Senior Selected for Global Business Competition

Justin Ovalle, a senior at East Islip High School and a member of the school's International Business Career Academy, was selected as the first Long Island student to compete in the W!SE Global Business Challenge (GBC). The competition took place on April 6 in Manhattan.

The WISE GBC is a virtual enterprise competition at which mock firms are invited to analyze a company and make recommendations to address the company's issues. Justin's "company" consisted of ten students, whom he has never met, from around the world. His company competed against several other companies.

Justin was chosen for this honor based upon a nomination from East Islip's Director of Guidance, Israel Malinowitzer. The selection process also entailed a look at Justin's work ethic within the Academy, his attendance, GPA, as well as other recommendations from teachers. As part of the International Business Career Academy, Justin and his classmates formed a mock-company called Mobile Revolution, Justin was the Director of

Human Resources for the group. In its first year, the program worked through the Virtual Enterprise system and interacted with other virtual enterprises worldwide.

"I like all the people I work with," Justin said. "The Academy gave me a lot of competitive experience and helped me make business connections for the future." Justin also placed in the Best Foot Forward Competition. His video related to the Career Academy theme of "Project Green."

The GBC provides an exciting opportunity for students to apply their expertise and work collaboratively with a team of students from across the globe to solve problems. At the competition, Justin engaged in the art of negotiations, worked as a member of a team, and designed, implemented and evaluated a business plan.



Valerie Tator, a social studies teacher at East Islip Middle School, has been named a

She earned her bachelor degree in history from St. Joseph's College and her master's in history from SUNY Stony Brook. In addition to her education, Mrs. Tator has practiced karate for thirty years and holds a 5th degree black belt.

Mary Hallowell, who was a student of Mrs. Tator and is now a member of the Harvard College Class of 2014, said of her former teacher: "[She was] one of the first teachers to truly acknowledge my potential. Having her approval greatly helped my confidence as a student." Ms. Hallowell added, "She assigned many projects that gave us much

creative leeway, and this, I believe, helped me to recognize my interest in theater (I wrote a play about the 1930's as my final project in her class) at a time when I had only been involved in athletics."

"All of us in East Islip are thrilled," commented Wendell Chu, Superintendent of Schools, on learning of Mrs. Tator's award. "Mrs. Tator brings social studies to life for her students and connects what has happened in the past with the issues and concerns of today." He further noted, "She designs lessons that put her students in the roles of the people during the era the class is studying. In this way, her students experience the mood of the times. Exciting News: Access to Parental Portal

We are pleased to inform you that parents of high school and middle school students will soon be able to access their children's progress reports and report cards online. We are in the midst of preparing to open the Parent Portal portion of our student management system called Infinite Campus.

Parents who register and activate accounts will be able to view different areas of information concerning their children. Initially, your children's report cards and progress reports will be presented for viewing. In future years, our goal is to have student schedules, immunization information, attendance and other areas made available. We hope to have the Portal open for elementary parents and legal guardians during the 2011-2012 school year.

Each parent or legal guardian of a high school or middle school student in our district will be able to create a unique username and password for the Portal. In order to gain access, parents or legal guardians will need to read the East Islip School District Parent Portal Acceptable Use Policy and complete and sign the East Islip School District Parent Portal Registration Form. Parents must register in person with the district.

For any parent who was unable to register during the previous designated days, daily ongoing registration will be held during the school day at the high school and middle school beginning May 1, 2011.

Registration should take approximately 10 minutes.

Please be sure to bring the following with you when you register:

- 1. a valid photo ID
- 2. a signed EISD Parent Portal Registration Form
- 3. a valid e-mail address

Once registration is complete, each parent or guardian will receive a unique portal activation key

code (or GUID #) along with instructions on how to set up his/her account on the portal via e-mail. Login and navigation information will also be provided in the e-mail, as well as on our school website at www.eischools.org. From the district's homepage, click on the tab "Parents" and click "Infinite Campus Parent Portal." Parents can e-mail our Parent Portal Help Desk for all questions regarding the portal or to send updated information at the following e-mail address: parentportal@eischools.org. Inquiries will be answered in the order they are received. Unfortunately, we will be unable to provide help by telephone.

We hope all of our high school and middle school parents and guardians will take advantage of this opportunity, which will result in cost savings of paper and mailing in the future, while making access for parents quicker and easier.

It is bad enough that there are double digit increases in retirement system and health care costs. In addition to those increases, the new state budget calls for more cuts to our state aid. These cuts are in addition to the cuts that were forced upon us last year. Forget about gradual reduction, this could be devastating.

This leads me to the title of this article. Don't for one second think that every item is not analyzed to see which will have the least impact on the students. We, as a Board, are asked to make decisions that sometimes affect part of the community, and sometimes all of the community. They are not easy decisions to

At the time of this writing, we are in the middle of budget presentations. We look out over the crowd and see the same faces that we see at our monthly Board meetings. We thank them for coming. Be informed, read the literature, ask questions. We need to have the whole community educated on which decision they will make in the upcoming budget vote.

Superintendent's Message

Every year it becomes harder and harder to continue providing the programs children need while remaining fiscally responsible to our community. This dilemma is due in part to rising costs

and increased demands for services, but lately it has been dramatically deepened by reductions in state aid to education. There has been a broad public outcry over rising property taxes on Long Island, and all of us in education have heard the message and are working hard in continuing to find cost-cutting efficiencies. At the same time, some information that is not as widely publicized is being overlooked.

The proposed state budget will reduce

East Islip's state aid by \$2.2 million. This will put state aid at a level \$4.7 million lower than it was in 2008-09. Currently, there is a lawsuit settlement known as the Campaign for Fiscal Equity (CFE,) that provided a formula for increasing the state's contribution to the education of children. This settlement came as a result of the state's recognition that it was not supplying funding appropriate enough to provide a sound, basic education to its children. Districts like East Islip have long recognized that the state's contribution to the cost of educating the district's children was insufficient to meet the growing needs of our student population. Now this formula, which was frozen for the past two years, has been suspended until 2016-17. It is no wonder all of us are considering drastic measures in order to find a budget that our

community can accept.

In trying to prepare our children for the 21st century and the skills needed to be successful, we have been stifled in many ways. As we try to imagine what the world will be like for our children, we increasingly ask them to be patient for the tools and programs that will help them find success. As an educator for the past 38 years, I have always worked to build the skills of my students and capture their passions and interests in the content I present to them. How do I capture both the attention of our state government and the trust of our community in order to provide for the children I serve? This is not a task I do alone, but in conjunction with all of you. We must work together to find the means to ensure that all of our children have the opportunities they desire and deserve as they move from childhood to adulthood.

Asst. Superintendent's Message

Recently, a headline in *Education Week* caught my attention: "Moving Beyond One-Size-Fits-All." I was thrilled to see that general education is developing the tools and the ability to infuse special education strategies into the general education

curriculum. Special education individualizes education for students with special needs through the use of IEPs (Individual Education Programs) and differentiated instruction. IEPs are mandated initiatives that are supported by federal grants as well as local funds. The goal of general education has been to individualize instruction, but many factors have been impeding this initiative, such as class size, class time limits and the hours needed to personalize education. With the advent of educational technology, the Response to Intervention initiative, and access to different methodologies, this goal can become a reality for all students. Teachers are now able to assess student needs, collect data and plan lessons based on student interests and educational needs.

The East Islip School District has made great strides towards the goal of meeting the individual needs of all students. Response to Intervention (RTI) is a New York State mandated initiative that the district has been working toward and which is beginning to be put into practice. The district's RTI Committee

has spent several years researching universal screening and progress monitoring methods as well as research-based interventions. RTI involves the early identification of students' learning problems and the use of focused lessons, or interventions, to address those problems before they can become identified as disabilities. If the student's skills progress, he or she leaves the program; but if there are still problems, the interventions intensify in frequency and length. If the student still does not respond to the most intensive instruction, he or she may be referred for a comprehensive special education evaluation.

In preparation for this initiative, the district has implemented a specific, research-based, early reading program for students in kindergarten through second grade. This program provides instruction for the entire class, as well as targeted additional instruction for students with greater needs. East Islip also provides intense training for many of our teachers in another research-based reading program, which is individualized for qualified students in grades three through twelve. A new reading program based on RTI principles that is designed for grades three to five will be implemented in the 2011-12 school year. These personalized early intervention initiatives, in conjunction with the present Balanced Literacy program, will lead to the early identification and remediation of learning deficits. In many cases, they will also circumvent the need for special education.

The district's recent assistive technology initiative, geared for all students, has helped to provide equal access, support and remediation where needed. Every school has the SOLO 6 software, and every student has the ability to use this software at home. Software components include a talking word processor, word prediction, text reading and a graphic organizer. Ongoing coaching for staff, students and parents will continue to be provided. The recent donation of iPads for our students with significant disabilities has helped to individualize programs for them, as well as provide highly motivating material

motivating material.

Person Centered Planning is an initiative in the Career Development Program. This process focuses on identifying the strengths of developmentally delayed students and helps them make choices and receive training in these identified areas. We have been able to personalize work experiences to meet individual needs and to develop necessary skills. Indicative of the success of this methodology is that some of our students now have job prospects as they

exit the program.

With the support of the staff, the community, and the various organizations that support our initiatives, we will be able to continue on the path of personalizing experiences that will build on individual strengths and remediate weaknesses. Ultimately this will raise students' interest in learning as well as achievement and help them develop into lifelong learners and productive citizens. New Kitchen for Career Development Program

Students in the Career Development Program at East Islip High School celebrated the grand opening of a new kitchen. Teachers in the district's special education department had been working for the past



year with administration to develop a program that expanded upon the curriculum of those students in the life skills classes. Career development teachers Margaret Gallagher and Sabina Uettwiller thought the addition of a kitchen perfectly aligned with the goal of the program, which is to find student interests and strengths and assist them in building upon those skills.

The Career Development Program teaches life skills such as health, consumer mathematics, cooking, office skills, retail skills, and reading to students in the program. Each skill is taught using a method that is individualized for each child's needs. Funds for the new kitchen came from grants, with the E.J. Autism Foundation donating the appliances. "It is the



fanciest school kitchen I've ever seen," said Andrew, who is enrolled in the program. "Thank you so much."

Take a Duck to Class Essay Winner

Eighth-grade students in the Family and Consumer Science Class at East Islip Middle School recently participated in the TD Bank *Take a Duck to Class Essay Contest.* Hosted by the Long Island Ducks, students were asked to submit an essay on "Why my community is important to me."Out of hundreds of essays received from schools across Long Island, four students were chosen as winners of the grand prize. One of those winners was East Islip eighth grader Krista Cook. In her essay, Krista wrote about the East Islip



community and how her friends and church are always there to help.

As part of Krista's prize, she received a Visa Gift Card and her entire class got to meet and receive autographs from Long Island Ducks All-Star Ray Navarrete and team mascot QuackerJack. The entire eighth-grade attended an assembly where Ray and QuackerJack explained to students the importance of a good education and how listening to parents and believing in yourself can help you achieve your dreams. "Whatever it is, it can happen," Ray told students. Despite being told he would never make the varsity baseball team, he added "Growing up, I told myself and my family that this was my dream and I will play baseball."

Raising Drug Awareness

In an effort to raise drug awareness, the district recently hosted a special seminar for 6th through 12th grade students and community members. The age-appropriate workshops were conducted over the course of two days by Michael Zotto and Jim Murphy of the Strategic Protection Group in West Islip. The pair held one seminar at the middle school for each grade, a seminar for each grade at the high school, and an evening session for parents and interested community members.

The seminars focused on signs of addiction, how an overdose can occur with any amount, and how to be a part of the solution. "You have no idea how your body will react to something," one of the presenters cautioned students. Mr. Zotto and Mr. Murphy began the workshops with an intense video documentary entitled "Hindsight," and covered such topics as what each drug looks like and its effect on you, as well as the dangers of prescription drugs. They also touched on local stories of drug abuse and its impact on society, as well as national stories of television stars and musicians who should be seen for their entertainment value and not viewed as role models.


