

"We have more students than ever before who have taken on the challenge of AP coursework," Director of World Languages, ENL and Assessments Christian Seifert said. "With a cohort of 32 more students, the increase is over a whole class in size. We also administered more exams last year than in any other previous year. What we are most proud of, however, is the 90% or greater passing rate on five different AP exams that were offered in 2024."

"As a district, we continue to increase enrollment in advanced courses," Director of Careers and Student Services Dr. Jason Stanton said. "Our students' continued success is a testament to our dedicated teaching staff."

Updated VE Room at EIHS Provides Students a TASTE OF THE BUSINESS WORLD







The new, updated virtual enterprise classroom at East Islip High School has proven to be a solid success, taking students in the program to the next level in terms of both physical resources and modeling the real business world. Phase 1 of the VE room update was completed over the summer, with the second phase – including a new floor and monitors around the room for presentations – scheduled for summer 2025.

"We wanted to build a space that was like a nextgeneration office or startup with the ability to have meetings, flexible spaces for the kids to work and high-speed computers to do a lot of the accounting," Director of Careers and Student Services Dr. Jason Stanton said. "Basically, a room to run a full-scale business for the virtual enterprise program. We designed the room with the VE teachers to get their input on what businesses look like today and what the kids really need to have experience with when they get out of college and into the real world."

The new VE room – also utilized by classes such as accounting, digital communications and health information network systems – has garnered significant attention and sparked interest in the program itself.

"Students that didn't previously sign up for our VE classes have walked by the room and summarily signed up for the classes," Dr. Stanton said. "We are looking forward to having more students participate in the VE programs next year."

EAST ISLIP COMMUNITY STANDS TOGETHER FOR SPLENDID HOMECOMING

East Islip enjoyed a splendid homecoming on Sept. 28, ignoring the occasional rain shower to demonstrate outstanding pride and community spirit. After a short but sweet parade down Main Street ending at the fire department, students and families enjoyed a food truck festival experience and a spectacular football game. Led by star quarterback Thomas Costarelli and spurred by fervent fans in the stands, the undefeated Redmen crushed Smithtown West by a lopsided 41-14 score. Excelling at the quarterback keeper, Costarelli ran for East Islip's first three touchdowns, and threw a 13-yard pass to Niko Meyers for the team's final TD of the day. Ryan Parker added a rushing TD, while Jack Kalinowski scored on a 37-yard interception. Brendan McCaffrey and Jaden Schmidt earned one sack apiece, while kicker Anthony Mariani was a perfect six-for-six on extra points. At halftime, viewers were treated to cheerleading and kickline performances, and Daniel Carroll and Lauren Glynn were crowned as homecoming king and queen, respectively. KEEPING SCHOOL SAFETY AT THE FOREFRONT

School and student safety remains a paramount issue for the district, and new initiatives for the 2024-2025 school year continue this emphasis.

"Over the past several weeks, our safety team has been meeting regularly to assess and strengthen security across the district," Superintendent Paul Manzo said. "As part of our ongoing commitment to ensuring the safety and well-being of our students, staff and community, we have implemented several additional security measures. These updates include enhanced surveillance systems, card access point readers in all buildings and an increase in security personnel throughout the district, allowing for more comprehensive coverage and vigilance at our schools."

Traffic control bumps were recently installed at the middle school and Timber Point, and the Blue Light lockdown system featuring exterior strobe lights was added to the already enhanced interior and exterior door access system in each building.

"With all the new parking lots that were recently refurbished across the district, we decided to add some speed bumps in various locations, designed to reduce vehicle speeds and for added safety for pedestrians walking through the parking lots," Facilities Administrator Anthony Gagliano said. "The district decided to add a Blue Light system so that in the event of a lockdown, pressing a button located in a building's main

lobbies results in all doors being in the locked position and the activation of a blue flashing light on the exterior of the building at specific entrance doors notifying anyone trying to enter the building that they are not to enter and to leave school grounds immediately."

Several new safety policies were also implemented, including a state mandate to inform parents of lockdown/emergency drills and a student cellphone use plan. For the latter, cellphones and electronic devices must be off and away during the school day for all students in grades K-8, and no ear buds are allowed. At the high school, students can only use cellphones in the hallway during passing time (without ear buds), and in the cafeteria during scheduled lunch period, study hall and library during noninstructional time (with ear buds allowed). High schoolers are not permitted to use cellphones or electronic devices during classroom instructional time, suspension and detention; or in bathrooms, locker rooms and physical education classes.

"We also take great pride in our partnerships with law enforcement, which includes utilizing resources that provide direct access to Suffolk County dispatch for emergencies," Manzo said. "We remain dedicated to continuously evaluating our safety protocols to ensure that we are providing the most secure environment possible for everyone, and thank the community for its continued support as we work together to keep our schools safe."
