BUILDING LITERACY SKILLS AT HOME



It is never too early (or late) to start doing literacy activities with your child. Strong literacy skills are essential for development and provide a foundation for school and work performance, social skills, and solving problems in all subject areas. Just a few minutes spent each day on simple literacy activities can add up to a lifelong love of reading and learning! These literacy-based activities are great for your preschool or early elementary age child.

READING



READ EVERY DAY!

Getting into the habit of reading every day for at least a few minutes is helpful for your child's development.



THINK ALOUD AS YOU READ.

Point out what you see in the pictures. Talk to your children about what you are reading. What did they like about the story? What didn't they like?



WRITING, DRAWING, & CREATING



EXPLORE FEELINGS.

Creativity and ideas can be expressed by drawing pictures.



BE CREATIVE.

Paper, crayons, markers, glue, and even household items like noodles, boxes, and sponges can be great tools for creativity.



MAKE STORIES.

Encourage your child to "tell stories" to you. Write their story down for them in a booklet (just a few pages of stapled paper is fine!), and have them illustrate their story.



PLAY "FIRST, NEXT, LAST."

Have pictures of different scenes from stories you read, and have your child sequence the events using the pictures. Have them retell the story.



PAINT WORDS WITH WATER.

Get a clean paintbrush and small bucket of plain water.
Go outside and let your child paint letters or words on the walls, sidewalk, or fence.

SPEAKING & LISTENING



BUILD VOCABULARY.

Talk with your child about everything. Describe the world around them in real (adult) terms.



EXPLORE RHYMES AND SONGS.

These can expose new words and develop speaking skills.





Literacy Grab & Go Preschool (3 - 4-year-olds)

Louisiana

Activity Title: I Spy: Words and Sounds Edition Domain: Language

Activity Purpose: Use the format of the familiar guessing game "I Spy" to build your child's ability to recognize and

work with sounds in spoken language.

Rationale

The ability to hear and manipulate (change) sounds in spoken words (referred to as phonological awareness) is the foundation for learning to read. When you engage in language play like this game, you are helping your child build phonological awareness.

Materials: ☐ objects (within sight)

Description of Activity:

- 1. Choose an object within sight.
- 2. Give directions that will help your child recognize and match rhyming words.
 - For example, you could say, "I spy with my little eye something that rhymes with 'new'."
 - O You child may reply, "shoe, the number 2, blue, etc." based on what they see around them.

Lagniappe: This activity is a fun way to pass the time at home, in the car, or on the go in the community.

Modify your directions to help your child focus on beginning sounds. For example, "I spy with my little eye something that begins with the /b/ sound." Have your child attempt to guess the object you have chosen. Your child may reply with "bed" or "barrette." If outside, they may guess "bird" or "billboard."





Literacy Grab & Go Preschool (3 - 4-year-olds)

Activity Title: Name It Domain: Language

Activity Purpose: Play a guessing game to build your child's expressive and receptive language.

Rationale

Expressive language is what a child communicates to others and receptive language is what they understand and comprehend from others. This game allows practice naming objects for expressive language practice. Through listening to and using your clues to name items, your child is strengthening their receptive language.

Materials:

objects (in the room or location)

Description of Activity:

- 1. To start, give a description of some of the items in a room or location. Use three details about the mystery item in your clue.
- 2. Then invite your child to guess the item based on your description.
 - For example, when in the bathroom you might say, "I am thinking of an item that is made of soft, absorbent fabric that you use to dry your body. What do you call it?" (a towel)
- 3. Allow your child the chance to also give clues. It's ok if they start with one or two descriptors as clues.

OR

1. Each bathtime, describe two or three items in the bathroom, beginning with the most obvious (bathtub, door, sink) to the least obvious (the handle on the toilet, the faucet in the sink, the bathtub stopper, etc.).

Lagniappe:

Play this game in various rooms of your house and when you're out and about.

At mealtime, you can provide a description of the food to be eaten and have your child name it based on the description. For example, "This is a dairy product, it is yellow, and I will spread it on your toast. What do you call it?" (butter)

Make this game more accessible for younger children by giving more clues. Also, when giving clues or having your child give clues, focus on color, size, and what something is used for.





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
