PARENT-TEACHER CONFERENCES

Fall Semester Conferences

Fall conferences are the perfect opportunity to check in and see how your student is doing in school. Conferences will be held in person this year, unless requested otherwise.

EduSched, https://conferences.gbaps.org, uses your parent contact email address on file with the District to schedule your student's conferences online and review your chosen times. We hope that you will find this method of scheduling to be user-friendly. Please visit http://goo.gl/imVtP4 for directions to use this convenient service.

If you do not have an email, need to update your email address with the District, or are unable to schedule conference times for your child(ren) through the EduSched system, please contact our main office. To request a phone call or virtual conference rather than meeting in-person, you will also need to call the main office.

If you request a virtual meeting, you will find each teacher's Zoom meeting link in EduSched under "Zoom Link." When you click on the link at the time of your conference, you should see a white screen with the message, "Please wait for the host to let you in." You will need to wait for the teacher to let you into the meeting, as they will need to finish their previous conference.

As we prepare for parent-teacher conferences, efforts are made to ensure that we are fully compliant with protecting the privacy of your child's educational records. State and federal laws regarding privacy of educational records require that any individual who is not a parent or a legal guardian (such as a step-parent) must have a written authorization in place, from a parent or legal guardian, allowing the sharing of the student's educational record. Progress Grades

Our second grading period of the first semester ends on November 15th. Report cards showing progress grades will be available to view in your parent portal on Friday, November 22nd. As of the 2024-25 school year, 9th and 10th grade MYP courses are graded according to IB MYP requirements. Student grades are a combination of four different assessment categories, including: Knowledge & Understanding, Inquiring & Design, Processing & Evaluating and Reflecting on Impacts. Teachers score assessments based on specific categories. It is likely that not all categories will be used in a single assessment. Teachers will assess each category on a 0-8 scale, using the composite total to correlate to a letter grade. Check out our grading guide for a breakdown of possible grades.

Clarification on MYP Standards-Based Grading


- IB MYP course work is scored on several criteria that fit into 4 categories for each course.
- The assessments are focused on the description of a student's work and is used by teachers as conversation starters about what the student's strengths and growth areas are in each category.
- All four categories are graded independent of each other and are used in the final overall assessment of a student's ability in the course. For example, a student can be rated very high in content knowledge but also rated as a poor communicator in that discipline.
- IB MYP courses use a 0-8 criteria-based rubric to score students. These rubrics explain the grading with student-friendly language and a breakdown of specific tasks. Rubrics are available to students prior to each assessment.
- IB grade descriptions are converted to numbers in order to work with the online computer grading systems. This conversion can create an impression of a percentage within the computer program, but descriptions of skills are not a percentage and are not parts or a whole. The <u>grading quide</u> shows how scores should be interpreted and converted to traditional letter grades.
- MYP-to-District grade conversion charts reflect common achievement between subject groups and are available to students and parents in the teacher course expectations documents.



Scheduling Update

Students will start selecting courses for the 2025-26 school year in November. Students and parents will receive more information about course offerings in the next few weeks. As always, students can access their academic 4-year plan, within Infinite Campus, for scheduling courses.







TECH ED: BAY LINK PROGRAM

Bay Link Manufacturing® is a high-precision, manufacturing learning lab. The program gives students the opportunity to complete projects for local companies in the areas of industrial welding, machine fabrication, and metals. Students learn about the business of manufacturing through sales, marketing, accounting, production planning, bidding, purchase orders and customer service. After completing the Bay Link Manufacturing® program, students will be prepared to attend a 2- or 4-year college to pursue on-going education in the field of manufacturing and engineering or be prepared to enter the workforce in an entry-level position.

IS CHOCOLATE MILK THE PERFECT RECOVERY DRINK?

A hangry toddler and a nutrition expert rarely see eye-to-eye on grocery choices. So when they do align, you know you've found something special. The surprising point of agreement? Chocolate milk. Kids have been demanding it for decades, but athletes have quietly made it a post-workout staple. Now scientists are telling us why. It turns out that chocolate milk has close to the exact 4:1 ratio of carbs to protein that's recommended for recovering endurance athletes. Chocolate milk is also quicker to digest than solid food and offers some naturally-occurring electrolytes. This combination makes chocolate milk a nearly perfect recovery snack. You probably shouldn't drink it throughout your day since it contains a lot of added sugar, but it certainly deserves a place within a well-rounded diet.

All West Physical Education students are offered free chocolate and white milk after their gym classes, thanks to Fuel Up to Play 60 and the Apple Family Foundation!

For more ideas about how nutrition can help you after a hard workout, check out Marathon Handbook's guide on the subject: "Here's Exactly What To Eat After A Run To Maximize Your Recovery." Any protein is helpful after a workout, but ideally, you'll want to find foods that have complete proteins, or ones that contain all nine essential amino acids. Chocolate milk fits the bill, as do additional sources such as dairy, poultry, beef, eggs, fish, pork and whole sources of soy like tofu. Finally, be sure to include foods rich in antioxidants into your diet as the oxidative damage from exercise can contribute to muscle soreness. This would include colorful foods like berries, fruits and vegetables.

FACT SHEET



\$183 Million Capital Referendum

The November 2024 Capital Referendum enhances safety and security at secondary schools; addresses deferred maintenance projects at several elementary schools; and provides equitable, efficient and appropriate learning environments for students and staff. This referendum continues the work that began with the April 2017 and November 2022 referendums, which added secure entrances at our elementary schools; addressed deferred maintenance

in many of our east side schools; upgraded auditoriums, athletic areas, and specialty classrooms; and renovated and/or constructed appropriate learning spaces for today's instructional practices.

The work of the previous referendums have resulted in engaging learning spaces that are vitally important as the Green Bay Area Public School District continues its efforts to improve academic outcomes.



REFERENDUM FACT SHE

No Tax Impact Due to **Debt Repayment**

The Green Bay Area Public School District has been fiscally responsible. Since 2016, the District's mill rate (the amount multiplied by each \$1,000 of homeowner's fair market value) has been decreasing, with the 2022 mill rate being the lowest in decades. In 2023 the mill rate increased slightly due to an increase to revenue limits that was not offset by state equalized aid.

The District has historically structured its debt to allow for future borrowing without having to increase the mill rate. This process of borrowing debt, paying down the debt, and then backfilling the paid off debt with new borrowing enables the District to address its significant facility needs while maintaining a steady mill rate. The District currently has \$450-500 million in deferred maintenance to be addressed over the next 20-30 years.

Why a Referendum Now?

- The District is paying down debt from the November 2022 Referendum. enabling the District to borrow \$183 million without impacting the debt levy.
- Delayed and deferred projects become more costly over time, both in labor and supplies.
- Consolidating schools enables the District to save approximately \$5 million annually to be used for additional classroom resources. The referendum ensures that students impacted by the school consolidations will be attending renovated schools with appropriate learning spaces.

What Happens if the Referendum Fails?

- The proposed projects would be delayed/deferred, resulting in future projects also being delayed.
- Failure of the referendum would require a significant mill rate increase in order to address facilities and/or operation needs.
- The District will continue with the school consolidations as approved by the Board of Education, which will result in more schools being impacted by boundary changes.
