Our Case For The Humanities

In this age of atomic power, when science and engineering are becoming all-important, we must not lose track of the artistic side of life. The cultural and artistic interests — including art, music, drama, religion, literature, and philosophy—are what the colleges and universities term the humanities.

My opinion is that much of the present interest in the fields of science and engineering is motivated by the desire for money. This is all very good from a practical point, for money is something which we all need. There is something else, though, which we all need in order to have a full life. It is the ability to express our own ideas and feelings and to live vicariously through the experiences and knowledge of others. This need can be fulfilled by use of the humanities.

Science, itself creates a need for the humanities. Nowadays our homes are filled with all kinds of contrivances which do work for us quickly and easily. These time-saving devices

give us plenty of leisure time which we would not otherwise possess. This time is often spent in some useful and enjoyable hobby, such as painting or music. Scientific creations, like radio and television, would be of little interest to us without the dramatic and musical programs. The great medical discoveries of the past century, which have increased man's life expectancy, have also increased his need for the humanities. Since the retirement age is relatively young, man must have something to occupy his mind after retirement. Hobbies in music and art are wonderful things to pursue. Many people write books or continue their search for knowledge. Books and plays are very entertaining for leisure time. A play like The King and I takes us to a far off land and entertains us with the amusing experiences of a person like ourselves in a foreign atmosphere like Siam. For more serious entertainment there are books, like Three Came Home, which acquaint us with the suffering which the P. O. W.'s had to undergo in the hands of the enemy during the two world wars and the Korean War. There are also biographies of such fascinating people as Edward Bok and Henry Ford, which show the rewards which these men received for persistent effort.

There are a great many values involved in the use of the humanities, which provide recreation for spare time; playing a musical instrument, acting in a dramatic presentation, reading books, and creating some work of art are of great worth.

They also give us a chance to provide entertainment for others in plays, on television, and in musical recitals or concerts. These humanities give us an opportunity to develop some of our latent talents in music and art and perhaps writing.

Knowledge of the humanities can also further our scientific program. It has been established that a great many of our scientific principles today, such as the atomic theory, originated with such Greeks as Plato in classical antiquity. Many of our mathematical and philosophical ideas originated from such ancient Greeks as Pythagoras and Euclid. Most of us have heard of the Pythagorean theorem, which states that in any right-angled

triangle the square of the hypotenuse is equal to the sum of the squares of the other two sides. This theorem was originated by Pythagoras, a Greek philosopher, about 550 B. C.

The humanities can be of great use in strengthening friendship throughout the world. First of all, family relationships can become improved by group use of these arts. One good example is that of the Trapp Family, which came to the United States from Austria and has toured the United States, giving concerts and impressing people everywhere with their happy family life. This idea of unity could be effected in a neighborhood. In my opinion the neighbors in European countries are much more friendly with each other than those in America. In many countries there are neighborhood gatherings in which everyone takes part. I believe that America in its fast development has lost much of this fun-loving attitude. The neighborhood could gather for a festive evening with entertainment given by those who can play musical instruments, sing, or act. Finally, I believe that the humanities have great possibilities on the national and international level in the exchange of groups of students of the humanities. This practice could do much in the way of increasing knowledge by an exchange of ideas and of promulgating international friendship.

So, at this time when every country in the world is building up its scientific and engineering program, and many of us are going into these fields ourselves, we must not for get the fact that the humanities can be of great value to us

We must never forget that each human being possesses a double entity: a body and soul. While science can produce a fuller life from the material side, we must not allow our souls to stagnate through neglect of the humanities. For some of us, these same humanities may even provide a living, but for most of us they will provide not only entertainment but also the cultural vitamins necessary to fortify our spiritual needs

So let us realize the full value of the humanities and put them to good use.



Fading Barriers

The concept of brotherhood means "good human relations" - about which there is often more talk than practical concern. True brotherhood involves the relationship of individual to individual; it concerns our daily actions. Brotherhood is something like faith. Religious faith is a concept most of us honor, but which we unfortunately neglect much of our lives. Then comes a crisis when our life or the life of somebody we love is threatened. Then our lips begin to form unaccustomed prayers that stumble haltingly from the heart. Is it not the same way with brotherhood? When danger sharpens our sense of common cause, we are only too glad to acknowledge that we are our brother's keeper, and that he is ours. Yet the common cause is always there. If we are all brothers on the field of battle or in the operating room, surely we are still brothers in the mundane surroundings of

our daily lives. The truth of the matter is that, although we accept these high principles of brotherhood, we are often individually too insincere in our application of them.

This being so, it is especially important to document by living example the faith which we must have in people and in the conviction that differences among people need present no insurmountable barriers to friendly relations. Once men are brought together under circumstances that really permit them to know one another and to embrace common purposes and values, then narrow prejudices concerning race, religion, and color disappear.

A very encouraging demonstration of brotherhood is exemplified by the Secretariat — the working staff of the United Nations.

It shows the ability of perhaps the most diversified assemblage of people in the world to understand one another and to work together amicably.

Altogether, there are some four thousand members of the United Nations staff, representing the majority of the nationalities of the world. They are of all races, colors, reliaions, languages, cultures, and ideologies. Their habits of dress, eating, worship, marriage, and work are varied as many come from highly developed and industrialized countries, while others are from underdeveloped, agricultural areas. There are Africans. Indo-Chinese, and West Indians, working side by side with their British, French, Russian, Greek, Scandinavian, and Latin-American colleagues. There are Arabs and Jews, Hindus and Moslems, Buddhists, Roman Catholics, Anglicans, Greek Orthodox, and varieties of Protestants from Baptists to Episcopalians. They represent capitalist and communist countries, thoroughly democratic governments, republics, monarchies, and even certain types of dictatorship.

In short, just about all the barriers known to human relationships are to be found in the United Nations Building. However, we find that these barriers are remarkably fragile, for all these people, so widely diversified in origin and background, work and play together in impressive harmony. Genuine understanding of different cultures dissolves and eliminates discriminations. Social and athletic clubs are formed on the sole basis of common interests. Thus, the United Nations has become a congenial human company, which is enriched, rather than divided, by its many differences.

Thus far I have mentioned only one of the great examples of working brotherhood. Let us recall the saying, "It's the little things that count." What are these little things? What can you and I as "little people" do?

There should be the deep desire to understand people different from us as understanding brings the recognition of the good in others, an act which is the basis of brotherhood. To gain understanding we must read about, live, work, and play with people of all races, creeds, and colors.

For centuries, civilization has fought to gain and preserve the basic human rights of religious freedom, tolerance, and the brotherhood of mankind. Our nation was founded upon just such principles, and devotion to them has helped build the spiritual strength without which America could never have achieved lasting greatness. However, our country is strong, not because of the efforts of one class, one person, or one job, but through the cooperation of all. The pooling of knowledges, skills, and experiences has proved to be the answer.

One of the most common fallacies is to think of human beings in terms of categories rather than in terms of individuals. Often when an American visits a foreign country, many assume that he is vulgar, gullible, and extravagant; in short, he gains the distasteful and bigoted sobriquet, a "typical" American. In like manner, the oriental may label a white man as "typical," implying all the defects and vices which are repulsive to eastern society. Catholics, Protestants, Jews, or Democrats and Republicans are wont to use the name of the opposite sect, cult, or party in a derogatory fashion. However, in all these cases, when the "typical" has been forgotten on both sides and only the individual appraised, it is usually discovered that a mutual respect obtains and that the two have much in common. The most important point to practice is to be on guard against the danger of generalizing with only a few instances as a Intolerance disappears if a man is honest with himself, if he stops judging people in general terms and confines his estimates to his own personal experience.

It is much more important to build bridges of understanding between persons than barriers of dislike. During the Korean conflict the breaking down of race barriers occurred every day: a soldier of the West rescuing a Korean from a shell crater, or a Frenchman fighting side by side with a boy from Kansas who could not understand a word the former was saying. To remove a barrier of discord and replace it by a bridge of harmony is a service to the world as well as to oneself.

Mutual consideration and understanding, tolerance, and devotion to principle are the strongest links we can forge in strengthening the bonds of brotherhood and faith among our fellow men. Graduates of Medford High School, our solemn responsibility is to do all in our power as individuals to destroy the remaining fading barriers of prejudice and bigotry.

Pauline Turco was elected representative at the Jewish Brotherhood Award which was sponsored by the Brotherhood for Christians and Jews.







Waring Chorus


