
## **CURRICULUM**

- Friends School of Baltimore does not calculate class rank.
- All GPAs are unweighted and include only academic course work taken at Friends.
- Some students, by virtue of their placement as incoming ninth graders, are unable to advance to the highest-level courses in mathematics, science, and foreign language.
- Friends School of Baltimore is on a semester schedule. One-credit courses meet four times in a 6-day cycle for two semesters. Half-credit courses meet four times in a 6-day cycle for one semester.





## **ADVANCED PLACEMENT (AP)**

**Considerations**: In 2019, College Board moved on-time AP registration for non-AP schools to early November and almost tripled cancelation charges. Previously, non-AP schools had until mid-March to register without late fees. The shift in timeline and increase in charges has significantly impacted participation.
