



Four Decades of Service Norman Ralph Recognized for Dedication to LPS

Norman Ralph's resume is not lengthy. He has been a newspaper delivery boy for the *Columbia Daily Tribune*, a bus boy at Wilson's restaurant and has spent the last four decades as a staff member of Liberty Public Schools.

Ralph received his 40-year recognition plaque at convocation prior to the start of this school year. His current title is network administrator.

"It was a total surprise," he said, after seeing his wife and mother at convocation to help recognize his service to the district. "They had planned running errands together. At the convocation, I had a coworker keep me from turning around to see them. I feel like everyone was in on the surprise."

Ralph graduated from Bob Jones University with a degree in broadcast engineering after first working with the district as summer crew, serving as a maintenance and a plumber's helper in 1979.

"At the time I graduated, the FCC changed up the requirement for an engineer and many were contracted, which made the job search hard," he said. "Returning to the district made sense."

Ralph said he applied for a fulltime job after getting his degree and seeing a job listing it in the local newspaper.

"There were five of us," he said. "I was responsible for doors and locks and audio/visual. The first computers for the district, 12 Apple II Plus computers, fell under audio/visual."

"Norman has always been very instrumental with technology in the District," said LPS Director of Technology Trey Katzer. "Even before there was an official technology department, he helped set up the District's first computers and network and did all the troubleshooting. I have truly enjoyed working with Norman over the years and I appreciate all that he has done for Liberty Schools. He is truly a very special employee."



High School Student Earns Perfect ACT Score

Liberty North High School Senior Natalie Coleman has earned the highest possible ACT composite score of 36.

About one-quarter of 1% of students who take the ACT earn a top score. In the U.S. high school graduating class of 2022, only 3,376 out of 1.34 million students who took the ACT earned a top composite score of 36. The ACT consists of tests in English, mathematics, reading and science, each scored on a scale of 1–36.

"Earning a top score on the ACT is a remarkable achievement," said ACT CEO Janet Godwin. "A student's excep-

tional score of 36 will provide any college or university with ample evidence of their readiness for the academic rigors that lie ahead."

The ACT is a curriculum-based achievement exam that measures what students have learned in school. Students who earn a 36 composite score have likely mastered all of the skills and knowledge they will need to succeed in first-year college courses in the core subject areas.

ACT scores are accepted by major four-year colleges and universities across the U.S.

The Liberty High School Blue Jay Nation officially inducted five new members into the schools Hallof Fame on Friday, October 4, 2024. A reception was held prior to the homecoming football game, with inductees being introduced to the capacity crowd at the LHS activities complex. SCOTT FLEMING Class of 1999

Scott Fleming graduated in 1999 and had a stellar high school basketball career for the Blue Jays, leading the team to a 31-0 record and the 1998 State Championship. While at LHS he was also active in Student Council and National Honor Society.


Scott's overall record as a Blue Jay was 79-6 over three years. He was selected as MVP of the conference and 1st team all-state and all-metro his senior year.

Scott attended Northwest Missouri State where he continued his basketball career. He is #8 for all-time points and assists and #1 in all-time steals and free throws made. He was a three-time all-MIAA honoree and ranks in the top four in both points and assists. He was inducted into the Northwest Athletic Hall of Fame in 2011 where the following was written about him: "Winner. The word that often comes to minds when

speaking about Scott Fleming. He was one of the most competitive men's basketball players in recent history at Northwest and laid a winning foundation for future Bearcat teams. A great leader who was not always in the face of a teammate but would lead by example and earned respect through hard work and dedication."

Professionally, Scott has been Branch Manager for PrimeLending since 2013. He leads a mortgage team that has finished in the top five in the state of Missouri consistently over the last ten years.

Scott is a youth basketball coach and mentor in the northland community for the past 10 years and has coached Liberty boys and girls' teams. Scott and his wife Traci live in Kansas City where their son Mason is a freshman at LHS, and daughter Brooklyn is a 6th grader at Discovery Middle School.



RYAN STEGALL Class of 1998

Ryan Stegall graduated in 1998. He was 3-year starter in baseball and basketball and helped LHS win the State Basketball Title in 1998 with a 31-0 record. However, his true love was the game of baseball.

He went on to play baseball for The University of Missouri on a scholarship. He was a standout player for the Tigers, not only at the plate but also as the team's closing pitcher. He was named All-Big 12 while at Mizzou and selected as the Big 12 Baseball Player of the Year by Collegiate Baseball. He would then be drafted by the Houston Astros in June 2001 in the seventh round. He would play four seasons in the Astros organization before retiring in 2004.

He returned to Liberty to work for Liberty Public Schools the following year and was an assistant coach for the baseball team at his alma mater. He would then be named the first head baseball coach at Liberty North High School in 2010. He guided the Eagles to back-to-back state championships in 2022 and 2023 and finished with a career record of 311-112. Many of his players found individual success, including recent New York Mets' draft selection Trey Snyder.

He announced in June 2024 that he was stepping away from the program following 14 years as head coach to spend more time with his family. He continues to be a physical education teacher at Heritage Middle School, a position he has held since returning to Liberty following his professional baseball career. He is an admired teacher/coach. In addition to his teaching duties at Heritage Middle School, he continues to serve as the school's athletic director.

He currently resides in Liberty with his wife Tori and daughters Caitlin (LHS Sophomore) and Mady (6th grade at Discovery Middle School.)

CARPENTER
Class of 2000

Jon Carpenter graduated in 2000. Jon excelled both on and off the field. Jon played football where he was a 3-year letter winner, as well as team captain during his senior year. He earned All-Conference honors in 1998 and 1999, as well as All-District honors in 1998.

Jon also participated on the track team, lettering in 1998 and 1999. Off the field, he was inducted into the National Honor Society and spent time volunteering as a youth sports coach for Liberty Parks and Recreation and Pop Warner football. Jon earned the prestigious honor of Eagle Scout while in high school.

Jon went on to attend UMKC majoring in business. After college, he found a true calling in philanthropy. His passion has been to help the underserved population in the Liberty and Kansas City area. Since 2010, Jon has organized and hosted over 20 events, raising over 2 million dollars for local charities, including Hope Faith Ministries, HappyBottoms diaper bank, Veterans

Community Project, and Rebuilding Together Kansas City. Jon has become a mentor in the philanthropic community of Kansas City where he consults with numerous local charities to provide insight in ways to enhance fundraising. He presently serves on HappyBottoms Board of Directors, where he was president from 2019-2021. Jon previously served on the Hope Faith Ministries' Board of Directors from 2015-2019. Jon's belief is that it is a gift to be able to share his time, talent, and treasures, something instilled in him by his parents at an early age. In 2024, he was an honoree of the Kindest Kansas Citian through Synergy Services. In addition to his charity work, Jon has also built a successful career in pharmaceutical sales. He currently works for Madrigal Pharmaceuticals.

Jon resides in Kansas City with his wife Katie and three kids: Madison (17), Knox (5), and Caroline (3).



ADAM
PERKINS
Class of 2003

Adam Perkins graduated in 2003 and became the first Blue Jay in program history to win an individual state title in Cross Country in 2001 and repeated with another title in 2002. His contributions to the team helped LHS achieve a top four state finish for four consecutive years.

Adam earned 9 state medals and was the Missouri Gatorade Boys Track and Field Athlete of the Year in 2001 and 2002. His junior season he won the 800-and 1,600-meter state titles and set a state record in the 1,600m with a time of 4:07.90, which still stands. He contributed to 3 4x800 relay medals, including a state championship in 2000 and runner-up finishes in 2001 and 2002. He was named the Kansas City Star Male Scholar-Athlete of the Year in 2003. Combined, Perkins accumulated 12 all-state medals and won 6 state championships. Additionally, Perkins was actively involved off the track at LHS as a member National

Honor Society and Student Council and was on the honor roll for all four years.

Adam's success extended into his collegiate years at the University of Arkansas. As a five-time All-American, he played a key role on four national championship teams and secured an individual national title with the distance medley relay. His achievements also led to him competing at the 2006 USA Track and Field Championships. He was named was named the 2007 Male Scholar Athlete of the Year.

After graduating with a degree in finance, Perkins pursued a professional running career and married Dacia Barr, who also ran at the University of Arkansas. The couple resides in McKinney, TX where he works for Harmon, Inc as Director of Operations. They have two children, Avaya (14) and Asher (11).



JALEN LEWIS Class of 2018

Jalen Lewis graduated in 2018 where he was a 4-year starter on the men's varsity basketball team and was district and conference player of the year. As a senior, he became the Blue Jay's all-time scorer, averaging

18.8 points per game. He played in the GKCBCA All-Star game and was named the Missouri Most Outstanding Player after scoring 27 points - hitting nine 3-pointers! He was a finalist for the DiRenna Award for the most outstanding basketball player in the Kansas City metro area. He scored 40 points on eight 3-pointers in the state tournament semifinals (the second-best performance in a single game.) As a junior he averaged 18 points and four assists a game and recorded four 30-point games, and 12 20-point games earning first team all-state in class 5A as well as first team all-district, the conference player of the year. He led Liberty to the district and section championships. As a sophomore and

freshman, he also earned first team all-district and first team all-league honors.

Jalen went on to Washburn University where he played in 121 career games making 88 starts and became the 27th member of Washburn's 1,000-point club. He finished his career with 1,473 points (10th overall) and remains the all-time leader in career 3-pointers

After graduation, he started a basketball training business and has worked with multiple NBA and overseas professional players in addition to youth players of all ages from the Kansas City area.

Jalen continues to be a positive role model in the community by serving as a mentor for youth basketball players from his community. He currently resides in Kansas City with his fiancé Skyler Britt, a son Keaton, and twin girls Kendall and Avery.



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METROPOLITAN

In partnership with Metropolitan Community College (MCC), juniors and seniors may attend afternoon classes on the Maple Woods Campus and receive college credit (9-13 hours per semester). The majority of these classes will transfer to other colleges and universities if the student chooses to continue their education. LPS pays for the courses and textbooks.







With a focus on Science, Technology, Engineering, the Arts, and Mathematics, STEAM initiatives at LPS involve K-12 participation in Project Lead the Way (PLTW), internship and experimental activities, and partnerships that provide students with the opportunity to solve real-world problems.



NORTHLAND CAREER CENTER Students are provided focused, active learning that prepares them for college and career opportunities. Students are able to earn Industry Recognized Credentials (IRCs)

while earning both English and math credits This type of training provides them the necessary academic and employability skills to be successful after graduation





The Northland Center for Advanced Professional Studies offers students the opportunity to engage in real-world experiences in the workplace with industry-designed curriculum and program instructors



Career Navigators are provided at each high school campus to work with students to promote career activities, facilitate job shadowing opportunities for grades 9-12, and place students in internships with area businesses.





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GROW YOUR OWN TEACHERS

Liberty Public Schools recognizes the need to diversify our certificated teaching staff, and has developed the Grow Your Own Teachers program to enhance the diversity of the teacher applicant pool. It is our intent that applicants for the GYOT program be recruited for careers in education from among our current senior class of Liberty High School and Liberty North High School students.




SOAR AWARDS NOMINATIONS

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




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
