Kimberly Cassibry, Associate Professor of Art at Wellesley College, is an art and architectural historian specializing in the ancient Mediterranean. Her interests include monuments and memory, the politics of cultural heritage, and the histories of museums. Both her teaching and her public outreach emphasize the modern lives of antiquities. In collaboration with Smarthistory (the Center for Public Art History), she has published on Egyptian obelisks as cultural heritage, the *Dying Gaul* as an ethnic stereotype, and the portraits of the Roman empress Julia Domna from Syria.

Travel is her greatest passion, and her book *Destinations in Mind: Portraying Places on the Roman Empire's Souvenirs* (Oxford, 2021) explored how ancient residents of the Roman empire visualized their favorite spots on collectible vessels. Her work has been supported by the Getty Foundation and the Metropolitan Museum of Art. She has received Wellesley's Pinanski teaching prize and has served as president of Wellesley's chapter of Phi Beta Kappa.

In June 2025, history will come alive for Wellesley Alumnae and their families. Our *Family Learning Adventure to Greece and the Greek Islands* is a learning journey to ancient Greece. The program is designed to go back to the sources of the Western tradition to enlighten the senses and inflame the imagination of children and adults alike.

You will venture out to explore seminal places, including Athens, Epidaurus, Nafplion, Mycenae, Santorini and Heraklion, Crete. Of special interest to children will be a boat ride to Nea Kameni, a volcanic magma dome in the middle of a caldera, pushed up by successive eruptions.

This is an opportunity for families to create lasting memories of shared learning and discovery as you explore this remarkable region of Greece as a family. Grandparents, parents, and children will learn about Greek mythology, history, literature, culture, and contemporary life. Familyfriendly solo travelers are also welcome on this journey.

Experienced youth education counselors will lead groups of similarly aged children in the Young Explorers Program, a series of educational and recreational activities developed to enhance their appreciation of the sites you will visit. The itinerary has also been structured to allow free time to enjoy swimming in the crystalline blue waters of the Aegean Sea and the facilities of the hotels.

We are privileged to have as our Wellesley lecturer on this journey **Kimberly Cassibry**, Associate Professor of Art, whose expertise in ancient Mediterranean art and her work on the preservation of antiquities both in museums and in situ will lend a fascinating dimension to your learning experience.

When it comes to multigenerational educational travel, no destination surpasses Greece. I hope you will join Wellesley on this learning adventure.

ITINERARY



Sunday, June 29, 2025

DEPART THE USA Depart the United States for Athens, Greece.

Monday, June 30

ATHENS, Greece

Arrive in Athens. Transfer to the *Hotel Athens Capital*. In the evening, enjoy a welcome dinner at a local restaurant. (D)

Tuesday, July 1

ATHENS

The capital of Greece, Athens is Europe's oldest city. Its ancient

monuments stand as testimonials to its glorious past that gave birth to democracy and other concepts and ideas that form an integral part of the Western tradition. Explore in the morning the Agora, the civic, commercial and living heart of ancient Athens. **Young Explorers will participate in a treasure hunt and learning session about ancient Greece.** After lunch at a local taverna, adults and children will tour the Acropolis and its celebrated monuments, including the incomparable Parthenon. Travelers will/may also visit the Acropolis Museum, which houses an outstanding collection of sculptures. (B, L)

Wednesday, July 2

ATHENS/EPIDAURUS/NAFPLION/MYCENAE

Leave the hotel in the morning to explore storied sites in the Peloponnese, the place where many of the ancient myths and legends had their route. After driving over the narrow Corinth Canal. We will continue to Epidaurus, the sanctuary of Asclepius, the god of healing. Epidaurus is famous for its magnificent 4th-century BC theater, which is notable for its perfect acoustics and harmonious proportions. Then on to seaside Nafplion, one of Greece's loveliest old towns, where we will enjoy lunch and time at leisure to explore the town. Returning to Athens, visit Mycenae, the most important center of the Bronze Age Mycenaean Civilization, and home of Agamemnon, who led the Greeks against Troy. (B, L)

Thursday, July 3

ATHENS/VOULIAGMENI/SANTORINI

After a morning at leisure in Athens, drive along the scenic coastal road of the Athenian Riviera to Vouliagmeni, a fashionable seaside resort, famed for its lake of warm water enclosed by limestone rocks. Those who wish may enjoy swimming in the inviting brackish sulphureous waters. After lunch at a lakeside restaurant we will drive





to the airport for the short flight to Santorini. Spend the next two nights at the lovely *Hotel Orama*, located in Fira, the island's main town. Dinner will be served at a local restaurant. (B, L, D)

Friday, July 4 SANTORINI

In prehistoric times Santorini was a flourishing trading center inhabited by a sophisticated society. In the late 17th century BC, a massive volcanic eruption collapsed half of the island and buried its main town, now called Akrotiri, in a thick layer of ash and pumice, preserving its houses, streets and squares as they existed 3,700 years ago. Some have connected the disappearance of half of the island with the legend of Atlantis. We will return to Fira to visit the superb Museum of Prehistoric Thera, which provides a fine introduction to Santorini's Bronze Age civilization, and whose exhibits include artifacts excavated at Akrotiri. Spend the afternoon at leisure to enjoy the unique architecture and vistas of the island. In the afternoon, **Young Explorers will take a boat to Nea Kameni, a volcanic magma dome in the middle of the caldera, pushed up by successive eruption.** (*This activity is subject to a minimum of 12 Young Explorer participants*). (B)

Saturday, July 5 SANTORINI/HERAKLION, Crete

In the morning we will drive to picturesque and photogenic Oia, which commands the northern entry into the caldera, its colorful houses perched on top of the ridge. Explore this incredibly beautiful place, enjoy lunch at a local restaurant, and then drive to the small pier below Fira to board the fast boat to Heraklion, the main city and commercial center of Crete. Upon arrival, drive to a local restaurant for dinner, and then check in at the *Hotel Megaron*. (B, L, D)

YOUNG EXPLORERS PROGRAM

Experienced youth education counselors will lead group of similarly aged children in the Young Explorers Program, a series of educational and recreational activities designed from a child's perspective, enhancing their appreciation of the sites visited. This is the perfect opportunity to inspire young minds with the epic poetry of Homer, the legends of the *lliad* and the *Odyssey*, the ideas of Socrates, and the actual feel of classical architecture.

Accompanied by their parents and/or grandparents, children will take guided tours specifically created to bring alive legend and history. Or, flexibility being the key, they may also enjoy independent time to relax or explore together as a family. In addition, while adults attend lectures or enjoy free time, Young Explorers may:

- Participate in their own archaeological "excavation."
- Learn about the heroes and other stories of Greek mythology.
- Participate in a "treasure hunt."
- Learn about the ancient Panhellenic games that gave rise to the modern Olympics, and the story behind the Marathon race.
- Run a race in the ancient stadium of Nemea.
- Learn the secrets of the Corinth Canal.
- Produce a play in the ancient Greek style of presentation at the end of the trip.

Sunday, July 6 CRETE

The largest of the Greek islands, Crete is home to Europe's first civilization, the Minoan, which rose about 4,000 years ago. With an incredibly beautiful and varied landscape that harbors over 2,000 plant species, outstanding archaeological sites and museums, historic old towns, and a cuisine that gave birth to the Mediterranean Diet, Crete is a magnificent place to visit. Many of the ancient Greek myths took place here, and Zeus, the supreme ancient Greek god, was reared at one of the island's caves. We will drive in the morning to the south of the island to visit the Minoan palace of Phaestos (2nd millennium BC), which is located in a beautiful plain. Continue to the superb Preveli Beach, where swimming can be enjoyed, and after lunch at a local restaurant, drive to Rethymno, one of Crete's most attractive towns, known for its well-preserved architecture dating from the Venetian and Ottoman periods. Return to the hotel late in the afternoon. (B, L)

Monday, July 7 **CRETE**

Spend the morning at leisure for independent activities. Crete has been known for its curative herbs since antiquity. You may wish to visit Heraklion's herb market, where shops sell a wide variety of the island's herbs. In the afternoon, tour the palace of Knossos, the largest and most magnificent Minoan palace in Crete. Clustered around a spacious courtyard, the palace contains a maze of rooms, passages and stairways that probably generated the concept of the labyrinth. More than any other palace, Knossos reveals the brilliance and refinement of the Minoan civilization. Also visit the superlative Archaeological Museum, home to the world's finest Minoan artifacts. **Young Explorers will tour Knossos with a specially-trained children's guide.** Farewell dinner will be served at a local restaurant that specializes in Cretan cuisine. (B, D)

Tuesday, July 8 HERAKLION/USA Transfer to the airport for the return flight home. (B)
