## Sonia, or Fhe Girl From Russia

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The annual Senior dramatic performance, "Sonia," a musical comedy in three acts, directed by Leslie R. Carey, was enthusiastically received by the large audiences that witnessed the two performances Thursday and Friday evenings, February 15 and 16, in the Roberts Junior High Auditorium.

The audience is hushed with tense anticipation as the curtain opens, revealing a group of college students, led by Sonia Markova, who are planning a surprise party for Professor Smythe, familiarly known as "the absent-minded professor". In the midst of the merrymaking, Sonia's Aunt Martha Mayflower, a prim and dignified lady, makes her appearance. Sonia has never seen her own father. He was a Russian nobleman, who was imprisoned during the Bolshevik Revolution. She receives a letter that he is alive in a Siberian prison and that, if money is sent, he will be able to escape. Pat Dunn, the popular hero at college, is in love with Sonia. He mistrusts the source of her letter, but decides, together with Professor Smythe and Aunt Martha, to accompany Sonia to Russia. They are all seized by the Bolsheviks. By the explosion of a bomb, the absent-minded professor is brought back to his senses. At the close of the story, Sonia finds the person of Ajariah Smythe, her long lost father. Pat Dunn secures the money paid to the conspirators, and Sonia agrees that it will make a nice little nest-egg for their new home.

In the leading role of Sonia Markova, the girl from Russia, Mary T. Martin portrayed her part in splendid fashion. The college football hero and fiance of Sonia, Pat Dunn, was played by George Taylor, in an energetic and capable manner.

Honors for the most realistic acting were divided between Agnes C. Trepaney, in the part of the dignified Aunt Martha, and David C. Baker, the absent-minded professor of Oriental philosophy. Herbert Anderson gave a finished study of Maurice, the college cheer leader. Rita McManus, as Peggy, and Mary B. Ayer, as Sally, were most worthy of mention. Inez II. Golding, doing the honors for Veda Veronal, the sophisticated beautician, made a very convincing vamp.

Other speaking parts—all of them essential to the carrying forward of the story—were in the capable hands of Henry D'Alelio, Boris Ivenuff; Myer Cohen, Count Ginwhiski; Clarence Brayton, the hard-boiled Sergeant O'Shaughnessy; G. Kenneth Gibson, Drosky, the leader of the revolution.

The college and Bolshevik choruses presented a delightful picture with their varied-colored costumes. Specialty dances were given by a group of flower girls. Edythe MacDonald and Antoinette Martini presented a Russian dance as a special feature.

All those who were engaged in the musical comedy from the cast to the stage hands deserve great credit for its splendid success.

The Medford High School orchestra, under the direction of Harold Osgood, furnished a pleasing program between the acts.

## Vocational School

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It is the aim of the Vocational School to fit boys for useful employment through the development of their occupational skill, required for the performance of satisfactory work under actual employment conditions in the following trades: Auto Mechanics, Cabinet Making, Electricity, Machine Shop, Painting and Decorating, Printing and Sheet Metal.

One half of the time is devoted to actual shop work and the other half to related and academic work. The laboratory method of instruction is used in the related classes and is very closely correlated with the shop work. This assures a thorough training in shop and technical information.

The school attempts to prepare the boy morally, intellectually, and physically for that vocation for which he seems to be best fitted by nature, ability, and opportunity; at the completion of his training it places him in the industry trained for, keeps in touch with his progress, and encourages promotion.

Each department of the school forms its individual club, which elects its own officers and holds weekly meetings. The dues pay the expenses of the annual outing held at the end of the year.

It is possible that the printing department may be given the opportunity to display its talents, for the organization of a newspaper staff from among the clubs is contemplated, and the actual printing of the paper will be done by this department.

At the same time hockey was getting under way and those sophomores who successfully demonstrated their prowess at stick handling and skating were kept on the squad. Throughout the winter months there were some who excelled in hockey and some who excelled in hookey, but the truant officers



did not award letters in the latter sport. Meanwhile the fleet of foot were eagerly awaiting the days when they could exhibit the unusual rapidity with which they could manipulate their pedal extremities. These were the youths who proved themselves worthy to be called track men.

The girls were by no means idle when they could participate in such sports as soccer, basketball, swimming, and baseball. Foremost among our athletes were Edna Fitzpatrick, Lorraine Driscoll, "Phil" Stewart, and Mary L. Ayer.

While our athletes were perfecting themselves physically, those of us who were more inclined toward literature were busy writing and soliciting material for the "Review". Proud were the chosen few who were enrolled on the "Review" Staff or whose literary accomplishments were published—and well might they be!

So busy did we become that before we realized it, June approached and our days as sophomores were over. The summer passed and soon we were back in school as Juniors ready for the tasks which we were expected to perform quite efficiently. It was now our turn to lend a helping hand to the sophomores. We took pleasure in directing them to the same rooms which we had labored unsuccessfully to find unless some condescending senior or junior had relieved our distress.

Although Mr. Gilkey had left us in the spring on account of illness, we had hoped to find him with us again in the fall. Unfortunately, he was not able to return. We found however, a very able substitute in the person of Mr. Kendall. Later in the year, when Mr. Kendall became headmaster we welcomed him to that position and promised him our loyal support. His generous and sympathetic counsel has been never failing.

Again with the fall began the regular round for sports—football, soccer, basketball, track, hockey, and baseball. The juniors were not slow in giving their loyal support and were by no means a small factor in the victories of the varsity teams.

This was the second year that we had felt the thrill of sports, but we were for the first time to feel a new thrill, for, as juniors, we elected class officers. The worthy representatives who were Louis Sacco, president; Marjorie Jackson, vice-president; Helen Coluci, secretary; Ralph Lovering, treasurer.

Thus the junior year advanced until the great event, the Junior Prom, approached. Of course, it was a success, for, headed by Robert Deery, the committee worked unceasingly. Perhaps you would like to know who composed this famous committee. They were Louis Sacco, John McGinn, Ernest Sacco, Ralph Lovering, William Warren, Henry Lurinsky, Helen Coluci, Lorraine Driscoll, Marjorie Jackson, Edna Blodgett, and Eileen Donavan.

When the junior prize speaking contest took place, we discovered that in our midst there were speakers who caused a hush to fall upon



their audience. We are not likely to forget Ruth Ryan's reading of "If I were King," which was truly worthy of the first prize for the girls. The gestures and facial expressions of Eleanor Catton convinced us that the timid little city girl could not be happy among all the insects and animals of the country. Edward Shea won the first prize for the boys with his presentation of "The Stone." Abbott Whitmarsh, who was second, caused hearty laughter when he enthusiastically presented "A Quiet Man at a Baseball Game."

Thus the year drew to a close. These final days were spent in the traditional manner—aiding the seniors to graduate. As is our Medford High custom, two girls and one boy were chosen from each junior home room to serve as marshals and ushers. How proud we felt as we formed the guard of honor for the senior class day, reception, and graduation. For this was also the signal that our days as juniors were drawing to an end. Soon would come that much-hoped-for day when we would be seniors. We had come, we had seen, we had almost conquered—one more year would tell.

The Senior year! The class of 1934 is about to be graduated from the Medford High School. The happy hours which we have spent here are passing into the realms of cherished memories. We have had daily contact with the lives of superior men and wemen, some of whom, though dead, still live in the glory of their achievements. Their high ideals of truth, honor, and purity have been instilled in us, and as the graduating class of this school, we hope that we have attained a loyalty and dignity worthy of them.

As in former years, the first exciting and important event of our Senior career was the election of class officers. To quote Mr. Kendall: "There never was a class which possessed so many aspiring politicians." There were 35 students who took out papers announcing their desire for class office. These were finally successful: Thomas Joyce, our good-looking President; Helen Green, petite and charming Vice-President; Helen Murphy, our brilliant and vivacious Secretary; and John Riley, Treasurer. We all thought that "Johnnie" was fully capable of taking care of any "dues-dodgers."

Athletics next claimed our attention. Bill Warren, an apparently quiet student, became the dynamic captain of football and led the team through a fine season! Although not a championship eleven, the team made an excellent showing. Our representatives were "Art" Griffin, "Larry" Green, "Ernie" DiGregorio, "Ronnie" MacDonald, "Pete" Biagione, Fred Brown, Henry Lurinsky, "Johnnie" Correia, and Wayne Crankshaw.

Another major sport was hockey in which the class was represented by Tom Jackson, Captain; "Marty" Boermeester, Phil Sullivan, Fred Manser, and "Joe" Buzzell. "Joe" was as sensational a goalie as Medford has ever had. He was on hand stopping the opponent's points every time they threatened.

Soccer, basketball, and track were our next consideration in sports. Our soccer team brought us everlasting fame by annexing



the Greater Boston Interscholastic Soccer League Championship. Jason McFague and "Joe" Buzzell were the outstanding stars from the class of 1934. The winter season saw "Vernie" Sherman, Salvatore Gemellaro, and Henry Gerrior as outstanding members of the basketball team. Many an exciting moment was furnished, for several of the games were decided by a two-point margin—the reason, no doubt, for the impromptu cheering section. Allan Andrews, "Johnnie" Hall, "Art" Griffin, Captain; Gordon Tower, "Bob" Laycock, John Donnellan were participants on the track team. This team proved a winning combination.

In baseball this year, Medford joined the Greater Boston Interscholastic Baseball League. Capt. Francis Doherty, "Phil" Sullivan, "Marty" Boermeester, "Arty" Johns, "Larry" Green, "Johnny" Kenefick, "Frankie" Hartwell, Allison Burt, and "Joe" Buzzell made up the team for "34—and what a team it was! This last outdoor sport needs no elaborate description.

The year 1934 has been a record one in many ways. In dramatics, the first event was the annual Christmas drama, "The Silence of God." The performance was unique in as much as the east was composed entirely of boys. "Ken" Gibson portrayed the role of Josef, the inn keeper, in a decidedly vivid and convincing manner. He played the part with such realism that some said he even walked with a shuffling step for weeks after. Richard Ashley, taking the part of Count August Feldman, also added to the dramatic accomplishments of this year.

On February 15th and 16th, another unusual achievement for the illustrious class of 1934 took place when, instead of the class play—a musical comedy, "Sonia", was presented. It was the first time in many years that any class of Medford High School has offered a musical production. We heard later that the largest audience ever to witness a Senior class play was present at the final performance. Mary Martin, as Sonia, was exactly what one would wish such a heroine to be! George Taylor, the college football hero, portrayed his role with perfect ease and naturalness. The comedy parts were taken by David Baker as the absent-minded Professor Smythe, and Agnes Trepaney as the dignified Aunt Martha. The superb acting of Inez Golding, Rita McManus, Mary B. Ayer, Henry D'Alelio, Kenneth Gibson, Clarence Brayton, Myer Cohen, and Herbie Anderson will long be remembered. Yes, the class of "34" upheld the high standard of the school with the presentation of "Sonia"!

In May, the Dramatic Club presented "Secret Service", a Civil War romance. Someone has said that whatever is worth doing at all is worth doing well. Evidently, the cast of "Secret Service" adopted this motto. Barbara Mayo as Edith Varney had a Southern per-

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sonality, charmingly all her own. No wonder Lewis Dumont lost his heart to her! We all did! Veronica Dyer, portraying Caroline Mitford, delighted the audience with her interpretation of the part. Wilfred Varney had reasons for his evident admiration. Michael Dyer, taking the role of the old colored servant and slave, Jonas, was highly satisfactory from the moment he stepped on the stage. His bearing—everything he did—made him outstanding in the cast. The success of this play, however, was not due to the work of individuals but to the united efforts of the coach and players; the cast was especially large, including over forty members.

Some may, by this time, have gained the impression that athletics and dramatics constituted the sole activities of our class. On the contrary, the originality of '34 was revealed by the formation of three new clubs: The Boys' Club, The Girls' Club and The Girls' Athletic Association. These clubs were all formed for altruistic purposes—to involve the sacrifice of self in the interests of others. The last important event in our Senior history was the finals of the prize speaking contest. This affair took place May twenty-first. The Seniors in the finals were Ruth Ryan, Mary Strunk, Antoinette Martini, Vera Golding, Kenneth Gibson, Clarence Brayton, and Abbott Whitmarsh. Everyone knows of the close competition in the contest. The first prizes were awarded to Vera Golding and Kenneth Gibson; second prizes, Ruth Ryan and Herbert Giffen.

Since the ending of the prize-speaking contest, all thoughts have turned to June and graduation. The announcement of the Year-Book Staff with George Masterton as Editor-in-chief, Claire Devlin, and Alice Cameron as associate-editors, and especially the animated discussion among the girls concerning graduation clothes have combined to make commencement seem very near. From that time until now, we have "hustled and bustled" here, there, and everywhere. We have been sent to the photographers; pictures have been taken; proofs, anxiously scanned; our friends have made complimentary remarks, and otherwise, and once again we have regained our dignity



and composure! The biography aids have delved into our past, present, and future; orders have been taken for rings, pins, and pictures of this team and that. Yes! the last few weeks have been hectic ones!

But not all the events of our school days have been occasions for happy memories. During the course of two years, four of our beloved teachers have been called from our midst: Miss Mabel A Gannett, Mr. Frank S. Gilkey, Miss Laura P. Patten, and Mr. Harry E. Walker. A realization of this loss to the school has gripped our hearts. Above all else, these men and women stood for sincerity and fidelity. They will always be held in loving memory by those who knew them. The services which they have rendered as teachers in the Medford High School will be forever enshrined in our hearts.

An additional cause of sadness and grief for the class of 1934 was the death of Paul Armstrong, taken from us April third. He will always be remembered with affection by his teachers and classmates. His cheerful smile and sincere friendship will be greatly missed.

### Class Oration

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#### HIDDEN TREASURES

Hidden treasures! A magic phrase which has always awakened in us adventurous thoughts of tropical isles and seas! A picture of the imagination, seemingly unattainable; in reality, however, very close to us, for we have within ourselves buried treasures! Our search for these will have all the romance and adventure of the treasure hunts of old: a treasure hunt all our own, for we alone hold the key.

Let us consider what these treasures are, and more important, to what use we may put them when found.

Ambition is one of these valued possessions. We all have some inner longing to attain something. We may not reach it, or we may change our objective, but, nevertheless, we have that desire, our ambition. It is our ambition, if we cling to it, which will lead us towards our goal. This, then, is one of the most valuable gifts which we shall find in our treasure chest. Fred Fisher, one of the well-known Fisher brothers connected with the automobile industry, is said to have predicted while young that before he was fifty years old, he would be in a position where he would not have to care what anyone else did. During the years preceding 1929, the fortune of the seven Fisher brothers was estimated by some as exceeding five hundred million dollars. Fred Fisher had the desire and the will to gain his goal, and he did.

Cooperation is another treasure. In modern society we are all interdependent. Evidence of this fact is found in the words of Charles M. Schwab, the great American capitalist and steel magnate. When asked which group was the most important, the capitalist, the laborer, or the producer of raw material, Mr. Schwab replied by asking which leg of a three-legged stool was the most important. What Mr. Schwab said of industry can be applied to all walks of life. Cooperation is a very valuable treasure which we all may possess. We shall find it one of our greatest assets. By cooperating with our fellow men at home, at work, in fact, in all our daily contacts, we shall reap the benefits which such service always brings.

In spite of present conditions, our opportunities are still numercus. Competition is keener, it is true, but it is often through competition that success becomes greater. As proof of these opportunities we have only to look to modern industry. In a recent article appearing in the "New Outlook," entitled "Tomorrow's Gadgets," the author makes the rather surprising statement that in the past four years our laboratories have almost doubled the sum total of new things which will be available to us, when we are ready to buy them.



For example, the National Broadcasting Company has recently invested nearly a million dollars in wiring Radio City for television. New devices of every kind excite the imagination, houses of steel and glass, washable wall papers, railroad trains scientifically streamlined and air-conditioned, all brought into being by contemporary minds.

Our generation, therefore, has remarkable opportunities, not only in the production of these new items but in their distribution and financial management as well. There is also the challenge to us to create new things and to develop new enterprises. Surely, with the ever increasing knowledge in science, our chances, nay, our responsibilities for these accomplishments are greater now than ever before.

To-day in the United States there is a greater diversity of work than in any other period. There are, moreover, many more people in different types of occupations than at any previous time in our history. As we have progressed in our present day civilization, jobs have been created. Only a very few years ago, there was no such vocation as that of radio engineer, announcer, or artist. At present, thousands of persons depend upon this young industry for their livelihood. Sound pictures created new jobs. So did motor cars.

All these opportunities are ours. Within us lies the power of making the most of them, if we but try. This latent power is a real treasure which must be brought to light. When we find it, it will be one of our most important qualities for success in whatever work we may undertake.

This fact brings us to another point. What will be our contribution to society? What work shall we do? This question we must answer for ourselves. But we must be careful not to adopt the attitude that the world owes us a living. The world owes us nothing. It will pay us only what we, ourselves, by hard digging, are able to take from it. The world does not give; it merely relinquishes, and, it seems, most reluctantly. There is no royal road to success. One of the laws of Nature is the law of compensation. We shall be rewarded only in proportion to our efforts.

Our contribution will be our own creation. If our work is well done, no matter how small it may be, we may point to it with pride. This result, indeed, is a treasure worth seeking with as much zeal as the treasure seekers of old searched for gold, silver, and precious jewels. But in order to fully realize the satisfaction of pride in our accomplishments, we must do our own work.

In the new novel, "Years of Grace," Margaret Barnes, the author, pictures a situation which proves that justifiable pride in our work can come only through doing it ourselves. The occasion is a birthday party to a grandmother, who, in response to a toast makes a speech in which she expresses her great disappointment in her children. Since they are all living in wealth and luxury and consider themselves successful, they are amazed at her statement. She explains further by telling them that they have done nothing; they have ac-



cepted everything given to them with no desire to shoulder a burden as their father did. The grandmother was disappointed in her children, because they did not accept responsibilities. If we do not accept our responsibilities, we cannot fail to be disappointed in ourselves.

Yet work will avail us little of either success or happiness, if we lack one of the most important qualities—faith in our fellowmen. One of our greatest examples of such faith is found in the life of Abraham Lincoln. It was his abiding faith in mankind which brought us through the Civil War. The circumstances did not tend to generate faith. The country was divided so that every member of the Cabinet except one was of the opinion that it would be wise to accept secession as final. Lincoln's popular vote had been much less than a majority, and there was no sign, that even the North was united in his support. Furthermore, reverses on the field of battle were many. But Lincoln's faith never failed. He granted that some of the people could be fooled all of the time, and that all of the people could be fooled some of the time, but he was absolutely certain that all of the people could not be fooled all of the time.

Sometimes he seemed to make the mistake of trusting individuals too much, but his willingness to seek and to expect the best was part of his nature. If he had not possessed this faith in mankind, he could not have said, while the war was still going on and bitter feelings ran high on both sides, "With malice towards none, with charity for all."

We cannot all occupy the position which Lincoln held but we can all make his faith a part of our daily lives.

Our education here has furnished us with a background for our future development. We have acquired the elements of training necessary to living in the present complicated society of the world. If we have made the most of this training, this will prove invaluable. Yet we cannot stop here if we are to fully benefit from our treasures. We must strive to better prepare ourselves. As Daniel Webster once said, "Every man must educate himself; his books and teachers are but helps." Each one must first build a firm foundation; next develop it.

When one looks at a high building, his gaze naturally turns to the top. Our future careers will be like this building: our eyes will be concentrated upon the top, success. But there is more to a building than its roof. Deep in the ground are rooted the foundations. Above the surface are the many stories. So it is with our lives. Below the surface are the deep-rooted principles of right and wrong, our foundations. Above the surface are the stories representing our progress in knowledge and understanding. Our education in the public schools forms the lower floors of this building. We are standing now upon the twelfth floor. Whether or not we build higher into the clouds depends upon ourselves. We must be sure, however, of our foundations. With a weak groundwork a building soon topples; likewise will our success collapse if founded upon a weak character.



Our foundation is the basis of all our other qualities. A treasure within ourself which will constantly aid us in our struggle upward. Thus we find that we have invaluable treasures within our grasp if we but reach outin an effort to attain them.

We have our ambitions, also the opportunities to fulfill these ambitions. We have our work to do for our contribution to world progress, and the qualities of cooperation and faith by which we shall realize success. In addition we have our foundation of character, our greatest treasure—the basis for all our future happiness.
