THURSDAY NIGHT CROCKETT SOCCER PRODUCES TWO VICTORIES

Pick 100 adults, sit them down, and poll them on this question: "What's the first word that comes to your mind when you hear the words 'middle school students'?"

It's a pretty good bet that - amid the sighs, groans, head-shaking, hand-wringing, and likely a few expletives - you could bunch their responses around a single word: immaturity.

Let's face it - in general, middle school kids don't get a whole lot of respect.

Which makes what the Crockett County Middle School girls soccer team displayed Thursday night at Cavalier Stadium all the more remarkable.

Playing in a semifinal game of the West Tennessee Regional Tournament, the Lady Cavaliers – a squad with a 12-1 record, and which has outscored its opponents 52-3 this season – found themselves behind 1-0 less than eight minutes into the match against Henry County. The Lady Patriots had managed to punch a shot past Crockett goalkeeper Hannah Wede – a feat roughly equivalent to sneaking sunrise past a rooster.

Coach Doug Wede's club could have panicked and folded like a card table. Instead, barely 10 minutes later - playing with a poise and a confidence and a patience beyond their years - tied it up. Seven minutes after that, they took the

And as they displayed a maturity that would stun the 100 unbelieving random adults we polled earlier...

They were following the lead of a sixthgrader.

Not a typo, ladies and gentlemen. A sixthgrader. With a smile almost as big as her limitless potential. And a work ethic bigger than the smile and the limitless potential.

Her name is Kalynn Lewis, and by the time the final horn sounded Thursday night, she'd pounded three goals into the Henry County net and the nails in the coffin of the Lady Patriots' championship hopes. Crockett won the contest 4-1 and is headed to the title game Saturday morning in Jackson at Trinity Christian Academy.

"Let me tell you about Kalynn Lewis," Coach Wede said after the triumph. "I asked the girls to be here by 5:00 tonight. That's for a 6:30 start time. Kalynn was here at 4:15, drilling shots at the goal, which she had pulled over to its spot on the field from its usual storage position in the corner of the stadium. She'd already worked up a sweat like Dak Prescott. I told her, 'You're gonna be gassed before we even play!' She just said, 'I'm good.' She's not really ready to go unless she's warmed herself up like that. Not only that, but she's one of the most coachable players I've ever had. She always wants to learn how to be better. And that is exactly why she is going to have many memorable moments on this field in the coming years."

And while the hat trick by Lewis was the major story from the game, this should also be definitively noted: If you think the Lady Cavaliers are anything close to a one-girl team, you are sadly mistaken and/or misguided – which is another reason this squad is so formidable. None of the players is jealous of anyone else's success.

That becomes evident when they score a goal against a strong opponent such as Henry County. There are hugs all around, high fives and tens, slapped hands, pats on the back, and smiles you can't fake. If they play a foe that is, shall we say, less than stellar – their celebrations are much more toned down. Sometimes you can't even tell they just scored.

But each goal Thursday night brought the party atmosphere. After the two scores by Lewis gave the suddenly rejuvenated hosts a 2-1 lead by the halftime intermission, Wede did what he often does during the break: He picks a certain player, pulls her aside, and makes a strategic adjustment with detailed instruction. For this particular match after talking with defender Charlee Lewis, who was playing despite suffering a back injury a couple of games ago - he then called Kalynn Lewis and Olivia Barger out onto the field and taught them a change in strategy he thought would open things up in the second half.

When he was finished with them, the two girls stayed together and talked through it with each other until they were both comfortable with it.

With 17:50 left in the match, Lewis fired a shot from the left wing that deflected off the goalkeeper's hands but stayed in bounds. Barger – who's constantly moving – slammed in the rebound to make it 3-1, Crockett. The joy those two shared in the ensuing embrace would settle the current conflict in the Middle Fast.

Now with a two-goal lead - and everdependable Ruth Gourley policing the middle of the pitch to ensure there'd be no clear runs at the Lady Cav net - Crockett's players gained even more confidence. The back line defense - Amy Mena, Kamilah Juarez, Catherine Scruggs, Marley Thornton, and Charlee Lewis - kept Hannah Wede from having to make any serious second-half stops.

And with time ticking down, Kalynn Lewis found yet another opening and put the whipped cream on top of the milk shake when she booted in the final tally in the 4-1 triumph.

"Our intent was not to let up at halftime," Coach Wede said. "We wanted to keep the pressure on. We made a little adjustment with Kalynn and Olivia that I thought would help both of them, and it's a tribute to them that they were willing to try it and execute it so well. This entire team is a dream to coach."

Saturday's title match at TCA will be Crockett's first time ever playing for the Regional Championship.

And speaking of successful teams...

HIGH SCHOOL SOCCER: Crockett's high schoolers - no slouches themselves this year - closed their regular season schedule Thursday afternoon with a solid 5-0 victory at Jackson North Side as senior Lydia Waddey collected a hat trick and Amaria Walker - though rarely tested on this day - posted another clean sheet in goal.


Coach Carli Branson's Lady Cavs improved to 9-3-1 for the season and now head into next week's district tournament play at South Gibson County in Medina. Crockett opens with revengeminded Dyersburg at 5:30 Tuesday after having defeated the Lady Trojans in an extra-time penalty kick situation last week.

Against North Side, Rebecca Waddey got the Crockett offense started early when she poked in a corner kick by Dani Rios that had glanced off the goalkeeper's hands.

Older sister Lydia then drilled in two long shots in the time remaining in the opening period. The Lady Cavs upped the margin to 5-0 in the second on Lydia's third goal and another by Braniya Green off an Emme Grace Martin assist. Branson used almost her entire roster Thursday and received solid minutes from reserve players Chloe Campbell, Adalee Doyle, Elany Miguel, Alivia Hale, and Kate Davis, among others.









