JULIE BENTON Bassoon Soloist

Julie Benton brings her musical talent to the West York stage as bassoon soloist for this evening's concert. In addition to being "1st chair" in the symphonic band, Julie is also active with marching band, woodwind quintet and band executive council. She was selected to membership in Modern Music Masters, national music honorary society, in her junior year, and is presently chapter president.

For the past three years Julie has well represented West York at numerous PMEA Festivals. She has captured "1st chair" at District Band and Orchestra and Regional Band and Orchestra. This past January Julie was placed in the first chair position at All-State Band in Pittsburgh.

Interestingly enough, Julie's elementary playing was done with the cello, and she began playing bassoon in eighth grade. Upon graduation, Julie will attend Shippensburg State College with a major in Pre-Law Studies.

JULIE WAMBAUGH Flute Soloist

Appearing this evening as flute soloist, Julie is culminating what has been a very successful high school music experience. Julie became a member of symphonic band and marching band in ninth grade and has participated in both flute quartet and woodwind quintet. She is completing her second year as both section leader and "1st Chair" of the band's flute section. During her sophomore year, she was honored with membership in the Modern Music Masters, national music honorary society; and has served this organization as secretary the past two years.

Julie has also compiled an impressive record at music festivals outside of the high school. Specifically, she has been a member of District Band for three years (this year achieving "1st Chair"), Regional Band, and District and Regional Orchestra, in which she was also awarded "1st Chair" this year.

Julie is a private student of Ray Kauffman of Millersville State College. Following high school graduation she will pursue a major in Speech Therapy at Indiana University of Pennsylvania.



ABOUT THE BAND


The West York Area High School Band begins each year at a week-long training camp — this year at Camp Nawakwa in Arendtsville — where new members are oriented and prepared for the busy fall season. Once school opens, the band performs at all home and away football games. Often featured are the Majorettes - under the direction of Mrs. Betty Lageman, and the all-male "Bulldog" color guard - a consistant winner in competition - instructed by Mr. Michael Donnelly. Highlights of this year's marching season included trips to the Hanover Halloween Parade, the Fiftieth Annual Alsatia Mummers Parade in Hagerstown, Maryland, and the Governor's Inaugural Parade in Harrisburg.

The Symphonic Band and Concert Band are offered as elective curricular subjects. The Symphonic Band meets daily while the Concert Band rehearses three times weekly. Student-led sectionals are held in both bands. In addition, many students participate in solo work and small ensembles meeting after school and evenings. A series of student recitals is held to give these students an opportunity to perform and listen to each other.

In addition to concerts presented in the York area, the band also makes an annual Spring Tour and has performed in Delaware, Maryland, Virginia, New York, New Jersey, Ontario, Canada, and throughout Pennsylvania. On two occasions, they were a feature band at the Mid-East National Band Clinic in Pittsburgh, and in 1973, at the 1st Annual Eastern Band Conductors Conference sponsored by the University of Maryland. Ensembles have performed at clinics and/or concerts at many Pennsylvania colleges, at two PMEA state conventions, with an All-State Band, and on WGAL and WSBA Television, and for numerous civic and church organizations in the area. Highlighting the band's past activities are a goodwill tour to Mexico City in 1972, and performance at Florida's Disney World in 1974. This year the Symphonic Band will journey to the Greater Pittsburgh Area for its annual Spring Tour.

The band has twice been honored by the "First Chair of America" Yearbook - a national non-profit book featuring selected bands from throughout the United States. They have also been featured as "Band of the Month" by both the American School Band Directors Association and Phi Beta Mu National Bandmasters Fraternity in the School Musician Magazine. In 1971, they were selected as one of six high school bands to appear on a nationally-distributed educational recording. In 1970, they were presented a citation from the National Federation of Music Clubs for their Pennsylvania premier performance of Vaclav Nelhybel's "Sine Nomine" during National Music Week. Most recently the band was seen on the cover of The School Musician for its participation in various adjudication festivals.

OUR DIRECTOR



William Powers, director of instrumental music at West York Area High School, is a native of York. After graduation from high school he attended Gettysburg College, where he received his B.S. degree in Music Education. At college he served as student director of the Jazz Ensemble, created and instructed marching band shows and toured with the College Symphonic Band and Chapel Choir.

Mr. Powers is a member of the P.S.E.A. and N.E.A., National Band Association, the Pennsylvania Music Educators Association, and the Music Educators National Conference.

Other societies to his credit include life memberships to Sigma Nu, national social fraternity; Phi Mu Alpha, professional music fraternity; and Thespians, national drama society.

The Symphonic and Concert Bands are the two bands in the present music department. The Symphonic Band, which you will hear tonight, is composed of the more experienced musicians and rehearses during the last period of the school day, five days a week. The Concert band meets three days a week, and provides an opportunity for others to perform and develop their musical abilities. Both are under the direction of director William Powers.

December began with District Band try-outs, held at Palmyra High School. This year West York still held the "record" (unoffical, of course!) of the most from one high school with 21 making the grade. And, as had been an annual tradition, all three bass clarinets who tried out made it. They won the best (?) lasagna dinner that had ever tickled their taste buds — prepared by Mrs. Powers, none the less! Late in December, the annual Christmas Concert was presented, featuring the entire West York Music Department.

The new year started out in a full swing with ensembles becoming active. The Brass ensemble is rolling along, as are the Woodwind Quintets, the Percussion Ensemble, and the Flute Quartet. The jazz band (started just last year) has the benefit of Mr. Powers' experience in the jazz idiom, and is expected to play a school assembly, and at the Spring Arts Festival in May. Another ensemble which is very active this year is the German Band, headed by Tim Williammee. This group is one of the most popular and has appeared throughout York County.

January 16-18 heralded the Lower Southern District Band Festival, held this year at Penn Manor High School. The guest conductor, and great soloist was Dr. Leonard B. Smith of Detroit. Dr. Smith kept everyone on their toes, and produced another fine band as the Southern District is noted for. Of course for their occasion, the West York Paper Air Force, was unhangered and flown, much to the dismay of Mr. Powers. All the participants enjoyed the

music and the social life of the festival. Many fond memories of our hosts and of new found friends will stay with us forever. At the festival, try-outs were held for Regional Band. This year at Carlisle High School, six members of our band were selected: Judy Jacobs, Julie Benton, Julie Wambaugh, Brian Day, Tom Johnson, and Mickey Arnold. Congratulations to all.

West York was also represented by three musicians at the Regional Orchestra Festival at Rehersburg in March. They were Julie Benton, Julie Wambaugh, and Tom Johnson. And this year we also had two representatives go to All-State Band in Pittsburgh. Julie Benton and Dave Becker obtained this great honor, and we are proud of them for their accomplishments.

February 16 saw the initiation of twelve new members into Modern Music Masters. Tri-M is a national honor society for musicians who have proven themselves worthy of membership on the basis of five aspirations — scholarship, character, cooperation, leadership, and service. The twelve participated in the recital as one of their requirements for membership. The new members are: Jim Balthaser, Jim Bentzel, Jane Burkins, Linda Brokenshire, Bev Dart, Jeff Gosnell, Sue Hartman, Steve Limbert, Kathy Robinson, Deb Smallwood, Charles Snyder, and Brian Wonderly. Also headlining February was the annual "Pops" Concert, consisting of performances by both the Symphonic and Concert Bands.



The recital series sponsored by Tri-M again provided an opportunity for members of the band or any others with a musical ear to gain experience by listening or performing in front of an audience

at informal after-school recitals. Tri-M is also in the planning stages of a formal, serious music recital to be opened to the public in the near future.

Having a band means having money, in one form or another. And, as in past years, the Instrumental Music Booster Club undertook the task of raising the necessary funds. In addition to this souvenir program, other projects included a citrus fruit sale,





a skating party, and the old standby — the sub sales. (Love them pickles!) Profits from these projects will go toward this year's Spring tour, the band banquet, next year's band camp, and new instruments.

During March, Mr. Robert Zellner, band director at Gettysburg College, spent some time with the band working, and offering constructive criticism. Mr. Zellner is a fine band director, and it gave the band an opportunity to play under a college band director - a priveledge few high schools have to enjoy.

Of course, the biggest undertaking of the band this year, as every year, is the diligent work of "getting it together" for the annual Spring Concert. To do this takes hard work, both individually, and in sectionals. A special note of gratitude goes to those section leaders, who spent their time, energy, and nerves in working with their respective sections.

This year we are featuring two of our band members, Julie Benton and Julie Wambaugh as soloists. They are both fine musicians and have been very active in band activities as well.

Frank "Take Five" Taylor spent several long hours with the band producing a recording of tonight's performance. Following the concert, the traditional Bananna Split Party will be held at Lincolnway Elementary School and the field will be wide open for a new "Champion Hog". All alumni are invited, all the ice cream you can eat — as usual!

Although the Spring Concert is barely over, we are preparing for the rest of this event-filled year. Just next week, West York will be hosting the East Allegheny High School Band, from the Pittsburg area, in our homes. East Allegheny's band will present a concert April 19 in our auditorium. April 26 West York will be hosting and performing at the Fourth Annual Adjudication Festival. The festival is sponsored by the P.M.E.A. The band will perform several prepared numbers and sight-read in front of a panel of judges, one of whom is Dr. James Dunlop, of Penn State University.

May (of course) is the highlight of the year for the band members — the Spring tour. This year we are touring and giving concerts in the western part of Pennsylvania — eastern Ohio area. May 7 we will be at McConnellsburg and Central Fulton High School. May 8 we will travel "over the line" to East Liverpool, Ohio. May 9 we will be back in Pennsylvania, at East Allegheny as our part of the exchange with them. We will also play at North Versailles and will return home on May 10, just in time for the prom!

Some news that members of the band have made themselves: This past Summer three band members spent time away at music camps working, practicing, and learning. Randy Klingel spent two weeks at Blue Lake Fine Arts Camp in Michigan. Randy took classes in improvisation, music theory, and played in both the concert and the jazz band.

Matt Donley and Tim Williammee spent five weeks at the Midwestern Music and Art Camp at the University of Kansas. Both made the top band, and took classes in music theory. Some of the conductors they had the priveledge to play under were Colonel Arnold Gabriel, Sir Vivian Dunn, Erich Kungel, and Victor Alessandro.

The Annual Band Banquet will be held on May 21, again at St. Matthews Church, featuring the presentations of awards, good food, and "special" entertainment. It is the farewell dinner for the seniors, and over 300 people are expected.

To close the year, the marching band will march in the West York Memorial Day Parade, and the combined symphonic and concert bands will play at commencement exercises in June.

At this time, I would like to thank, on behalf of the band and Mr. Powers, the Instrumental Booster Club, the administration, and the entire community for their support of the band program. Also, special thanks goes to the band officers, the staff, and the section leaders for the dedication they have put towards the band. Once again, thanks for making this year such a successful one.

MODERN MUSIC MASTERS

Chapter 821 of the Modern Music Masters, a national music honor society, was formed at West York during the Fall of 1965.

Modern Music Masters does for music what the National Honor Society does for scholarship. With the current emphasis that is given to science, mathematics, and foreign language, Modern Music Masters helps to keep a proper balance between the academic and cultural subjects.

Chief aims of the society are to foster greater interest in band, orchestral, and choral performance, and to provide wider opportunities for personal musical expression. Students are selected for "Tri-M" membership on the basis of musicianship, scholarship, character, cooperation, leadership, and service to the school, church, and community. Prospective candidates must also perform a solo in concert or recital.

Although primarily an honor society, the West York Chapter has sponsored a student recital series, guest ensembles, and several field trips to hear concerts.

Ensembles, an important part of the instrumental music program at West York, acquaint some of the more advanced band students to the techniques and literature of small group performance. During their after-school and evening rehearsals, stress is placed on balance, intonation, ensemble timbre, and sight-reading of literature from the various musical eras. Student leaders often conduct rehearsals themselves, thus gaining experience in rehearsal technique.

In addition to appearances within school, the ensembles have performed at several area colleges, in a solo/ensemble adjudication contest, on WSBA-TV, at banquets, and for numerous church and service organizations throughout the York area. They have also appeared in a series of student recitals sponsored by the West York Chapter of Modern Music Masters, a national music honor society.



STUDENT RECITAL SERIES

One of the most valuable experiences offered by the instrumental music program at West York is the student recital series. Sponsored by the Modern Music Masters Honor Society, the recitals are held after school and on Sunday evenings throughout the year. Recently the program was expanded to include guest ensembles; last year appearances by the Indiana University Tubaphonium Ensemble and the Towson State College Early Music Ensemble.

The purpose of the recital series is not necessarily to entertain the public but, instead, has a three-fold objective: 1) to encourage students to explore solo and ensemble literature, 2) to give all students an opportunity to perform in front of a live audience, thus building confidence, and 3) to share with the student body and faculty the talent our area is fortunate to have.

In conjunction with the recital series, the band has also sponsored a Solo/Ensemble Adjudication Contest. Those who choose to enter the contest perform a selection of their own choice in front of a panel of judges. Each judge prepares written comments on the performances along with a final rating based on standards set up by the Music Educators National Conference.
