

## DO506 – Labette County High School Wellness Policies

DO506 – Labette County is committed to providing school environments that promote and protect children’s health, well-being and ability to learn by supporting healthy eating, nutrition education, physical activity and integrated school base wellness. Therefore, it is the policy of DO506 – Labette County that:

### **Policies in Place**

#### **Nutrition**

##### **General Guidelines**

1A. All school food service personnel receive required food safety training at a minimum of every 5 years. Continuing education training for all food service personnel meets federal and state requirements.

1B. All school food service personnel receive required food safety training at a minimum of every 3 years.

1C. All school food service personnel receive food safety training annually.

2A. The dining area has seating to accommodate all students during each serving period.

2B. The food service area is clean, orderly, and has an inviting atmosphere that encourages meal consumption.

3A. The dining area has adequate adult supervision.

3B. The dining area has food service personnel and supervisory staff use positive communication cues with students to promote consumption of foods served as part of Child Nutrition Programs.

3C. The dining area had adults model healthy eating in the dining areas and encourage students to taste new and/or unfamiliar foods.

4A. The students are allowed to converse with one another at least part of the meal time.

4B. Mealtime conversation is not prohibited for the entire meal time as disciplinary action.

4C. Reimbursable meals and/or parts of a reimbursable meal are not withheld or denied as a disciplinary action.

5A. Reimbursable meals and/or parts of a reimbursable meal are not withheld or denied as a disciplinary action.

5b. Students are not being disciplined by separation from other students in the dining area.

5c. Students are not being disciplined by being seated in a separate location.

6A. Content of reimbursable lunch and breakfast is identified near or at the beginning of the serving line.

6B. One or more Kansas food products served as a part of the school meals program and identified at the beginning of the serving line each week.

6C. Two or more Kansas products served as a part of the school meals program and identified at the beginning of the serving line each week.

## **Breakfast**

1A. All school breakfasts comply with USDA regulations and state policies.

1B. At least three different fruits are offered each week on three different days. At least one fruit per week is served fresh.

1C. At least five different fruits are offered each week. At least two fruits per week are be served fresh.

2A. Students have the opportunity to eat breakfast.

2B. District offers at least 15 minutes “seat time” to eat breakfast (not including time spent walking to and from class or waiting in line) or Grab n Go breakfast options are available.

2C. District has implemented alternative 2<sup>nd</sup> chance breakfast service options. “Breakfast in the Classroom” or “Breakfast After First Period” is available.

## **Lunch**

1A. All school lunches comply with USDA regulations and state policies.

1B. At least three different fruits are offered each week. Two fruits per week are served fresh.

1C. One additional ½ cup vegetable offering weekly from any of the three vegetable subgroups (dark-green, red/orange, dry beans and peas).

1d. At least five different fruits are offered each week. Four fruits per week are served fresh.

1D. At least five different fruits are offered each week. Four fruits per week are served fresh.

1E. An additional 1 cup vegetable offering weekly from any of three vegetable subgroups (dark-green, red/orange, dry beans and peas).

2A. Students have at least 15 minutes “seat time” to eat lunch not including time spent walking to/from class or waiting in line.

2B. Students have at least 20 minutes “seat time” to eat lunch not including time spent walking to/from class or waiting in line.

2C. Students are offered recess before lunch and at least 20 minutes seat time to eat.

### **All Food Sold in Schools**

0a. No foods or beverages are sold except reimbursable schools meals or snacks.

1a. All food and beverages are in compliance with USDA’s smart snacks in school ‘All Foods Sold in Schools’ Standards from the midnight before to 30 minutes after the end of the official school day.

1b. All food and beverages are in compliance with USDA’s smart snacks in School ‘All Foods Sold in Schools’ Standards from the midnight before to 5 pm.

1c. All food and beverages are in compliance with USDA’s Smart Snacks in School “All Foods Sold in Schools” standards 24 hours a day.

2a. No energy drinks are sold on school property from midnight before to 30 minutes after the end of the official school day.

2b. No energy drinks are sold on school property from midnight before to 5 pm after the end of the official school day.

2c. USDA's Smart Snacks in School Beverage Standards for middle schools apply to high school (only 100% juice, water, milk).

3a. Fundraising within the school day meets USDA's Smart Snacks in School "All Foods Sold in Schools' Standards (sans the exempted fundraisers).

3b. Fundraising within the school and until 5 pm meets USDA's Smart Snacks in School "All Foods Sold in School" Standards ( sans the exempted fundraisers).

3c. No exempted fundraisers. All fundraising involving foods or beverages meet the USDA's Smart Snacks in School "All Foods Sold in Schools" standards.

3d. Fundraising activities involving the sale of food or beverages that meet USDA's Smart Snacks in School "All Foods Sold in Schools" standards and/or exempted fundraisers will not take place until after the end of the last lunch period.

3e. Fundraising activities support nutrition support nutrition, nutrition education and physical activity messaging.

### **Other Child Nutrition Programs**

1a. Meals and Snacks served under the USDA at-Risk Afterschool Meals, Afterschool Care Snack Program, Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Program and/or Summer Food Service Program comply with all federal regulations and state policies.

1b. Participate in one of four programs. (At-Risk Afterschool Meals, Afterschool Care Snack Program, Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Program or Summer Food Service Program)

1c. Participate in two of the four programs. (At-Risk Afterschool Meals, Afterschool Care Snack Program, Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Program or Summer Food Service Program)

### **During the School Day**

1a. Students have access to free drinking water throughout the school day, including during meal service. Hygiene standards for all methods delivering drinking water will be maintained.

1b. Students are allowed to have clear/translucent individual water bottles in the classroom where appropriate.

1c. Students have clear/translucent individual water bottles in the classroom where appropriate.

3a. School provide staff information on non-food rewards.

## **Nutrition Promotion**

1a. Students provide input on foods offered in the cafeteria.

1b. Students learn about the nutrition requirements for school meals and some students are involved in helping plan menus annually.

2a. District promoted participation in the National School Lunch Program and School Breakfast Program if applicable and to choose nutritious foods and beverages throughout the day. Menus are posted on school website and/or distributed to families via another method.

2b. District implements marketing and advertising of nutritious foods and beverages consistently through a comprehensive and multi-channel approach by school staff, teachers, parents and students.

2c. District implements marketing and advertising of nutritious foods and beverages consistently through a comprehensive and multi-channel approach to the community.

3a. District allows marketing (oral, written, or graphics) of only those foods and beverages sold on the school campus during the school day that meet the requirements set forth in the Smart Snacks Rule (Schools are not required to allow food or beverage marketing on campus).

3b. District allows marketing (oral, written, or graphics) of only those foods and beverages sold on the school campus during the school day that meet the requirements set forth in the Smart Snacks Rule on the school campus at all times.

3c. District allows marketing (oral, written, or graphics) of only those foods and beverages sold on the school campus during the school day that meet the requirements set forth in the Smart Snacks Rule on the school campus at all times.

## **Nutrition Education**

1a. All students in grades K-12 will have the opportunity to participate in culturally relevant participatory activities, as appropriate, and a variety of learning experiences that support development of healthful eating habits that are based on the most recent Dietary Guidelines for American and evidence-based information.

1b. District administrators inform teachers and other school personnel about opportunities to participate in professional development on nutrition and teaching nutrition.

2a. Include nutrition education as part of physical education/health education classes and/or stand-alone courses for all grade levels, including curricula that promote skill development.

4a. Integrate age-appropriate nutrition education into other core subjects such as math, science, language arts, and social sciences, as well as into at least one non-core/elective subject.

4b. Integrate age-appropriate nutrition education into two or more core subjects such as math, science, language arts, and social sciences as well as in two or more non-core and elective subjects.

5a. Include nutrition and health posters, signage, or displays in the cafeteria food service and dining areas that are rotated, updated or changed quarterly.

5b. Include nutrition and health posters, signage or displays in the cafeteria food service and dining areas, classrooms, hallways, gymnasium, and/or bulletin boards that are rotated, updated or changed quarterly.

6a. Offer information to families at least once per semester that encourages them to teach their children about health, nutrition and agriculture education and assists them in planning nutritious meals for their families.

6b. Offer information to families at least once per quarter that encourages them to teach their children about health, nutrition, and agriculture education and assists them in planning nutritious meals for their families.

6c. Offer information to families at least once per month that encourages them to teach their children about health, nutrition, and agriculture education and assists them in planning nutritious meals for their families.

## **Physical Activity**

### **General Guidelines**

1a. All students in grades K-12 have the opportunity to participate in moderate to vigorous physical activity at least 2 times per week during the entire school year.

1b. All students in grades K-12 have the opportunity to participate in moderate to vigorous physical activity 3 or more times per week during the entire school year.

1c. All students in grades K-12 have the opportunity to participate in moderate to vigorous physical activity every day during the entire school year.

2a. District prohibits the use of physical activity as a punishment. District prohibit withholding physical activity, including recess and physical education, as punishment.

2b. District encourages extra physical activity time as an option for classroom rewards

2c. District uses extra physical activity time as a classroom reward.

### **Throughout the day**

1a. Elementary school students have at least 15 minutes a day of supervised recess (not including time spent getting to and from the playground), preferably outdoors. Supervisory staff encourage moderate to vigorous physical activity.

1b. Elementary school students have two supervised recess periods per day (not including time spent getting to and from the playground), totaling at least 20 minutes. Supervisory staff encourage moderate to vigorous physical activity.

1c. Elementary school students have two supervised recess periods per day, totaling at least 30 minutes (not including time spent getting to and from the playground), with one being offered in the morning. Supervisory staff encourage moderate to vigorous physical activity.

2a. School policy outlines guidance on conditions regulating indoor and outdoor recess during extreme weather conditions.

2b. Each school provides equipment, instruction and supervision for active indoor recess.

2c. Students that participate in indoor recess are provided moderate to vigorous physical activity opportunities.

3a. Structured physical activity opportunities, in addition to physical education and recess (where applicable), are encouraged for all students.

4a. Professional development on integrating physical activity into core/non-core subjects is provided to licensed physical education teachers, school nurses, and building administrators.

4b. Professional development on integrating physical activity into core/non-core subjects is provided to most staff.

### **Physical Education**

1a. Physical education is taught by teachers licensed by the Kansas State Department of Education.

1b. Physical education teachers are licensed and participate in physical education and/or physical activity specific professional development every 2 years.

1c. Physical education teachers are licensed and have advanced certification and/or education.

2a. The physical education curriculum is sequential and consistent with Kansas State Board of Education approved physical education teaching standards for pre-kindergarten through grade 12.

2b. Physical Education teaches basic motor skills, enhances knowledge of concepts related to movement needed to achieve and maintain health for lifetime physical activity.

2c. District offers lifetime sports and fitness classes/opportunities.

3a. Elementary students receive 90-119 minutes of physical education per week, which includes at least 50% of the minutes engaged in moderate to vigorous physical activity.

3b. Elementary students receive 120-149 minutes of physical education per week, which includes at least 50% of the minutes engaged in moderate to vigorous physical activity.

3c. Elementary students receive 150+ minutes of physical education per week, which includes at least 50% of the minutes engaged in moderate to vigorous physical activity.

5A. High school students are provided structured physical education in at least 1 course required for graduation.

5B. Additional opportunities for physical education as an elective are offered.

5C. High school students are provided structured physical education in at least 2 courses required for graduation.

6a. Physical education curriculum encourages a multi-dimensional fitness assessment.

6b. Physical education curriculum includes fitness assessment of at least 50% of all students enrolled in physical education and student fitness reports are available to parents.

6c. Physical education curriculum includes fitness assessment of at least 90% of all students enrolled in physical education and student fitness reports are available to parents.

### **Before and After School**

1a. Extracurricular physical activity programs, such as a physical activity club or intramural programs, are offered.



1b. Extracurricular physical activity programs, such as a physical activity club or intramural programs, are offered, with input from students, and meet the needs, interest and abilities of a diverse student body.

1c. Extracurricular physical activity programs, such as physical activity club or intramural programs, are offered through partnership with community organizations and resources.

2a. An Assessment on walking and/or biking to school has been completed to determine safety and feasibility.

### **Family and Community**

1a. Community members are provided access to the district's outdoor physical activity facilities.

1b. Community members are provided access to the district's indoor and outdoor physical activity facilities at specified hours.

1c. Community members are encouraged to access the district's indoor and outdoor physical activity facilities at specified hours.

2a. Offer information via multiple channels at least once per semester to all families that encourages them to teach their children about physical activity, and assists them in planning physical activity for their families.

2b. Offer information via multiple channels and provide opportunities for physical activity at least once per quarter to all families that encourages them to teach their children about physical activity, and assists them in planning physical activity for their families.

### **General Guidelines**

1A. Annual staff wellness activities and/or professional development opportunities related to nutrition, physical activity, mental health, and abstaining from tobacco and e-cigarettes are provided to encourage school staff to serve as healthy role models. Staff wellness activities and training may also include additional components of the Whole School, Whole Community, Whole Child Model.

3a. Annually, offer district-sponsored wellness family activities that address one or more components of the whole school, whole community, whole child model.

4a. Annually partner with local health agencies and community organizations

4b. Each semester, partner with local health agencies and community organizations.

4C. Quarterly, partner with local health agencies and community organizations.

6a. Farm to school activities conducted annually in one or more schools.

7a. Each semester, culturally relevant health education information is provided to families via handouts, postings on the school website, newsletters, presentations and workshops.

7b. Quarterly, culturally relevant health education information is provided to families via handouts, posting on the school website, newsletters, presentations and workshops.

7c. Monthly, culturally relevant health education information is provided to families via handouts, postings on the school website, newsletters, presentation and workshops.

8a. The local school wellness policy committee meets at least twice per year.

9a. The school wellness committee makes appropriate updates or modification to wellness policy based on assessment and an update on the progress toward meeting the State model wellness policy is made available to the public, including parents, students and the community.

9b. The wellness policy assessment and progress toward meeting the state model wellness policy are presented to school and district staff.

9c. The wellness policy assessment and progress toward meeting the state model wellness policy are presented to and approved by the local school board.

## **Developing Policy**

### **Lunch**

2b. Students have at least 20 minutes “seat time” to eat lunch not including time spent walking to/from class or waiting in line.

### **During the school day**

2a. District develops nutritional standards for non-sold food and beverages made available on school campus during the school day.

2b. District adopts Smart Snacks in school “all Foods Sold in Schools” Standards for non-sold food and beverages made available on school campus during the school day.

2c. Non-sold foods and beverages meet Smart Snacks in School “All Foods Sold in Schools” Standards The focus of classroom celebrations is not on food.

3b. Schools begin incorporating non-food rewards.

3c. Food is not used as a reward in district schools unless the food meets Smart Snack in School “All Foods Sold in Schools” Standards

### **Nutrition Education**

1c. The Wellness Committee, teachers and other school personnel participate in nutrition education-related professional development at least once a year.

2b. Active classroom learning experience are provided such as involving students in food preparation or other hands-on activities at least once a semester.

3a. District uses qualified personnel or organizations from the community to provide nutrition education to students under the direct supervision of a teacher at least once/year.

4C. Integrate age-appropriate nutrition education into all core subjects such as math, science, language arts, and social sciences as well as in three or more non-core and elective subjects.

5c. School personnel collaborate with the school nutrition staff to use the cafeteria as a learning laboratory that allows students to apply critical thinking skills.

### **Throughout the Day**

3b. Structured physical activity opportunities, in addition to physical education and recess (where applicable), are offered to all students at least 1 time daily. School staff are encouraged to participate.

3c. Structured physical activity opportunities, in addition to physical education and recess (where applicable), are offered to all students at least 2 times daily. School staff are encouraged to participate.

4c. Professional development on integrating physical activity into core/non-core subjects is provided to all staff.

5a. Structured physical activities are approved by a licensed physical education teacher and integrated into health education and one or more core subjects, such as math, science, language arts, and social sciences, as well as in non-core and elective subjects.

5b. Structured physical activities are approved by a licensed physical education teacher and integrated into two or more core curriculum subjects, such as math, science language arts, social sciences, as well as in non-core and elective subjects.

5c. Structured physical activities are approved by a licensed physical education teacher and integrated into all core curriculum subjects, such as math, science, language arts, social sciences, as well as in non-core and elective subjects.

### **Before and After school**

2b. The school has developed a walk and/or biking to school plan and encourages students to walk and/or bike to school based on safety and feasibility assessment.

2c. The school has implemented a walk and/or bike to school plan or implemented an alternative plan based on a safety and feasibility assessment and has communicated it to the community.

### **Family and Community**

2c. Offer information via multiple channels and provide opportunities for physical activity at least once per month to all families that encourages them to teach their children about physical activity, and assists them in planning physical activity for their families.

### **General Guidelines**

1b. Each semester provide staff wellness activities and/or professional development opportunities related to nutrition, Physical activity, mental health, and abstaining from tobacco and e-cigarettes are provided to encourage school staff to serve as healthy role models. Staff wellness activities and training may also include additional components of the Whole School, Whole Community, Whole Child model.

3b. Each semester, offer district-sponsored wellness family activities that address one or more components of the whole school, whole community, whole child model.

5a. District wellness committee will discuss the development of a farm to school program.

5b. Facilitate the integration of a farm to school program and curricular activities including hands-on activities as appropriate to facilitate the nutritional and educational goals in 50% of the schools.

6c. Farm to school activities are integrated into one or more core subjects.

## **Not a Policy**

### **General Guidelines**

2C. High School: Closed campus. Students must remain at school during lunch periods.

### **Breakfast**

2c. District has implemented alternative 2<sup>nd</sup> Chance Breakfast service options. “Breakfast in the Classroom” or “Breakfast After First Period” is available.

### **Nutrition Education**

2c. Active classroom learning experiences are provided such as involving students in food preparation or other hands-on activities at least once each quarter.

3b. District uses qualified personnel or organization from the community to provide nutrition education to students under the direct supervision of a teacher at least once/semester.

3c. District uses qualified personnel or organization from the community to provide nutrition education to students under the direct supervision of a teacher at least once/quarter.

### **Lunch**

2C. Students are offered recess before lunch and at least 20 minutes seat time to eat.

### **General Guidelines**

1c. Each quarter provide staff wellness activities and/or professional development opportunities related to nutrition, physical activity, mental health, and abstaining from tobacco and e-cigarettes are provided to encourage school staff to serve as a healthy role models. Staff wellness activities and training may also include
