The Instrumental Music Booster Club was organized in July of 1956. Its purpose is "to arouse and maintain an enthusiastic interest in the various phases of instrumental music in the West York Area Schools." Membership is open to anyone interested in the progress and development of instrumental music in the West York Area Schools.

The officers and members of the club wish to thank the residents of the community for their continued support of the group's activities. Past projects have included the purchase of new majorette and band front uniforms, new instruments for elementary music programs, and miscellaneous band equipment; sponsorship of the John Philip Sousa Band Awards; Albert Kelly summer music camp scholarship; partial payment of a summer band training encampment, annual band parties and band banquet. The project that highlighted the year 1971-72 was the Mexico Tour trip. Funds for these projects have been raised through the sale of 7" records; submarine sandwich sales to industry and community; and contributions from industry and community, Rutters Hot Dog stand and our annual Spring Concert souvenir program.

Our main projects for the year 1972-73 are to raise funds for the symphonic band's Spring tour, a trip to a concert at the Kennedy Center in Washington, Albert Kelly Scholarship, John Phillip Sousa Band Award and the fourteenth annual band training encampment planned for late August 1973.

OUR FEATURED SOLOISTS



DIANNA WITTLE, EDWIN KAUFFMAN, TED ALTLAND, PHILIP WECKER French Horn Quartet

The French Horn Quartet was organized especially for tonight's concert. In addition to the Symphonic Band, its members have been active in numerous small ensembles, York Symphony, City Band, Young Persons Chamber Orchestra of York, and Spring Garden Band. Several have been active on the band staff; Phil having served as section leader, and Dianna as historian and corresponding secretary.

In competition, the quartet has collectively represented West York Area in twenty-two PMEA music festivals at the district and regional level with Phil having been selected for the Pennsylvania All-State Orchestra last January. All have been active in West York's recital series and have participated in the school's solo/ensemble adjudication contest. Ed and Phil hold membership in Modern Music Masters, a national music honor society.

During the past two summers, Phil has studied horn at the University of Kansas and the University of Indiana at Bloomington. He attended the latter as a recipient of the Albert Kelly Memorial Camp Scholarship sponsored by the Instrumental Music Booster Club.

SANDRA CROWL Oboe Soloist

Sandra Crowl, oboe soloist for tonight's concert, has been active in the West York music program since the fourth grade. In addition to holding the "1st chair" position in the symphonic band (for the past three years), Sandy is an active member of the woodwind quintet, Young Persons Chamber Orchestra of York, Youth Symphony, and Spring Garden Band. She has also served the band as section leader and secretary. During her sophomore year, she was honored with membership in the Modern Music Masters, a national music honor society; and is currently chapter secretary.

In competition, Sandy has won "top" positions in eight PMEA district and regional festivals. On two occasions she has entered West York's solo adjudication contest; having earned a Division I (Superior) rating last year. She has also appeared in numerous student recitals as soloist and with small ensembles.

During the summer, Sandy has attended high school music seminars at Edinboro State College, University of Kansas, and Millersville State College. Upon graduation this June, Sandy plans to continue her music education at York College.



ABOUT THE BAND

The West York Area High Band begins each year at a week-long training camp — this year at Wilson College in Chambersburg — where they orientate new members and prepare for the busy fall season. Once school opens, the band performs at all home and away football games and for numerous school and civic occasions. Often featured are the Majorette Corps, coached by Mrs. Betty Lageman, and the all-male "Bulldog" Color Guard — a consistent winner in competition — coached by "Bud" Schlosser.

The Symphonic Band, one of two concert bands available, is an elective curricular subject meeting five periods per week for full credit. Of these periods, three are used for sectional rehearsal with student leaders in charge. In addition, many students participate in solo work and small ensembles meeting after school and evenings. A series of 16 student recitals are held to give these groups an opportunity to perform and listen to each other. Soloists and ensembles also participate in an adjudication contest sponsored annually by the band.

In addition to concerts presented in the York area, the band also makes an annual Spring Tour and has performed in Delaware, Maryland, Virginia, New York, New Jersey, Ontario, Canada, and throughout Pennsylvania. On two occasions, they were a featured band at the Mid-East National Band Clinic in Pittsburgh, and this past January, at the 1st Annual Eastern Band Conductors Conference sponsored by the University of Maryland. Ensembles have performed at clinics and/or concerts at most Pennsylvania colleges, at two PMEA state conventions, with an All-State Band, on WGAL and WSBA Television, and for numerous civic and church organizations in the area. Highlight of the band's activities was a five-day goodwill tour of Mexico City during May, 1972.

The band has twice been honored by the "First Chair of America" Yearbook — a national non-profit book featuring selected bands from throughout the United States. They have also been featured as "Band of the Month" by both the American School Band Directors Association and Phi Beta Mu National Bandmasters Fraternity in the **School Musician Magazine.** In 1971, they were selected as one of six high school Bands to appear on a nationally-distributed educational recording. In 1970, they were presented a citation from the National Federation of Music Clubs for their Pennsylvania premier performance of Vaclav Nelhybel's "Sine Nomine" during National Music Week.

OUR DIRECTOR

Alan Wyand, director of instrumental music at West York Area High School, was born in State College, Pennsylvania, and received both his B.S. and M.Ed. degrees in music education from the Pennsylvania State University. He taught three years in Huntingdon County (Pa.) before moving to York in 1959. Since then, he has attracted state and national attention to the activities of the West York music program through appearances of the band and numerous ensembles.

In 1967, Wyand was selected as one of ten high school band directors from the United States to be honored by the **School Musician Magazine** in its column "They Are Making America Musical." He was further honored by membership in "The Order of the Silver Horn" awarded to "those whose accomplishments in the field of school music are of the highest national standards." Just recently he was presented a "Citation of Excellence" Award from the National Band Association.

Wyand is a life member of P.S.E.A. and N.E.A., a charter member of the National Band Association (current state chairman), a member of the American School Band

Directors Association, the Pennsylvania Music Educators Association, the Music Educators National Conference, and the Percussive Arts Society.

Honorary societies to his credit include Phi Beta Mu, national bandmasters fraternity (past president of Pennsylvania Chapter); Phi Delta Kappa, honorary education fraternity; and Phi Mu Alpha, honorary music fraternity.

In addition, Wyand is National Editor for Phi Beta Mu and has news articles appearing monthly in a professional journal. He is also a member of the Board of Directors for the National Band Association, national chairman of the ASBDA Research Distribution Committee, member of the National Advisory Council for Modern Music Masters Honor Society, and has served on the North American Band Directors' Coordinating Committee.

During the summer of 1971, he was a staff member with the "Camp de Musique International," a music camp based in Switzerland with concert performances throughout Europe.

Wyand has appeared as clincian and adjudicator in Maryland, Virginia, and throughout Pennsylvania. In June, he will adjudicate at the 2nd Annual Invitational Mexican Band Festival in Mexico City.



"OUR YEAR IN REVIEW"

Leo is very much at home in the band office, thanks to Bob Limbert, who was appointed "Keeper of the Gerbil." During homecoming, the band was especially proud of the two representatives we had on the 1973 Court: Aleis Firestone and Deb Briggs.



The weather was terrible this year — it seemed to rain at every Thursday rehearsal and who could ever forget the downpour at the Spring Grove game when we saluted our friend, Sue Seaks, who is now teaching there. Another highlight was our Mexican Appreciation Show in which we thanked the community for its support of our trip last Spring. The Halloween Parade was also rained out, so Phil Frey hosted a party at his home to replace it. The parade was rescheduled for Monday night and we received many fine comments from the radio commentator and spectators alike.



This year's marching band would not have been such a great success without its numerous leaders. Calling the signals was our drum major, Bill Meals. The majorettes really put in an excellent season with head majorette Aleis Firestone, and Mrs. Betty Lageman, who instructed them. "Bud" Schlosser and Brett Shaffer worked with the "hard" guard whose color sergeant, Randy Zepp, and the rest did a terrific job on the field



and in parade competition. The entire band front deserves a great deal of thanks and appreciation for a job well done.

We closed the 1972 marching season with our traditional pot-luck supper and fun-nite. In the annual volleyball game, the band again won their revenge match to save face for Mr. W. With great effort, the guard got through their 50 pushups supervised by all bandsmen. Even though they lost again, we still love them!

This year both the Symphonic and Concert Bands received head starts as a result of marching band practices being after school. The Symphonic Band, which will perform tonight, is composed of the more experienced musicians and rehearses everyday from 8:00 until 9:00 a.m. The Concert Band rehearses three times a week with Mr. Wyand, and provides an opportunity for others to perform and develop their musical abilities.



December started with District Band tryouts, which ended up as an endurance contest for the clarinets. We tied our record with last year's as 35 students "made it." Our Annual Christmas Concert featured both bands and the chorus providing music for the holiday season. The brass choir played numerous Christmas jobs including the Shiloh Lions Christmas party, St. Paul's Lutheran Church, and the North Mall to mention a few.

The ensembles were hard at work again this year with two brass groups and two woodwind quintets. A brand new ensemble this year features the P.A.D. (Percussive Arts Department), or more affectionately known as the "Jungle Beaters of America", "The Paradiddle Platoon", or the "Rudimental Engineering Division." They are one of the more active ensembles and will appear in tonight's concert in Clifton William's "Concertino." Soloists and ensembles appear in a recital series which is sponsored by the West York Chapter of Modern Music Masters, a national music honor society. The purpose of these recitals is for everyone to get an opportunity to play new literature and have the experience of playing in front of a live audience. Planned for the spring is the Third Annual Solo/Ensemble Contest.



This event provides the contestants with constructive criticism and a rating of their performances based on a national scale. The adjudicators are selected from area colleges and universities. The German Band was also extremely active with numerous jobs at banquets and festivals.

Kicking off the new year was Cheryl Wonderly's selection to the All-Eastern Band held in Boston. The band, consisting of outstanding students from 11 states, rehearsed under Dr. Hunsberger from the Eastman School of Music and performed at the bi-annual convention of the M.E.N.C.



One of the biggest events of the year was the invitation for our band to perform at the First Annual Eastern Band Directors Conference, sponsored by the University of Maryland. This was a particular challenge to perform this early in the season. Even though the audience was small, they were very appreciative. To round out the day, we visited the Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts where we enjoyed a performance of Fred Waring and the Pennsylvanians. Arriving home at 1:30 a.m., we found that Bob Limbert's car would not start. The bus drivers also had problems as we kept going around in circles in downtown Washington, D.C. trying to find the Kennedy Center.



Another honor during January was Phil Frey's selection to the National High School Hall of Fame, sponsored by the School Musician Magazine. A picture and an account appeared in the January issue and is on display in the new trophy case in the band wing. Phil Frey was also honored, along with Stephanie Hinkle, by the West York Optimist Club during Youth Appreciation Week. In other honors, Phil Wecker was selected for All-State Orchestra held in conjunction with the Annual three-day PMEA Conference at the Host Farm in Lancaster.

A tragedy came to the band when our good friend Mr. Chet Sheffer passed away after a prolonged illness. He will be missed by all the band; especially the clarinets. Several band members paid him due respects by attending funeral services.

The first day of February took the District Band members to Manheim Township High School in Neffsville. The homes and hospitality were well-liked. The guest conductor was Mr. William Musser, and after a morning



of rehearsal, tryouts were held for Regional Band with seven West Yorkers placing: Leslie Smith, Pam Quigley, Cheryl Wonderly, Dave Eyster, Phil Wecker, Jeff Gable, and Steve Stough.

Our fund raising was again spearheaded by the Instrumental Music Booster Club. In addition to this souvenir program, other projects included three sub sales (with snow again hitting us during industrial day) and a hot dog/soda sale at Rutter's Farm Store. Monies earned will go toward this year's spring tour, a variety of social events, and next year's band camp. The Anna Eyster Memorial Trophy Case is now on display in the hall of the band wing. It was purchased in memory of Mrs. Eyster who was an active member of the club for many years, and had passed away last summer.

District Orchestra was held at Ephrata High School with three bandsmen players representing West York. They were Julie Benton, Phil Wecker, and Tim Anderson. The guest conductor was Fritz Miraffi.



In addition to our own concerts, the band sponsored three special music programs from surrounding universities. The student body gave a standing ovation to the Trombone Ensemble from the University of West Virginia. The Susquehanna Jazz Lab played at another assembly and was also well received. One of our band alumni, Tom Eyster, was a member of this group. A Woodwind Quintet, graduates of Peabody Conservatory of Music, also appeared in our recital series.

March 11 was the initiation of new inductees into Tri-M and a recital. The new initiates take a special test and must perform in the recital. A reception was held for the parents and audience in honor of the new members — thanks to Mrs. Stitt. The new inductees were: Andrea Altland, Julie Wambaugh, Pam Quigley, Cheryl Wonderly, Judy Jacobs, Dave Eyster, Phil Wecker, Ed Kauffman, Ken Baker, Scott Hursh, Al Polson, Steve Rodgers, Dave Funkhouser, Dan Knipple, Tim Anderson, Deb Brodbeck, Marilyn Young, Nancy Thomas, Cheryl Lehr, and Vickie Kling. Phil Frey was also named as "top-notcher" by the national headquarters of Tri-M. He was presented with a certificate by Mr. Wyand during the recital.



Again this year Dr. James Dunlop, Director of Bands at Penn State University, came to work with our band. He has a reputation throughout the nation for excellent band work. We look forward to the two-hour session where we get the experience of playing under another director who really puts us to work.



Sue Seaks, who we mentioned earlier as being a good friend of the band, has been helping the clarinets with preparation for the concert tonight. She comes to West York after school on Thursdays for an hour session.



MODERN MUSIC MASTERS

Chapter 821 of the Modern Music Masters, a national music honor society, was formed at West York during the Fall of 1965.

Modern Music Masters does for music what the National Honor Society does for scholarship. With the current emphasis that is given to science, mathematics, and foreign language, Modern Music Masters helps to keep a proper balance between the academic and cultural subjects.

Chief aims of the society are to foster greater interest in band, orchestral, and choral performance, and to provide wider opportunities for personal musical expression. Students are selected for "Tri-M" membership on the basis of musicianship, scholarship, character, cooperation, leadership, and service to the school, church, and community. Prospective candidates must also perform a solo in concert or recital.

Although primarily an honor society, the West York Chapter has sponsored a series of sixteen student recitals and several field trips to hear concerts.

STUDENT RECITAL SERIES

One of the most valuable experiences offered by the instrumental music program at West York is the student recital series. Sponsored by the Modern Music Masters Honor Society, this series of sixteen recitals is held after school and on Sunday evenings throughout the year.

The purpose of the recital series is not necessarily to entertain the public but, instead, has a three-fold objective: 1) to encourage students to explore solo and ensemble literature, 2) to give all students an opportunity to perform in front of a live audience, thus building confidence, and 3) to share with the student body and faculty the talent our area is fortunate to have.

In conjunction with the recital series, the band also sponsors an annual Solo/Ensemble Adjudication Contest. Those who choose to enter the contest perform a selection of their own choice in front of a panel of judges. Each judge prepares written comments on the performances along with a final rating based on standards set up by the Music Educators National Conference.




