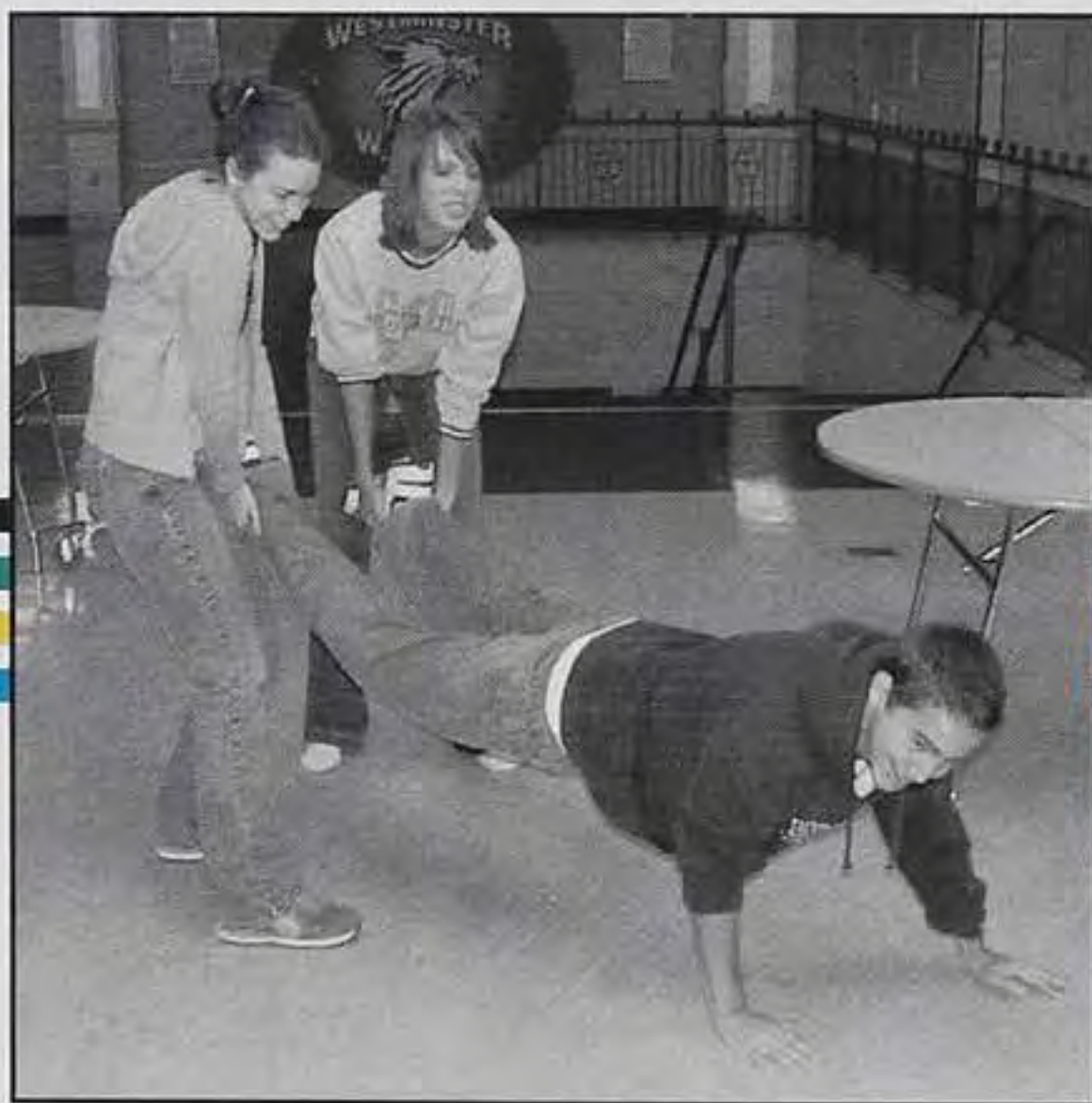

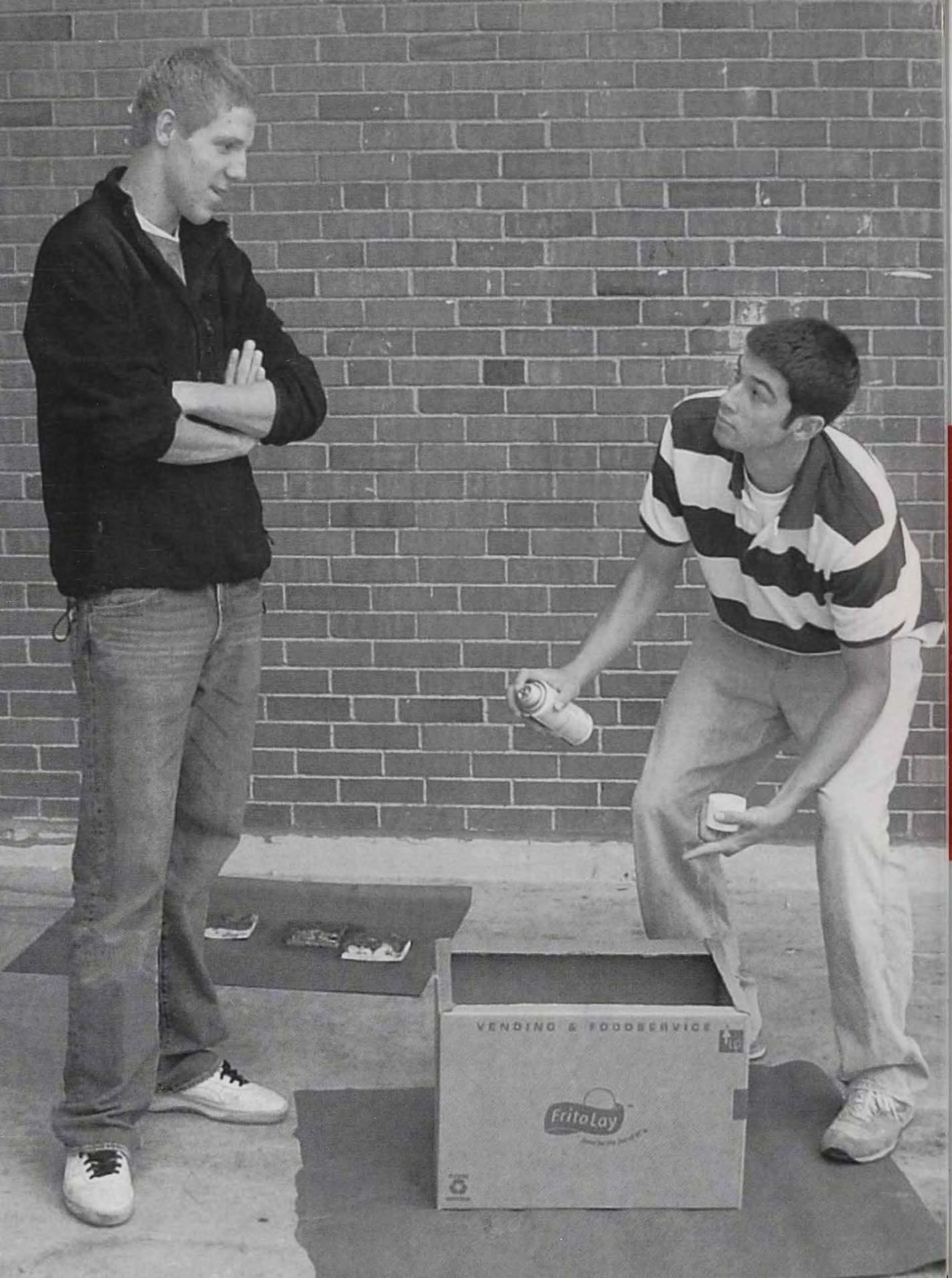

became a lot more realistic, including the sword fight. It was like we were trying to chop each other. Not quite, but you know."

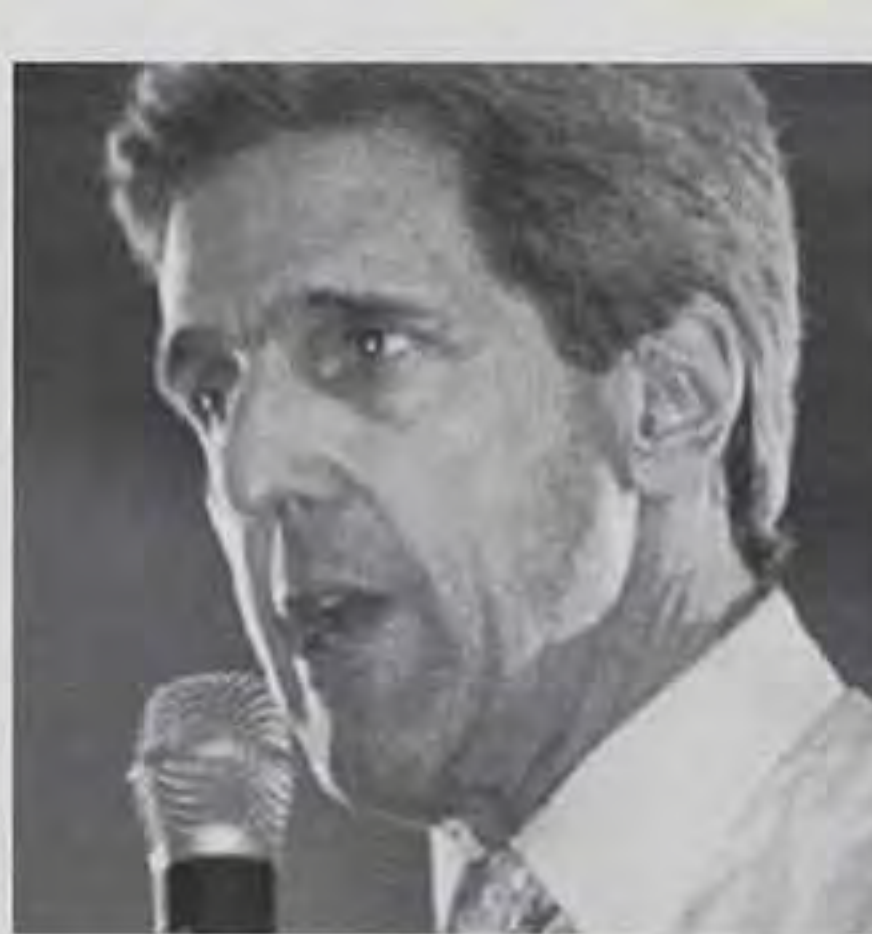

Bush wins again

As election day drew near, people became concerned about whom their president would be due to pollsters' close predictions. The class of '04, or at least those who were 18, considered their own views and which man they thought would make the better president. Senator John Kerry held his "cool" throughout the campaign as well as the election, but because of his comments regarding important issues, final results suggest many people took hope in Bush's views instead.

"Americans are generous and strong and decent... because we hold beliefs beyond ourselves. When this spirit is present, no wrong can stand against it," said President Bush.

Many people said the President could not govern morality, but many others said he won because of his values and morality. Either way, the President won the election with 51% of the popular vote, the largest percentage in 16 years.

Overall, Westminster took an active part in the election. While driving through parking lots, it was

easy to spot "BUSH-CHENEY" bumper stickers and rare to see anything "KERRY-EDWARDS," but there was the occasional "Christians for Kerry" sticker on someone's backpack.

On Election Day itself, some teachers allowed students to watch results, but the wait was long as Kerry did not concede the election until Nov. 3.

"I was so happy when Bush was re-elected because I believe that he is morally correct, while Kerry is still trying to make up his mind about everything," said sophomore Elliot Nester. Junior Jamie Kim agreed.

"President Bush couldn't be more perfect for the job. He proved his heart for our country during his immediate response to 9/11, and he stands up for the moral values that are still so important to this country," she said.

In Ken Boesch's American Government class, students watch the results of the election. Not only was President Bush the first president since 1988 to win the popular vote, he also received the most popular votes of any presidential candidate.

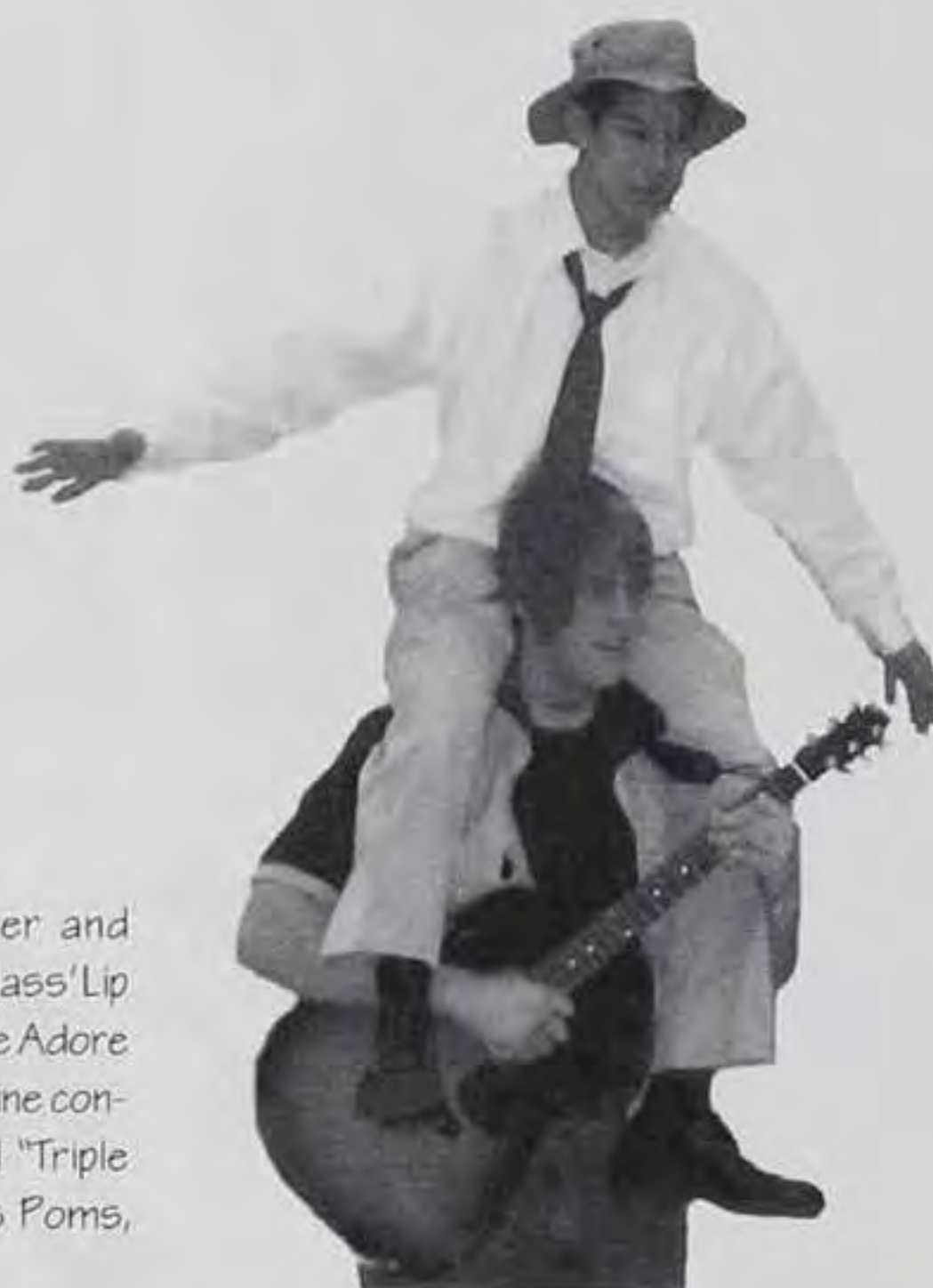
A: I really enjoyed the general enthusiasm and craziness of the whole week. At the school I used to teach, we didn't have anything like this.

Tsunami in East Asia

Jan. 30 marked Iraq's first **free election** in half a century. Voting was a risky choice considering the many death threats; there were more than a dozen **attacks** that killed at least 28 people and wounded 71 others. U.S. troops and other authorities took extreme security measures to try and prevent attacks and car bombings; however, their efforts were not always successful. The deadliest single attack was a **suicide car bombing** in Hilla which killed 125 people.

The aftermath of Hurricane Ivan

In the late summer months, **deadly hurricanes** lashed the Florida panhandle and nearby Alabama. Four hurricanes, Charley, Frances, Ivan and Jeanne, hit in just over a month's time and destroyed hundreds of homes, killing 33 people and leaving millions **without power**. Additionally, many local businesses suffered heavy damages that affected long-term earnings. Walt Disney World, Florida's largest theme park, was forced to **close** its parks during hurricane Frances.



Caught! In the News

On Dec. 26 tragedy swept across Asia and East Africa in the form of a Tsunami. The death toll reached over 250,000, making 2004 the deadliest year for earthquakes in five centuries. The lack of clean water, efficient sewer systems and well-stocked clinics and hospitals led to infectious diseases, adding to the death toll. Reconstruction and rehabilitation costs were predicted to reach near 1.2 billion dollars.

Although there were many legal battles such as those involving Martha Stewart's obstruction of justice, Michael Jackson's alleged molestation and the Supreme Court's determination that children under 18 could not be sentenced to die, international tragedy seemed to overshadow financial and personal woes. But whether people's lives and homes were awash with flood waters or bombs, the goodness of humanity remained steady as citizens of the world united to provide relief from man-made and natural disasters. Westminster bought red rubber bracelets to raise money for tsunami victims, determined Iraqis made history by bravely casting ballots despite escalating violence and America became vocal about a weight problem that threatened its future.

Kirstie Alley's show *Fat Actress* is a controversial reality comedy in which her character portrays an actress out of work because of her weight. Alley's show, along with productions such as the documentary *Supersize Me*, reflects America's newest health problem: obesity. According to a Mar. 14 CBS report, 20% of the nation's children were obese in 2004, leading to increases in type II diabetes and other illnesses.

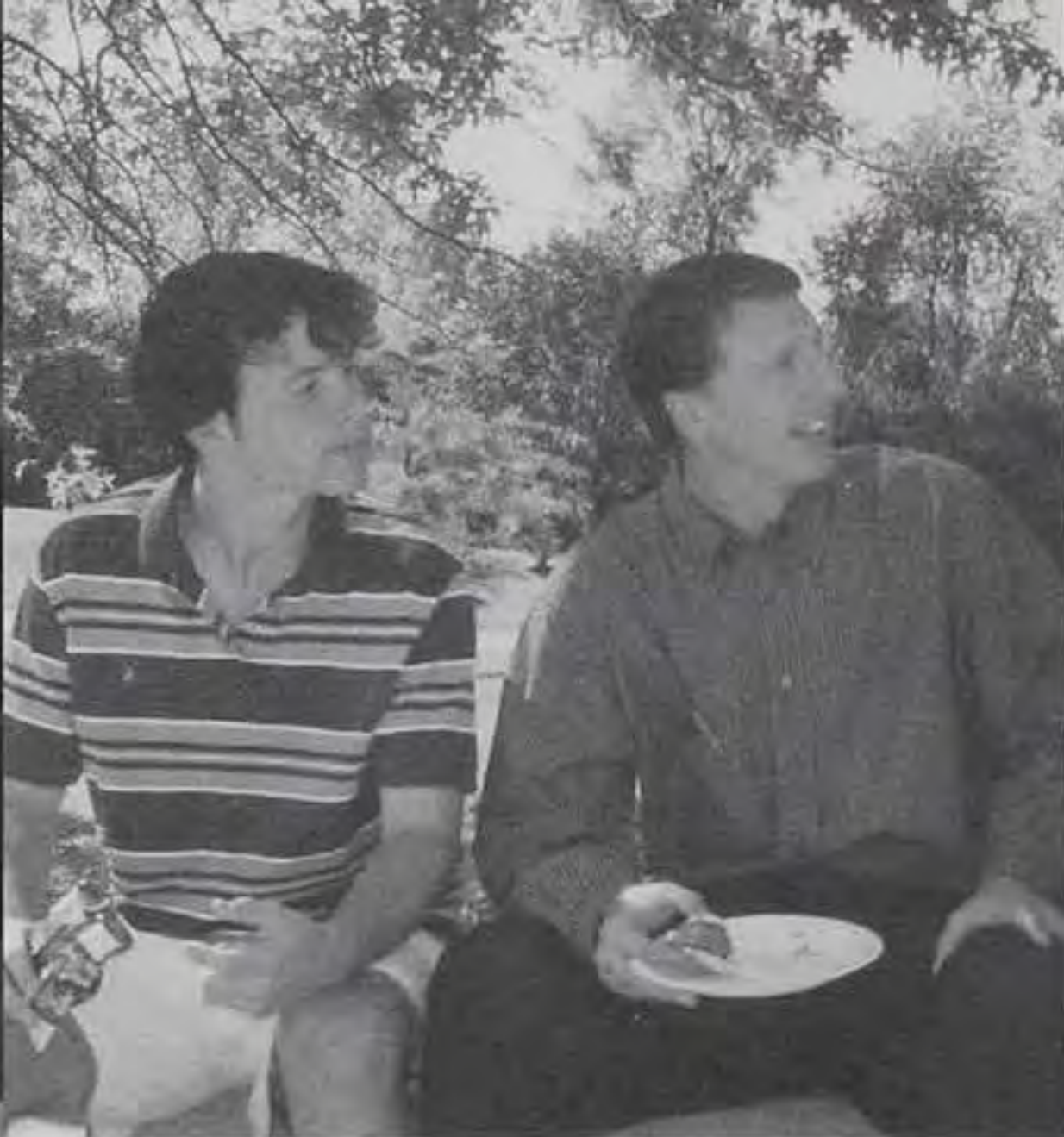

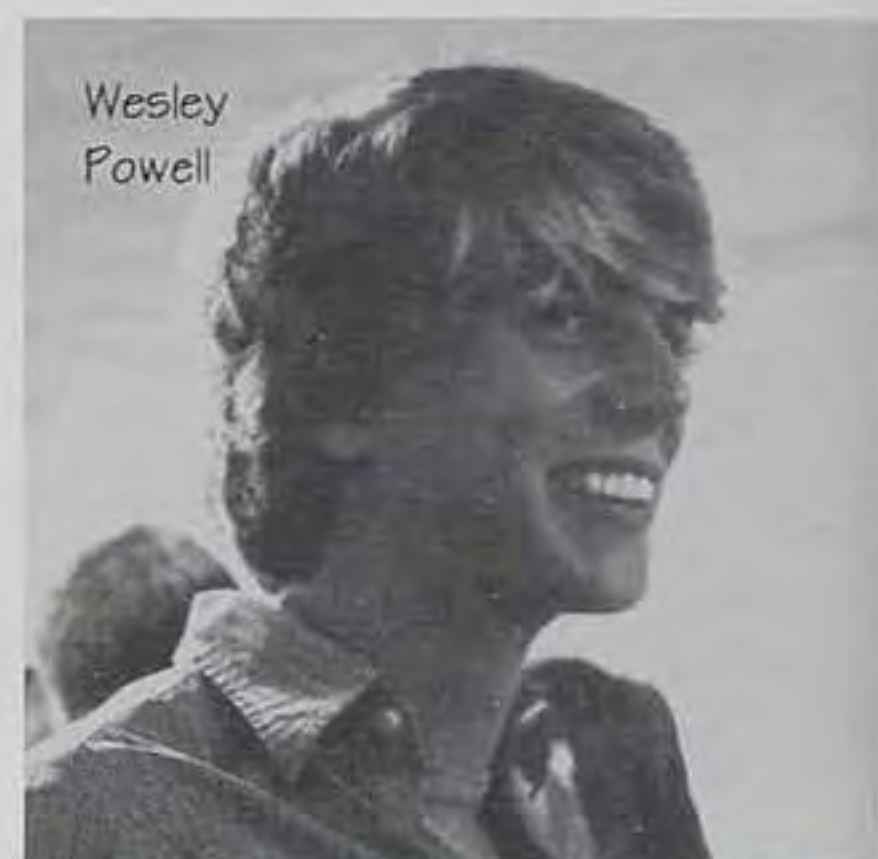

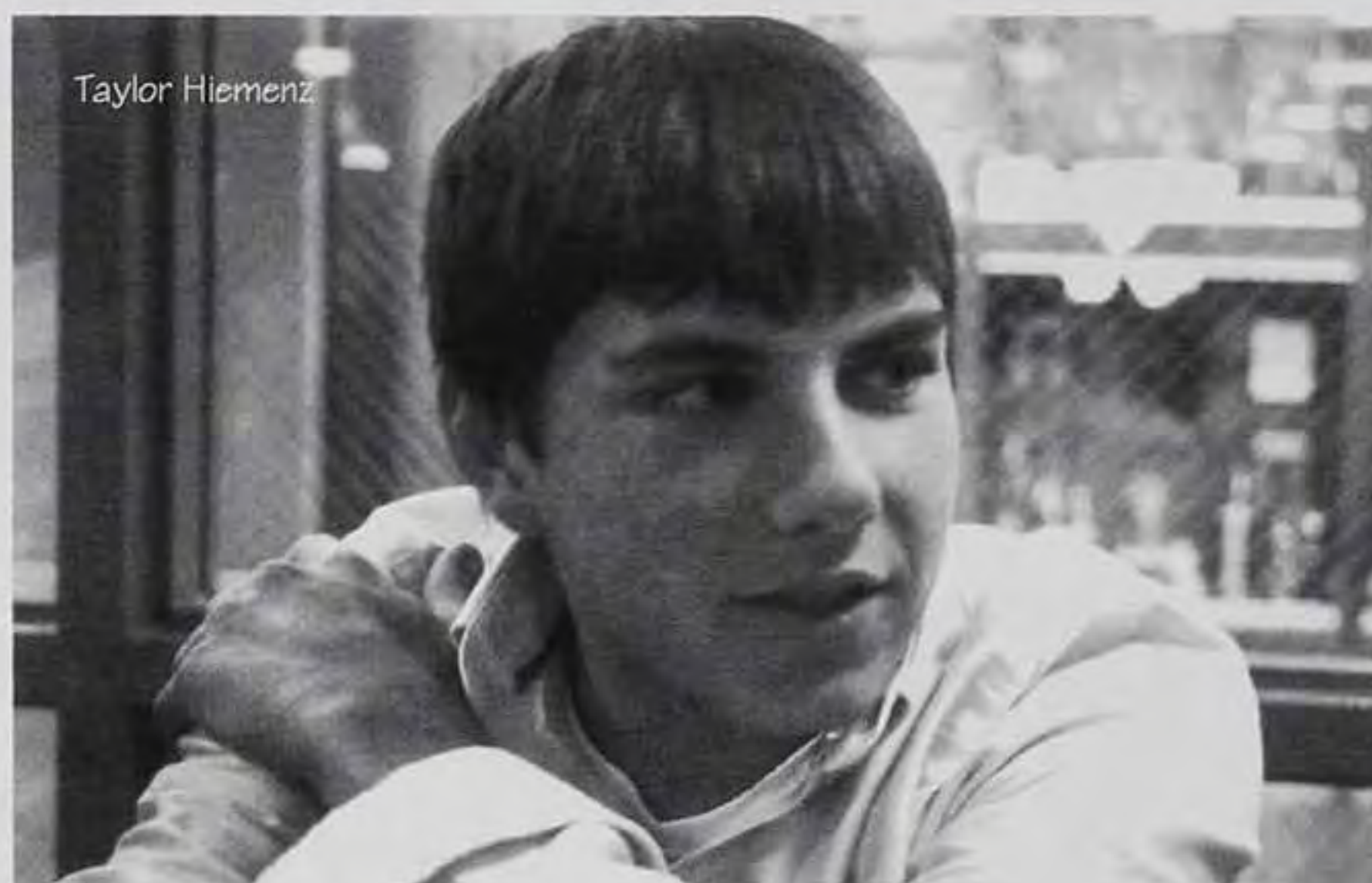
Juniors conjure

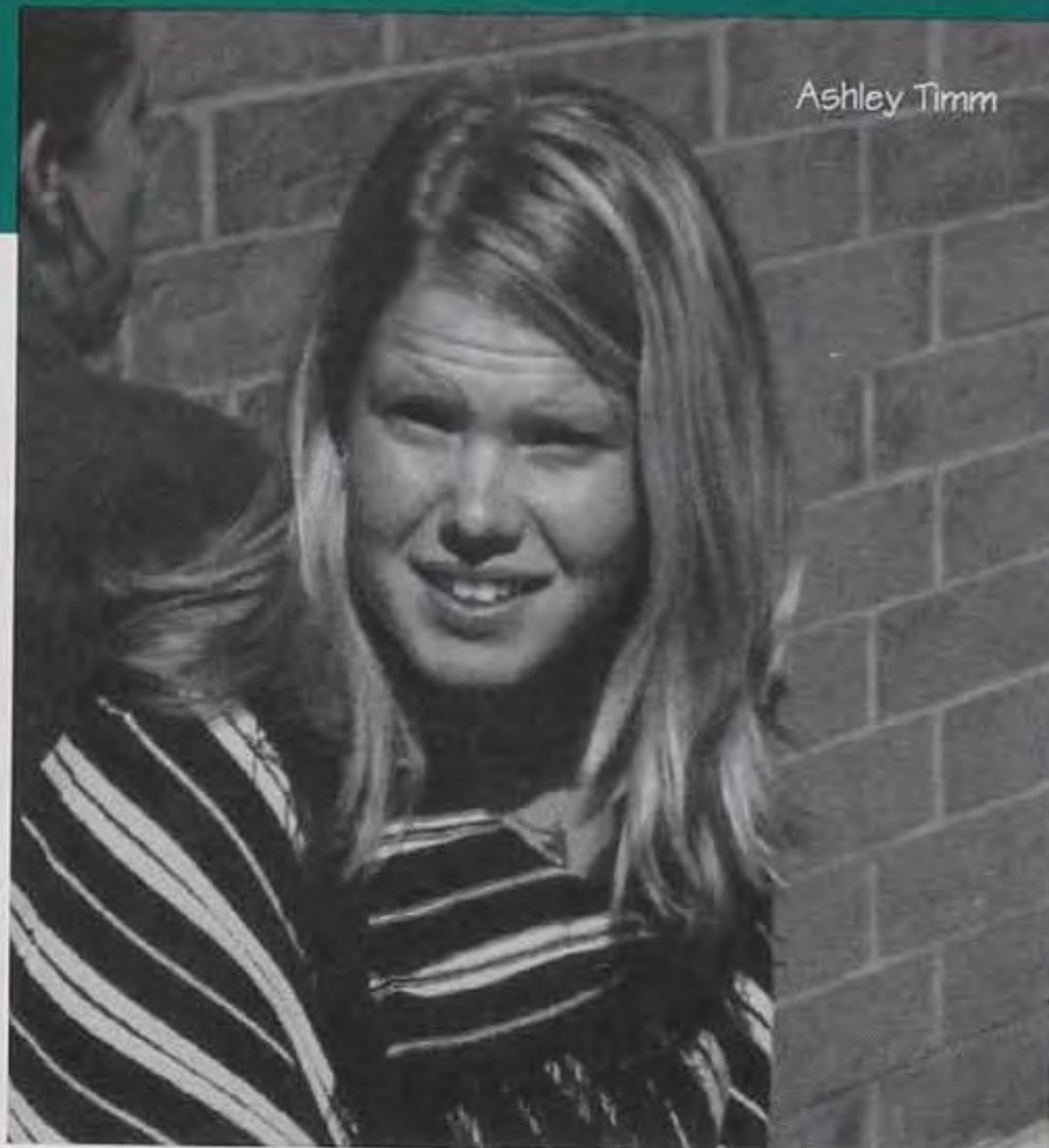
Daniel Minnella also reviewed the play: "I thought it was well done. The chairs were a little too comfortable, though. I fell asleep during the first half."

"We were especially blessed by the mothers and fathers who prepared a barbecue for us. It was a great day all around," Zavaglia said.



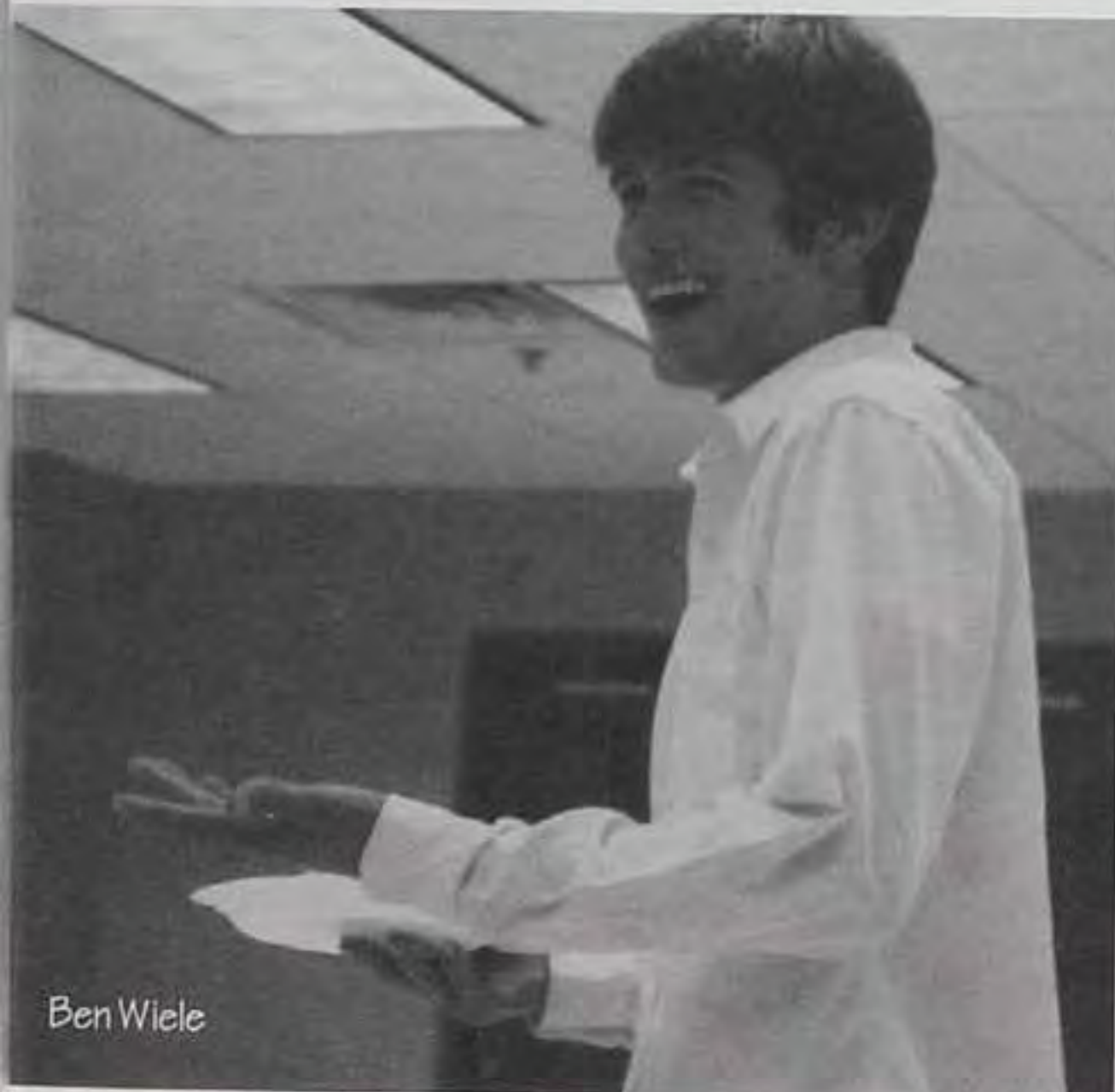

I spent more time in prayer than ever before."

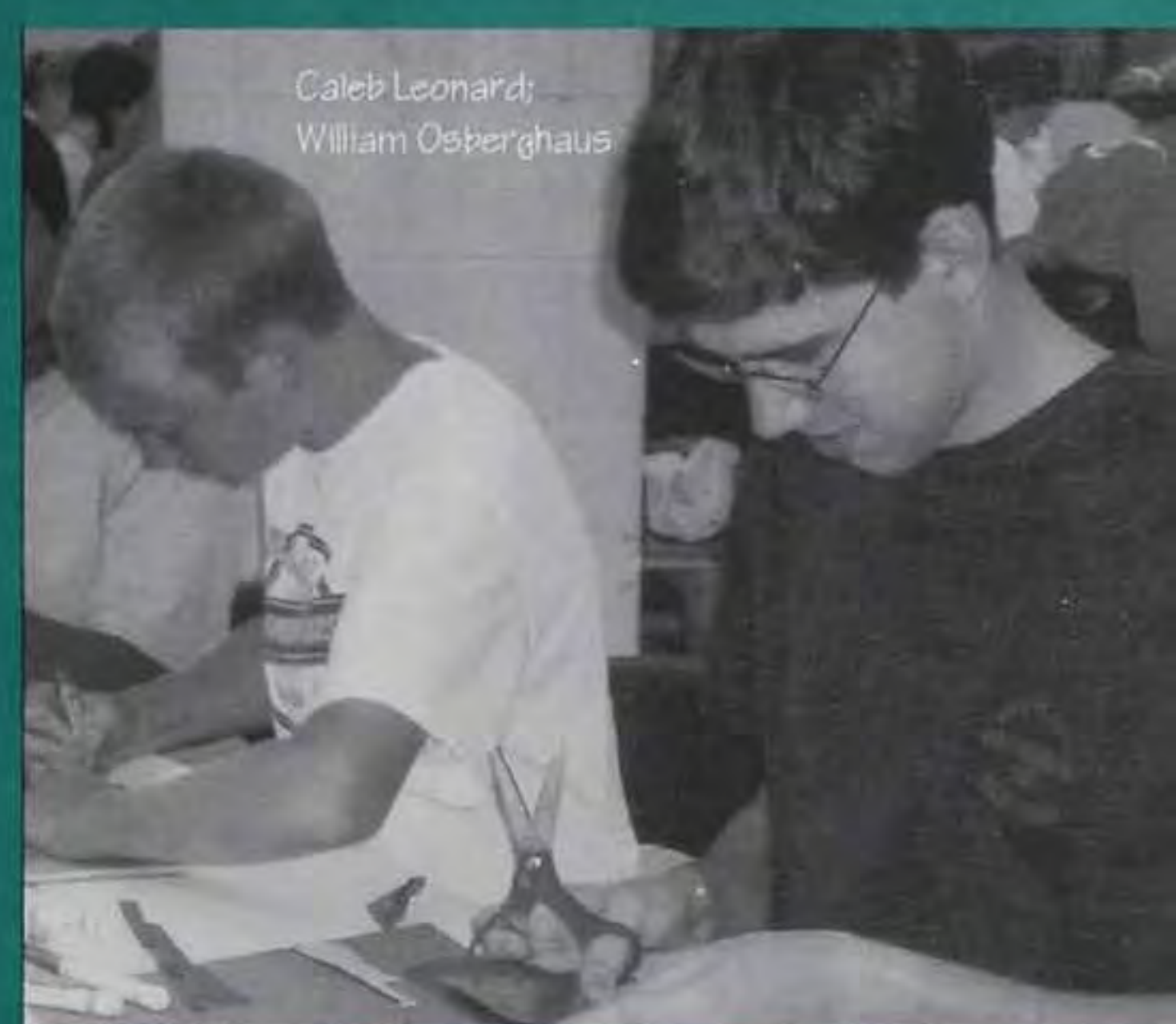

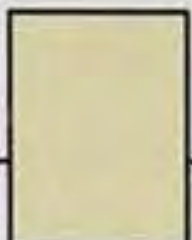

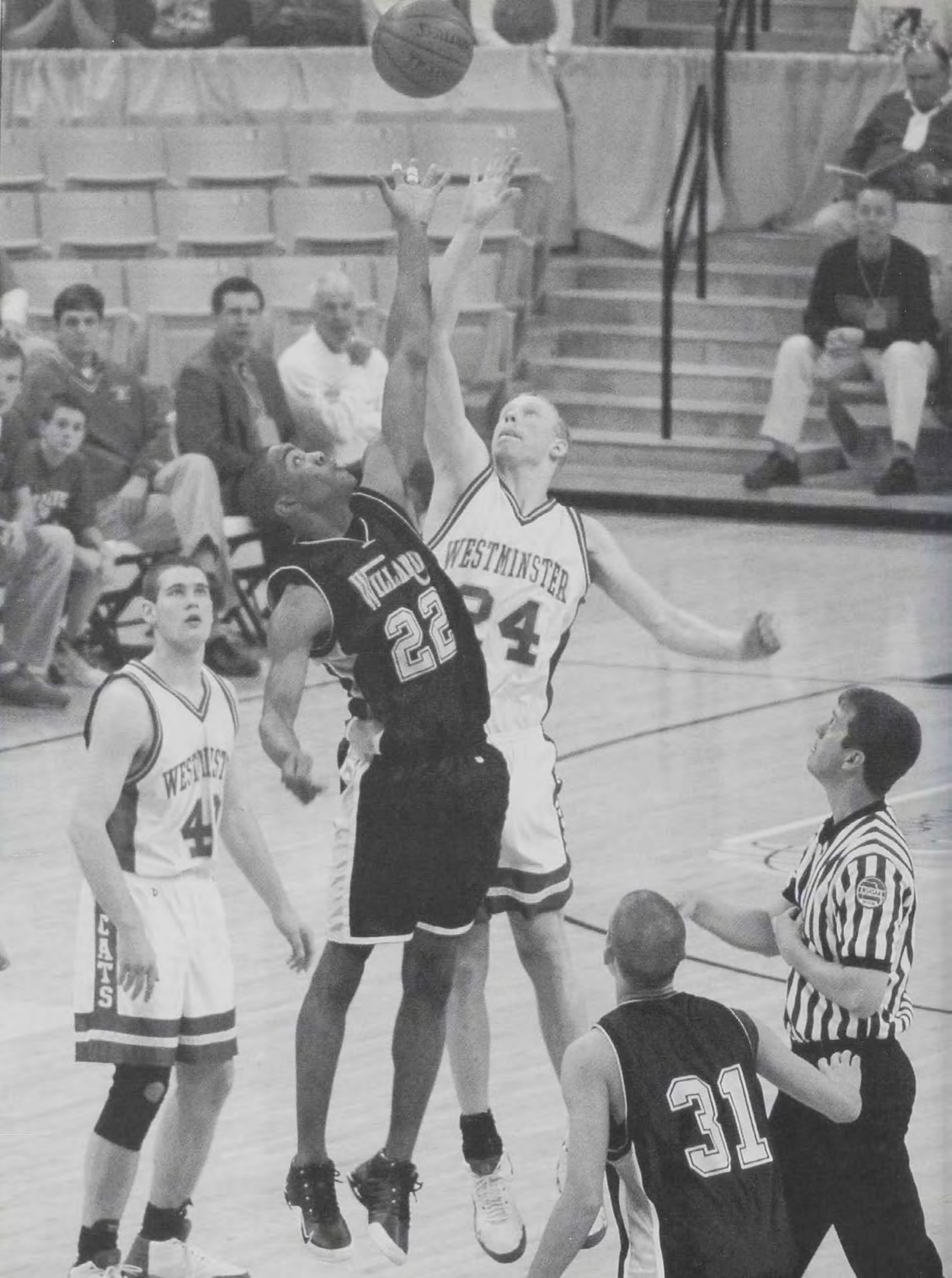

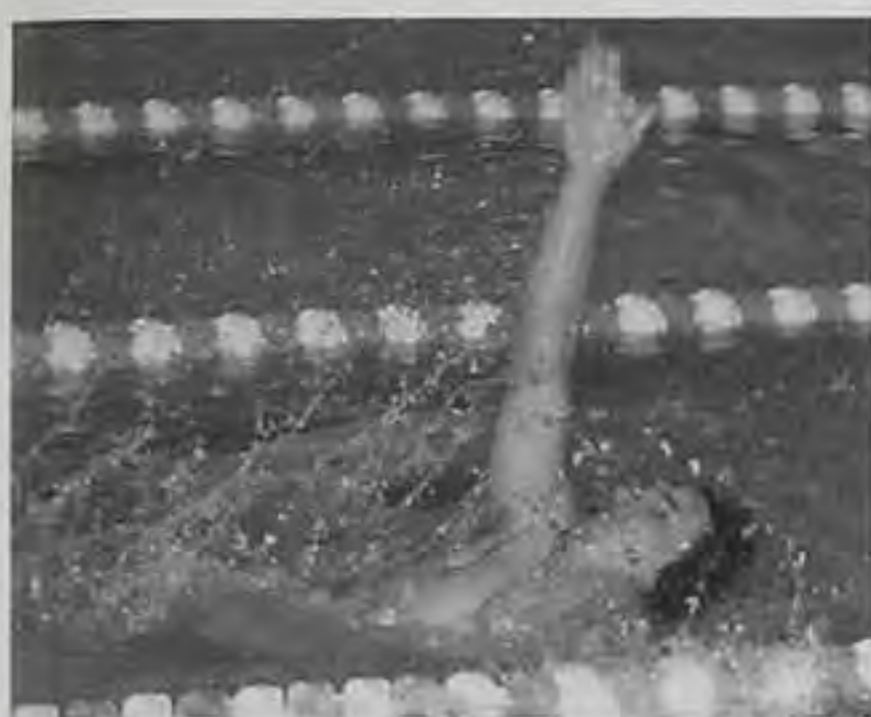

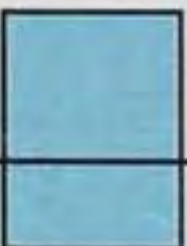

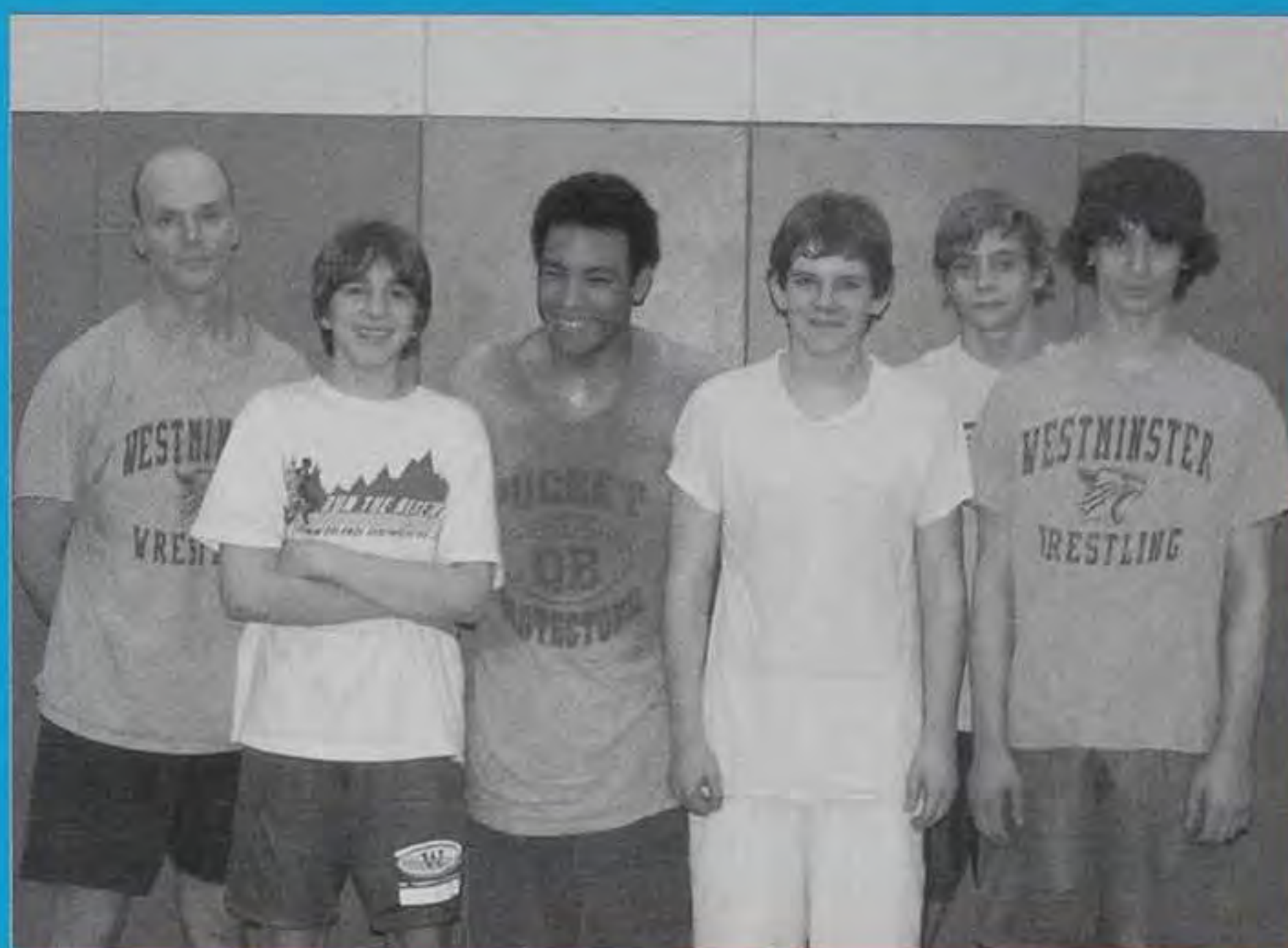

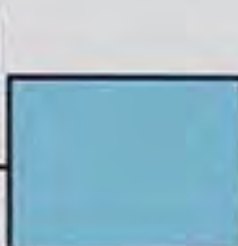

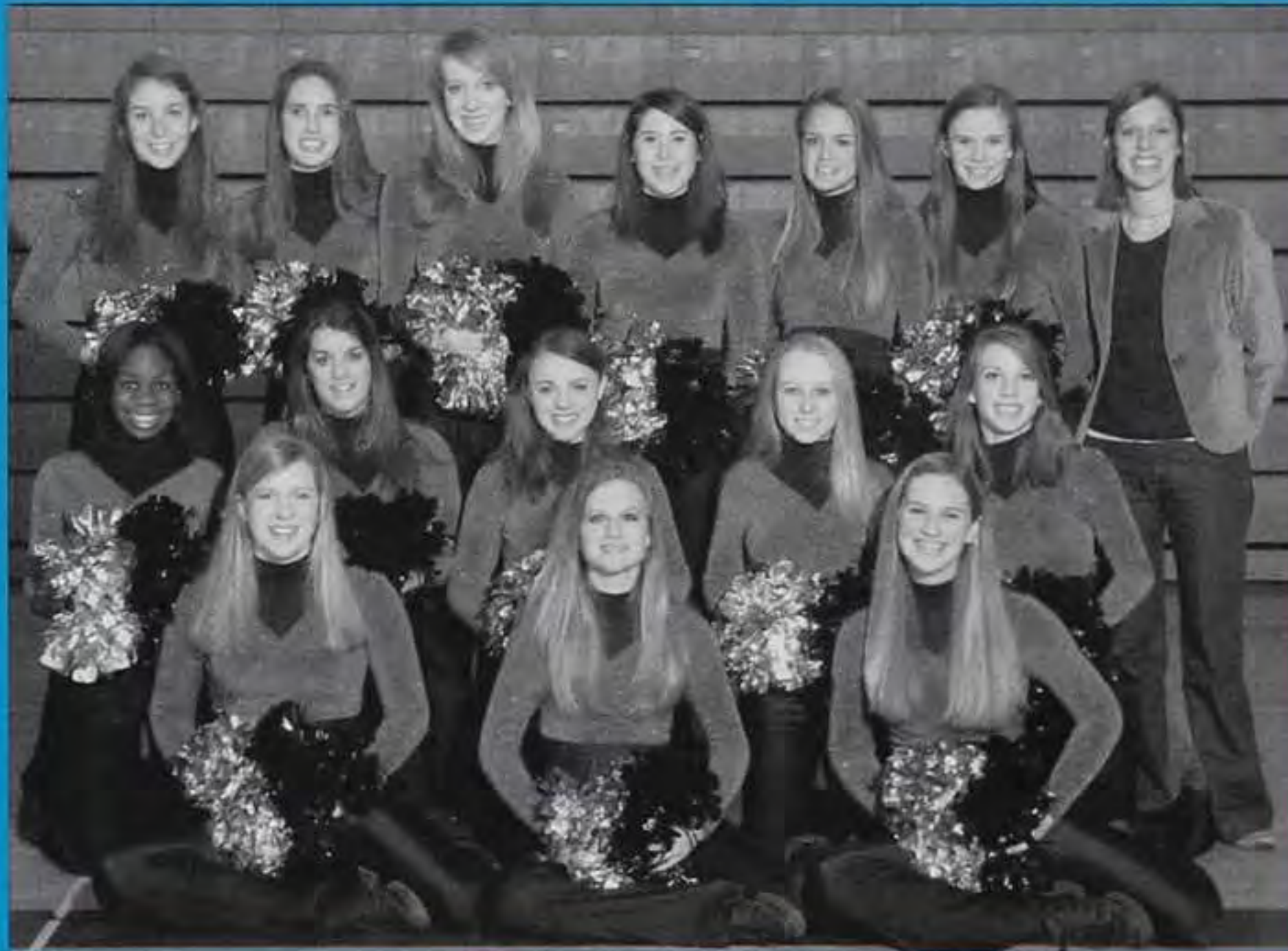
