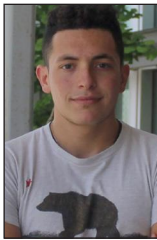

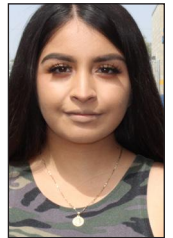

Foreign exchange students explore US culture

We dream of traveling to different countries, experiencing the culture, familiarizing ourselves with the atmosphere, and getting to know the people. For many of us, we imagine exploring other countries with our friends or family, but foreign exchange students travel to strange countries by themselves.

"We've been hosting students from Germany since 2011 through the program 'Friendship Connection,'" said Ms. Patricia Pahner.

Friendship Connection is a four week home-and-home German exchange program for high school students in the U.S. and Germany. Students must be in German 2 in order to participate in the program. Through the program, students apply as "Hosts Only" or "Full

Participants." Those who apply as 'Hosts Only' will have a German partner of the same gender, similar age, and same interests. Those who apply as 'Full Participants' will have a German partner and will return to visit them in Germany in the summer.

On April 2, exchange students arrived at LAX where they met their German partner. Our hosts and their German partners are Juliana Garibay-Tamayo and Clara Kress, Kathleen Christensen and Adriana Hartmann, and Helen Castillejos-Hernandez and Xenia Epp.

All girls saw major differences within our school. "In Germany our teachers are the ones who rotate classes whereas here the students are the ones who rotate classes," said Xenia. Another difference they noticed

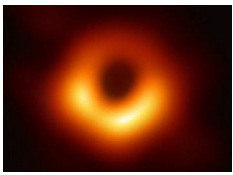
And they're off

The 145th annual Kentucky Derby took place on May 4. The horse race is held in Louisville, Kentucky. Country House was named the winner of the 145th Run for the Roses. Front-runner, Maximum Security, had crossed the finish line first but was later disqualified for an infraction. It was determined that the horse dangerously impeded the paths of others. Country House's jockey, Flavien Prat, initially raised the objection. It was the first time in the Derby's 145-year history a horse was disqualified for action during the competition. The co-owner of Maximum Security said he was stunned by the decision and plans to file an appeal with the state racing commission.



Black Hole Sun

On April 10, the first image of the black hole was captured. The image captured the Supermassive Black Hole (SMBH) at the center of M87 (aka. Virgo A), a super giant elliptical galaxy in the Virgo constellation. The photo was captured by the event horizon telescope. Lincoln Carr, physicist at the Colorado School of Mines, thinks scientists can become better researchers by embracing the ambiguity inherent in the arts.



Avengers Endgame

11 years after their first movie Iron Man, Marvel Studios has delivered their biggest film to date, Avengers: Endgame. The movie now holds the "biggest global opening weekend" record, previously held by Avengers: Infinity War, the movie that preceded in the Marvel saga. The film has also surpassed Avatar's domestic box office but has yet to surpass its global box office, which keeps it at the highest grossing movie of all time. Endgame is currently at \$2.6 billion, needing a little above \$100 million to bridge the gap between the two. The chances are slim, as it is the movie's 3rd week. Nonetheless, Marvel Studios has a great deal to be proud of after a successful 11 years in the industry and are not going to stop anytime soon.



New royal baby

Prince Harry and Meghan Markle, the Duke and Duchess of Sussex, have welcomed their first child, a boy, the royal family confirmed on May 6. The boy was born at 5:26 a.m. weighing 7 pounds, 3 ounces,

the palace said. The new baby is Queen Elizabeth's eighth great-grandchild and the seventh in line to the British throne. That makes it very unlikely that he will ever make it to the throne, as grandfather Prince Charles, uncle Prince William and his children, Prince George, Princess Charlotte and Prince Louis, and then dad Harry are all in line first, in that order. The new baby's name broke with Windsor tradition, instead of a family name the child was christened Archie Harrison Mountbatten-Windsor.



Having a bad week

The N.B.A. and the Sacramento Kings announced a joint investigation into allegations of sexual assault against Luke Walton, recently hired as head coach for the Sacramento Kings. Walton was accused of sexual assault in a lawsuit filed in Los Angeles Superior Court by Kelli Tennant, a former host for Spectrum SportsNet, a Southern California television network. In the lawsuit, Tennant said that Walton had sexually assaulted her in a Santa Monica hotel room in 2014, while he was an assistant coach for the Golden State Warriors. Walton had just been fired from the Lakers on April 12 when the allegations surfaced.



Billboard awards

The 2019 Billboard awards ceremony was on May 1. It was held in the MGM Grand Hotel in Las Vegas. It was aired live on NBC. It was hosted by Kelly Clarkson. There were many winners but the Top Artist were Cardi B., Drake, Ariana Grande, Post Malone, and Travis Scott. Drake was the big winner that night, that was his 12th win. He now holds record for most wins in BBMA history, with a total of 27.

Met Gala

The Met Gala, formally called the Costume Institute Gala and also known as the Met Ball, is an annual invitation-only fund raising gala for the benefit of the Metropolitan Museum of Art's Costume Institute in New York City.
