Jack Shaver was pleased when he found out this year's District 14-AA Tournament would be played at the Humboldt Golf & Country Club.

After all, it's his home base. It's where he's primarily honed the skills that have made him Crockett County's top high school golfer for the past two seasons, even though he's still just a sophomore.

So when they teed it up Monday morning, Shaver strove confidently to the first hole and... promptly three-putted after his foursome reached the green. And on the second hole, he missed another makeable putt for a bogey. He was already three-over-par after two holes, in an 18-hole event in which – if you don't keep your score in the 70s – it's doubtful you'll see a berth in the following week's Region 7-AA Tournament.

So – at that point – what magical mental adjustment did Shaver make, or what sport psychology mantra did he employ? (Queue up the ESPN documentary music, please...)

"Nothing, really," the quiet linksman replied. (Kill the music – and the drama.) Shaver just played on. It's what he does. And he proceeded to play the final 16 holes in just one-over-par fashion to shoot a 76 and tie for the low medalist honors in the tournament, even though he was designated second place by an arbitrary decision to use a scorecard playoff rather than a head-to-head competition, which Shaver would have preferred.

[Note: A scorecard playoff is a method which designates one hole on the course – in this case the #1 handicap hole, considered the toughest hole on the course – to break the tie, using the number of strokes each player used on that hole. But both players parred it, so they went to the #2 handicap hole. Unfortunately, it's the one Shaver three-putted to begin his round.]

[Note #2: It's a lame, lousy way to decide a District Tournament champion. The vast majority of golfers hate it, and most tournament directors avoid it if there's time to actually hold a head-to-head duel.]

Anyway, Jack Shaver will be playing in next week's regional, as will his Lady Cavalier counterpart Rachel Crossnoe, who shot a 92 to place fourth among all the participants in the girls' portion of the tournament.

Shaver, after his tenuous start, birdied three straight holes (9-11) to offset a couple of bogeys late in the round. Crossnoe was fairly steady throughout her round on a day when many of her competitors just couldn't put anything together.

The season ends for the Crockett teams, which remain extremely young. Two of the Cavaliers' counting scores were shot by freshmen: Max Woods with an 85 and George Randall with a 90. Tyler Rathbun posted an 86 for Coach Chris Eubanks' squad.

VOLLEYBALL: Golf was not the only high school sport on the Crockett docket Monday. Coach Andrew Laman's volleyball team rebounded from a tough four-set defeat at powerful Dyer County last Thursday to score a big district win over Obion County, posting set triumphs of 25-22, 25-13, and 28-26 for a 3-0 sweep on Senior Night in Emerson Gymnasium.

Laman used his senior players extensively during the match, but still found time to employ his younger rotation players as Obion County put up a more spirited fight than in past seasons. The visiting Lady Rebels even pushed the Lady Cavaliers into extra time in Set 3, but Crockett eventually prevailed.

The volleyball team will journey to Dyersburg Tuesday night for another district rematch. Crockett survived a tough bout with the Lady Trojans in their first meeting in Alamo, but it was a dogfight.

GIRLS SOCCER: That school in Medina continued to hinder the progress made by Crockett's soccer squad when South Gibson County managed a lopsided 7-0 victory over the previously 7-1-1 Lady Cavs.

"South Gibson is very skilled," Coach Carli Branson said. "Defensively, we allowed too many open opportunities in the middle of the field. Amaria Walker (our goalie) actually played a phenomenal game to keep it from being a 'mercy rule' game, making multiple saves. But these are the games we will learn from. South Gibson has quite a few players who play club ball. We have to see girls putting in work outside of practice too - even if they don't play club ball - if we're ever going to cut into the difference in our programs right now. Our girls know their performance tonight was not their best now we'll see how they respond."

It doesn't get any easier for Crockett this week as Dyersburg makes the trek to Alamo for a Thursday night match.


