















School Life






Social Life

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
Sports

Mr. Paul McGinnis

Mr. Paul S. McGinnis, a dedicated member of the math department passed on in 1986. He was a citizen of Medford.


A graduate of M.H.S. in 1943, Mr. McGinnis was on the Senior Advisory Board, Student Cabinet III, Drama Club, Hockey Team, Yearbook Staff and was Senior Class President during his high school days.

Graduating with honors, he attended Harvard University from 1943-44 and then transferred to Dartmouth College where he earned his Bachelor of Arts degree. While at Dartmouth he was also a Junior Grade Lieutenant in the U.S. Navy from 1943-1945, and in 1968, he received his Masters in Education degree from Boston State.

As a proud Medford Citizen, Mr. McGinnis was a member of the American Legion, Knights of Columbus and was area interview chairman for Dartmouth College.

Mr. McGinnis then began teaching Medford on September 6, 1962 at the Hobbs Junior High School. He then transferred to M.H.S. in 1963 where he taught Math until his death on May 28, 1986.

Mr. Paul McGinnis will be sorely missed by faculty and students of Medford High School and his friendship, dedication, and caring will not be forgotten by those who knew him.


Mr. Paul Matatall

Mr. Joseph Sammon


"Don't Allow Yourself To Accept Mediocrity."

Mr. Daniel Buckley


**"Each Year

Mr. Steve Toltz


"The Sky's The Limit."


The Mustang News Displays Talent.



Tara Lane



At home, The Celtics won their 16th World Championship, a league record.


Wade Boggs of the Red Sox suffered a cracked rib when he fell against a hotel sofa while trying to remove his cowboy boots.


Bill's interests included running, music, and watching *Family Ties*. Bill admired Michael J. Fox. He could relate to Alex P. Keaton, the character Fox played.




John Raguin


