Medford 18—Watertown 0

The Medford High Mustangs opened their most successful football season in over a decade with a decisive 18-0 blitzing of Watertown High. Junior quarterback Ed Rideout, who scored all of the Blue and White's points and destined to have an outstanding year, plus an overall great job by Medford's defensive unit, helped make new head coach Jim McKinnon's debut an impressive one.

In the first quarter, Rideout capped a Mustang drive when he swept around end for 21 yards and the Blue and White's initial score. Jimmy Reid, another junior who was to have a great year, gained valuable yardage on the ground and at the receiving end of Rideout's passes. Co. Capt. Bruce Thistle and Ed Jay also did the ball toting for the Mustangs.

In the 3rd quarter, Medford iced the game on two long runs up the middle by Rideout. Twice he noticed openings in the Watertown defensive line and twice he changed the play at the line of scrimmage. Behind the effective blocking of center Bob Benedict and guards Rick Burns and Rich Etna, Rideout "quarterback-sneaked" for touchdowns of 54 and 67 yards.

However it was the hard-hitting, blitzing, Mustang defensive unit that helped preserve the well-earned victory. Time and again the Mustangs, led by Co-Capt. Len MacDonald, and consisting of Walt Bedell, Steve Giles, Del Keen, and Chick McLaughlin, broke through and pinned the pass-minded Watertown quarterback for losses. Also credit defensive back Ron Corbett with a great job. He prevented a sure Watertown TD with a great defensive play.

Overall, it was a great win. The Blue and White showed poise and determinations, and that they were a well-drilled, hard-hitting football team. The fans could feel that this was going to be a big year for Medford High School.

FOOTBALL



The Mighty Medford Mustangs continued to win and win big their 3rd successive shutout. The victims this time was arch-rival Somerville by a 21-0 score. Coach McKinnon stated before the game that this one would be the key to Medford's season. The gridders realizing this, proceeded to put on an awesome offensive show and; as usual, an equally impressive defensive performance, much to the delight of the vast throng at hand at Hormel Stadium.

Once again quarterback Ed Rideout was outstanding. He directed Medford's offense with such poise and ability rarely found in juniors. The well-balanced Mustang offensive machine, under Rideout's direction, was something to behold. The ground game went well with Rideout, Ed Jay, who also through some key blocks, and Jimmy Reid all eating up big chunks of yardage. The passing, missing from the earlier ball games, was also clicking with Reid and Chick McLaughlin snaring Rideout's pitches.

Medford registered its initial score with 2 minutes remaining in the first half when Rideout rifled a 9-yard scoring strike to McLaughlin. The two also hooked up for the 2-point conversion. A bit later, in the waning moments of the half, Reid scampered 9 yards to pay dirt after a 40 yard "bomb" to McLaughlin; and Medford went to the dressing room with a 14-0 bulge.

The Mustangs weren't satisfied, though, so in the 3rd quarter the Blue and White pushed across another touchdown; the conversion pass to John Feeley fell inches short. This drive was probably the best seen around Medford in years. With the ball on their own 35, the Mustangs started to roll. Rideout swept left end for 20 yards; then he promptly swept the right side for another 20. On both plays key blocks were thrown by Jay and Ronnie Corbett. Diversifying his attack, Rideout then threw a 20 yard pass to Reid, who made a nice grab. Somerville's defense stiffened for three plays, but on 4th and goal from the 5, Rideout took off around left end and dove in for the score. Russ O'Neill booted the extra point and that was all of the point output.

Probably just as impressive as the offensive performance was the defensive job. Displaying fierce pride and determination, which marked this ball club throughout the year, the Mustangs on three important instances showed that they wanted another shutout. This unit, again led by Len McDonald, with Walter Bedell, Richie Etna, Del Keene, Bruce Thistle, and Steve Giles, tackled hard and played heads-up ball. This was all that was needed for Medford to bring home the Somerville Lodge of Elks trophy—donated to the winner—and of course, the game ball.

Chelsea 0—Medford 8



Rain or shine, the Mustangs were determined to win this one, and Chelsea proved to be a formidable foe. Sparked by little Jimmy Reid, who intercepted two passes and knocked down a third in the end zone; Ed Rideout, who scored the only touchdown of the afternoon; and once again, the Mustang defensive unit, who held Chelsea to only 64 yards rushing and one completed pass; the Mustangs continued unbeaten, untied, and unscored-upon.

Medford moved the ball fairly well in the first half, but managed to score only once—a 30-yard Rideout scamper in the second quarter. Full-back Ed Jay banged over right tackle for the conversion, and that was all the scoring for the day.

Once again it was the outstanding play of the Blue and White's defense that captivated the packed stadium. Credit Co-capt. Len MacDonald and company in the defensive line, and Jimmy Reid and company in the defensive backfield, with a fine job. Chelsea tried to wear down the lighter Mustangs, but the Blue and White refused to be worn down—this game was too important.

The dedication ceremony was an inspiration and a very colorful sight. There were guest speakers, members of the Hormel family, and an overflow crowd to add to the festivities. All in all it was a great day in Medford, it opened its gorgeous new stadium, and the Mustangs appropriately dedicated it with a win.





Medford 6—North Quincy 8

The Blue and White suffers its first setback of the season, and the only one at Hormel Stadium, to a strong, well-drilled North Quincy eleven who eventually became Class A co-titlists. The loss, along with knocking the Mustangs out of the unbeaten ranks, also eliminated Medford's unscored-upon string.

Statistically, Medford was beaten badly; but the score indicates what kind of an effort Medford gave. They were there in the clutch, and made the most of the few North Quincy mistakes.

The game started out on a bright note as Medford's Ed Rideout took the opening kickoff and weaved his way 76 yards to the North Quincy 12 yard line. Three plays later, Ed Jay swept the right side and dove into the end zone for the score. The conversion, a pass from Rideout to Chick McLaughlin, was successful but a penalty nullified the effort. A second attempt failed, and the Mustangs led 6-0.

The rest of the afternoon was controlled by the North. They scored on a 57 yard march, which was aided by a costly offside penalty when North Quincy was set to punt. This penalty kept their drive alive and eventually led to a score and the winning conversion.

Although the Mustangs were stymied offensively, with Rideout, Jay, and Co-captain Bruce Thistle only being able to chalk up one nice run apiece, the defense made some clutch plays preventing the North from running up the score. Rideout and Jimmy Reid each had an interception, and the defensive line made several key stops to prevent first downs.

The game ended on a bright note for Medford, however, as the Mustangs put together first downs on a run by Rideout, a pass to Dave Polcari, and the last play of the game, a pass to Russ O'Neill on the North Quincy 37 yard line. But the gun sounded and the Mustangs not only lost its first game, but also lost three key players. Thistle, center Bob Benedict, and Polcari all suffered injuries.

If there could only be two words to describe the 1966 Mustangs those two words would be "pride" and "determination". The Mustangs certainly proved just that when they stampeded arch-rival Everett High 28-10. This was the first time a Medford unit has beaten Everett since 1959; and in the past few years Medford has taken some pretty bad beatings. The main satisfaction, though, was the fact that the Blue and White bounced back after its loss the previous week. Its been a long time in Medford that a team has shown so much of these two qualities.

Needless to say, Quarterback Ed Rideout put on another stellar performance —2 TD's and 2 PAT passes, but another great individual effort was turned in by Jimmy Reid, who scored two touchdowns, caught 2 conversion passes, and rushed for 155 yards. On defense it was John Feeley, who turned in a good job with 2 key fumble recoveries, along with Len McDonald, Walt Bedell, Rich Etna and Steve Giles. As usual, a great job was done by the Blue and White defensive crew.

In the first quarter Medford showed it meant business as it drove 67 yards after the opening kickoff. Stopped momentarily by a fumble, Feeley helped resume the Blue and White drive by recovering his first fumble. Two plays later Rideout found Reid all alone and hit him with a 13-yd TD pass. The two again combined for the PAT with Reid making a fine catch. Soon thereafter Medford regained control via a punt and the Mustangs were off again. Rich Jenkins carried for 11 to the Everett 45. The ensuing play was probably the prettiest of the season. Rideout, scrambling all over the field threw a long pass downfield to Dave Polcari. "Pokey" lunged into the air and caught the ball over his shoulder and landed on the 5—a truly tremendous grab. Rideout scampered the remaining yards for the score. Russ O'Neill faked his kick, and Rideout, the holder, passed to Reid to make it 16-0.

After the kickoff Everett started to move and dove to the Mustang 8, but the Blue and White dug in and prevented the score. However, Rideout was tackled in his own end zone for a safety. Medford kicked to Everett and the Tide immediately pushed across a score and a conversion before the half ended with M.H.S. leading 16-10.

In the 3rd quarter Medford drove 90 yards for a score. A 25 yard run by Rideout and a 25 yard run by Reid, climaxed by a 3 yd dart by Rideout highlighted the march. Medford's final score, registered in the last quarter, was a beauty with Reid and Rideout combining once again—this time on a lateral. Rideout carried 15 yards to the Everett 37, then laterelled to Reid who raced the final 37—the play covered 52 yards. O'Neill's kick hit the goal post and was ruled "no good".

Coach McKinnon sent in substitutes, much to the delight of the howling mass of humanity at Hormel Field. After the game the ball was presented to Co-Captain Bruce Thistle, who suffered a concussion in the North Quincy game and did not play.





Medford 44—Quincy 6

After two tight ball games in which the Blue and White just eked out in the closing minutes, the Mustangs trounced hosting Quincy High 44-6. The Mustangs put on an awesome offensive show and on the defensive unit almost had its 4th shutout of the campaign.

Rich Jenkins, a junior, romped for three TD's; Co-captain Bruce Thistle and Ed Jay chalked up big yardage; and, of course, Ed Rideout had his usual fine day. End John Zanelli made two fine receptions for sizeable gains. Defensively, Ron Corbett had another great afternoon in the secondary as he picked off three Quincy passes—two to set up touchdowns. One could truly say that it was a team effort.

After a scoreless first quarter in which Medford threatened but couldn't put across a score, the Blue and White began to roll. The march for the initial score was set up by a 50 yard pass to Zanelli. Rideout, Jenkins and Jay moved the ball closer with Rideout carrying for the final two yards. The conversion, a pass to Chick McLaughlin who made a driving catch, was called back because of a penalty. However, Rideout proceeded to rifle a pass to Corbett to make it 8-0.

Quincy tried to move but a long pass was picked off by Corbett and the Mustangs again were on the go. Rideout arched a long one that Zanelli caught falling down and his back to the passer; the play covered 34 yards. Three plays later Jenkins swept in from 6 yards out. Jimmy Reid made his first and only appearance and caught a Rideout pass for the conversion. Reid had an injured ankle. On the last play of the half, Jenkins found a big hole and romped 69 yards for a touchdown. Russ O'Neil made good his placement and Medford went into the dressing room with a 23-0 lead.

On the second play of the second half, Rideout handed off to Jenkins who proceeded to ramble 53 yards for his 3rd score. O'Neil made it 2 for 2 and 30-0 Medford lead. Quincy was again stopped by a Corbett interception and the Blue and White started to move once more. Nine plays and 70 yards later Thistle banged in from two yards out. The conversion failed but the 36-0 lead was big enough.

In the last quarter all of the starters were sitting on the bench for coach Jim McKinnon wanted to have his subs see plenty of action. Quincy pushed across its only touchdown, thus ending Medford's hopes for a shutout. The Mustangs got it right back, though, as they drove in for the last score. Greg Arbeene looked impressive as he gained 46 yards on 5 carries before Ken Rideout, covered the last 10 for the touchdown. Fran Leone succeeded in rushing for the two points and Medford won its 7th game.

The game ball was presented to Del Keen who was injured in practice and was hospitalized. The Mustangs now looked forward to the game against arch-rival Malden.

The Mustangs, sparked by some the best quarterbacking Medford fans have ever seen, squeaked to its 5th win in 6 starts with a 19-12 verdict over Newton. The win, although a non leaguer, was significant in that Newton was a solid team from a often-supposed stronger league than the GBL, Medford showed that this supposition can be debated.

Although the game was decided in the last 35 seconds, it appeared Medford was on its way when it took a 12-6 half time lead. It took the Mustangs nearly a half to get rolling, but once it did, it wasn't easy to stop them. With a little over 3 minutes remaining in the 1st half, Ed Jay broke lose for 30 yards, and Medford started to move. Rideout capped a 51 yard drive when he slanted in from 3 yards out. The conversion failed. The ensuing kickoff was fumbled and the Blue and White were back in business. The Mustangs struck quickly as Jimmy Reid scampered for 17 yards. On 3rd down, Rideout hit tight end Chick McLaughlin with a 14 yard touch-down pass. Rideout made the conversion but a penalty nullified it; a second attempt failed. It was generally felt that Medford would now break it open.

Newton, however, came storming back. They were helped by a Medford penalty that set up the 1st score with a little over a minute left in the half. Medford came within 17 yards of pay dirt before the clock ran out.

The Mustangs failed to score in the 3rd period, Newton did, though, and thus tied the score. Dave Polcari batted down the attempted conversion pass. So it remained until middle guard Walter Bedell blew in and threw the Newton quarterback for a big loss and forced a punt. Medford got the ball on its own 18 with a shade more than 2 minutes to go, and started its memorable drive.

It started with a beautiful double reverse from Rideout to Reid to Jay, who ran until he was hit, and then laterelled to Rideout for a 32 yard gain. Rideout then hit Jay for 15 yards to the Newton 25 and another first down. With less than a minute to go, Rideout faked a pass and ran to the 10 before going out of bounds to stop the clock. It was first and goal; Rideout ran to the 4 and again went out of bounds. This set up probably the most exciting play of the season. With 40 seconds left, Rideout found no where to go so he began to scramble. He appeared to be hit, but pulled himself up and rifled a pass to Jay who made a fine leaping catch with a Newton defender all over him. Russ O'Neil booted the extra point and the Mustangs won a squeaker.

HAVERRHILL

For the second week in a row Medford High had to rely on a late game drive to pull out a victory, its 6th in 7 starts. Once again a packed throng at Hormel Stadium was treated to a hard-hitting contest with a frantic ending and Ed Rideout's late-game heroics.

Medford fell behind 6-0 in the first quarter and it remained that way until half time. The ball changed hands on numerous occasions via punts, interceptions, and fumbles in the rough and tumble first half. It was by far the roughest game of the season and the officials didn't hesitate to call penalties—both teams lost much yardage by way of them.

In the second half the hitting was just as hard, but the two teams concentrated more on moving the ball rather than dishing out punishment. Medford tied the score in the 3rd quarter when Rideout returned a Haverhill punt 50 yards for a touchdown. The kick for the conversion failed.

So it remained until the Blue and White took possession on their own 20 with 1:32 remaining in the game. On the first play Ed Jay carried for 8 yards. Than Rideout hit Dave Polcari with an 18 yard pass. Rideout then ran for 9 yards before stepping out of bounds to stop the clock. After a 2 yard loss and a time out; Rideout looped a short pass to Richie Jenkins who danced his way for 22 yards to the Haverhill 25. A pass failed, but a short run by Rideout brought the ball to the 22. The next play was something to watch. Rideout began to scramble with 25 seconds remaining, he was hit but before falling he rifled a pass that Ron Corbett nabbed on the four. Rideout promptly swept left end for the score with Co-captain Len McDonald erasing the lead defender to pave the way.

But it wasn't over yet. The fans were cleared off the field and Medford kicked off. On the first play from scrimmage and the last of the game, the Haverhill quarterback heaved a 39 yard pass that was caught on the Medford 15 before Ron Corbett made the tackle to end the nerve-wracking afternoon.

Medford 13—Malden 25

Before a vast throng at Malden's Pearl St. Stadium, the Blue and White of Medford dropped its traditional Thanksgiving Day contest to the upset-minded Malden High School. It was only the second loss for the Mustangs who, coming into this annual affair, were enjoying a very successful season; Malden, on the other hand, had just a mediocre campaign. But in this game, records or past performances mean very little, it's a game of spirit, determination, and most of all—breaks. The 12,000 plus who crammed every inch of seating and standing room both inside and out of the stadium attested that it was a hard-fought, well-played contest with breaks making the difference.

It was plain to see that Medford was tight in the first half. On the second play of the game, a Mustang fumble gave Malden the ball deep in Blue and White territory. Malden took advantage of this break and proceeded to drive in for the score in four plays. The conversion kick was good and the hosts led 7-0.

Malden surprised everyone by employing an unbalanced line that Medford found hard to cope with. Using this formation, Malden moved well behind their excellent junior quarterback Bill Croken.

Early in the second period Malden intercepted a pass, again they took full advantage and marched in for their second score. The Mustangs stopped the conversion bid but Malden now led 13-0.

Still tight on offense, the Blue and White couldn't move and had to punt. Malden, with plenty of momentum now built up, drove downfield for the score covering the distance in 5 plays. After the kickoff, the Blue and White finally put together a drive, only to have it stopped via an interception in the end zone. Rideout passed to Jimmy Reid for 9 yards to midfield. Rich Jenkins carried for 11, and Rideout galloped for 21 to the Malden 18. Momentarily shaken up, he returned to gain a half dozen more yards. With the ball on the 6, Rideout rifled a pass intended for Ron Corbett but was picked off by Malden, collapsing the

Mustang scoring bid. Moments later the half ended with underdog Malden leading 19-0.


Medford emerged from the dressing room like the Mustangs of old. Coach Jim McKinnon made alterations to cope with the unbalanced line; the result was only one Malden first down and 3 punts. Rideout finally put Medford on the score board with 4:13 left in the 3rd quarter when he knifed his way in from 4 yards out. The drive covered 87 yards, and the Medford fans started to come to life.

Soon after the final quarter began, Rideout handed off to Reid who then reversed a handoff to Jenkins. Jenkins then lobbed a pass back to Rideout who grabbed it and simply outran the Malden secondary. Russ O'Neil kicked the extra point and Medford closed the gap to 19-13. The Medford fans went wild, they figured a repeat of the Mustangs' earlier late-game victories over Newton and Haverhill.


But such was not to be. Medford had the momentum and was seemingly on its way for a third score, but Malden intercepted a pass similar to the one Rideout scored on, and ended the drive. The interception led to a Malden touchdown. This score demoralized the Blue and White's hopes for a victory. They lost their momentum, and in the end, the ballgame.

The loss was the 11th straight for Medford in this second oldest schoolboy grid rivalry in America. The game was filled with new wrinkles used by both clubs: Malden with its unbalanced line, and Medford with its razzle-dazzle passes by Jenkins. The game was exciting to watch, as all the Mustang games, and it proved anything can happen in this series.

For Medford it was the end of an exciting football season. This club is credited with bringing Medford back into the limelight of high school football—it was a long time in coming. It was truly a team effort all the way and, even though they failed to win the big one, the city of Medford and its grid fans will always be proud of them.



Hockey Summary 1966-67

The 1966-67 Mustang hockey team was one that blew hot and cold as far as producing wins. The final record 4-6-4 at first glance is deceiving; they were in just about all their games. The Mustangs, who were loaded with experience this year, began their campaign by trouncing both Somerville and Rindge Tech by identical scores of 13-0. Medford displayed the great hustle that stayed with them all year in these first games. It seemed that Medford was off to a really great season, but such did not come off. Jim Catino, John Kacamburas, Ralph Turner, and Ken Steeves were the big guns for Medford with a net-full of goals.

The Mustangs then faced a fired up Brookline team who took an early lead, but a late Mustang surge forced a tie. Bob Kearins and Jim Catino scored late-game goals to pull it out. From then on, however, it was a downhill struggle. Newton, considered a powerhouse, skimmed by the Blue and White, 5-3, in a come-from-behind effort. In this game, Kacamburas injured his wrist and Turner broke his glasses. This hurt the Blue and White scoring attack and they lost to the tourney-bound Newton squad. Following this setback, Medford had to go up against powerful Arlington—one of the strongest teams in the state. Arlington overpowered the Mustangs by a 9-1 score.

As the season rolled on, Medford lost its scoring ability, which lost games. Concluding the first half of the season, the Blue and White came from behind twice to break even with Waltham, 2-2, and Cambridge Latin, 3-3. Their record at this point was 2-2-3, and they were still in tourney competition.

The Mustangs, as they started the second half of the season, met a surprisingly potent Somerville team who had to be put down by two late-game scores by Ken Steeves and Bob Kearins. Once again they dumped Rindge 8-1, and seemed to be back in early-season form. Brookline, however, scrubbed these hopes as they edged Coach Pete Brady's skaters 2-1. Arlington again was too overpowering and handed Medford a 6-0 whitewashing. In this game, though, the score was not indicative of the game that was played: Medford played their hearts out for the first two periods, but the stronger Arlington squad was just too much for Medford to cope with. The rest of the season saw the Mustangs tie tourney-bound Waltham, 2-2, lose to Cambridge Latin, 1-0, and in the final game, bow to Newton.

John Kacamburas was the high scorer on the team with 21 points, while Bernie Costello, and Ralph Turner had 12 each. Turner and Kacamburas were co-captains and provided a great punch to the scoring with their hustle. They made excellent captains.






The 1966-67 Mustang basketball team did not enjoy the fruits of a winning season, but it did provide many thrilling and tense moments for the Mustang hoop fans. The squad was not a big one, and much-needed varsity experience was lacking. Coach Leo Appiani had an abundance of raw talent in boys like Albie Burns, Frank Juliano, Nick Padovani, and the previous year's highest scorer Bob Tancredi. Also added to the list were juniors Bob Farese, Paul Jay, Jack Fiumara, Eddie Rideout, and Jerry Warren. All these boys have ability, but the essentials, height and experience, kept the Blue and White from winning basketball.

Medford started off the campaign with a loss to Brookline—a real heart-breaker. From then on it was down hill struggle. Midway through the season, however, the Mustangs showed great determination and gave everything they had, but the breaks just weren't with them. They didn't give up, though, and rallied to pull out wins over Revere and defending league champ North Quincy. Then, the roof fell in. Medford had to face the two strongest teams in the loop in Somerville and New Bedford. In the Somerville game Medford stayed right with them for a greater part of the contest, but Somerville just wore them down in the late stages. New Bedford beat them decisively and Medford lost its momentum. From that point on, the Blue and White captured only a few scattered victories over their weaker opponents.

The sweetest victory of the campaign came at the late stages of season when the Mustangs revenged the earlier loss to Malden and upset their arch-rivals in a close one 66-65. Jack Fiumara paced the attack with 18 points followed closely by Tancredi with 17. Jerry Warren had a big night with 12 points and a bundle of rebounds. It was a tight ball game, each team taking the lead and then losing it. Medford took the lead in the final seconds and held on to gain a very sweet victory over a good Malden club.

The season was not a total disaster, however, for even though Tancredi (commonly referred to as "Tank") failed to repeat as high scorer of the league, he made up for it with his hustle, rebounding and team leadership. He made a fine captain. Behind "Tank" the team displayed a fierce desire and determination. This was evident in the other seniors: Burns, the "bull" underneath the board; Padovani, the hustling, never-quitting playmaker; Juliano, the center who led the team in scoring his first year out for the team; and the assistance of Marc Blesoff, who never stopped going whenever he got in there. These seniors passed on their admirable qualities to the juniors, which made every win a team win; without it Medford wouldn't have won a single game.

There is no reason not to expect a winning campaign in '67-'68, for this crop of juniors showed great ability and got that always-needed experience. There aren't that many giants, but Farese, Jay, Warren, and Rich Etna all have good size; while Fiumara can shoot, and Rideout can handle the ball. This group should bring a few victories to Medford next year, for with the added attitude instilled in them by the seniors of this year's squad, they can't miss.
