 - Most students complete the exam during Foundations of American Democracy or AP US Gov't

* Transcripts

- Transcripts are sent through <u>www.parchment.com</u>
- To view your transcript:
 - Open Infinite Campus
 - Click on "Documents"
 - Click on "Unofficial Transcript"

* Grade Point Average (GPA)

- Your cumulative GPA is your grade point average over the course of your high school years.
- GPA can be used for various reasons such as college admissions or scholarships

* Annual grade level meetings are held with students and slideshows are always posted on our <u>website</u>.









 - Send your transcripts (create your account using your personal email)
 - 1. <u>www.parchment.com</u>
 - ii. Letters of Rec
 - 1. Tip: Fill out a **Brag Sheet** for your letter writers
 - iii. Essay Writing
 - iv. ACT scores, if needed
 - 1. <u>www.act.org</u> or <u>www.collegeboard.org</u>

Essay Writing

It doesn't get said enough, but colleges are literally looking for reasons to admit you. That's why they ask for an essay. They simply want to hear about you. Take your time. Give it some thought, share it with a few people you trust, and revise.

ESSAY BASICS

- Write your essay in a program like Microsoft Word or Google Docs so you can simply copy and paste it into your online application.
- Watch world limits-- commonly between 250 and 650 words
- Ask a friend or teacher to look for inconsistencies, grammatical mistakes, and typos.
- Proofread, proofread, proofread. You don't want some small mistake to accidentally make it look like you don't care.
- Proofread again.

ESSAY TIPS

- Tell colleges something about yourself that you can't capture in the application.
- Jump off the bandwagon. Don't write what you think your colleges will want to hear. Let them know about what drives you.
- Use your own voice. Ask someone you trust to read your essay to see if it "sounds like you."
- Be short and sweet. Clear, concise writing matters more than length.
- Show, don't tell. Be specific and factual.
- Write about your real life. Don't exaggerate or embellish
- Be confident. Skip all the maybes, sort ofs, I thinks, and so on.

There are 4 primary ways students pay for college:

- Financial Aid (Grants, Federal Loans or work study)
- **Scholarships**
- Private Loans
- Self Funding

FINANCIAL AID:

- Attend COLLEGE GOAL WI for live help with FAFSA registration
- Complete the FAFSA as early as possible
- Get additional assistance from the Financial Aid offices at your potential universities

SCHOLARSHIPS:

- Remember, the more time and energy you put into completing scholarship applications, the more scholarships you will receive.
- Where to look for scholarships (free money for school!):
- Visit the Sun Prairie West High School Scholarship Website weekly
 - Search for scholarship applications from the college(s) you are applying to.
 - Complete the Local Scholarship application

Wisconsin Guarantee (Act 95)

- Starting August 1, 2024, with the high school class of 2025, the Wisconsin Guarantee will offer guaranteed admission to all Universities of Wisconsin universities for Wisconsin high school students in the top 5% to 10% of their graduating class.
 - Students in the top 5% will be guaranteed admission to all UWs including UW-Madison provided they apply on or before the <u>Early Action deadline of November 1</u>.
 - If you are in the top 10%, you will be guaranteed to all UW universities except UW-Madison.

Grade 9 TO DO List

- It's normal to feel shy as you start high school. If you have questions, ask friends, a teacher or a trusted advisor.
- Try new classes and extracurricular activities.
- Explore your interests!
- Develop good study habits.
- College admission offices will evaluate your grades from ALL four years.
- Discuss your options after high school with your teachers and counselor.
- Plan to take challenging and advanced level courses.
- Start a brag sheet: a list of activities, achievements, awards, and other notable accomplishments.
- Search for part-time or seasonal jobs and volunteer experiences, especially for the summer after freshman year.
- Start saving! Money from holidays, birthdays, or part-time jobs can go a long way.
- Think about how your skills and interests might direct you toward a career.
- Ask people how they got their current jobs. If possible, shadow careers that interest you.
- Take a look at summer pre-college programs offered by your local universities.
- Review requirements for college admission.



Grade 10 TO DO List

- Evaluate the extracurricular activities that you began your freshman year.
- Try to pick up something new. Level up involvement in your activities.
- Grow your leadership skills by taking on a new project or contributing new ideas.
- Revisit the plans that you made last year for after high school.
- Learn the requirements to take advanced courses your junior and senior years.
- If possible, take practice tests to help you prepare for the ACT or SAT.
 - o Take the PreACT in fall and spring.
 - Consider taking the PSAT in fall of junior year.
- Explore ways to use financial aid, grants and/or scholarships to pay for attending a college campus.
- Reexamine the careers you found interesting in your freshman year. Job shadow someone if you can.
- Talk to your parents and friends about how your career interests align with college majors.
- Explore which college campuses offer your major of interest.
- Take a look at summer pre-college programs offered by your local universities.



Grade 11 TO DO List

- Get ready for the ACT and/or SAT.
 - o Consider taking the PSAT in the fall.
- Explore potential college campuses and see what appeals to you, then visit websites and attend college fairs to hone in on what's important to you.
- Stay on track with your classes and grades.
- Take the ACT and/or SAT.
- Ask the teachers, counselors and coaches who know you best for letters of recommendation.
- Register for college campus tours and preview days.
- Research admissions requirements for the colleges you're interested in.
- Review priority dates and deadlines for admission.
- Attend campus tours & preview dates.



Grade 12 TO DO List

FALL

- Attend Senior Meeting with your School Counselor in September / October
- Attend the Wisconsin Education Fair (WEF) at SP West
- Letters of Recommendations (obtain in fall / winter)
- Complete college applications (fall / winter)
- Attend College Goal Wisconsin for FAFSA help
- Create an account on www.parchment.com in preparations for sending your transcripts
- Keep track of application dates and deadlines, scholarships and housing
- Gather application materials. Include transcripts, test scores and letters of recommendation
- Apply for financial aid using the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid).

WINTER

- Decide which pathway you will choose after graduation
- Pay enrollment deposit (if required)
- Complete your housing application (if needed)
- Watch your email for campus updates or tasks to complete

SPRING

- Register for college placement tests
- Make the last semester of high school count
- Take placement tests
- Review financial aid offer from your future school
- Send final grades from your senior year to the college you are attending

SUMMER

- Sign up and attend student orientation at your future college
- Prepare for your first year of this new pathway!



Additional Considerations

- 1. Extracurricular Activities are not required but are helpful for admissions purposes, especially if you demonstrate leadership. Quality over quantity!
- 2. World Language is not required for HS graduation, but may be required for college admissions--check your universities of interest for clarification!
- Take advantage of all of our <u>learning opportunities at SP West!</u>
 - a. Dual Enrollment courses
 - b. Advanced Placement courses
 - c. ACCEL Academies
 - d. <u>Early College Credit Program</u> (ECCP) allows juniors and seniors to take up to two courses at UW Madison
 - e. Start College Now (SCN) allows juniors and seniors to take up to two courses at Madison College
 - f. Participate in a youth apprenticeship or other work-based learning program
 - g. Participate in Fire Academy/EMR Academy
 - h. Early Graduation
 - i. Applications due no later than the 10th day of first semester of senior year

NOTE: When considering options d-h, it is best to weigh these carefully. SOME universities prefer students take advantage of their full high school curriculum. When in doubt, reach out to the college admissions office!
