
#### Middle school students are learning in portables

With each passing year, our aging facilities and overcrowding issues become more difficult to address. Even though we have maintained our buildings well, they are aging and outgrowing the educational needs of today's students.

The bond would fund the modernization of Glenwood and Skyline Elementary Schools and Lake Stevens Middle School.

In January, pipes burst at Glenwood and Skyline Elementary Schools flooding classrooms and causing significant damage. Learning was disrupted as students were forced to move to other locations while repairs were made. As systems continue to age, this will become more frequent.

## lack of **state** FUNDING

The 2024 Construction Bond is a continuation of our long-term facilities plan. It builds on the work completed through past bonds, including the 2005 bond, which will be fully-paid in 2025.

Washington state does not provide funding for school construction projects, which is why districts like ours rely on bonds. A bond requires 60 percent approval from our community to pass.

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HVAC Systems are failing, causing us to spend additional funding on repairs.

The bond would fund additional classroom spaces to serve students with specialized needs at eight SPECIAL EDUCATION schools throughout the district. This helps ensure that all students can access the spaces they need to learn. The new spaces would be modeled after spaces built in our newest schools, such as Lake Stevens High School.

school students are also taught in portables. Building a new elementary school and expanding Glenwood, Skyline and Lake Stevens Middle Schools will provide permanent classroom spaces for current and future students.



Several schools have one space to use for both PE and lunch. New gyms will be added to five schools for PE and more after-hours community use. Artificial turf at Lake Stevens Middle School and field lighting at North Lake and Lake Stevens Middle Schools and Cavelero Mid High School will allow greater access to these fields by the community.

# **BOND MEASURE**



The proposed School Construction Bond aims to fund improvements across all schools, resulting in a slight increase of \$0.56 per \$1,000 of assessed value for the average Lake Stevens homeowner.

Currently, homeowners pay \$0.44 per \$1,000 of assessed value for the 2005 bonds, which will be fully-paid in 2025.

If the 2024 School Construction Bond is approved, the total Lake Stevens School District tax rate for all voter-approved bonds (2016 and 2024) is projected to be \$1.76 per \$1,000 of assessed value.

### As a senior citizen, is there a possible exemption?



#### I don't have children in school. Why is this important to me?




#### Doesn't the state pay for new schools?

No. In Washington, school construction and capital projects are funded by voter-approved bonds. The state provides partial matching funds, only after voters pass a bond and build schools. We will stretch taxpayer dollars by leveraging approximately \$60 million in state construction dollars.
