SSC Brief Overview

- A school that **operates a categorical program** that is funded through the Consolidated Application (ConApp) must establish a School Site Council (SSC).
- The School Site Council has **decision-making authority** over the use of the funding that is allocated to the school.
- The SSC annually reviews and updates the School Plan for Student Achievement (SPSA), identifying proposed expenditures for the funds.







 - All Language and Literature, Math, Science, Individuals and Societies, Language Acquisition, and Visual and Performing Arts courses will have common assessments aligned to essential standards.
- Increase the number of students achieving at or above grade level standards in Writing - Organization and Purpose. Expected outcomes:

Safety Plan Review

- MtMS staff and stakeholders completed a Marzano survey, and findings were published in January 2024. The scale was 1 5 (strongly disagree strongly agree). The most common response was a 4 of 5 when asked questions about the safety of our school.
- Teachers also reported their perceptions of how students and parents felt about the safety of our school. The lowest scored area was when teachers were asked if students and parents describe Mitchell as a safe place 3.09 out of 5.
- Staff and students have been trained on the various types of safety drills, and drills have been scheduled in accordance with state and district guidelines.
- Campus Safety Team Meetings have been scheduled to take place at the beginning, middle, and end of year, including district support staff.
- Campus Comprehensive Safety Plan is submitted on November 1 with no major changes to this year's protocols compared to last year's plan.
