Each year the club sponsors an exhibition of the award-winning photographs in the Kodak Competition in the M.H.S. Library. Field trips are another outstanding feature of the club.



Regular Wednesday meetings saw the members convene in Room 307 with the officers guiding the meetings.



RICHARD N. OLANS Valedictorian THE PUSH-BUTTON MIND

In this age of tranquilizers, hula hoops, and striped toothpaste, one image stands out above all others as a symbol of our way of life — the push button. This mechanical contrivance has infiltrated almost every phase of modern life. To start your car, push a button; to cook a meal, push a button; to kill cancer cells, push a button; to destroy a country, push a button!

Many push buttons, however, play beneficial and even essential roles in the modern world. It was the push button that triggered all early attempts to reach outer space via rockets and satellites, and it will be yet another push button that will inaugurate man's further journeys to the realm of the moon, the planets, and even the stars. While this cosmic role of the push button may be awe-inspiring, most of us are involved in its more earthly functions. It has revolutionized industry and domestic life. It is responsible for many of our comforts and conveniences, but it also brings with it the danger of a standardization that could threaten the creativity and vitality of the American society. For the push button, whether on a computer or on an assembly line, can reduce the spirit of individualism so necessary for human progress. Such a lack of initiative leads to submissive conformity, which, in turn, generates more push buttons. A vicious circle is thus established, the final result of which will stifle creativity and freedom of thought. We will then have the end product of all this electronic gadgetry -- the push-button mind.

Physical exertion, too, has been slowed to a minimum by time-saving devices. We spare our bodies constantly; and, although we pride ourselves on being sports minded, we are essentially a nation of spectators rather than a nation of participants. We ride, rather than walk; we exercise our finger muscles more often than the muscles of our arms. But we must not allow this physical lethargy to go a step further, to that of mental apathy. Our creature comforts have made us physically soft; our push buttons are doing the same to our minds. Once we relax our thought processes and allow others to do our thinking for us, we are lost. We become helpless robots for those who want to manipulate our minds and our loves. We live in a time of comparative plenty during which we are easily lulled into a state of mental inertia. The old slogan of "A chicken in every pot" now becomes "Food in every freezer." "A car in every garage" is now "Two or three cars in every driveway." What were formerly considerea luxuries are not deemed necessities, many of them with a built-in obsolescence designed to keep us constantly buying the new models.

And with all this there is the push-button mentality, nourished by the sensationalist reporting of the news and a steady stream of mediocrity from the mass media. For example, we seem more concerned with the tantrums of a Jack Paar than with those of a Nikita Krushchev. The listless indifference engendered in a push-button society can easily develop into a complete reliance upon the omnipresent button. We have already developed so-called electronic brains. But a computor cannot think independently. Once independent thinking has ceased, progress also will come to a halt, and society will be doomed to decay. Beware of the ultimate dependence upon a button!

We of the graduating class are of the generation of war babies, during whose lifetime there has never been a day without fighting and conflict somewhere in the world. We have been spawned on television and time-saving devices. We are now coming of age, and we are faced with the threat of a rival ideology whose proponents are masters of pushing buttons to control the mind. Their sworn purpose is to bury us. We must reexamine the complacency and indifference of twentieth century American life in order to reestablish the values of hard work, self-sacrifice, and creative and independent thinking that have made our country great. We must question whether we want Americanism to be represented to the new and developing nations as nothing more than T.V. sets, dollar bills, and uninformed tourists. We must prove to the world and even more important, to ourselves-that democracy, rather than push-button mentality, is chief hope for peace.

As we leave Medford High School and scatter in all directions and to all fields of endeavor, we of the Class of 1962 will soon have the responsibility of leadership placed upon our shoulders. We must pledge ourselves to be aware of what is going on around us in our own communities, as well as in other parts of America, and all over the world. We must have the courage of our convictions to stand up and be counted against what we do not think is right. Upon our vigilance may depend our very existence. We must not shrug off wrong-doing without protest, and we must not condone political corruption in any form. We are indeed fortunate, in this great country of ours, that we are free to question, to criticize and to change. We must use that most precious of American possessions, the vote, to root out the soothsayers who push the button full of promises in order to be elected and then, having lulled our minds, ignore their pledges. It is for the free participation in this process of democracy that our education post and future prepares us

democracy that our education, past and future, prepares us. We must not be influenced by the push buttons and be swept along by the tide of conformity. We must keep in mind the famous words of Emerson in his essay entitled "Self-Reliance," when he said "Whoso would be a man must be a non-conformist." We must not be afraid to think independently or to do what we believe is right. America was reared on individualism, and its future status as a nation relies heavily upon the maintenance of this credo. We must avoid the pitfalls of push-button thinking which stunt the development of both our minds and our bodies. Walk at times when you could ride. Read a book rather than watch T.V. Look into the candidates for public office and vote for them because of their stand on the basic issues and not because of their personalities.

Progress is impossible in any democratic society if intellectual creativity and freedom of thought are stifled. Automation, with its push-button equipment is not inherently harmful. We must beware only of its overuse. The push button is a double-edged sword. We must treat it with respect, appreciating its benefits but acknowledging its dangers, and therefore employing the push button with moderation so that it will not become a crutch for future civilizations.

I can envisage dangerous yet more exciting times for our generation in the remaining decades of this century, and we must be mentally and physically alert to meet the ever present challenge to our society.

HENRY P. SARTORIO Essayist Excerpts from THE MYRIAD PHASES OF SCIENCE

This generation is indeed fortunate to be living in the space age, an era of astounding scientific and technological advancements, particularly in medicine, synthetic products, electronics, rockets and satellites, and atomic energy. The accomplishments of scientists in the past twenty-five years have far surpassed the entire progress of civilization over the thousands of years leading to the wonders of recent times. In view of the tremendous discoveries of recent years, it is almost unbelievable that in 1838 the Clerk of the Patent Office resigned in despair, complaining that all worthwhile inventions had been promulgated..... The future of science today is unlimited; unrealized horizons exist in the laboratory and in human welfare; in the brain, in the heart, and in the soul.

In today's science-shrunken world the situation is critical: Communism is a serious threat to the existence of democracy, and its unquestioned leader, the United States. The struggle for world supremacy today, however, is chiefly a battle of brains, not barbaric physical combat, since each side fears the destructive retaliatory forces of the other. This struggle, keen, intense, frightening, will be won instead by the nation whose people make the greatest scientific advances... The fate of the United States depends chiefly on the education of its scientists, capable and dedicated men who must aid their nation in the great intellectual battles of the scientific war. The relation of science to man's major fields of edeavor is shown by the statement of the Dean of Science at MIT: "To a considerable degree, our form of government is determined by our economics, our economics by our industry, our industry by our technology, and our technology by our science.". . . In generations past the remarkable American people, tough, energetic, inventive, resourceful, and efficient, resolutely faced and overcame menaces as dangerous as those of today in relation to existing strength. To be an American is not only a rare privilege but, especially in these troubled times, a tremendous responsibility.

Many scientific advances of this century have been of immediate and direct benefit to the people, contributing to a longer, fuller, richer life. Today everyone considers these wonders of automation, unimaginable one hundred years ago, indispensable, even essentials of daily living.....

Unlike the aforementioned scientific advances extensive basic research is also done in fields such as atomic energy and space exploration in which discoveries are not yet of immediate value to individuals but of deep potential value for the future of mankind. The complacent United States received a shocking awakening in 1957 when Russia demonstrated its scientific intents and capabilities by launching the first Sputnik satellite upon the unsuspecting world. The race for space following is tense and close..... Scientists are also trying to produce the controlled fusion of hydrogen atoms, a process which would place the limitless thermonuclear power contained in the vast quantities of hydrogen in the oceans at the service of mankind, the true purpose of science.

..... This generation must accept its grave responsibilities as the first generation in history which can destroy our entire civilization; most grim is the possibility of doing so merely by the accidental or unintelligent push of a button. It is a grim challenge to the world to preserve peace and to use science not as an instrument of destruction but as an instrument of immense benefit to man.....

One of the most important decisions of a young man is the selection of a career, and a scientific career is both satisfying and rewarding. A distinction should be made between science and technology or engineering: science is basically the interrogation of nature while technology is the practical application of science to benefit man..... The true scientific spirit is not new; in the words of Democritus, the Greek philosopher who 2300 years ago perceived the concept of the atom, "I would rather find the true cause of one fact than become king of the Persians." Science is a rewarding career, not just financially, but in the satisfaction that only such challenging work brings. Those intangible rewards include the satisfaction of "finding the true cause" of Democritus, the spirit of adventure of an unprecedented undertaking, open-mindedness, and a respect for truth......

In today's world everyone must know some science to be more fully aware and appreciative of his natural surroundings; an educated man must be versatile and comprehensive: a scientist must have a fundamental knowledge of the humanities and a non-scientist must know the basic principles of science. Free science, the free following of curiosity, has never been trivial, selfish, or purposeless. The sober record of experience shows that the trained human mind, given free play and a congenial climate, turns to deep and significant enterprises... The idea that science is coldly logical and faultlessly relentless in its forward march is not true. Science is a natural and integral part of man's whole life, an activity which is basically a blend of logic, intuition, art, and belief. Science has been refined into an instrument of great beauty and precision by a few geniuses, but as a natural social activity science belongs to all men. This proposition will assure that the citizens of the free democracy of the United States, understanding and prizing the work of science, will advance the cause of science, making it flourish with beauty, power, and benefits for all mankind.




