Goal 2:


USD 470 Head Start will provide quality evidence based early learning practices to improve children's literacy, language and school readiness skills.




ENROLLMENT INFORMATION

During the 2023-2024 school year, 363 enrollment applications were completed. Our program is funded for 147 children, and we were fully enrolled throughout the 2023-2024 school year. We served 75 children in the full day classrooms, and 72 children in the half day classrooms.









FAMILY ENGAGEMENT

As parents are the first and most important teacher for their child, the program supports and strengthens parent-child relationships and strives to engage families in their child's learning and development. Parents and family members are encouraged to volunteer in the classroom and attend program community engagement activities. During the 2023-2024 school year, we partnered with REACH Infant-Toddler Services and the Arkansas City Public Library for a "Read & Stroll" event at Lovie Watson Park. Volunteers brought stories to life at reading stations. Adjacent to the reading stations was the Story Walk, an outdoor adventure where families could follow a walking path with storybook pages around the park. Other activities included giant yard games and playground equipment. Community Organizations offered craft projects and provided community resource information. Attendees enjoyed popsicles from the Arkansas City Police Department and made their own fresh blended smoothies by riding a bicycle powered blender.

Conscious Discipline Family Events

Our program uses Conscious Discipline to create a compassionate school family that ensures children's success. Conscious Discipline is a program that helps adults stay calm enough to see misbehavior and upset as a signal to teach instead of punish. It is built on safety, connection, and problem solving. We hosted a variety of fun, relaxed parent education events that taught helpful strategies from Conscious Discipline. Event topics included:

- Choices





HEALTH SERVICES


Head Start recognizes that in order for children to learn at an optimal level, their basic needs must be met. Education and support for overall health and wellbeing of children and their families as primary prevention is the best approach in avoiding health concerns and unhealthy habits in the future. Our program works closely with families to ensure children have access to regular medical and dental check-ups, ongoing care as needed, and assisting in navigating the roadblocks that may affect this access. Collection of medical records show a continued rise in children receiving regular care following the decrease in these services being utilized in the wake of the pandemic. During the 23-24 school year, program coordinators noticed a trend of elevated blood lead levels in a higher than national average number of students. In collaboration with the health department and district nurses, the team developed a packet of educational tools and resources related to risks and prevention of lead exposure, which is now included in all enrollment packets.

Children in the Head Start program are provided with healthy, well balanced meals and snacks to nourish their bodies and fuel their brains for learning during the school day. Children are encouraged to try new foods through an offering of a variety of fruits and vegetables over the course of the school year. For the 23-24 school year, students enjoyed a hands-on learning opportunity each month by making a healthy snack in the classroom environment.



DISABILITY SERVICES

Monthly screenings are offered in different locations around our county to provide a convenient place for caregivers to bring their children to be screened. Should a delay be identified, we work closely with the Cowley County Special Services Cooperative to provide students the services they need so they can be as successful in school as possible. Head Start Program Performance Standards require that we maintain that 10% of total student enrollment consists of serving children with disabilities. Our program consistently reaches that 10% threshold.



SCHOOL READINESS

In order to meet our School Readiness Goals, USD 470 Head Start implements curriculum with fidelity. The curricula align with Head Start Early Learning Outcomes Framework and Kansas Early Learning Standards supporting school readiness in all developmental areas. This ensures each child is prepared to succeed in school which facilitates a seamless transition to Kindergarten.



APPROACHES TO LEARNING

- Children will manage self in social situations, and will demonstrate persistence and engagement in learning with increasing independence.
- 2 Children will demonstrate initiative and express creativity while interacting with the world around them.

SOCIAL AND EMOTIONAL DEVELOPMENT

- 5 Children will recognize, interpret, express and manage a range of emotions while engaging in positive relationships and interactions with adults and children.
- Children will recognize self and others as unique individuals, and have a knowledge of and a sense of belonging to a family, community, and other groups.

LANGUAGE AND LITERACY

- 5 Children will communicate, understand and respond to others and will express self to meet the demands of the situation.
- Children will understand and use an increasing vocabulary.
- 7 Children will demonstrate knowledge of print and awareness that print conveys meaning.

- Children will express themselves through the writing process.

COGNITION: MATHEMATICS DEVELOPMENT

10 Children will demonstrate math knowledge through number sense, counting, operations, measurement and geometry.

17 Children will use scientific inquiry, reasoning and problem solving to learn about the world around them.

PERCEPTUAL, MOTOR AND PHYSICAL DEVELOPMENT

- 12 Children will develop and demonstrate gross motor and fine motor skills.
- Children will demonstrate knowledge and skills that advocate wellness and safety.

ASSESSMENT DATA

The Teaching Strategies GOLD Assessment, based on 38 Objectives for Development and Learning, is used in all classrooms. The assessment is aligned with the Head Start Early Learning Outcomes Framework (ELOF) and Kansas Early Learning Standards. This observation based, embedded assessment relies on everyday interactions with children in the classroom to evaluate children's progress three times each year.


USD 470 PreK/Head Start Growth Fall to Spring 2023-2024



CLASS DATA

The Classroom Assessment Scoring System (CLASS) is an observational tool used in Pre-K classrooms that focuses on adult-child interactions that support social, emotional, and cognitive development of children. Classrooms are scored in the domains of emotional support, classroom organization, and instructional support.

Formal CLASS observations are conducted twice per school year, Fall and Spring. This information is used for individual classroom goal setting as well as program wide professional development. Our average scores were higher than the competitive and quality thresholds in all three domains.



TRANSITION TO KINDERGARTEN


USD 470 Head Start implements transition strategies and activities that prepare Pre-K students for a smooth transition to Kindergarten. Kindergarten transition packets are provided to Pre-K students and their families second semester to prepare them for Kindergarten expectations. The packet includes a checklist for entering Kindergarten which contains important enrollment information and frequently asked questions. Families are also provided with a Kindergarten in Kansas booklet which includes learning standards along with suggested activities. A Welcome to Kindergarten video featuring local Kindergarten students is also shared with families to help ease any anxiety of the transition. At the end of the school year, activities are planned between Kindergarten and Pre-K classes to introduce the Pre-K students to Kindergarten. Child data and information is shared with receiving Kindergarten classes to provide children with a consistent, supportive transition and learning experience.



Additional Services for Children with an IEP

In the spring, our Disabilities
Coordinator attends IEP transition
meetings for students with
disabilities who will be moving on
from our program to Kindergarten.
At that time, families can ask
questions about what this new
chapter will look like and be assured
that their child will successfully
transition to Kindergarten with much
support and encouragement.
