3rd in the IHSA Regional contest and advanced to sectionals where they had the second highest finish in school history. Students who led the team with great performances were Kenneth Allen, Johnnell Seanior, Reggie Brown and Wole Daramola. Coach Evans says that he is happy to say that with only one senior, the whole team will be returning next year. Watch out for the Thunderbirds.




Who Said District 205 Students Aren't Prepared For College? By Habibat Oguntade



United Nations Summer Leadership Academy By Stacy Wright

Launching elementary and high school students into the global society is the fundamental objective of the United Nations Summer Leadership Academy which is joint partnership between District 205,AT&T and the District 205 Academic Enrichment Foundation. As a district, we not only serve our current students, but also our future students by exposing them to enriching academic, cultural and life activities.

The United Nations Summer Leadership Academy is a six-week, community-based program that blends the Ralph Bunche United Nations curriculum, world history, economics, current events, wellness and leadership training. The mission of the UN Academy is to provide students in grades five through eight, from surrounding school districts and communities, with a global-based academic and enriched experience. Weekly cultural field trips are also a part of the academy.



The 2011 summer marked several new additions to the UN Academy. First, a Chinese language and culture class was added as an additional academic component. Secondly, due to the overwhelming popularity of culinary arts with UN Academy students, a second section of the class was added to provide students with more time to explore recipes and cuisine from around the world. And finally, in preparation for the End of Summer Celebration, a theater arts class was added to the program. Students performed "The Wizard of the UN Oz", which highlighted their understanding of the United Nations, as well as their unique experiences and adventures over the summer.

HISTORICAL FINANCIAL REVIEW




The US and Global economy continue to struggle. Many financial analysts and economists believe we are headed back into a recession. The District has already felt the impact of the continued economic contraction and will need to continue to take action to limit the negative financial impact on the District's fund balances.

The District has been proactively addressing the concerns brought about by the current economic climate. Despite declining revenues, the District's FY12 budget that was approved by the Board of Education last month shows a surplus of Revenues over Expenditures (excluding the bond fund and the capital projects fund).

This balancing effort shows the prudence and fiscal responsibility of the District while navigating through difficult financial times. The District was fortunate to have been able to utilize \$3.2 million of Federal ARRA funds to help balance the budget for FY12. This will be the last time the District will receive these funds.

Yet, there are still three primary areas of concern for the District as we look to the future: (1) The State financial crisis and its impact on state funding, (2) The increase in foreclosures and its impact on tax collections, (3) Low rates of inflation and its impact on tax revenue growth. These issues are discussed on the following page.



ISSUES Facing the District

State Financial Crisis

With almost one-third of the District's revenues coming from State sources, Thornton Township High School District 205 is very dependent on State revenues to fund its operations. It is therefore vulnerable to the economic plight of the State. It has been projected that General State-Aid revenues will decrease by approximately \$4 million over the next two years with declining student enrollment. While the State is making efforts to not reduce funding, it has acknowledged that this will be very difficult going forward. Despite increases in General State-Aid revenues for students from low socioeconomic situations for FY12, the Illinois State Board of Education has cautioned that there is a risk that this portion of General State-Aid revenues may be reduced due to the dramatic increase in cost state-wide.

Increasing Rate of Foreclosures

Over the past five years, the District has collected between 92% and 94% of its property taxes. For the most current year, this percentage has decreased to below 89%. This drop is primarily due to an increase in the foreclosure rate in the District. While banks are paying taxes on most residential property foreclosures, commercial property foreclosures, which banks do not pay taxes for, are dramatically impacting tax collections. For every one percent decline in tax collections, the District loses approximately \$600,000.

Low Inflation

While low inflation levels will help keep the growth in certain expenditure types low, the District is capped in its growth of real estate tax revenues by the rate of inflation as defined by the consumer price index. This led to revenue growth that was capped at the 2009 consumer price index of 2.7% for the tax levy that was approved in December 2011. Many experts are projecting that inflation levels will be low or non-existent for several years given the anticipated slow growth in the economy and the high level of unemployment. With real estate tax revenues making up approximately half the total revenues, an extended period of low inflation could be devastating to the District.

With the goal of ensuring that the financial condition of the District remains healthy, it is imperative to examine and react to major issues that have a significant impact on the District's financial condition.

STANDARD & POOR'S

RATIONALE

The 'AA-' rating assigned to Cook County Township High School District No. 205 (Thornton), Ill.'s general obligation (GO) limited school bonds series 2008 reflects the district's:

- Participation in the deep and diverse Chicago metropolitan area economy;
- Good financial management that overcame a chronic fiscal imbalance and restored positive financial operations following a series of budget adjustments; and
- Strong cash reserves, including working cash.

Adequate but below-average wealth and income levels, and a moderately high debt burden partially offset these factors.

The district's financial management practices are considered "good" under Standard & Poor's Financial Management Assessment (FMA). An FMA of "good" indicates that practices exist in most areas, although not all may be formalized or regularly monitored by governance officials. Management review expenditures on a monthly basis and provides the board with monthly budget reports. The district budgets with the help of five-year financial projections and multi-year building maintenance schedules.

OUTLOOK

The stable outlook reflects Standard's & Poor's expectation that the district's management will take the steps necessary to maintain at least balanced financial operations and strong cash reserves in spite of the levy cap. The district's participation in the Chicago metropolitan area's diverse economy supports the outlook.


