Creating Scientists at the Intermediate School

The start of the 24/25 school year brought a new science curriculum resource to Mifflinburg Area Intermediate School students. That resource is Amplify Science. The Amplify Science resource tackles the relatively new STEELS science standards which were approved at the State level to guide science instruction.

Each grade, 3-5, will work through four science units during the school year. Each unit has twenty-two lessons to explore the unit's topic. Some of the unit topics include Weather and Climate, Energy Conservation, Waves, Energy, and Information, Patterns of Earth and Sky, and Ecosystem Restoration. STEELS science standards. Students learn how to look for patterns, use cause and effect relationships, connect systems and models, and make connections across other science topics.

When asked what they like about science class this year students at the Intermediate School shared the following. Tenley in 4th grade said, "I like the new app because we can build different things and see how they work. We get to do different experiments." 5^{th} grader Emma shared, "It is easy to understand because our teacher explains it to us. The activities we do are fun." Camden is 3^{rd} grade said, "I like when we get to make our own forces and share them with our classmates."

Each unit focuses on a problem the students need to solve. The problem is shared in the form of a question. Throughout the unit, students gain information through inquiry and hands on learning to help them solve the problem posted at the beginning of the unit. Through this process, the students engage in Science and Engineering Practices which are linked to the

When thirteen-year-old Rowan White walked through the doors of Debra Rapson's classroom, she did not know where her singing would take her, but she is loving every minute of zeroing in her talent and being in thrust into center stage with the pure sound of her beautiful voice.

Debbie Rapson said of her talented student, "She is by far, just spectacular, and has a singing talent that is really just a gift."

Rapson explained that shortly after hearing Rowan sing, she met with her parents to discuss goals and objectives for Rowan. She wanted to empower her and allow her to do things that make her feel confident.

Rowan also joined the Uptown Music Collective – a singing-focused group in the area which has helped her to become a locally known talent. The Collective provides music education as well as highimpact musical experiences which helps to create a community committed to connecting people with music. Rapson stated that "Being a part of the Collective will help Rowan get noticed in the industry."

Since getting set up with a vocal coach outside of school, Rowan feels that she is finding true happiness there. Her vocal coach, who is an instructor within the Collective, works with her on specific styles which allows her to experiment with her voice.

Rapson has had Rowan as a member of the Middle School's Choir for the last two years, and she was previously in the Intermediate School's Choir.

White explained that she was, "hoping to take it (her experience with the Collective) and turn it into a career."

She further stated that she would like to be the type of artist that you hear on the radio or be the lead singer of a band, and while sometimes singing and acting go together at this age, Rowan is laserfocused on singing.

Rowan was recently selected to perform in the Uptown Collective's *Floyd Nation* - *Experience Pink Floyd* at the Community Arts Theater in Williamsport. Ten students earned the opportunity to be a part of Floyd Nation's performance of Another Brick in the Wall which gave them the opportunity to meet the whole band and experience the diverse ways that they produce sound. Rowan joined the Collective just this past January, but already feels that this opportunity has been extremely educational for her as well as enjoyable. She said that, for her, singing, "is enjoyable like an escape. I also think that some of my closest bonds are with some of the other kids in the Collective.

White gets to do four larger performances per year through the Collective, but they perform a lot in between. She will be a part of one showcase per year, and Rowan enjoys that the kids get to pick different songs and have the opportunity to sing both leads and backups. She plans to continue performing with the Collective and stated about her experience, "It's a great Collective. The music is great, and you can learn a lot from them."

Rowan meets daily in school with Mrs. Rapson just to sing. She also works on her talents at home and with her vocal coach, but Rapson explained that "people in this industry sing for hours each day, and I wanted Rowan to get used to training daily."

My visit to the Middle School to see Rowan's talents for myself resulted in her performing one of my favorite Fleetwood Mac songs, Dreams, which she knocked out of the park! She was truly amazing, so humble, and sounded impeccable. When a singer makes you feel the music, that is how you know they are good. I asked her what her favorite song to sing was, and Rowan replied, "Rhiannon by Fleetwood Mac."

Rowan's relaxed demeanor paired with her true talent can only take her up from here. Congratulations on your recent performance, Rowan! We cannot wait to see what you do next.

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
