




- 2.0-2.49 May apply with Supplemental Factors such as:
 - Extra Curricular Activities
 - Work experience



Parents Role


Direct:

Involves your attitude toward learning



Indirect:

Involves understanding the education system and how to navigate





Direct Role

Know your student's goals and learn how to support them.

PLACE - Provide a study area.

COMMUNICATION - Work out concerns about conflicts




Learn with your student(s)!

What are the expectations for your student?

- Advocate for your student's learning needs, especially if they are struggling with subjects or need additional support

- Get information about college options and requirements
