War crimes

Tensions have developed worldwide when the Russian military invaded Ukraine on Feb. 20, a one-time Russian territory and now a free, democratically elected country since 1991. The president of Ukraine, Volodymyr Zelenskyy, has defied the Russians, and has become a world-wide hero. When President Biden called him to offer sanctuary and escort him out of Ukraine, Zelenskyy replied, "Mr. President, I don't need a ride, I need ammunition."

It was thought that Russia and Vladimir Putin would take over the country in a matter of hours. However, the Ukrainian people have fought back with a bravery seldom seen. The US and other countries so far have condemned the action and have issued economic sanctions, but so far, it remains seen if that will help the people of Ukraine. In the meantime, Putin has been bombing civilian targets including hospitals and nuclear power plants.



What's in a name:

The decision to change Facebook's name to Meta reflects the company's growth opportunities. "To reflect who we are in the future we hope to build, I'm proud to share that our company is now Meta," said Mark Zuckerberg. Zuckerberg sees repositioning a key growth area that can also attract younger users. However, many feel Zuckerberg is trying to hide behind the name change as bad publicity has damaged Facebook when a whistleblower Frances Haugen, with hundreds of internal documents, showed that Zuckerberg was more interested in the bottom line than in the welfare of Facebook users. Congress has indicated that the company's "monopoly-like power," and algorithms have been abused to the detriment of others, especially teenagers. Zuckerberg spent several days testifying before Congress, trying to keep them from issuing sanctions.

The Roe vs Wade Court Case

Roe vs Wade was a decision of the U.S. Supreme Court in which abortion was declared constitutionally protected. Roe vs Wade began in 1970 when a woman who lived in Texas wanted to get an abortion, but abortions were illegal in Texas. On May 2, someone leaked a draft of the Supreme Court which showed that the majority of justices are going to overturn **Roe**. Many people are protesting because they think it's unfair and not right that the government gets to make decisions about women's bodies. An investigation has started to determine who leaked the document, a grave betrayal of the court in an attempt to undermine the integrity of deliberations.



Human remains found in lake

Authorities have discovered human remains in Lake Mead, which is located East of Las Vegas. The human remains were found on May 7, in a barrel at a reservoir. The rangers who discovered the remains said, "At first I thought it was a bighorn sheep and then we started digging around a little bit and as we discovered the jaw, we realized it was human remains and that's when we contacted park rangers to come and investigate." Lake Mead is 532 feet deep, so authorities believe the remains were dumped in the late 1970s or 1980s and was only uncovered now by drought. The body had a gunshot wound, so many police believe that this could have been a homicide.



Mass shooting in NY

A horrific incident happened on May 14, in Buffalo, New York at Tops Friendly Grocery store. A Gunman ended up killing ten victims and injuring 11 others. He was immediately arrested when police arrived at the scene. The motive is believed to be racially motivated since all the victims were African American. The gunman, an 18-year old from Conklin, NY was hospitalized for a short time before he graduated from high school for threatening to shoot up his school. The shooter bought the AR 15 style rifle legally, although the clips were not legal in New York

They are intended to recognize the most outstanding member of a class overall in terms of academic achievement, athletic/leadership/or other (music, drama, etc.) achievement, contributions to the school, and leadership. Recipients' names are engraved on a plaque on a large trophy that is kept in the BHS office. In 2015 a scholarship was added to the award by Javier Serna and his family- Javier was the Outstanding Senior Boy of the class of 2005.

Analei Ramirez said, "I didn't expect to win it, I was a bit confused at first." and Alan Alavez Garduno said, "At first, I was re-

ally confused, I wasn't paying attention until I saw my picture on the screen. I walked up all nervous and happy at the same time."

Analei then mentioned that "I won the Apple Scholarship, the English Department Scholarship, the Seal of Bi-literacy, and a medal for having a GPA over 4.0." Additionally, Alan mentioned that "I won the apple scholarship, the silver medal for a GPA of 3.5 or higher, and the Seal of Bi-literacy."

Marsha Booth was on her way to a BHS basketball game in Alta Loma when she was involved in a fatal car accident. The 1966 BHS yearbook described Marsha and her passing in this way: "a girl of honor and judgment, integrity and maturity...a favorite of students and teachers, died in an automobile accident when her adult life was just beginning. In the span

of seventeen years, however, Marsha's enthusiasm and involvement in school activities led her to numerous student offices. Her excitement over new ideas and belief in the innate good of mankind made her the kind of individual who reaches the heights of achievement, no matter how short the time."

The Outstanding Senior Boy award is dedicated to the memory of Jim Hicks, who died of leukemia in the fall of his senior year. He is described in the 1966 yearbook as "a man who loved people and was loved, a boy who played football and was admired, an American who loved his country, [who] packed a lot of living into his seventeen years. His courage and faith were exemplary and he never lost either. Jim gave more to the world and its people than most do in 100 years."

Let go.

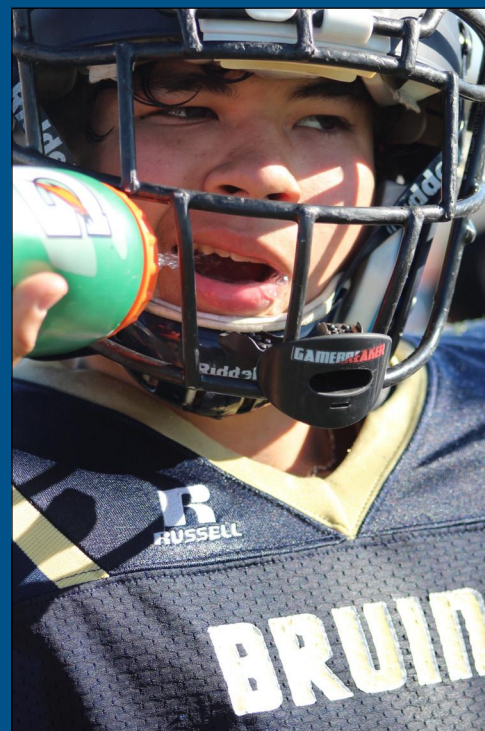
