OUR MISSION

St. Ignatius College Preparatory is a Catholic, Jesuit school serving the San Francisco Bay Area since 1855. Through a rigorous and integrated program of academic, spiritual, and co-curricular activities, St. Ignatius challenges its students to lead lives of faith, integrity, and compassion. Students are enriched by a diverse and loving Christian community and are called to become life-long learners who develop their individual talents for the greater glory of God. With a commitment to intellectual excellence, leadership, service, and justice, we strive to be men and women for and with others, responding courageously to the opportunities and challenges of our time.

SCHOOL COMMUNITY

Founded in 1855 by the Society of Jesus (Jesuits), it is one of the oldest Catholic secondary schools in the west. Its 11-acre campus, bordered by Golden Gate Park and Ocean Beach, is located in the Sunset district. St. Ignatius draws students from the following Bay Area counties: San Francisco, San Mateo, Marin, and Alameda. Accredited by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC) and the Western Catholic Education Association (WCEA), St. Ignatius holds membership in the Jesuit Schools Network, College Board, National and Western Association of College Admission Counseling, Association for Supervision and Curriculum Design (ASCD), and the National Catholic Education Association.

FACULTY

Of the 96 teaching faculty, 80% hold an advanced degree. The average class size is 25.

ADMISSIONS

The student body reflects rich, ethnic and social diversity. In 2024-2025, the student body includes 1491 students of the following ethnic groups:

Admissions at St. Ignatius is selective. There are approximately 1,300 applications for 385 spaces in an incoming class. Admission is by application, recommendations, applicant video, entrance examination and previous year's school grades.

FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

Financial assistance is received by 23% of the students. Approximately 5% of our students receive close to full tuition.

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

The academic program at St. Ignatius is designed to prepare students for college. A student must pass a minimum of six academic courses each semester. Upon completion of requirements, seniors will graduate on May 31, 2025.

• There are no honors level courses in Religious Studies; however, the University of California has approved the following college prep courses: RS 102: History of Covenant (Social Science Elective), RS 103: Literature of Covenant (English elective), RS 201: Christology (English elective), RS 300: Ethics, Morality & Justice, RS 447: Encountering the World's Religions, RS 471: Telling Stories: Faith (English Elective), RS 472: Science & Religion, RS 475: Sports & Spirituality, RS 477: Ecological Justice & Spirituality, Studio Art (B/C): Sacred Symbols.

• The Religious Studies Program at St. Ignatius is an integral part of our school's identity, as it embodies our mission to develop the entire person: intellectually, spiritually, and ethically. St. Ignatius requires 3.5 years of Religious Studies.

CLASS RANK AND GRADE POINT AVERAGE

St. Ignatius calculates both an unweighted and weighted GPA. We use a letter-based A-F/4.0 grading scale. We weight Honors and AP courses and students receive one extra grade point to the above values. Reported GPA on our transcript reflects courses taken at SI. Due to factors and situations outside of a student’s control (e.g. course availability, enrichment opportunities), a commitment to equity, and our school mission, we do not rank students or provide a GPA distribution of the class.

STUDENT LIFE

Arrupe Center for Social Justice

As a vital aspect of Ignatian character, our motto, “persons with and for others” invites students to engage in service both as part of their academic requirements and as part of their everyday lives through a faith that lives justice. Our graduation requirement is 75 total hours; 40 hours of direct service with a marginalized population at one non-profit agency and 35 service hours at various non-profit agencies of the student’s choice. In addition to this requirement, approximately 25% of the Junior class elects to participate in one of nine local, domestic, and international immersion opportunities. These experiences move students beyond service, expose them to individuals and communities directly impacted by social injustices, form them in a “well-educated solidarity,” and deepen their relationships with others and with God. Our hope is that these service and immersion experiences transform students’ hearts and, ultimately, lead them to become change agents advocating for justice in our world.

St. Ignatius offers the **Magis Program** which provides academic, social, and cultural support to students who are first-generation, college-bound, historically under-represented in higher education, and/or from low-income families.

St. Ignatius also supports the **Fr. Sauer Academy**, a tuition-free middle school for 6th-8th grade students who fit the same profile above, but due to financial limitations are unable to afford a private, Jesuit, Catholic Education.

Co-Curriculars

St. Ignatius offers over 100+ academic, social, service, and community engagement oriented student clubs including affinity groups. St. Ignatius sponsors 15 sports with nearly 1,100 students on 55 teams and 9 club teams competing in one of the state’s premiere conferences, the West Catholic Athletic League (WCAL).

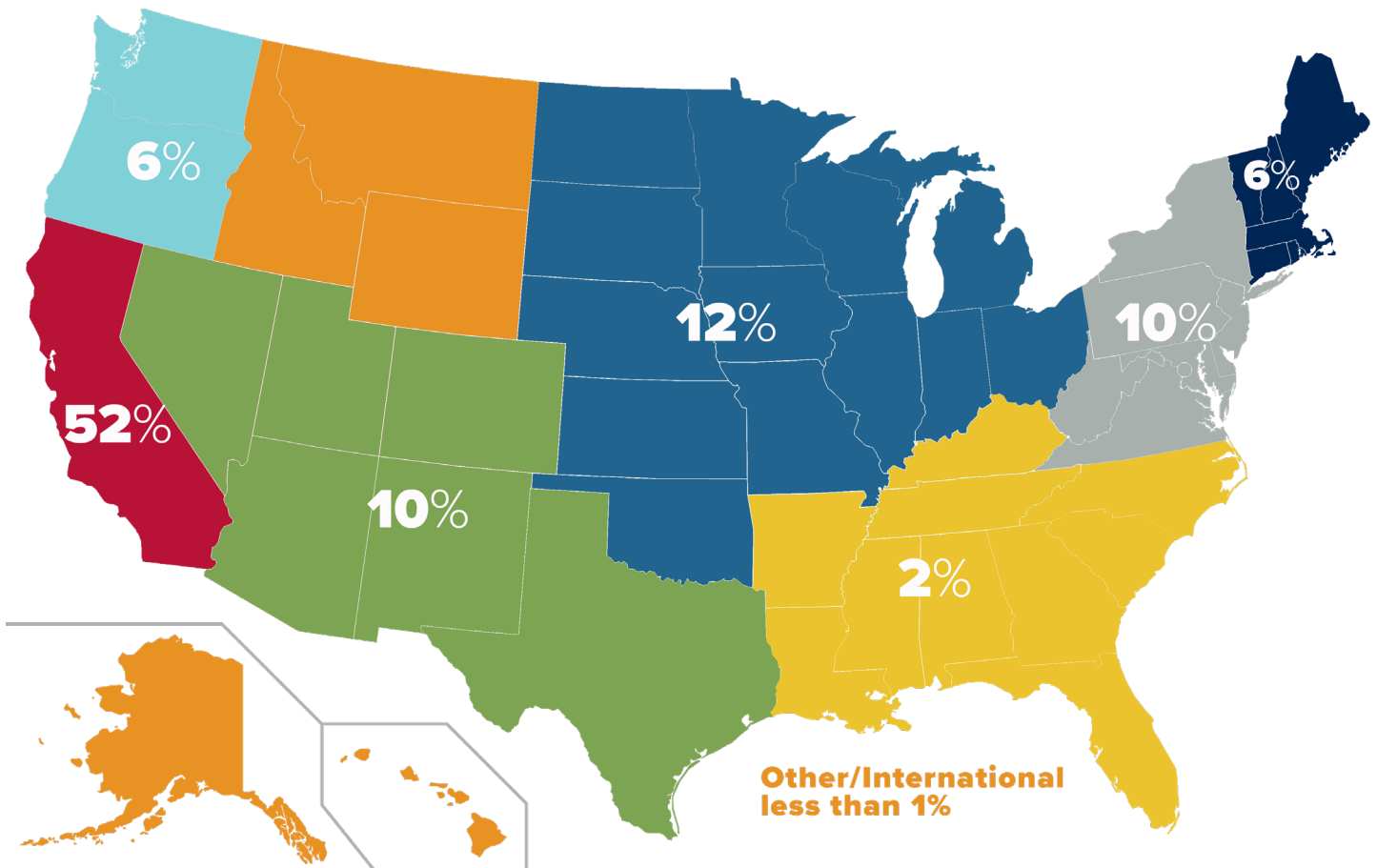
DISCIPLINE
