LETTER FROM DR. CARMEN GARCÍA, SUPERINTENDENT



Dear Morgan Hill Unified Community,

We are excited to report that our Dual Enrollment program, in partnership with Gavilan College, continues to thrive. This program offers high school students the opportunity to pursue trade certificates, career pathways, or even a university degree by taking college-transferable courses during the school day, completely free for MHUSD students.

Launched in Fall 2023, the program began with 152 students enrolled in four courses. This year, we expect around 600 students from Live Oak and Ann Sobrato High Schools to take advantage of Dual Enrollment opportunities. The number of courses available has doubled, growing from 8 to 16.

As part of this program, our students can take University of California and California State University transferable college courses during the school day and earn weighted high school credit and college credit.

Our program offers a range of coursework from math to ceramics and music to construction management, welding, video production, and beyond. Our goal is to provide something for every single student on campus.

Some of our courses offer students the opportunity to earn certifications in a trade once the coursework is completed. For example, over the summer, we had 38 students enroll in Welding 203. Upon successful completion of the course, they received a Welding Certificate of Proficiency.

We're deeply grateful for the invaluable partnership with Gavilan College, the dedication of our educators that teach the courses, and the enthusiasm of our students. They all have been essential to the success of this program.

Thank you for joining us in this mission to lay the foundation for our students' present and future success.

MHUSD'S THRIVING DUAL ENROLLMENT PROGRAM WITH GAVILAN COLLEGE

Morgan Hill Unified School District (MHUSD) is proud to announce the continued success of its Enrollment program, offered partnership with Gavilan College. Launched in Fall 2023, the program provides high school students with an extraordinary opportunity to get a head start on their careers and college education by enrolling in college courses during their regular school day. In its first semester, 152 students took advantage this opportunity, and the program has seen remarkable growth in just one year.

For the 2024-2025 school year, MHUSD expects to see between 550 and 600 students participating in Dual Enrollment courses at both Live Oak High School and Ann Sobrato High School. The selection of courses has also expanded significantly, growing from just 4 per semester to a robust 16, providing students with a wider range of subjects and experiences.



Students enrolled in the program can earn both high school and college credits simultaneously, with many of the courses meeting University of California (UC) and California State University (CSU) transfer requirements. This unique opportunity gives students a competitive edge in their academic journey and makes higher education more accessible and affordable, as the courses and textbooks are provided at no cost.

The variety of courses offered reflects the district's commitment to meeting the diverse interests and career goals of its students. From math, ceramics, and music to specialized fields like construction management, welding, and video production, the program aims to cater to all students, whether they are pursuing academic, technical, or creative paths. Some of the courses also allow students to earn industry-recognized certifications. For example, over the summer, 38 students completed Welding 203 and earned a Welding Certificate of Proficiency, equipping them with valuable skills and qualifications before they even graduate high school.

This program is made possible through the invaluable collaboration between MHUSD and Gavilan College, the dedication of the district's educators, and the enthusiasm of the students. Together, they are building a foundation for both present success and future achievement, helping to ensure that MHUSD students are well-prepared for whatever path they choose after high school. We look forward to seeing even more students take advantage of this incredible opportunity.



MHUSD SECURES OVER \$6 MILLION IN GRANTS TO ENHANCE DISTRICT SERVICES

MHUSD has successfully won grants totaling over \$6 million to bolster services for students, families, and the community. These grants, which target a wide range of student support systems, will significantly augment the district's ability to address academic, behavioral, and social-emotional needs, while also building essential community partnerships. Student Services and Enrollment Director, Jessica Swift has been instrumental in actively seeking out opportunities to obtain these grants for the benefit of District Students.

COMMUNITY SCHOOLS GRANT

The largest of the secured funds, the Community Schools Grant for San Martin/Gwinn (SMG) and Walsh Elementary Schools, as well as district-wide services, amounts to \$2.6 million spread over five years. This grant supports efforts to form partnerships with local community agencies and government bodies to align resources that enhance student outcomes. The partnerships created through this grant will foster a more integrated approach to education, health and social services, youth development, and community engagement.

CALIFORNIA LEARNING COMMUNITIES FOR SCHOOL SUCCESS PROGRAM (LCSSP)

With \$1.2 million secured over two years, the LCSSP grant focuses on improving student outcomes by reducing truancy rates and supporting students at risk of dropping out or those who have been victims of crime. This initiative plays a critical role in keeping vulnerable students engaged in school and on track for success.

SCHOOL-BASED WELLNESS CENTER GRANT PROGRAM

Another significant grant, totaling \$1.2 million over two years, will go toward establishing and expanding school-based behavioral health wellness centers. The program is designed to promote racial equity by addressing a broad range of prevention, early intervention, and mental health service needs. These funds will enable MHUSD to strengthen its infrastructure, technology, and training necessary to support a robust behavioral health system for its students.

EDUCATION FOR HOMELESS CHILDREN AND YOUTH (EHCY)

Through a \$225,000 grant spread over three years, MHUSD will further its commitment to supporting students affected by homelessness. This funding, provided through the McKinney-Vento Act, will help the district remove barriers to school enrollment, attendance, and academic success for students experiencing homelessness. It remains the only federal program dedicated to identifying and stabilizing these vulnerable students.

CALIFORNIA YOUTH BEHAVIORAL HEALTH INITIATIVE (CYBHI)

ROUND 4: YOUTH-DRIVEN PROGRAMS

To further promote mental health and wellness, MHUSD has secured \$747,000 over two years as part of the CYBHI. These funds will be used to create and expand youth-driven programs, such as drop-in centers, designed to reduce mental health stigma and provide access to culturally responsive services. These spaces will offer children and youth a safe environment to seek community, support, and advice while focusing on early intervention.

TOBACCO USE PREVENTION EDUCATION (TUPE)

The district also received \$28,687 in funding for one year through the TUPE program. The goal of this initiative is to reduce youth tobacco use by promoting healthy decision-making. Using research-based education and community collaboration, TUPE aims to build social skills. knowledge, and youth development while engaging with local tobacco control programs and community partners.

PREVENTION EARLY INTERVENTION (PEI) AND SCHOOL LINKED SERVICES (SLS) GRANTS

In collaboration with the Santa Clara County Office of Education, MHUSD annually receives approximately \$130,000 through the Prevention Early Intervention and School Linked Services grant. These programs are designed to shift towards a "help first" model, providing mental health support early on to prevent severe conditions. The services offered through SLS are school-based, ensuring students, families, and systems receive the necessary support to address behavioral health risks and challenges.


TOTAL IMPACT

In total, these grants amount to approximately \$6,130,637. Through these funds, MHUSD is ensuring a comprehensive approach to student wellness, safety, and academic success. By building partnerships with community organizations and improving behavioral health infrastructure, the district is creating a more supportive and equitable environment for all its students.

MHUSD RECEIVES \$200,000 GRANT TO LAUNCH FARM-TO-SCHOOL INITIATIVE

Morgan Hill Unified School District (MHUSD) is excited to announce that it has been awarded a \$200,000 grant from the California Department of Food & Agriculture to create a farm-to-school pipeline in southern Santa Clara County. The initiative will focus on partnering with small, women, and minority-owned farms to supply fresh produce for the district's 13 schools, while also creating a replicable procurement model for other Bay Area districts.

As part of the project, MHUSD will establish the FarmTECH Learning Center, an experimental school farm designed to provide students with hands-on agricultural education. Students will engage in outdoorbased lessons, including hydroponics and water management, while the farm will serve as a source of fresh, locally-grown produce for school cafeterias.





The initiative also includes the creation of a FarmTECH Nutrition Lab, where students will taste-test new fruits and vegetables, explore diverse recipes, and learn about global cooking techniques. Additionally, field trips to local farms will offer students insights into sustainable farming practices, food science careers, and healthy eating habits.

MHUSD's existing programs, including Future Farmers of America and agricultural career pathways, will complement this new venture, further strengthening the district's commitment to student learning and well-being.

California Senator John Laird toured our facility to learn about our FarmTECH program. We showcased our vertical farming system which grows 100% of all our district lettuce across all 13 schools. He applauded our efforts to provide MHUSD students with the best produce available. He awarded our team for our commitment to providing our students with the best local produce available.










CENTRAL HIGH SCHOOL HOSTS ART EXHIBIT
