"The American Way"



The most spectacular, most impressive, the most thrilling, the most heart-warming play ever produced in Medford High School was our Senior Class Play, "*The American Way*." It depicted the influence of our American ideals of life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness, upon Martin Gunther, his wife, Irma, and their two children, Lisa and Karl, German immigrants, who settle in Mapleton, Ohio. As a result of his honesty and hard work, Martin becomes financially able to build his long dreamed of furniture factory. Tragedy visits the happy Gunther home when the World War is declared. One of the most dramatic incidents of the play occurs when Karl, now a stalwart young man, pleads in vain for permission from his mother to enlist in the United States Army. Shortly after his enlistment, which is encouraged by his father, Karl is killed. Counteracting the sorrow of Karl's death, is the joy and happiness which his son, Karl, Jr., brings to aging grandparents. The second Karl finds it very difficult indeed to obtain employment in this modern age. He is, therefore, easily persuaded by a dubious friend to join a group of American agitators. A truly crucial moment it is as Karl is about to take the radical's oath. The aged Martin interrupts the meeting. He pleads with Karl in a stirring speech not to pledge himself to the bonds of that un-American group, but to reaffirm the high ideals of America. The cruel radicals beat Gunther to death, thus illustrating to Karl, as nothing else could, their ruthlessness. The last scene is that of Martin Gunther's funeral. The entire town pays tribute to his brave soul by singing "*The Star-Spangled Banner*." The audience greatly appreciated the drama, for they laughed, cried, and loved with the characters.

To Mr. Leslie Carey, our director, who again demonstrated his powers of play production, go our hearty congratulations and appreciation. Many thanks are due Mr. John Ricker and Miss Katherine Baker for their efforts so unselfishly contributed.

On April 23, 1940 the following notice was read to the student body.

At the meeting of the School Committee held on Monday evening, April 15, the following vote was passed:

"That a letter of commendation be sent to Mr. Carey, his assistants, and participating members of the Senior Class for their splendid presentation of the Senior Class Play."

Our presentation of "*The American Way*" was truly a class effort. The combined efforts of over one-hundred sixty of our class were required for the successful production of our play. The production could not have been the success it was without the faithful efforts contributed by the various assisting groups. We were fortunate indeed to have talented young actors and actresses to represent our class in the principal roles and in the all-important supporting cast. Tiring hours of rehearsal, dressmaking, and stage setting were contributed, respectively, by the cast, the wardrobe mistresses and the stage committee, all important cogs in the machine which successfully produced our class play. The very theme of "*The American Way*" demonstrated the ideals of faith, honor, ambition, and co-operation. It may be truly said that these same ideals were expressed by all our classmates who so unselfishly participated in the successful production of the Senior Class Play of 1940. "*The American Way*" will always remain with us as a splendid monument of our last year at Medford High School.

The spectacular drama, "*The American Way*," required the maximum in scenery and the utmost in efficient stage management. Those demanding requirements were capably executed by our stage committee under the direction of Mr. John Rieker. Many hours of laborious preparation were contributed by the stage committee in order that the scenery and properties, so necessary to the success of our play, could not have been more capably treated. Our humble thanks to the stage committee for its excellent work in setting our play and for their unselfish and untiring efforts.

The costuming of our play was a tremendous task in itself. When we take into consideration the span of years our play represented, we may well realize the costume demands. The audience delighted at the colorful, historically authentic attire of our characters. The cast enjoyed the efficient patient assistance of the wardrobe mistresses, capably directed by Miss Katherine Baker; and we all appreciate the unstinting unselfish efforts contributed by the wardrobe mistresses in their many hours of labor.

Vocational School



It is the aim of the Vocational School to fit boys for useful employment through the development of the occupational skill required for the performance of satisfactory work under actual employment conditions in the following trades: automobile, cabinet making, electricity, machine shop, painting and decorating, printing, and sheet metal.

One half of the time is devoted to actual shop work and the other half to related and academic work. The laboratory method of instruction which is used in the related classes is very closely correlated with the shop work. This close tie-up assures a thorough training in shop and technical information.

The school attempts to prepare the boy morally, intellectually, and physically for the vocation for which he seems to be best fitted by nature, ability, and opportunity; at the completion of his course the school places the student in the industry trained for, keeps in touch with his progress, and encourages his promotion.

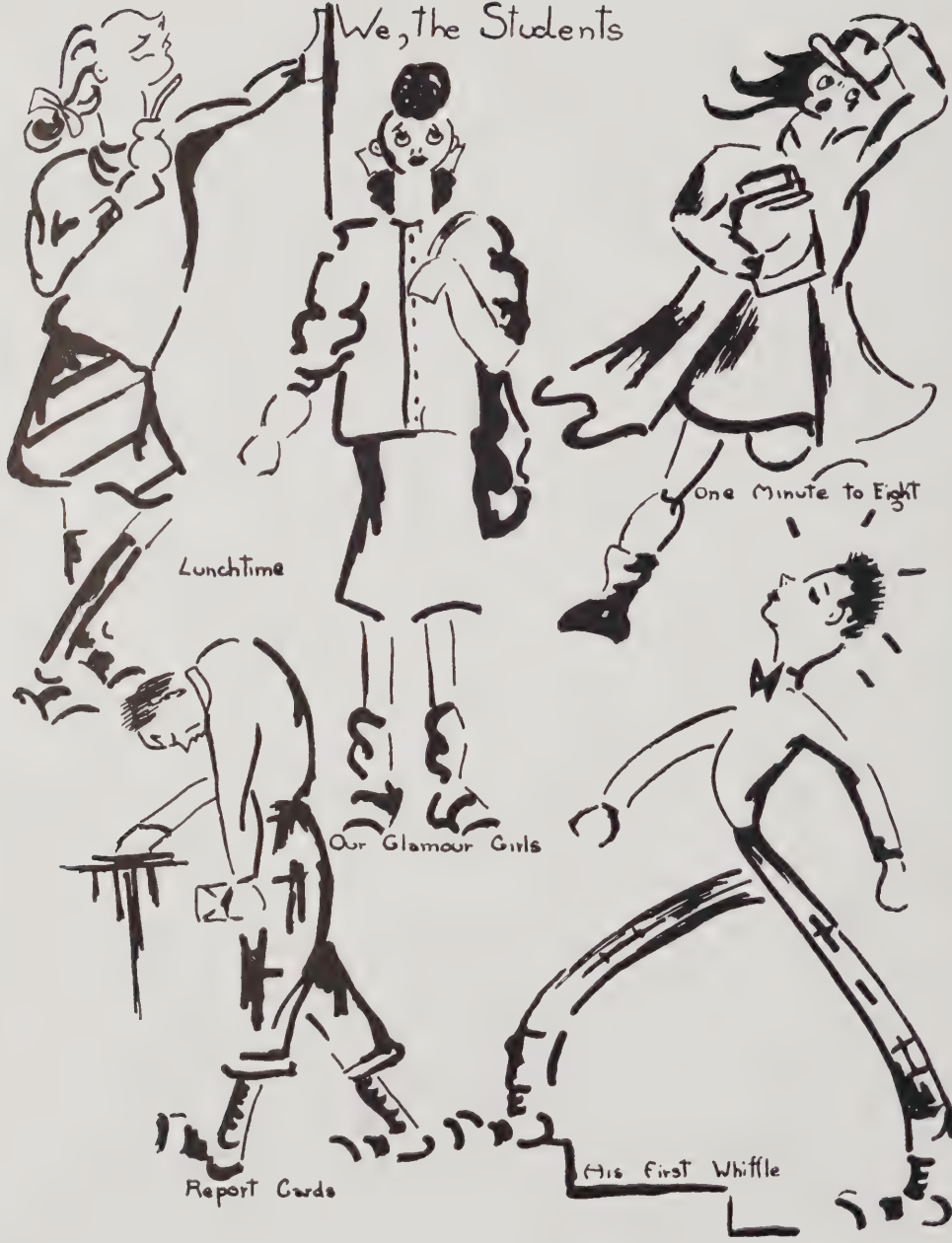

Ivy Oration



THE green of the ivy is a pleasant color. In the springtime, green becomes the sign of newness and awakening; it is the symbol of this season, the growing time of the year.

I wonder, classmates, if I may not venture the remark here that all young growth — our own included — is usually characterized by a shade of green? There is humor in the statement, "He or she is as green as grass"; but there is more than humor. There is the implication that he or she is young, eager, ready for the battle of life.

In a measure, our class may be compared to this sprig of ivy which has just been planted. Are not we — dignified seniors, I grant — still green in the sense of being young and in the process of growth? Yet greenness, associated though it may be with the humorous viewpoint of inexperience, possesses a significance far deeper. Green, my friends, is a smiling color, the color of happiness.

Today, the world needs happiness. For the world today is grim, bitter, disillusioned. The light of knowledge is withheld; subjugation is stunting the growth of peoples and nations. War such as mankind never before dreamed, grinds all Europe in the gristmill of hate. We see the hopeless processions of the thousands of folk who are homeless, separated, starving. Over everything hangs the war cloud. Spring has come to Europe, true; the green is there, but no one can see it. The rolling fogs of war blot it out.

Now, by way of contrast, let us consider this land of ours. I dare say that in all this world today ours is the only country wherein people approach the nearest to complete earthly happiness. We have our troubles, to be sure. We would not be a progressive nation if we did not encounter difficulties. But here in the United States is freedom — within limits, of course — freedom of speech, of worship; the right to live our own lives without undue interference by the state. Rule under dictatorship says that the state owns the individual; government under democracy maintains that the individual owns himself and that he, in turn, owes cooperative effort to his fellowmen.

How fortunate are we, then, classmates, to be born into this happy heritage!

Despite the growling chorus of the war gods over Europe, the outlook for the United States is green because our democratic institutions are built on bedrock. They cannot be destroyed by demagogues or dictators.

Our reflections upon events of the day would be idle if we reached no worth-while conclusion. Each member of the Class of 1940 should devote himself with the highest resolution to the lesson of the ivy. Each of the thoughts I give you now is in direct antithesis to the dictatorial creed. It is expected of the ivy that it grow and flourish into strength and power: that, exactly, is what the country expects of us, collectively and as individuals. It is expected of the ivy that it adjust itself to compensate for the ambitions of neighbor plants. Plainly it can be seen that we, too, must make peaceful adjustments with our neighbors in the daily process of our lives. Finally, classmates, from the smiling green and the warming russet of the ivy let us learn our philosophy of life: happiness.

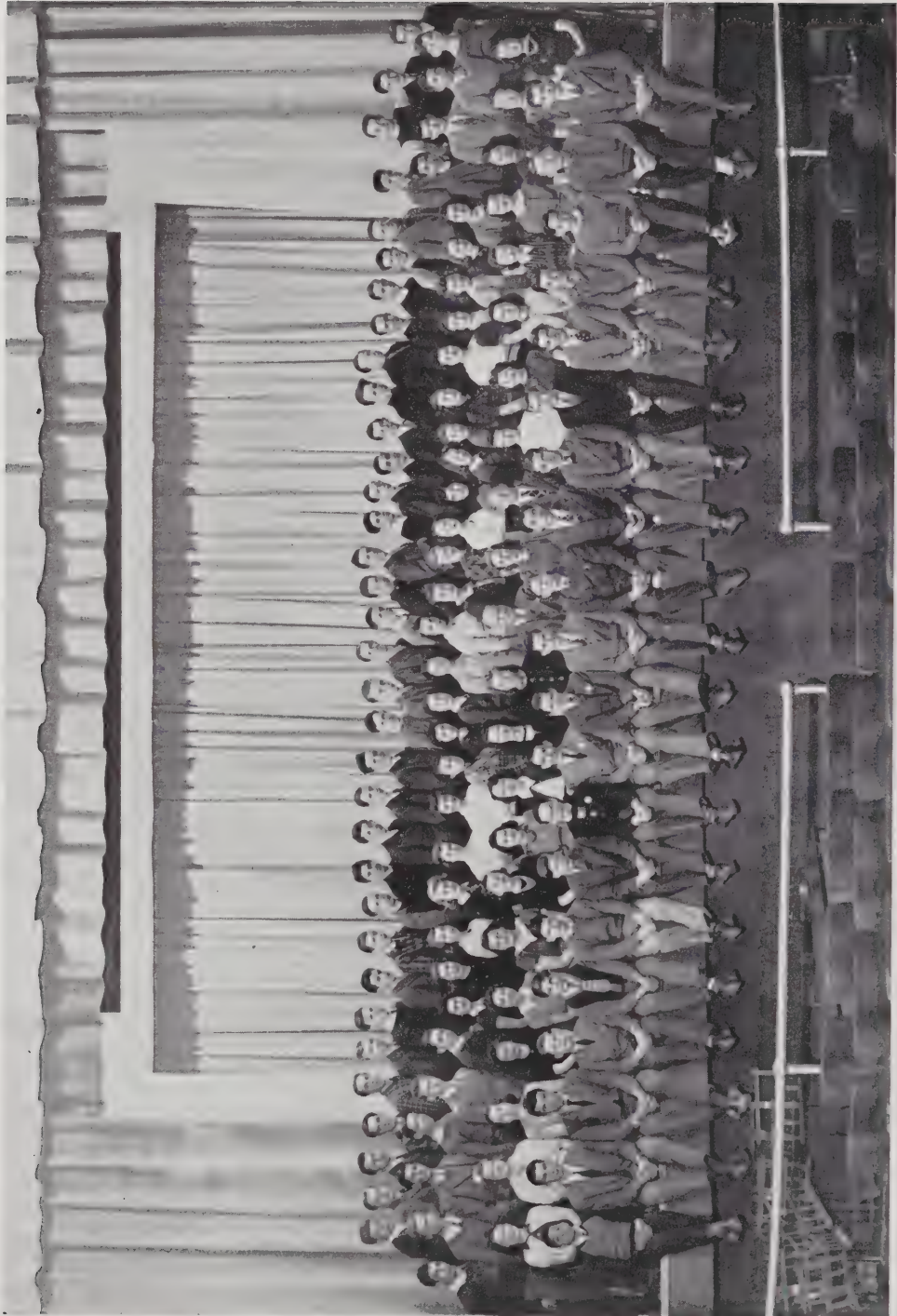

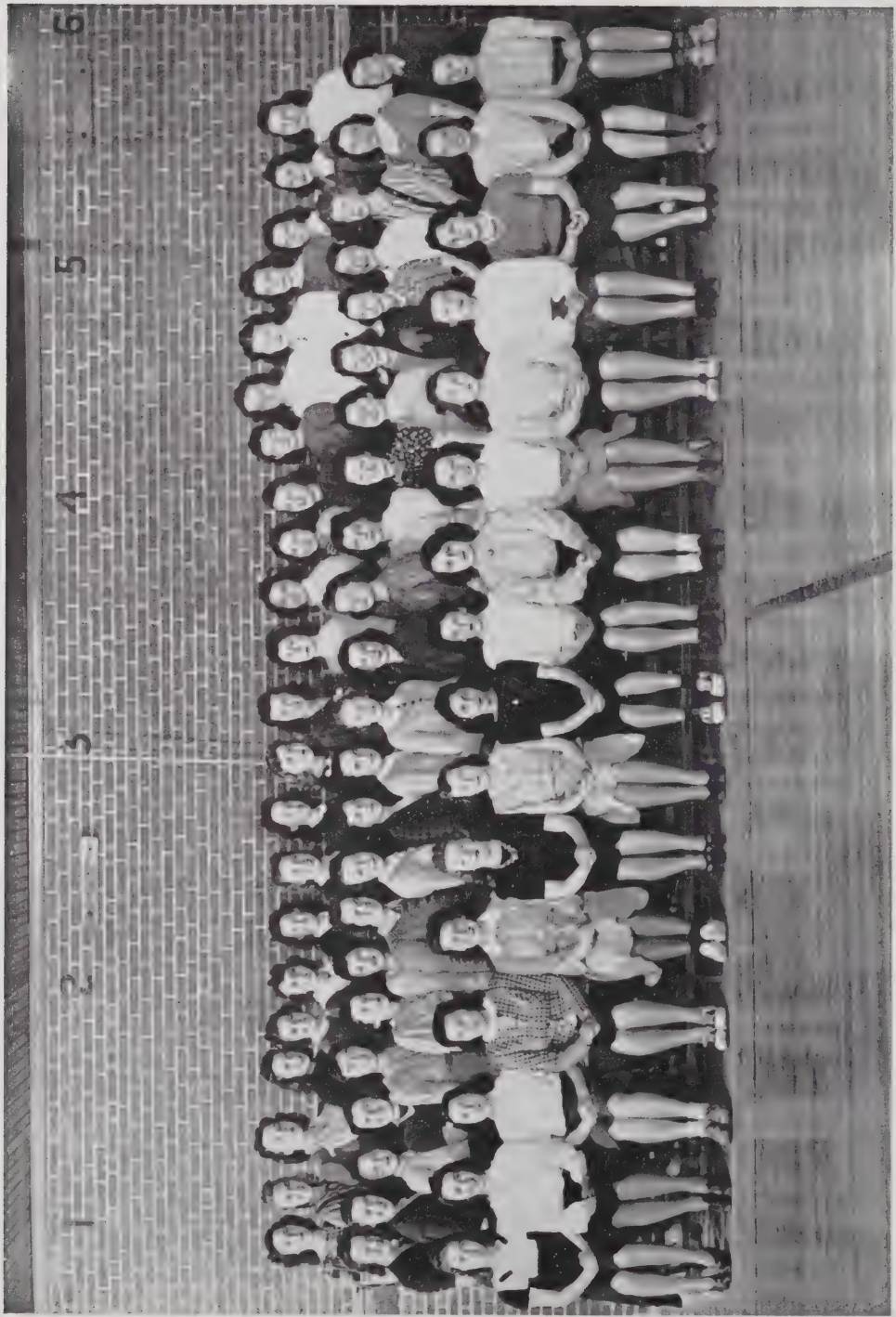

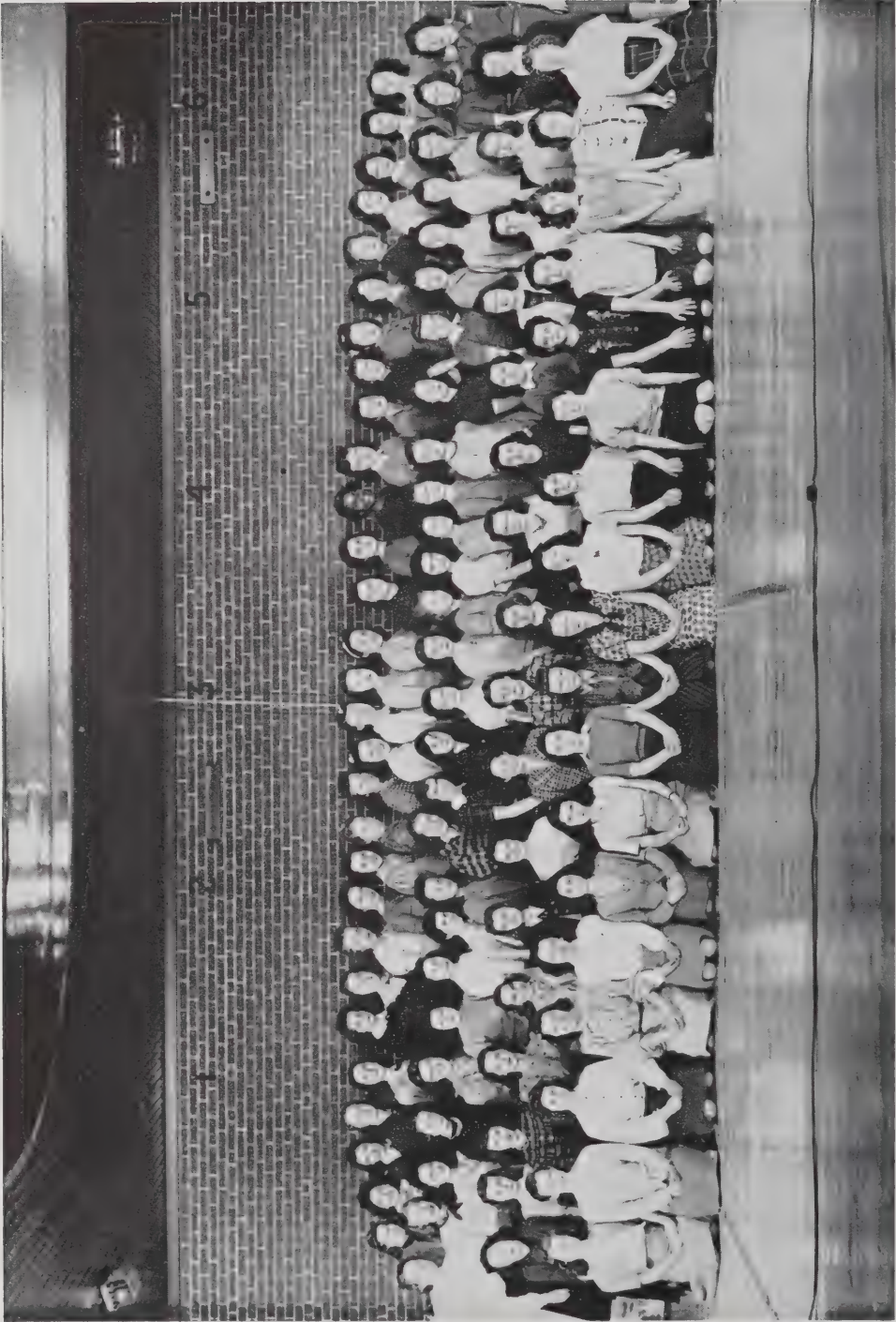


This year a new type of recreation was introduced to the girls of Medford High School — bowling.

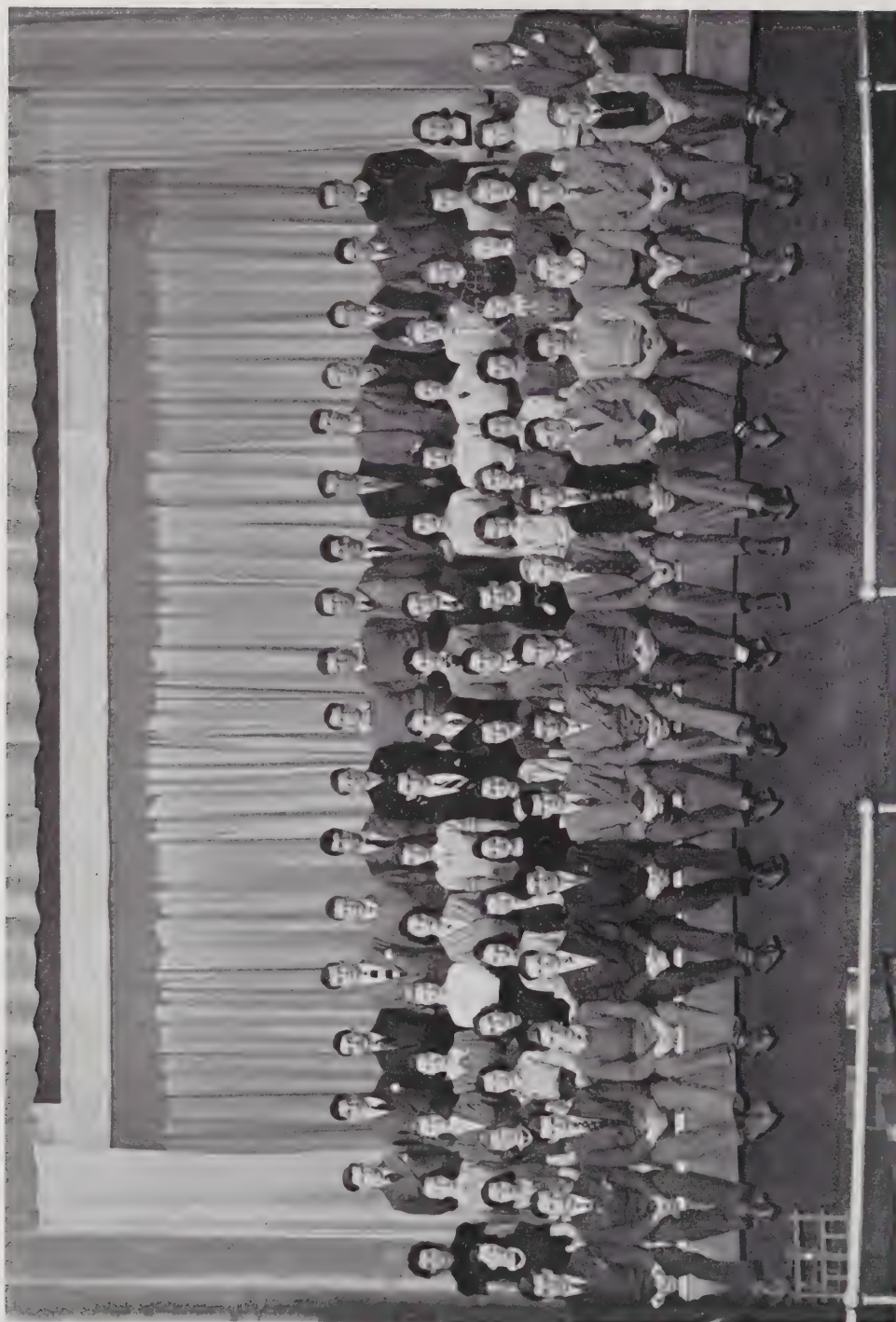

Vistas for Seekers



HOWEVER YOU and I may shortly be situated, we shall take our places not only as college students, as victims of unemployment, or as individuals in a vast army of workers, but also as members of an advancing society of glorious human life.

As we step forth to do our work in the world, we shall become more conscious than ever of its wealth-producing power. Even now as we participate in these Class Day exercises, we have only to gaze at the facilities of this auditorium to realize the wonders of modern architecture. You and I are indeed privileged to enjoy the benefits of the better environment in which we live. These achievements have resulted from tireless endeavors in the fields of commerce, industry, transportation, and communication; and from the development of the land, through hard labor, investment of capital, and intelligent management. Amidst the clamor of our striving to accomplish these difficult tasks, we hear the complaints of those who harp on the industrial depression, on labor forced to loaf. Those who grumble about prevailing conditions charge that mankind has gone the limit, that there are no future opportunities, and that progress has changed to regress.

Nor is this idea new. The story is told of a clerk in the United States Patent Office at Washington before the Civil War, who was so amazed at the tremendous number of inventions and patents that he resigned his position. He honestly believed that no new improvements or discoveries could be made. He concluded, therefore, that there would be no opportunities for his advancement. Remember, that was before the Civil War. Surely Andrew Carnegie and Jacob Riis, two young men just entering manhood at the time of the clerk's resignation, never harbored such demoralizing thoughts. Carnegie and Riis will live in memory for decades to come. As for the clerk who quit, how many can recall even his name?

History is replete with examples of men who have demonstrated that doors were waiting to be opened — of men who have had the vision to recognize an opportunity and the temerity to act upon it. Columbus, for instance, found a way. The doors he first tried for the chance to sail west were shut. Did he then shrink from his undertaking? Far from it! Indeed there was no obstacle formidable enough to divert this intrepid explorer. Braving uncharted seas, he achieved his goal. That venture required all the determination, all the skill, all the faith he could command.

Again, let us consider the Wright brothers. Applying the resources about them to gravitation, they produced the modern mechanism with which we travel through the air. The existence of electrical energy, the law of gravitation, and radio-activity were present before the times of Franklin, Newton and Marconi, but it remained for Franklin to fly a kite, for Newton to see an apple drop from a tree, and for Marconi to get vibration from a metallic substance without the use of a connecting rod. Just as those men applied the value of their findings to practical advantage, so must we.

Even in our daily experience we observe men, seemingly defeated, who find a way out. I know a man here in Medford who was formerly a successful contractor. He lost the use of one of his legs when a staging gave way. While he was recoving, his business was dissolved. Today he is successfully engaged in

making superior quality neckties. The man of whom I speak did not quit; he worked. That gentleman realized his opportunity. He made the most of his chance because he stayed with it and worked. We cannot quit; we must work.

There are doors before us, doors which must be opened. We still have frontiers in the fields of scientific progress and material advancement. We have before us the problems of human depression, social maladjustment, and the lack of proper economic distribution. The questions of life itself are still to be answered. There are openings before us; openings which we must discover if we are to acquire a sincere appreciation of the fullness and richness of life.

What then is required of us to open those doors? First, we must utilize what talents we possess. Be they ten, five, or one, if we use them wisely, there will be held out to us the promise of a greater life. A reasonable endeavor is all that is expected.

Next, we must play the game together. What football team can win a game if eleven men each have a different way of trying to arrive at the goal line? If we have no purpose, we stand stagnant. No football team can win a contest unless there is a goal toward which to drive. To reach the goal a team must possess the power to visualize its destination, and to plan, according, its manner of attack. Our purpose is to play the game of life, with ever a view for a richer, fuller understanding.

There may be times when we shall feel frustrated, when all doors seem barred, when we shall cry, "What's the use!" Such a crisis will call forth the best that is in us. We must muster all our manly strength and courage, and keep before us the simple faith that we will succeed, no matter what the odds.

The important thing, then, is our outlook on life. To one man, there are no stainless mountain peaks, no adventures of the soul. To another, life is a house of many mansions, and doors are ever open. To others, of whom we know all too well, the object in life is to steal, plunder, and be despotic and egotistic. The opportunities which those despots grasp do not lead through the open door to a richer life. At this time in the history of the world, Americans cannot allow the slightest weakening in their determination to accept all opportunities to do their share in the work of the United States. There are such opportunities awaiting us. We shall, under the guidance of God, find the way.

Contributing to a successful year were Captain Larry Zarella, Bob Murray, Paul Murphy, Leo Beecy, Tilo Margarita, Arthur DiMartino, Pete Sullivan, John Furey, Fran Hardy, and others whose names did not reach the headlines.

At the close of the season the lettermen elected Paul Murphy and Tilo Margarita co-captains for the 1940 campaign.

The schedule: Saugus, Melrose, Brockton, Somerville, Lynn English, Everett, Newton, Waltham, Arlington, and Malden.

MEDFORD 12 — SAUGUS 0

The inaugural game of the 1939 season with Saugus saw the Mustangs whip the tenacious and rugged lads from Class C ranks. A bad pass from center presented Medford with its first opportunity. A touchdown resulted. Another was added on a seventy-two-yard march. Although the plays based on precision were ragged, Medford showed power and condition which foreboded evil for later adversaries.

MEDFORD 6 — MELROSE 0

A stalemate was averted by a perfect play. "Chuck" Edgerly, behind perfect interference and blocking, galloped fifty-six yards for the only touchdown of the game. Melrose gained less than forty yards in all departments. The team was beginning to take form as a real power.

MEDFORD 7 — BROCKTON 7

After a first half which presaged defeat, Medford came back to sweep mighty Brockton off its feet. The superior condition of the Mustangs was apparent. A seventy-yard drive was nullified by a fumble on the lip of the Brockton goal. Undaunted, the Blue and White surged in to block the kick and recover on the two-yard line. Captain Larry smashed over for the score and calmly converted Medford's first point after touchdown to tie the score. Time ran out as the Mustangs were smashing toward another score.

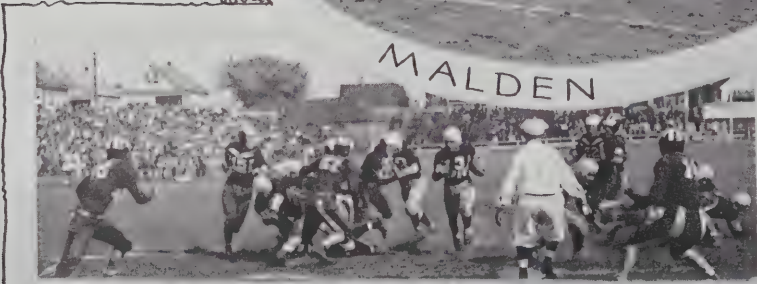
To mention individual stars would be folly. The entire team was superb after the first minutes when Lanone and Gold of Brockton combined to score on end runs and a low pass.

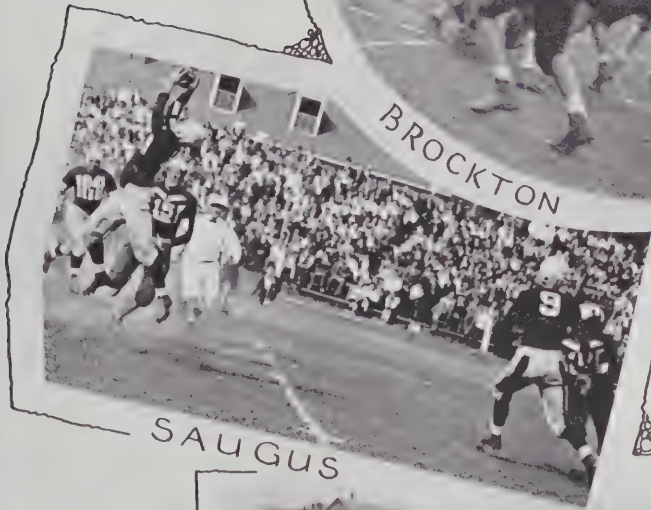

A penalty gave Medford the ball on Lynn's eighteen-yard line, from where it scored in four line smashes. Murray's scintillating broken-field running after a pass interception scored the second touchdown. On a cleverly executed spinner reverse the Mustangs scored touchdown number three. The second team was on its way to another score as the gun sounded to end the game.

MEDFORD 7 — ARLINGTON 0

In a thrilling game Medford defeated Arlington at Fulton Field. On the opening pass, the visitors threw a scare into the Mustangs with a long pass which was almost completed. Two acrobatic catches by Beecy featured Medford's advance, which led to a score. After gaining the lead Medford refused to open her bag of tricks, and played purely defensive football.

MEDFORD 12 — SOMERVILLE 0

The ultimate in timing and precision came in the jinx-ridden Somerville game. Medford ended Somerville's string of four victories with a perfect performance. A twenty-five year span remained unbroken, Bud Mahoney's running, Murray to Beecy passes, Margarita's defensive work, Murphy's vicious tackling, and the cohesion of the Medford forward wall were factors in a marvelous exhibition of spirit and football.

MEDFORD 7 — WALTHAM 0

A fighting Waltham team, endeavoring to keep its home record clean against Medford, held the determined Mustangs until a fifty-six-yard march terminated in a running pass from Murray to Cannava for a touchdown. Medford lost many opportunities by fumbles. Ted Alves was strong on defense.

MALDEN 7 — MEDFORD 6

Thanksgiving saw Medford's hopes for a State Championship dashed on the rocks. A vastly superior Mustang eleven lost to a physically beaten Malden outfit. Even at half time with Medford trailing, 7-6, the outlook was still bright, for Medford's power was tremendous. The Blue and White offense, however, was thwarted in every drive.

An interception by Brown of Malden and his subsequent eighty-five-yard run were enough to spell defeat.

Beecy, Murray, Hardy, Sullivan, Furey, DiMartino, Alves, and Zarella were playing their last games as Mustangs.

The season saw memorable performances. The team, largely seniors, exceeded the expectations of all supporters.

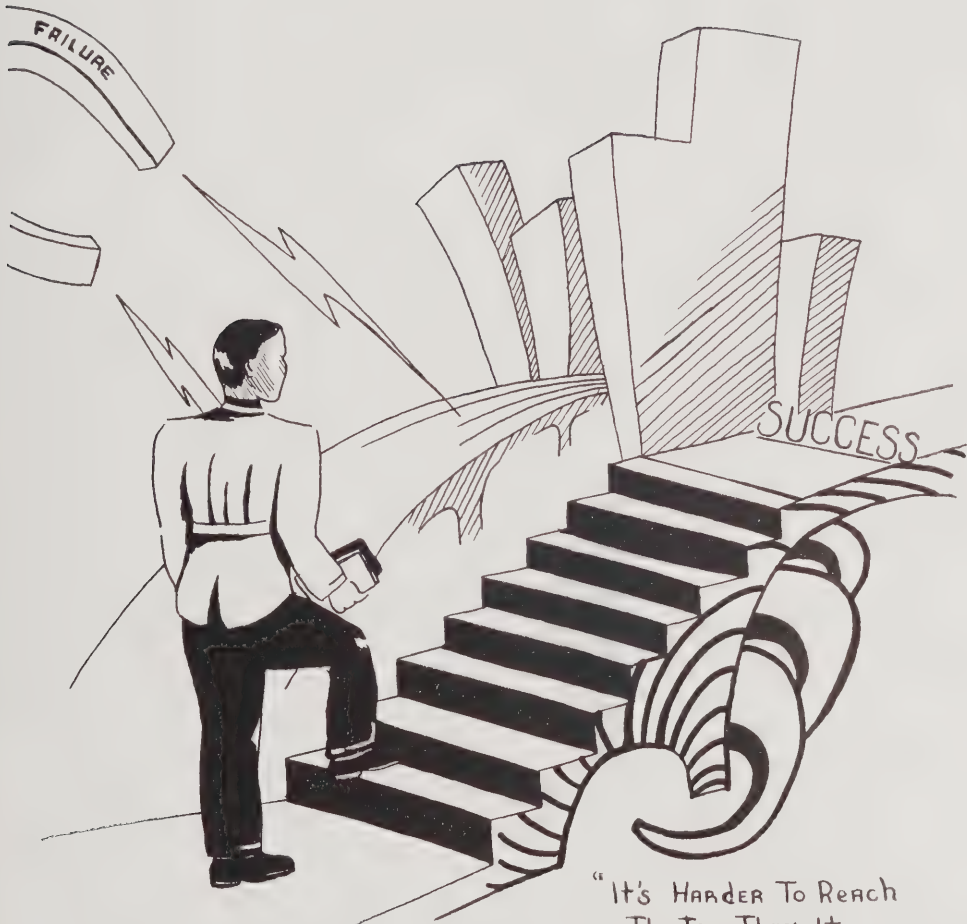
