



Remember racing home from kindergarten to show your mother that gold star you received for reciting the alphabet? Cookies and milk made that celebration special.

Then came Jr. High and you had to become accustomed to having more than one teacher. Luckily, new friends made this transition enjoyable.





Clouds of breath, buzzers, blades scraping against the ice, bodies crashing on the boards and millions of signs all set the stage for our moment.




"Being involved with the Class of 1988 is one proud memory."

She suggests that future MHS students should "get involved in a sport or club that you are interested in "because" you will meet a lot of good friends this way, and be having fun, too".





Ro Ro has been inspired by her family because "when I run into hardships, they give me the fighting desire to keep going."

Ro Ro feels the incoming freshmen should "be sociable and treasure your high school years, because they're memories that will last a lifetime."



Sports

The year in sports was full of surprises, such as the return of Sugar Ray Leonard. After five years of retirement from boxing, Leonard decided he would return for one last fight, but only if it was against Marvelous Marvin Hagler. Leonard showed flashes of his former brilliance and won a controversial decision.

In other championships, the Lakers beat our Celtics in six games for the Basketball title. The New York Giants conquered the Denver Broncos to take Super Bowl XXI. Finally, the Edmonton Oilers defeated the Philadelphia Flyers in seven games to win the Stanley Cup.


LoCoco's MHS years have meant a lot to him. He "met so many people and made so many friends". It should be no

Mrs. Reynolds



Soccermen capture GBL title . . . again!

For the 1987 soccer players, defense won the headlines, games, a championship, and all-star recognition. Once again the strong defense carried Coach Joe Barletta's club back to the top of the GBL standings.

Led by tri-captains Steven DiLeo, Dom LoCoco, and Tony Caggiano, the Mustangs dominated the Greater Boston League with a 13-0-1 record and 6-1-1 overall, with their only loss to Newton North and the tie to Revere. Anchored by goalie Caggiano, the defense was the heart of the team. In 18 games the Medford goalie allowed just six goals and a record 15 shutouts. For his 0.19 goals-against average, Caggiano was voted the MVP and GBL All-Star.

On Medford's "D", LoCoco, Sean Falvey, John Coehlo, Fabio Riparo, and Ralph Scudo played an outstanding season in front of the net. Along with defending the Mustangs, tri-captain LoCoco scored a game winner against Arlington and was selected as an all-star player along with sweeper Scudo.

Even though the Medford offense was relatively quiet this season, it was far from silent. Much of the unstoppable offense was provided by DiLeo, Edmond "Mondy" Loyer, Shahram Geransayeh, Jay Murphy, and Ron Parella. Close behind DiLeo was Loyer who scored seven goals and recorded five assists. Both DiLeo and Loyer were named to the All-Star team.

Midfielders John Paul Magazzu, Elkin Mora, and Dave Bertolaccini, maintained the Mustang streak throughout the battle for the top slot. Magazzu also scored the lone goal to defeat Everett 1-0.

In the all out team effort that exceeded Coach Barletta's greatest expectations, the Mustangs kept the tradition alive. For the ninth straight time since Barletta took over in 1979, the Mustang soccer team made it to the North Sectionals of the Division One State soccer tournament. However, the number one seeded Mustang booters fell to Lincoln-Sudbury in the first round.


Spy-Ponders outrun Mustangs in G.B.L. race.

Given the size and inexperience of this team, a second place finish, two All-Stars, and a three point difference certainly still added up to a number one team.







The Mustang defense seemed to come alive after the first quarter, holding the Tornadoes to only one other touchdown. But the offense did not cross the 50 yard line until the third quarter. At the end of four quarters of play, with only a scattering of Mustang die-hards left in freezing rain, the Tornadoes were victorious with a final score of 28-0.





Seniors splash to the finish





Mustang tracksters finish 4-3.
