The East Islip Board of Education has unanimously voted to approve a contract with John J. Finello to serve as the district's Interim Superintendent for the 2011-12 school year.




Mr. Finello earned a Bachelor of

retired from Huntington on June 30 of this year.



Mr. Finello is also an active member of local, state and national superintendent associations, and has served on the executive board of Section XI of the New York State Public High School Athletic Association. He has received many accolades for his dedication to students over the years, including the Spirit Award, presented by the Huntington Foundation for Excellence in Education, for his nearly four decades of service to the Huntington community.

I hope you are enjoying a healthy and fulfilling summer. With students returning to school on September 6th, and September 11th just a few days after the opening of school, our district's 9/11

Commemoration Committee met to discuss a district-wide plan to commemorate the ten-year anniversary of this unspeakable tragedy that has affected history. The committee, comprised of administrators, teachers, librarians, parents and community members, met on Thursday, June 16th to brainstorm ideas for this commemorative event which would be appropriate for each grade level.

Since September 11th falls on a Sunday this year, we are planning to have our district-wide activities on Thursday, September 8th and have selected Friday, September 9th as a rain date in the case of

inclement weather. In addition to a moment of silence held in each building, the following is a brief description of the events and activities each school is planning for its students.

At the East Islip High School and East Islip Middle School, outdoor ceremonies are being planned which will include color guard presentations and speeches from community members who were involved in the 9/11 rescue efforts. In addition, the High School is planning to create a time capsule, with an event to take place in the courtyard, and the social studies teachers will be discussing the historical significance of 9/11. At the Middle School, a large flag will be created in the courtyard, and each student will have the opportunity to decorate a portion of the flag with a patriotic message. A memorial walk of the courtyard is being planned during extended lunch hours. Students will also view a short video about our nation's heroes, and the events

that led to the commemoration of this day.

The elementary schools are planning a flag ceremony, along with patriotic songs to be sung by all students. Students will be asked to wear red, white and blue to school as they learn about the events of 9/11 in their classrooms using developmentally appropriate materials. In addition, Connetquot Elementary School is planning to dramatize a special story, appropriate for grades one and two. Ruth C. Kinney Elementary School is also planning a patriotic art project that will display handprints of students for all to see. Other plans are still being developed.

The tragedy of September 11, 2001 occurred when many of our students were either quite young or not yet born. You may wish to discuss the tragedy of 9/11 at home with your children prior to these events.

I would like to thank all who assisted in planning and coordinating these tributes. You are wished a safe and enjoyable summer. I look forward to welcoming our students back to school on Tuesday, September 6, 2011.

The FTK would like to thank all those who have contributed to its success over the years. Please reserve the date of June 21, 2012 for next year's Golf Outing.



He left students with his motto, "No excuses...anything is possible."

Cranes for A Cause
